## Kevin Coyle to File Lawsuit Against Derry News Et Al

Former Derry Town Councilor, former Prosecutor for the town of Londonderry Kevin Coyle continues to fight accusations after backlash from a story published by the Derry News and Eagle Tribune regarding the home of Air

Force Veteran, Larry Reimer earlier in 2017, and resulting inflammatory comments being made about him online.

Outfield News reported on this in August 3rd's issue, and now Coyle has proceeded to file a complaint against the Derry News, the Eagle Tribune, and Bringing Derry To-

gether for accusing him of making false statements and implying effort in doing so for monetary gain.

In summary, Coyle had questioned the fact-checking behind the article on his public access television show, "Up Close and Political," stat-

## Fire Chief Looks to Fund Four Firefighters with Safer Grant

During the Monday night Town Council meeting, Londonderry Fire Chief Darren O'Brien took a moment to thank the council, budget committee, and the public for voting in the plans to renovate the Central Command Station. "We got some busy days ahead of us. I look forward to it and I will be sure to make it something that the town is very proud of," O'Brien said.

Fire Chief O'Brien then presented the council with the proposal of utilizing the federal government's SAFER grant (SAFER stands for Staffing

for Adequate Fire and Emergency Responses). This grant allows communities \$345 million of the federal government's money for fire and emergency staffing needs. Chief O'Brien presented the council with a breakdown of the hiring of four firefighters over the course of three years and what the cost/share portion is to the town and the community and what the share portion is to the federal government. The total cost of the four firefighters comes to \$93,868 a year for salary and benefits of each firefighter.

O'Brien also felt that this is a good opportunity for the town to take

advantage of having the federal government contribute for some of the staffing needs the fire station is looking to move forward with. Research by the fire department has also revealed that calls are steadily increasing by about 27% per year over the last five years. Fire Chief O'Brien is currently operating a staff of ten firefighters and using an eleventh firefighter to help cover the first overtime slot. This has been the operation approach for the past two years, but needs have increased and the staff will need to as well. Calls to the fire station have also increased

## Former Owner Takes Exception With Report of Historic Home's Condition

At the Heritage Commission meeting on March 22, Mr. Richard Flier brought forth a presentation to the commission about the historic property that resides at 2 Litchfield Road. According to Flier, the property has become a "mixed area" of sorts. The area itself is located on a very busy intersection with workers that come from Nashua to the Manchester airport. Flier mentioned how over his career, he has restored over a million square feet of historical buildings.

Flier told the board that after the property got

its designation as a historic property, it has continued to deteriorate to the point where it is not in good shape today and the barn is in even worse shape. The back of the building, there was a pool that no longer is in use and a fence that is crooked. There was also a roof that got put on the building last year that does not meet historical standards or looks. The most alarming problem the building has had is the water, specifically in the basement. When there was a storm a few months ago, it knocked out the electricity in the building and flooded the basement. There was no

automatic generator available and the sump pump system was not functional. Another problem with the building is the amount of mold and mildew that has gone up through the foundation.

Flier also said that there will be a huge cost to restore the building up to "historical standards"

# Conservation Commission Discusses Kendall Pond Cameras

The issue of Kendall Pond conservation area was discussed at the Conservation Commission meeting, where members gathered to talk about the possibility of installing cameras to deter would-be vandals of the area. The majority of the research on the various types of cameras was done by board member Bob Maxwell. After doing research on the various cameras the commission can use, there are still

many questions that are still left unanswered. Does the Commission want real time or archive access? Having archive access would be the easier option, because someone with access to the camera would just have to pull out the memory card as often as he/she deems necessary. A 16 GB memory card could easily store up to 7,000 or more pictures, so the card can be left in for over a month without running into problems. The issue with this type of camera is that

someone would physically have to remove the card to see what was picked up on it, but can be programmed to overwrite photos if necessary. If there was a problem at Kendall Pond, someone would have to go through all the photos manually to see if there was any suspicious activity caught on camera. The camera would be motion and heat activated.

