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Keno Question Comes Up at Town Council Meeting

It didn't take long after the mention of Keno gambling for divisions to emerge between Chairman Tom Dolan and Vice Chairman John Farrell at Londonderry Town Council Meeting on Monday, Nov. 6.

Deliberations on the subject began when Town Manager Kevin Smith asked the question of whether the council should sponsor the ballot question for Keno in Londonderry on the town warrant.

In accordance with the passage of state funding for full-day kindergarten

this past summer, each town and city in the state is tasked with deciding whether not they will allow keno gambling in their local bars and restaurants.

Under the provisions of the new law, the state will provide a set dollar amount for each full-day kindergarten student beginning in 2019. After 2019, the per-student amount would change based on how much revenue the state takes in from keno.

Currently Londonderry does not offer a full-day kindergarten, a fact that Chairman Dolan was quick to point out in his

case against sponsoring a warrant question.

"It doesn't do anything for the community and we don't get any of the money," said Dolan. "I don't think it's going to enhance our social fabric to have gambling in the pubs or restaurants."

While Dolan noted that Londonderry's willingness to adopt full-day kindergarten might change his opinion, he made clear that his personal preference would be to leave adding keno to the warrant up to a citizen's petition.

"I don't have any issue letting the voters vote on

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Michael's Way Scheduled to Open Before Holiday

Michael's Way will be opening to the public at last. The new road connecting the Woodmont Commons shopping plaza to Pillsbury Road was originally scheduled to open the week of Nov. 1, according to its developer. However, it hit some snags that forced the Planning Board to consider a waiver at its Nov. 8 meeting.

Jeff Kevan is a civil engineer for TF Moran and spoke on behalf of the developer. "Our goal was to try to get the road open to try to alleviate some of the traffic during the Thanksgiving holiday

time period," he said. Currently, the agreement the developer had with the Planning Board was to have all parts of the road completed, along with landscaping before it was opened to the public. Right now, the landscaping is not done and road is missing a 1.5 inch "wearing course," which is the top coat of pavement.

John Trottier P.E. from the Londonderry Department of Public Works explained that Kevan is seeking a waiver to open the road since regulations say that all site improvements must be completed prior to it opening. The only usual exception would be the landscaping.

Trottier told the board that the plan is to finish construction while drivers use the road to access the shopping plaza. It would be missing the wearing course and pavement marking until the spring construction season starts next year.

Right now, drivers on Pillsbury Road are

blocked from accessing Michael's Way by large orange and white striped barrels. By opening the road now, it would allow the developer to begin a traffic study of the area. "The owner can start to

monitor traffic flow in the areas required under the 2016 conditions of approval," said Trottier.

"I think it's a good idea," said Town Councilor Jim Butler. "There's been a lot of infrastructure that people don't see when it comes to drainage, electrical, water, sewer and it is a lot of

money up front." Butler went on to say that it would be better for the road to settle over the winter before the developer investing in putting on the wearing course and the pavement marking.

Planning Board member Leitha Reilly has concerns about safety. Kevan said there wasn't any-

thing to worry about and that the planned sidewalks would be extended as time goes on down to the shopping center and up from Garden Lane.

Kevan also projected that the power lines would be finished in the spring as well. To do this, however, parts of Michael's Way will be closed periodically to allow for the laying of the lines.

There was discussion of the roundabout planned for the area, with Ann

Chiampa expressing concerns about if the area will be labeled clearly enough for drivers to anticipate the circle's potential traffic backups. Kevan said there would not be stop signs for that spot, but there would be adequate warnings for drivers.

Chairman Art Rugg said that opening up the road now "will give us a handle on future planning" for the area.

Michael's Way is not a

public road, so the town will not be responsible for its upkeep. Town Planner Colleen Mailloux said, "under site plan approval, these are all private roads internally and would not be accepted as public roads." Any and all maintenance of the roads within the Woodmont development would be the responsibility of the developer.

Kevan said Michael's Way is scheduled to open, "the week before Thanksgiving."

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Recreation Commission Discusses Skate Park Dedication and Future Plans

Preparations for next spring and discussions concerning the town's skate park took the stage during the Londonderry Recreation Commission's latest meeting at Town Hall on November 13, whose goal it is to provide recreational activities and facilities for residents of all ages.

Members began the meeting by briefly going over old business, starting by noting how treatment for grubs on the

Londonderry Athletic Fields Association Fields on Sargent Road has been ongoing since their discovery early last month, but there are fears that the field near Nelson Road will also require treatment in the future.

