"We had all hands on deck Monday at 8:30 (a.m.), and everybody was all smiles," Putney reported.

Attendance is up at Matthew Thornton, with 541 enrolled as of Aug. 29. It's the same number they had in 2015-16, she said, and more than the 501 that had been projected for this year. The average class size is 21.6, Putney said.

Putney said this year she will continue to focus on "POP culture," Perseverance, Ownership and Practice. "We will stay the course while adjusting it for the skills each individual needs," Putney said.

And while a couple of exhausted first-graders fell asleep over their lunches, one fifth-grader told her his first day was "amazing," Putney said.

North Elementary School Principal Paul Dutton said he had a "great" opening with 465 students. A new student and first grade orientation the previous Friday helped relieve anxiety, Dutton said.

His professional staff went back to school themselves, learning CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation and AED (automated External defibrillator) skills over the summer, he said.

Dutton said he is looking forward to building on the skills children acquired last year through the POP program.

Of his 465 charges, 29 percent are first-graders, Dutton said. On Opening Day, 22 of the 29 came in on the same bus. It was comical, he observed, to see all the little ones file out at the same time.

School Principal Richard Zacchilli thanked the Parent Teacher Organization (PTO), which provided all staff with a "bag breakfast" the previous Friday, as they prepped for Monday.

LMS had a modified schedule for the first two days, Zacchilli said, while students worked on organizational procedures. "We want them to have positive relationships with all the adults in the building," he said.

He welcomes 1,010 sixth, seventh and eighth graders. Nine students on the rolls were absent, and he said staff would be checking to see if they got a late start, were in charter schools, or had moved.



# **Editorial**

### Be an Informed Voter

Next Tuesday, Sept. 13 is the State Primary Election, bringing with it the usual puzzlement over the requirement for partisan ballots.

If you are registered Republican, you vote on the Republican ballot. If registered as a Democrat, you get the Democrats' ballot.

While in most cases the Democrats' ballot is less interesting – fewer contested races - that doesn't negate the importance of casting a ballot. And there are indeed some contests, particularly for Governor.

There's more to choose from on the Republican ballot, and we're delighted to see that 18 GOP members put their hats in the ring for the 10-seat State Representative race in Derry. That's a nice show of interest in the future of state government in New Hampshire. While that's the most extensive list of candidates, there are choices in many other races as well.

The Primary will determine whose names appear on the November General Election ballot, where regardless of political party affiliation, we get to vote for our favorite for national, state and county office. And of course this year the national election is particularly important, as all of us choose our next President even if it means voting for the lesser of two unappetizing choices.

We hope to see a high turnout in the Primary, rather than the usual lackluster effort at voting in anything but the Presidential Primary and Presidential election. We know there's a difference in opinion in how the state should be governed. and it's hard to comprehend why complaints are levied throughout the year but come election time, people stay away from the polls.

We let ourselves and our neighbors down when we ignore any election, only to find ourselves taxed out of our homes and represented by people who embarrass or upset us. If you have an opinion on the candidates, and we hope you do, Sept. 13 is the time to make that known in the voting booth.

And if you're still undecided, pick up the phone and give a couple of political hopefuls a call. Share your concerns, and see how they

There's still time before the Primary Election to prepare yourself to make an informed choice. If you care about who represents you in Washington and Concord and Brentwood, take the time to learn about the candidates and be an informed voter Sept. 13.

#### **Auditorium Questions**

To the editor:

It is true that Londonderry is planning to add enough housing units to accommodate more than 3,600 residents (Londonderry Times, April 30, 2015) as part of the Woodmont Commons project. However, just how long will this build take and how many of these residents will actually be children?

We are blessed across southern New Hampshire with many great school systems. As of 2015 these towns' respective property tax rates were comparable. The difference between Bedford, Londonderry and Windham was less \$1.75 per \$1,000 assessed evaluation.

We in Londonderry pride ourselves that "our" kids go on to Division 1 colleges. This has changed in 25 years. Not having an auditorium has not affected this high rate of acceptance into the best colleges. There is no question on the "common application" or on any other college application that asks "Did your High School have an auditorium?"

When this topic was discussed before the Town Council the last time around - (yes we have discussed and considered the issue of an auditorium for many years. In fact a portion of the cost was a 2015 ballot and the voters voted no.) - it was stated by one Council member, "Show me the money."

Very wise advice. Is it fiscally responsible to suggest that we borrow \$10 million to build this, simply because some other bond the taxpayers have been paying for years will be paid up? How about the tax rate goes down when this bond is paid off? Would not a tax rate that has actually been retive to prospective home buyers?

Is it not fear-mongering to suggest that if we choose not to build this auditorium before we can afford it, that our property values will plummet? The Londonderry housing market just this past year has exploded. Existing properties have been bought and sold within days of being listed. Not having an auditorium has not been a deal breaker.