If the commission would like to get a camera with real-time photos, the only way to achieve that

would be through cell phones. The commission felt this approach was too expensive and they would also have to pay for the cell service as well. The real-time camera would also burn battery more quickly than an archive camera. The archive camera also has the possibility of holding up to a 32 GB camera that could potentially hold 14,000 photos if necessary. The issue here is that someone would have to sit through all these photos if there is suspicious activity on the

property, but the camera card would be swapped out every so often.

The commission also discussed if the camera would be in danger if someone were to vandalize it. A solution to this problem was discussed in the form of a lock box and stored high up with access only by ladder. The camera cannot be hidden behind bushes, but if it is in a box, someone cannot steal the camera or the card. It was also discussed that the camera card would not need to be looked at specif-

ically unless there is an act of vandalism reported. Also worth noting is that the Kendall Pond area would not be closed to the public after a certain time, but rather the parking lot area would be. By doing this, the commission felt it would deter any would be vandals.

The motion was made to authorize member Bob Maxwell to spend \$500 for a camera and accessories (card, lock box, etc.) to be used at the Kendall Pond conservation area-the motion was passed.

# Comcast Cable License Renewal Discussed at Public Hearing

Representative for the town of Londonderry Bill August returned to the Town Council for the public hearing on the Comcast Cable renewal license agreement on Monday night.

He reported the negotiations with Comcast were a success and the town would even be able to provide a senior discount to subscribers over the age of 65 that the town never had previously.

The cost was reduced to \$2 off the additional

starter. There have also been significant technology improvements to the town under the renewal license according to August. He also said, the new license is very strong in terms of what the town is able to negotiate with for customer service requirements, telephone response standards, and installation schedules.

A representative from Comcast was also available to answer questions from the council and the public. One question from the Town Council was exactly how many people could the Wi-Fi on

the town commons support? Under the current configuration the maximum number of people it can hold is 50 at one time. This may be a concern when it is time for Old Home Day and the town brings in multiple vendors to set up for the town's celebration. There was no technical answer given when the council asked what would happen to the 51st person that would try to log on, but the person would either get an error message or not be able to log in at all.

The discussion then went into OTT-over the top platforms and could be considered the future. DIRECTV has started offering hook-up with no satellites. The other platforms for OTT are Netflix and Stream TV that require data to use. Some of these platforms you can even use on your cell phone. With technology expanding constantly, there may be a point where customers solely have the need for Wi-Fi and the council asked the Comcast representative if they would be ready for

that. He assured them that Comcast can expand their network and they have the largest most robust network in the country, so expanding it would not be a problem if necessary. Councilor Tom Dolan felt what the town is getting from Comcast now is much greater from what they were getting a decade ago, but was concerned how Comcast would fare ten years from now. August answered by saying the town is relying on Comcast being competitive, which it has been in the

past.

With so many new technological advances happening year after year, it is uncertain whether or not (at this point) if the opportunities out-weigh the risks. The number one drive of cost is programming and that will play a big part in the advances of technology and streaming going forward.

Overall, the town felt they had made a promising deal with Comcast to extend their contract with them for another ten years of service.

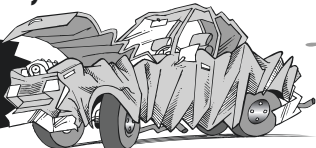

in volume as well. The station may get as many as two, three, or even four calls at a time.

"I looked at it as a step in the right direction," O'Brien said. "If we could get some assistance from the federal government, it wouldn't be a major cost burden to the town for the first three years and then the town would pick up the cost after that point." The only stipulation to this grant, however is that it is not usually awarded until the month of June and the fire

department only has 180 days to enact the process of getting the firefighters they need hired. The problem with this is that it puts the hiring process off until January of 2019, so the Fire Chief would have to absorb six months of the approved budget during FY 19, which has already been established. The cost for the six months would be about \$46,934 (half of \$93,868) that would have to be funded by the town somehow.