There were also concerns over the possibility of the commission's diesel mower starting to malfunction due to some of its electrical components not functioning. A new model would most likely run the commission eleven to twelve thou-

sand dollars, although it was pushed more towards the group's long range plans, as this is currently the off-season for the fields and budget talks are not really a concern as a result.

Upon moving on to new business, discussions continued over upgrading the lighting system at the Nelson Road Softball Field, due to the fact that the wooden poles used to hold the lights have a life span of roughly forty years and they are quickly

approaching that benchmark. Some have also begun to show signs of twisting on the upper portions.

Such a renovation would run the town anywhere from one hundred and twenty thousand dollars to one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Jim Edwards, a "softball activist" in Londonderry for over thirty years, has recently been working with the local softball leagues to drum up support and funding for the project.

The commission is also preparing to take bids via a petition warrant article to have a maintenance building built for the sake of equipment storage, as various field and groups have had to rely on metal crates to store their equipment so far.

Finally, a local woman, who has chosen to remain anonymous, announced earlier in the week to the commission that her son, who was living in Florida at the time, recently passed away. Since he

was an avid skater, the mother was hoping to donate funds to the skate park for general use. However, members advised against this, as it would be mainly focused towards the purchase of lumber and other materials. Although it is not official as of yet, members did suggest that the funds instead be put towards a granite bench with her son's name on it, which would be placed outside the fencing area of the skate park.

Orchard Christian Fellowship Raising Money for Students With Race

If you're looking for an opportunity to fit in a quick race in this November, as well as raise money for a good cause, the Orchard Christian Fellowship Church has just the event for you, as they will be hosting their second annual Turkey Trot Fundraiser on November 18.

According to Scott Rowe, Director of Student Ministries for the church, the primary focus of the fundraiser is to raise money for several causes aimed towards local students between the sixth and twelfth grade, namely their scholarship fund. Said scholarships are typically given to students who contribute a large chunk of their time to assist in various community events, with the number of hours they contribute being taken into account when scholarships are finally awarded. On top of this, the funds

also go towards mission trips in the summer to help fix various homes that have started to rack up rather large amounts of damage, as well as a weekend youth camp retreat in the winter in Hebron, New Hampshire.

Although the race is on its second year, Rowe admits that last year's was simply a dry run that mainly involved family and friends within the

church, netting about fifty to sixty participants and raising roughly five hundred dollars. However, this year is being advertised far better, as they have already received a number of donations from various local establishments and are expecting anywhere from one hundred to two hundred people to show up.

The race itself will be roughly a 4K, or 2.46

miles, starting at the church on 136 Pillsbury Road and will gradually make its way through a series of trails, sidewalks and fields of local schools before finishing back at the church at around 10 AM. Racers are free to run or walk at their own pace and can also bring strollers for their children and even dogs, although they are expected to be on leashes.

On top of the race, prizes will be awarded to the runners with the top three best times. Furthermore, racers can also wear costumes, with the best team costume and individual costume winning a prize as well. But above all else, Rowe and the church want to give back to Londonderry and its students with this race.

"The reason we do this

is to impact the community", Rowe noted.

Take Caution This Season

The season of Autumn brings the color orange to mind: Pumpkins and turning leaves, sweet potatoes in a Thanksgiving spread, and for some, that special bright orange worn by hunters as a safety precaution.

It's hunting season in the Granite State again, and that means those pristine woods in back of your home, or along your favorite path are likely to resound with more than bird songs and leaf blowers.

The sounds of gunshots will be heard, and that calls for exercising extra caution when you're in or near the woods - whether you're aiming the gun or sipping coffee on the back porch.

Don't take chances. For hunters, always be sure of your target, taking special care in knowing that what you see is really what you're hunting. In other words, identify your target before you fire. Always. Make sure you take seriously what you learned in hunter education, and furthermore, take some form of hunter education before taking to the woods.

Know your weapon. The life you save may be your own or your neighbor's as a result. And be certain you're not trespassing in pursuit of your hobby. Be respectful of the land where you hunt, and the neighbors around you.

Know the rules. If the land has a "No Hunting" sign posted and you don't have personal permission to hunt

there, go somewhere else. Just as important is leaving the land you do hunt on as you found it - or maybe even in better condition, where possible.

Each year, both private and town-owned land is trashed and vandalized.

Whether it's someone's idea of a private shooting range, complete with spent cartridges and beer cans, trees cut down without permission, or ATV damage to trails, the "rotten apple" spoils it for everyone else, hunter or non hunter. Clean up after yourself.

For the rest of us, this is the season when we don't want to be crashing around in the brush. Make it easy for the hunters and for yourself. Wear hunter orange when you're in an area where hunting is likely and make sure your faithful canine companion is sporting a matching ensemble for his or her safety. If you enjoy wearing camouflage, perhaps for the time being it's time to change your fashion choices.