Stroke is when poor blood flow to the brain results people ha in cell death. There are two main types of stroke: ischemic, due to lack of blood flow, and hemorrhagic, due to bleeding. They result in part of the brain not functioning properly. Signs and symptoms of a stroke may include an inability to move or feel on one side of the body, problems understanding or speaking, feeling like the world is spinning, or loss of vision to one side among others. Signs and symptoms often appear soon after the stroke has occurred. If symptoms last less than one or two hours it is known as a transient ischemic attack (TIA). Hemorrhagic strokes may also be associated with a severe headache. The symptoms of a stroke can be permanent. Long term complications may include pneumonia or loss of bladder control.

The main risk factor for stroke is high blood pressure. Other risk factors include smoking, obesity, high cholesterol, diabetes, a previous TIA, and atrial fibrillation. An ischemic stroke is typically caused by blockage of a blood vessel. A hemorrhagic stroke is caused by bleeding either directly into the brain or into the space surrounding the brain. Bleeding may occur due to a brain aneurysm. Diagnosis is typically with imaging such as a CT scan or MRI scan along with a physical exam. Other tests such as an electro-cardiogram and blood tests are done to determine risk factors and rule out other possible causes. Low blood sugar may cause similar symptoms.

Prevention includes decreasing risk factors as well as possibly aspirin, statins, surgery to open up the arteries to the brain in those with problematic narrowing, and warfarin in those with atrial fibrillation. Å stroke often requires emergency care. An ischemic stroke, if detected within three to four and half hours, may be treatable with a medication that can break down the clot. eople had an ischemic stroke and 3.4 million people had a hemorrhagic stroke. In 2010 there were about 33 million people who had previously had a stroke and were still alive. Between 1990 and 2010 the number of strokes which occurred each year decreased by approximately 10% in the developed world and increased by 10% in the developing world. In 2013, stroke was the second most frequent cause of death after coronary artery disease, accounting for 6.4 million deaths (12% of the total). About 3.3 million deaths resulted from ischemic stroke while 3.2 million deaths resulted from hemorrhagic stroke. About half of people who have had a stroke live less than one year. Overall, two thirds of strokes occurred in those over 65 years old.



# Mistakes Sting Lancer Gridders Hard in Their 2016 Opener

**¬**hroughout the weeks of its pre-season, the Londonderry High School football squad heard its fair share of speeches about how vital it would be to keep mistakes down to a minimum if it's going to return to being a Division I playoff team.

But as is so often the case, the Lancers found out that actions speak larger than words in their season-opener against the defending D-I champions from Goffstown High School in Goffstown Saturday, Sept. 3.

Coach Jimmy Lauzon saw his charges play hard and do quite a few good things on the gridiron against the Grizzlies. But the six turnovers proved costly to the Lancers in what ended up being a 19-14 loss.

Londonderry fumbled the football away four Goffstown on pass interceptions twice, with the decisive turnover being a fumble in the Lancers' own end zone with 1:05 left to day, turning the ball over

beautiful pass interception until late in the first half. by senior standout Cam MacDonald. But it wasn't to be on this warm Saturday afternoon in front of a large and spirited crowd.

"I loved the effort, I loved the physicality, but vou can't turn the ball over five or six times and expect to win. You just can't do that," said Lauzon.

The Lancers received strong performances from numerous sources, and they tallied 367 yards of offense to Goffstown's 232. The LHS passing game collected more yardage than the host Grizzlies' entire offense did, with senior quarterback Jake Stevens completing 27 of the 41 passes for 288 yards and both Londonderry scores. His favorite targets were MacDonald, who caught 10 tosses for 145 yards and the first Lancer score, and junior Adam Wilkinson, who hauled in eight tosses times and handed it over to for 64 yards and the other LHS touchdown.

The Londonderry offense scuffled on its first three possessions of the all three times on two interceptions and one fumble.

The LHS defense was nothing short of machine-

Londonderry snagged a 7-0 lead early in the second quarter when it ended a short drive with a 31-yard pass connection from Stevens to MacDonald.

The Grizzlies trimmed their deficit to 7-3 late in the second period when kicker Sam Heidenreich wowed the crowd by hammering a 47-yard field goal through the uprights.

The score would remain at 7-3 at halftime, with the LHS gaining 195 offensive yards to Goffstown's paltry 58.

But the hosts were very effective with their first offensive series of the second half, using 11 plays to drive 62 yards to pay-dirt on a 6-yard quarterback run.

Facing a 10-7 deficit, Londonderry went on offense and ran an eight-play drive that ended at the Goffstown 27 on a fumble.

The Grizzlies then went back down the field and upped their lead to 13-7 on a 32-yard field goal with 2:08 remaining in quarter number three.

The Lancers appeared to have the game tied as the fourth quarter began on a long pass play, but the 47-vard connection ended badly when Londonderry fumbled the ball away at

the Goffstown three at the tail-end of that play.

However, the Lancer defense refused to allow the Grizzlies' offense to move the ball at all on the hosts' subsequent series, and LHS quarterback Stevens and his offense were back on the grid in mere minutes to start a series on Goffstown's side of the 50.

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