Town Manager Kevin Smith felt confident that with the town council's blessing to move forward they would be able to find

that money within the budget to be able to absorb the cost. Smith asked O'Brien to present to the council, because typically anytime new personnel is added it is done through the warrant article process. With the timing of the federal grant, it does not give the town the luxury to use the warrant article process. If the town chooses to approve the grant, it would require them to hire the personnel in FY 19's budget. The council did indeed give their blessing and the Fire Chief was allowed to move forward with the SAFER grant process.

ing that he had hoped that those involved in the vetting process of Reimer, "had done their homework" before representing to the community what was reported. It was this comment that had resulted in the adverse reaction and commentary surrounding the notion that Coyle had lied about Reimer's land interest and the fact that Reimer had a son that led Coyle to pursue legal action against the aforementioned.

As of April 2nd, Coyle has submitted a complaint to the Rockingham Superior Court with intent to set such action in motion.

According to this formal complaint, no retrac-

tions have been issued by the defendants, and defamatory articles and commentary are still posted on respective websites, as well as on the Facebook page for "Bringing Derry Together."

In his formal complaint, Coyle states that the defendants, "...continue to publish this article recklessly, wantonly, maliciously, and without privilege of any kind." He further stated that once the defendants were provided with documentation supporting Coyle's questioning they, "failed to issue a retraction or remove articles from the aforementioned websites to stop the defamatory impact on Mr. Coyle...in spite of assurances to Mr. Coyle that they would issue a retraction and a policy by Lague on BDT that would

not tolerate the vitriolic comments on its Facebook page."

The complaint further mentions that Coyle has been referred to as a slew of inflammatory things such as, "deplorable," "land-hungry," a "slimy Republican degenerate," etc and had also been told to "resign."

The complaint further states that acts considered to be wanton, malicious, or oppressive in any way, compensation to the plaintiff are warranted, and reiterates that the commentary in question was made intentional dis-

regard for Coyle's rights, and therefore warrants legal action.

As a result of this lawsuit, Coyle requests that the court order defendants to remove all online publications containing defamatory remarks, award Coyle reasonable attorney's fees and compensatory damages, and further relief as the Court deems reasonable.

No official court date has been set at the time of this publication, and more information will be reported on as this story develops.

# NH Fish & Game Proposes Radio Telemetry For Turtle Population

On Tuesday March 27, the Conversation Commission welcomed Joshua Megyesy from NH Fish & Game to talk about their new project for the Blanding's turtles. The Musquash Conservation area in Londonderry was found to have a population of Blanding's turtles of roughly 230-235 turtles, which is a high number regionally according to Megyesy. The Musquash in Londonderry is a good size, but is surrounded by roads and increasing development, which is a concern for the turtle's safety.

The new project the NH Fish & Game department is working on is using radio telemetry on the Blanding's turtles. Radio telemetry is used to track animals from a distance from a transmitter that is attached to the animal itself. Megyesy is hoping to get primarily female turtles to put transmitters on along with a GPS unit to try and determine where exactly they are going to nest. Recent research has suggested there is a lack of juvenile Blanding's turtles in the area and by tracking the females; they can find out what is happening to their offspring. The Fish & Game department hopes

they can get permission from the Conservation Commission to help protect these areas and keeps the turtles from wandering away from their nesting areas (or find out where they are going). Blanding's turtles typically nest in the same spot every year, so if there was a specific area reserved for the turtles, chances are high they would return there every year.

The grant that NH Fish & Game received was meant specifically for Blanding's turtles, but they also received another grant to work on spotted turtles, which is starting sometime later this

year. It is possible that the Musquash may turn into a site for spotted turtles as well. There will most likely be a bit of overlap between the research going on with the Blanding's turtles and the spotted turtles, but Megyesy assured that the research on both turtle species will help the other one. Megyesy appeared before the Conservation Commission in order to get their approval of allowing him to trap the two turtle species for further research on their nesting

habits and locations. There is a possibility the radio telemetry portion of the research could extend all the way into November of 2018. Megyesy said they are not looking to track them year after year, but just long enough to get the proper amount of information on them. The NH Fish & Game department also knows the life span of each transmitter before it dies out. Research has also shown that the population of Blanding's turtles cuts off right around the lakes

region.