Fall is a beautiful time to be in the woods, so long as we take literally the old adage that it's better to be safe than sorry. We know the vast majority of hunters use common sense in the pursuit of their game, but in southern New Hampshire, woods and homes are close neighbors. On a clear fall morning, the sound of gunshots is a good clue that you're not alone. Take care, and enjoy a beautiful fall.

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School District Discusses Application of New Grading Method

We are all used to the traditional A-to-F grading scale that defined most of our time in school. But while it seems like a tried and true method that could stand the test of time, groups like New England Secondary School Consortium (NESSC) argue that there may be a better way.

Touting what they describe as a Standards-Based Grading system, NESSC has been working for the last couple of years to implement this new grading system into our classrooms and recently held a meeting at Londonderry High School

on November 8 to discuss their progress throughout New Hampshire, including parts of the Londonderry school district.

Led by NESSC representative Dan Blank, the presentation took place in front of both staff members of the school district and parents to students currently in the district in order to give them an accurate idea of what the program hopes to accomplish.

With researching starting back in 2010, the plan primary objective is to focus on the specifics of each student's study habits, working to identify their strengths and weaknesses when it comes to each subject.

More specifically, they no longer want students to work through memorization of facts, instead utilizing three learn criteria labeled product, process and progress, or identifying what a student knows, how they can improve and how much they have improved over a set period. In essence, a numerical scale would be used to judge each applicable learning method.

Blank explained that the NESSC feels that traditional, standardized testing is flawed because not only does that type of scoring not give parents an idea of where their child specifically stands against other students, but when a student fails,

they feel that they are being punished for their mistakes, potentially discouraging them instead of promoting progress.

"We're trying to shift our standards from just labeling kids and moving on", Blank noted.

Blank and the NESSC were fully aware that their system has been called out for having several potential flaws, and were quick to address them, on top of giving handouts that delved into the specifics of the system's updated report card and noting dozens of studies that either supported their system or that labeled standardized testing and ineffective.

For starters, some

have argued that that this new system could cause students to become lazy, as this new system would be more lenient and allow for a "redo" policy for poor test scores. However, Blank noted that a reassessment form would need to be signed by both the student and teacher, thus discouraging students from abusing the system and encouraging them to actually study harder.

There was also the concern for how this would meld with the college application process, as some schools may not be prepared to figure out how these new grading methods compare to their acceptance standards.

But on top of showing letters from Dartmouth College and the Community College System of New Hampshire that mentioned their support for the method, Blank explained that the college acceptance process focuses not only on grades, but on activities in and out of school and the overall character of the student, so such a concern really would not be a problem.

The new system is currently being used across New Hampshire school districts to varying degrees, as well as Londonderry grade schools, but there was no mention about implementing it any further in Londonderry as of yet.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day is Saturday

Hazardous waste generated by homeowners can pose a substantial threat to public health and the environment if not handled properly. Pouring hazardous products down the drain

or onto the ground may cause serious environmental problems, such as malfunctioning septic systems, corrosion of plumbing, and contamination of groundwater. When thrown in the trash, household

hazardous wastes can cause trash truck fires and may end up in an unlined landfill and slowly leach toxins into the ground.

In order to prevent hazardous products from contaminating the environ-

ment, the Town of Londonderry along with the Town of Derry is sponsoring a Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Day on Saturday, Nov. 18, at the Nelson Fields (LAFA) off of Sargent Road, Londonderry, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 12 p.m. This collection is possible with the help of grant monies from the NH Department of Environmental Services.

You may bring to the collection pesticides, herbicides, acids, chemicals strippers, oil & lead based paint, mercury, solvents, degreasers and sealants, basically any toxic or haz-

ardous material you may have in your home. There are some items that are not accepted at the HHW collection, Latex paint, used motor oil, and automobile batteries should NOT be brought to the collection day. Call Londonderry's Public Works Department at 432-1100 ext. 193 or the Derry Transfer Station 432-4650 to find out how to dispose of these items locally.

In order to cut down on the problem of hazardous waste disposal there are several things a resident can do. To reduce the amount sitting in your cupboards buy only what you

need. When you buy, read the labels so that you use non-toxic products whenever possible. When storing your hazardous products put them in a safe place and keep them in their original containers, which should be closed securely. Use up the entire product so there is nothing to dispose.

Finally when disposal is the only option, donate leftover paints and other products to a local service organization, recycle your used motor oil at a Londonderry Waste Oil Collection Day, and never pour harmful chemicals down the drain.

the intersection.