The real priority of this project is to gather information on the female Blanding's turtles that can live up to 60 or 70 years old and figure out what they are doing and protect them the best they can. The motion was made and passed unanimously by the Conservation Commission to give their approval to Megyesy to do his research on the Blanding's and spotted turtle population in the Londonderry Musquash.

## State Ranks Rockingham County Healthiest in the New Hampshire

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation has ranked Rockingham County the healthiest county in New Hampshire for the second year in a row. The ranking was announced in the eighth annual "County Health Rankings," produced by the Foundation in conjunction with the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute.

The rankings are a state-by-state look at health outcomes, factors, and policies and programs. Data analyzed includes information on access to healthcare, tobacco use, income levels, premature birth, obesity, child poverty, teen births, sexually transmitted infections and alcohol and drug use.

In the rankings for overall health outcomes, which measures how long people live and how happy they feel while alive, Rockingham County was deem-

ed healthiest, followed by Carroll, Grafton, Merrimack, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Belknap, Strafford and Sullivan, with Coos bringing up the rear.

Rockingham County also came in first in health factors, including health behaviors, clinical care, social, economic and physical environmental factors.

Lisa Morris, director of the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health Services, wrote in a statement, "The conditions in the places where people live, learn, work and play and age affect a wide range of health risks and outcomes.

This annual report provides the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services with local level data to help us understand the health of residents across our state."

She continued, "Each

county has their own unique challenges and strengths, and we will continue working with local partners to help address the top challenges in their communities."

Nicole Ferrante, Recreation Coordinator, has seen an interest in healthy living grow over her years with the department, and while the interest crosses all demographics, she has particularly seen an interest in health by seniors, millennials and the special needs population.

"People live longer now, and they want to age in a healthy manner," Ferrante, said. New Hampshire is one of the top three states for a median age of 50 or better, she said.

"They really want to get active, so we're giving them more options for fitness and wellness," Ferrante said.

# Town Council Reminds Owners to Get Dog Registered

Councilor Tom Dolan made a friendly reminder to dog owners on Monday night that it is that time of year again for dogs to get their renewal licenses. The process is very easy and can also

help save a lost dog. The annual registration of all dogs with the Town Clerk is required by State of NH laws. According to the Town Clerk's website, the licensing year runs from May 1 to April 30, so time is beginning to run out. The owners must provide proof

that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies and puppies should be registered after receiving their first rabies shot. The registration fees are as follows:

Puppies (4-7 months) - \$7.50

Spayed or neutered dog - \$7.50 (Owner needs to provide documentation of spaying/neutering)

Unaltered dog - \$10

Senior citizen dog - \$3 (owner is 65 years old or older, first dog only)

Senior citizens are given a discount of 50% off the registration of their

first dog. If you choose not to license your dog, it will be considered a violation of State law. Along with being charged the annual license fee, owners will be charged late fees for not complying with State law (\$1 per month after June 1). Owners will also be charged with a civil forfeiture fee of \$25. The owner must pay this fee to avoid a summons and court appearance.

Having your dog registered is not only a courtesy to your neighbors, but can also help track down a lost

pup if he/she wanders away from home. The license also works as an identification badge, so if someone finds your dog and he/she is registered, they can be returned home safely. Owners may register their dogs in person at the Town's Clerk's office or by certified mail. If you are registering by mail, you must enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope and a valid rabies certificate.