I'm also excited that Londonderry Trailways organization has just started construction to extend the rail trail across Rt 28 at Sanborn Rd. But I am concerned that there will only be a pedestrian crossing signal. According to the Oct. 5 article in the Londonderry Times, the intersection "will be getting some pedestrian hybrid crossing signals on Sanborn Road by the North Londonderry Ele-

mentary School. Those are the kinds of crossing signals that will require walkers or bikers to press a button, which will set off a flashing yellow light to alert cars that they are crossing the road. The Trailways Committee had paid for a traffic study to be done to see where these signals would be needed the most. According to Saur, the state then determined which type of signal would be used where the trail intersects major roads." A pedestrian hybrid crossing signal system will do nothing to

help traffic coming out of Sanborn Rd onto Rt 28.

And finally, I just read in the Nov. 9 Londonderry Times that there will be a 102 unit complex for residents 62 and over on Sanborn Rd. near North School. This will add even more traffic to an already difficult intersection.

Now is the time to take action on this intersection. It needs a traffic light. It needs to be designated as a school zone. Please help before someone gets seriously injured.

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Londonderry Dancers Prepare for 'The Nutcracker' Again

Big smiles and ballet slippers crossed the floors of the Londonderry Dance Academy as local students prepare for The New England Dance Ensemble's annual performance of the holiday classic, "The Nutcracker." The company auditions dancers in September to narrow it down to 90 dancers under the age of 18 from Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire. Once in the NEDE they have opportunity to perform in "The Nutcracker," which will be at the Seifert Performing Arts Center in Salem, NH on Nov. 25 and 26.

Barbara Mullen is the Artistic Director of the NEDE and the founder of the LDA. She recently ran a "clean up rehearsal" with the children's ensemble, focusing on technique and polishing the young dancers' performance. During the rehearsal, 22 kids practiced the "Children's Dance Party" scene from Act I, which includes the iconic trumpet and violin piece that everyone

recognizes from the ballet. Harrison Cornellier is an 8-year old dancer from Derry. He plays Fritz, the brother to Clara. Two dancers from Windham, Olivia Fee, 13, and Katelyn Hillner, 11, both play Clara. Mullen explained that there were two sets of cats for the show, so more children could participate. One group will perform Saturday and the other on Sunday.

Both the girls got involved in dance because of their moms. The came to the Londonderry Dance Academy because their former studios were not living up to their expectations. Fee said she switched to NEDE to get more class time. "I get more experience. I get better faster," she said. "Especially with Mrs. Mullen being a great teacher." They both appreciate that Mullen takes the time to correct them, but does it in soft, yet firm manner. During the rehearsal, Mullen encouraged the boys to shove her to understand the motions needed to complete a scene. "Are we ready, big and mighty

boys?" she asked with a smile. In order to get more males for the show, Mullen took in the brothers of current and former dancers and trained them.

The young man playing the role of the Nutcracker this year is LHS sophomore, Dustin Cournoyer. He is also playing the part for a second company this season. Mullen said he recently won a scholarship to study dance at SUNY Purchase, also called Purchase College.

Audrey Severn and Brook Soucy, also from Londonderry, are two more of the teenaged dancers. This year, they both have five parts apiece. They explained that as the kids get older and more experienced, they get better parts. Soucy really enjoys that NEDE brings in currently working professionals from the American Ballet Theater in New York and the Pennsylvania Ballet. Severn said they had Misty Copeland as a principle one year, and "that was one of the best parts."

Mullen said one of the selling points of the NEDE is that students can dance and learn from guest artists "that are currently performing at the Lincoln Center." They get to see a level of technique and

dedication to dance they may not otherwise see at that age. "How cool is that?" asked Mullen. This year, the company welcomes Pennsylvania Ballet's Nayara Lopes and Sterling Baca as the Sugar Plum Fairy and Cavalier.

"It just makes me so happy to give them the opportunity to fulfill their dreams," she said. LDA is a non-competition school so Mullen and her team can focus on fun and not awards. Not all their students continue to pursue

dancing as they get older. Mullen said some become doctors and pilots. "We're a bit of an overachieving crowd," she joked.

Mullen said she believes one of the reasons "The Nutcracker" is so popular is because it's a simple story. "I love it because it's easy to follow the story," she said. "It's very clear what's going on." That makes it more appealing to people who don't usually seek out the ballet. Some of the aspects of NEDE's version are likely to leave the crowd wanting more. Mullen said they will not only have it snow on stage, but the fire in the fireplace during Act I is real.

"This show is our own show, it's unique," said Fee. Hillner agreed. "It's

breath taking," she said.

Other dancers from Londonderry that were at the rehearsal include Lindsay LaBossiere, Elizabeth James, Caitlin Batts and Julianne Swisher, all 9-years old. Those from Derry include Charlotte Locke and Mia Cross, also aged 9. Arabella Esposito is 7-years old. All the dancers, regardless of age, took rehearsal seriously and demonstrated dedication to getting everything just right for their big performance.

it. But personally, I would not want to sponsor it as a warrant. If the citizens really want it, let them sponsor it in a citizen's petition," outlined Dolan.

On the other side of the issue, Vice Chairman Farrell expressed his view that the Town Council had a duty to put keno on the warrant and let the voters come to a decision when Londonderry goes to the polls this spring.

"People vote for their legislators, they put them in office, and the legislature puts something out to let the voters vote. Right or wrong, let the voters vote up or down," said Farrell. "They [the legislature] put it out there at the state level and I think you should let the voters tell them what they think."

Although Farrell men-

tioned that he had no intention of supporting keno if it goes to the warrant, he went on to express frustration at what he sees as the state legislature's failure to properly inform the public about enabling legislation like the question of keno.

Standing up to address the council, Rep. Doug Thomas, R-Londonderry, said he believed "towns have the experience and expertise behind them to decide which way they would like to go."

In the end, a consensus was reached that the council would revisit the issue of warrant sponsorship after the November 7, election day, when upwards of ten towns would have the keno question on their ballots.

The last day for citizens to submit petition warrant articles will be January 9, 2018.

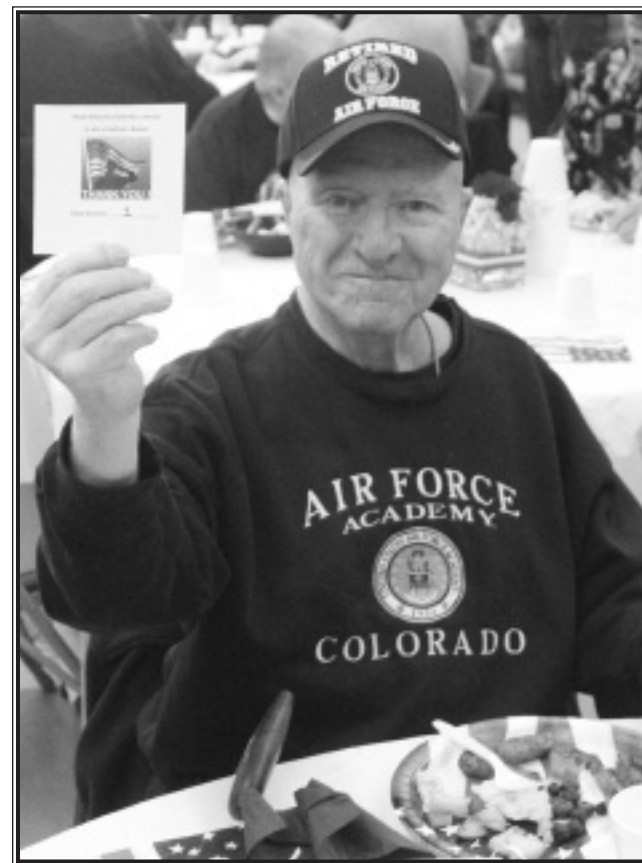
Another highlight was the giveaway of gift baskets. The baskets are created and donated by members of the community,

She was the only enlisted woman working as a stenographer- the rest were civilians. Her eldest brother also served in the Air Force. She said her favorite part of being in the service was "just learning a lot of the language and culture of the Philippine's."

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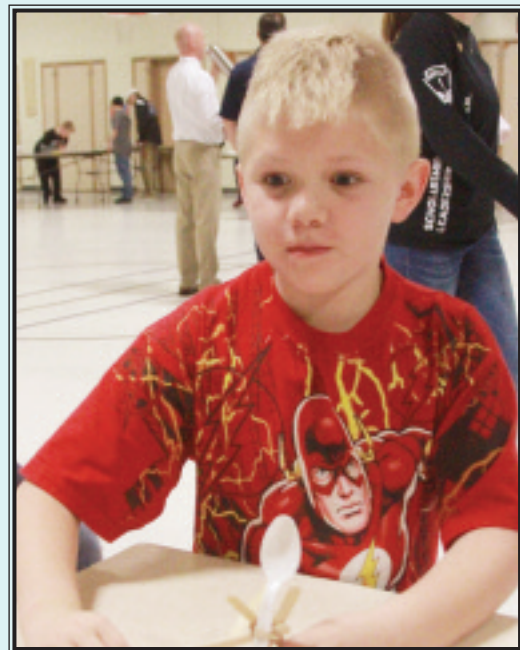
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Students Experiment During Annual Science Night

Lady Lancer Field Hockey Trio Receives All-State Recognition

The Londonderry High field hockey team enjoyed an excellent 2017 campaign which found it landing in the Division I championship match.