According to Town Clerk Sherry Farrell, the number of dogs that are unregistered is a significantly low amount. In

2017, the clerk's office had a record of only 20 unaccounted for dogs for the town. This year, Farrell is guaranteeing that they will have 1% or less of dogs that are unregistered. The goal is to make sure that every dog is accounted for in town. This is important for the safety of all Londonderry residents, so that everyone knows if a dog has had their rabies shot or if a dog gets loose they can find their owner more easily. Farrell also noted that this is a top priority for the Clerk's office.

and have the building last over the next generation. The barn was also a major concern for Flier and his team, because it is in worse shape than the main building, with rot all the way around it. There needs to be significant work done to both the roof and the floor of the barn. The economics to restore the property up to historical standards are roughly \$700,000-\$800,000. Flier is looking to save some aspects of the building like the stairwells, the area where the fireplaces used to be, and some of the floors. Although there is no use for the barn, Flier suggested possibly turning that area into a nursing home or another type of care center. Currently, Nutfield Publishing occupies the building, but Flier felt that the publish-

ing company would not be staying for various reasons he could not disclose.

For safety reasons, the property requires total restoration both inside and out with the electrical and heating systems both needing repair as well. Flier also noted that the pool on the property needs to be taken out ASAP, because it is a safety hazard.

By going to the Heritage Commission, Flier hoped to get the "OK" from them before the project goes to the Planning Board. There was no decision made by the Heritage Commission and further talks amongst the commission would need to take place.

When the current occupant, and former owner of the property was reached for comment

after the Heritage Commission meeting, Chris Paul said, "I was shocked at some of the things Richard was saying about the property. He's trying to portray, for the sake of his project, that the property has been neglected. I take exception to the implication that the property has been neglected since I know how much work and money I have personally put into the building."

He went on to say, "Beside the fact that the entire building has been painted several times, a new roof was put on two years ago, I replace old rotted sills on three sides of the house and have performed countless repairs throughout the years I had owned it."

Flier had also mentioned during the meeting that the current occupants would be moving. To that, Paul responded,

"That was the first time I heard that. My wife and I, Deb Paul, Publisher of the Londonderry Times, had an arrangement with Richard that we would reside here until other arrangements were made." This was part of a more global agreement we made with Mr. Flier requiring him to perform on other matters, which he has yet to complete.

Two days after seeing the meeting air, Paul said, "We received an eviction notice from Flier's lawyer telling us to vacate the property by mid-May."

Paul then continued, "Mr. Flier's group has been to two boards in town, and has painted a much bleaker picture of the property than actually exists. The boards and committees he has approached regarding his project should take that into consideration when making their decisions."

Longtime Londonderry High varsity baseball coach Brent Demas may enjoy rollercoaster rides, but certainly not the kind that he and his 2017 Lancers endured last spring.

Demas and his squad had hopes of doing far better than a 10-10 record, the ninth seed in the Division I tournament, and an ugly first-round exit from said tournament.

This spring, the senior-heavy Londonderry High crew has plenty of battle-tested and versatile talent back in its fold, and hopes are running fairly high on coach Demas' squad that the 2018 campaign will wind up being more memorable than the

previous one did.

The Lancers' list of returning players with varsity experience includes seniors Nate Sullivan (catcher/short-stop/pitcher), Anthony Piriolli (pitcher/first base), Anthony Ferraro (first base/pitcher), Shane McNamara (second base/third base/pitcher), Andy Ross (OF/P), Ricky Perry (outfield), Dylan Walsh (OF/P), and Travis Peabody (P/1B). The lone returning junior starter is Reece Manor (infielder/pitcher).

Other varsity returnees include seniors Jake Bolduc (INF/C), Dakota Johnson (INF/OF/P), and Matt Minton (OF).

The Lancers' varsity newcomers include juniors Jack Dingman (catcher), Zach Luongo (OF/

1B/P), Evan Cormier (OF/P), and Jack Thompson (3B/C/designated hitter), and freshman Brandon Fish (middle infield/pitcher).

Whether or not this determined crew will be up to the challenge of returning the Lancers to the top of Division I for the first time since 2014 is the big question. But coach Demas seems pretty pleased with his personnel.