The Lady Lancers, who went an extremely strong 11-6 overall and fell just a single win short of the Division I championship, had three of the stalwarts who helped make that level of success possible receive some impressive honors from the New Hampshire Field Hockey Coaches Association late last week.

Seniors scoring star Maeve McPhail (a mid-fielder) and Chase Vanini (a defender) were named First-Team All-Staters and their fellow 12th grader Allie Marsh notched Second-Team All-State honors.

Additionally, the two first-teamers also tried out for and were successful in making the New Hampshire 2017-18 Twin-State Field Hockey Team which will play a squad jammed with Vermont

senior stars in the 35th Annual Twin-State Classic next June. They will compete alongside two Pinkerton Academy senior stars for coaches Kelli Bradley of Souhegan and Jess Brown of Goffstown in that renowned annual summer match. The locals were among some 60 hopefuls vying for just 20 spots on the state team at tryouts on Sunday, Nov. 5, and both LHS and PA had two make it.

Regarding veteran standout McPhail, LHS field hockey coach Nichole Treadway said, "She was a New Hampshire Field Hockey.com Player of the Week the last week of the season with her game-winning (penalty) stroke against Bishop Guertin to put us into the semifinals. Maeve finished the season with five goals and five assists, but was consistent in generating our offense and solid on defense, especially on defensive corners."

Speaking of defensive stalwart Vanini's recognition as a First-Team All-Stater, the Lady Lancer coach said, "Her consistency on defense kept us

And regarding second-teamer Marsh, Treadway stated, "Allie had 10 goals and four assists. in the semifinals in Exeter.

The Lady Lancers then faced off with the third-ranked Timberlane Lady Owls in the state championship match on the turf field at Bedford High and fell by a 4-2 count. But the immense contributions of the three all-staters helped the Londonderry High contingent to a 2017 campaign which was truly a memorable one.

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LHS Boys' Cross-Country in the Middle of the Pack at New Englands

Veteran coach Matt Smith's talented Londonderry High boys' cross-country contingent capped off its strong 2017 season with a fine, 17th place finish out of some 30 teams at the New England Cross-Country Championships at the Troy Howard Middle School in Belfast, Me. last Saturday, Nov. 11.

Powered and inspired by impressive freshman talent, Smith's Lancers

ended up looking upward at a group of 16 teams which was headed by the 2017 New England champs from Xavier, Ct. But there were also 13 squads below the locals.

Skilled Londonderry ninth-grader Will Heenan was first for his Lancers and the fourth New Hampshire harrier across the finish line, placing 33rd overall with his time of 16 minutes and 20.72 seconds. A total of 253 male runners from across the New England region

completed that race.

Heenan was followed to the finish by his fellow LHS freshman Ryan Young, who wound up 111th overall in 16:58.62. And behind Young were Londonderry senior Jake Donnelly in 117th (17:01.02), his fellow 12th grader Kerry Daley in the 181st position (17:36.23), third Londonderry freshman Matt Griffin in 186th place (17:39.23), senior Jeff Cieslikowski in the 192nd spot (17:42.05), and his junior teammate Kyle

Hoglund exactly one second behind him (17:43.05) in 193rd.

Freshmen Heenan, Young, and Griffin all stepped into the LHS cross-country fold impressively this season after helping to continue a multi-year streak of state championships of three straight rolling at the Londonderry Middle School last autumn. And the three talented and determined young men lit a spark which helped propel the established

Lancer veterans to greater heights this fall.

After a truly superb effort at the Division I championships in Manchester's Derryfield Park several weeks ago - through which the Lancers finished a tiny two points out of the runner-up spot behind Pinkerton - the Londonderry bunch bagged a fifth place team finish at the state Meet of Champions at Mine Falls Park in Nashua to qualify for the New Englands.

While the losses of current LHS seniors like Donnelly and Daley and Cieslikowski to graduation will no doubt sting coach Smith's Lancers, there will be more impressive talent coming up from a 2017 Londonderry Middle School bunch which bagged a fourth consecutive state championship this fall. So saying the Londonderry High boys' cross-country future looks bright might just end up being a huge understatement.

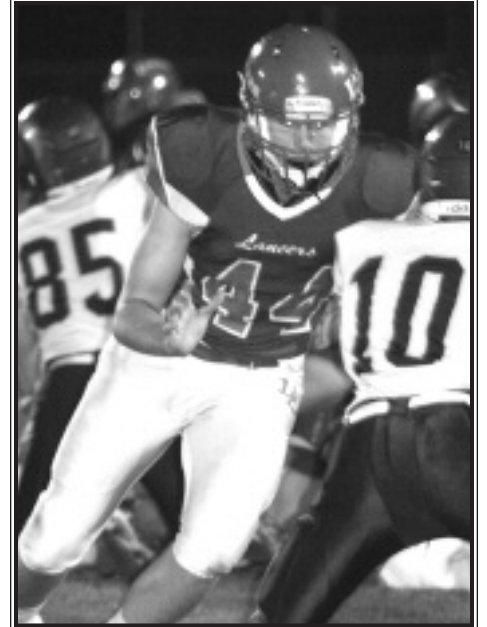

While the Londonderry High football team's 2017 season didn't go quite as far along as the folks wearing Lancer gridiron garb would have liked, it's an irrefutable fact that the LHS contingent was jammed with hard-working and determined talent.

And that fact was borne out recently when no less than 10 Lancers received All-South Conference honors after helping their 2017 squad to a very solid 6-4 campaign.

Senior defensive lineman Pat Zepf and senior wide receiver Connor Dubois were both named first-teamers, as were junior linebacker Ben

Psaledas and star sophomore running back Jeff Wiedenfeld.

Notching South Conference Honorable Mention recognition were seniors Shane McEachern (a defensive back) and Jake Dionne (linebacker),

juniors Pat Hagearty (defensive lineman), Josh Berube (offensive lineman), and Jack Ogden (linebacker), and sophomore wide receiver Cole Keegan.

Speaking specifically about his talented quartet of all-conference players, Londonderry coach Jimmy Lauzon had no trouble finding words of praise.

Regarding Psaledas, who has done a masterful job of maintaining his family's long legacy of

football success at LHS which still includes his grandfather Butch - a Lancer assistant coach - coach Lauzon said, "Psaledas was very consistent for us on both sides of the ball. He led our team in tackles and was the leading tackler in six games, which is what you want from your linebackers."

Versatile senior Zepf did vital work at multiple positions for the Lancers, and coach Lauzon said of him, "Zepf was a standout for us. No one had a bigger impact for us, and he did it in three all three phases of the game at kicker and punter, defen-

sive end, and wide receiver. He had 7.5 sacks, five batted balls, and over 40 tackles, he had 16 catches and two touchdowns, and he also punted for an average of 31 yards and made 28 out of 30 extra points."

Speedy and deceptive running back Wiedenfeld - who like teammate Psaledas has a rich family football tradition to maintain at LHS - wrote a new entry in the Lancer record books by becoming the first Londonderry sophomore to rush for 1,000 yards this fall. Of him, coach Lauzon gushed, "Wiedenfeld was the spark to the run game we've been missing for

the last couple of years. He's a workhorse and that's how we treated him. He ran for 1,070 yards in 10 games with 10 touchdowns as a sophomore. He also played outside linebacker and returned kicks."

And speaking of Dubois, the LHS coach stated, "He was our big-play guy. He came up with big catches, big returns, and big runs when we needed them. When we played North he came through on a huge kick-return at the end of the game, and at Merrimack he made a big catch to put us in position to score and win. He always stepped up in moments

when we needed him to, and that says a lot about him as a player."

The Lancers began the 2017 season in superb fashion with consecutive wins over Bishop Guertin of Nashua, Timberlane of Plaistow, and Nashua North. Then came a disappointing Mack Plaque loss to those arch-rivals from Pinkerton Academy in Derry, but Londonderry rebounded beautifully with consecutive wins over Keene, Merrimack, and Alvirne of Hudson before falling in their final three games of the fall against Nashua South and Salem twice. The latter Salem loss came in the D-I playoffs.



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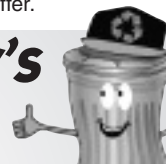
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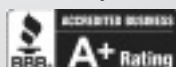
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Standout Lady Lancer Spikers Collect State Post-Season Honors

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Ex-Lancer Football Stars Fairweather and Scarfo Excel in College

Maintaining your levels of intensity and performance and focus when you're on a sports team which is struggling certainly isn't easy for an athlete. But former Londonderry High football stars Eric Fairweather and Nick Scarfo were both able to do so quite impressively in collegiate football this autumn.

Junior Fairweather was the guiding hand at the tiller of the Saint Anselm College offense as the Hawks battled their way through an extremely challenging 1-9 campaign. And the talented quarterback was a silver lining in his team's rather dark cloud of a 2017 season, serving as the catalyst not only for the passing game but the running game just like he was during his illustrious, award-winning days as a Lancer.

And freshman linebacker Scarfo was a key part of the foundation-setting, first University of New England football squad up in Portland, Me., this fall.

The former Lancer star was either first or second in tackles for the UNE Nor'easters in six of their eight contests. That brand new UNE contingent went 2-6 overall playing a junior varsity and prep school schedule in preparation for full-fledged varsity play in the Commonwealth Coast Football Conference next year.

Anybody who watched Fairweather absolutely run wild during his high school senior football campaign of 2014 and then scoop up award after award will remember it for a long time. And the next autumn the speedy and smart quarterback moved on to Saint A's where he got to play plenty as a freshman after several veteran signal-callers went down with injuries.

The LHS grad appeared in eight games that fall, starting the final seven. He went 112-of-187 for 1,058 yards passing yards, posting a 59.9% completion percentage and tossing seven touchdowns. He rushed the football 107 times for 716 yards and eight touchdowns and ended up being named to the Northeast-10 Conference All-Rookie Team.

However, the 2016 campaign was one which Fairweather would rather forget as he suffered a serious ankle injury during the very first game of the season and wound up being sidelined the rest of the way.

So, rebounding this fall for a strong season for second-year coach Joe Adam's Saint Anselm squad was foremost in Fairweather's mind, and he was once again a gem for a Hawks' team which struggled mightily in winning just once.

In that 35-34 edging of the Pace University grid-ders in New York, the LHS grad rushed for three touchdowns and then

threw for the winning score.

Fairweather carried the ball 27 times for 134 total yards and was a very solid 14-for-22 through the air that day, hooking up with junior Kyle Hill on an 11-yard pass which ultimately proved to be the game-winner with 6:37 left in the fourth quarter.

When all stats were tallied for the 2017 season, Fairweather had played in all 10 Hawks' contests and led the team in passing with 771 yards and six touchdowns. He also led the squad in rushing - by a wide margin - with 763 yards and nine scores on 163 carries. He averaged just under five yards per rush and had a

season-long run of 82 yards. The squad's number two rusher statistically was senior running back Correy King, who finished with 347 yards.

NICK SCARFO

This former Londonderry High defensive powerhouse will remain in University of New England football history forever after proving himself to be a true stalwart on the very first Nor'Easters' defensive unit in season one this fall.

The freshman commu-

nications major, who claimed all-conference football honors following his junior and senior grid campaigns at LHS, was right on the spot for a great many tackles for his new college team.

After starting out the inaugural season with losses to Curry and Husson, Scarfo and his new teammates bagged wins over Northfield of Vermont and then Bates in nearby Lewiston, Me. to move to 2-2.

The 6-foot, 200-pound linebacker was second in tackles with nine against Curry in the opener, first with 11 against Husson, and first against Bates with eight in the Nor'Easters' second victory.

In subsequent contests, the ex-Lancer stalwart was tops for UNE against Tufts with nine tackles, second with seven against Bridgton, and first with a full dozen smacks against Kirkland Academy.

Two of Scarfo's teammates' on coach Mike Lichten's UNE contingent were former Pinkerton Academy opponents Pat Chamberlain and Dylan Fischer, both of whom played on the offensive line.

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TOWN OF LONDONDERRY LEGAL NOTICE

The Department of Public Works would like to remind residents of the snow ordinance regarding parking and the placement of snow on the streets. The Winter Parking Ban is in effect from November 1 to April 1. During that time, no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public road or right-of-way between 12:00 midnight and 8:00 A.M. or at any other time as to impede snow removal operations. Any vehicle parked in violation of this ordinance will be towed by the Police Department. Any vehicles so towed will be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing. No person is allowed to place any snow or ice upon the surface of the traveled portion of any Town maintained portion of road or highway. Blowing, shoveling, or plowing snow into the street, creates a very dangerous situation that can cause swerving and accidents. Any person violating this ordinance may be subject to a penalty as specified in Town's Snow Ordinance.

Generally, the Town has a 50 foot right-of-way, which extends 13 feet from the edge of pavement. Residents are asked not to reconstruct road shoulders and swales or place any structures and landscape items within the Town Right-of-Way. Stakes, delineators or rocks create a road hazard and should be removed. The Town is not liable for damages that may occur to objects placed within its right-of-way.

Mail and newspaper boxes are allowed in the Town's right-of-way. To reduce the possibility of damage, mailboxes should be installed in such a manner that no part of the mailbox is within three feet of the edge of pavement. Installations should be sufficiently sturdy to withstand the weight of heavy snow resulting from plowing operations.

Trash barrels & recycling barrels should not be placed in the road where they can impede traffic or snow removal operations. Place trash and recycle barrels in your driveway or in an area cleared outside of the travel lane.