"We have a depth of quality pitching through the whole program, especially on the varsity level," said the coach. "In the early part of the season it's important that we establish roles while maintaining enough flexibility to be able to fill in at any position. Offensively, we will compete in the

box, and that's all we are asking the boys to focus on. In the field, we have had early bumps, but with our experience we expect the team to execute."

Demas and much of the rest of Division I will have their eyes focused on the defending D-I champions from Exeter High this spring, but the Bedford High Bulldogs have reached the state title game each of the last three years, winning the 2016 crown and finishing second in both 2015 and 2017.

The Lancers get their 2018 campaign going officially next Wednesday, April 11, when they play host to the Spaulding Red Raiders of Rochester. The locals then play at Winnacunnet and Pinkerton on Friday and Saturday.

It's a rather disappointing and unhappy truth, but the Londonderry High School boys' lacrosse program has never had a varsity team make it as far as the Division I or Class L state championship match.

Oh, there has never been a shortage of talented or determined athletes in the program, which was started soon after LHS opened back in the late 1970's by Tom Sawyer. States Marine - has taken over the helm and feels that his crew's strongest facet will be its defensive unit.

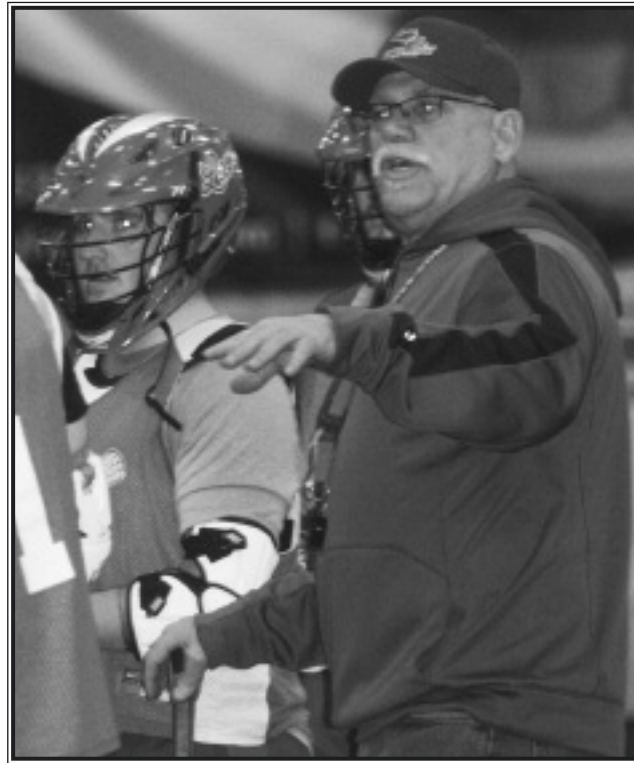
The Lancers will need to be right on top of their game again this spring to compete with the likes of the two-time defending champion Bishop Guertin Cardinals - who have been in every single state title game since 2005 and won no less than nine championships during that long span - as well as the arch-rival Pinkerton Astros and those Marauders from Hanover High.

Since 2005, Guertin, Pinkerton, and Hanover

are the only teams to collect Division I or Class L state championships.

Vital depth is added by seniors Jack Wanders (middle), Connor Warren (middle), Mason Smith, and Ryan O'Neil (both attacks), juniors Patrick Murphy (middle), Derek Felix (attack), and Nathan Gehris (defense), and sophomores Devin Rheame (defense), Derek Mower (middle), and Jake McEachern (middle).

"We have increased our coaching staff numbers across the board to really work the fundamentals at every level, and this year we are starting a middle school team," said coach Sampson. # Local Children Get Early Start in Gardening With Garden Club

Spring has sprung, and even though the weather has been less than cooperative thus far, plenty of gardeners throughout the

area are ready to get down and dirty this season.

But gardening is an activity that anyone can enjoy, regardless of age. Thus, in order to give local children an early

taste of the age-old practice, the Derry Garden Club, which has members from Londonderry, Derry, Winham and Chester, recently held Green Thumb event with children at the Derry Boys and Girls Club on April 2.

With about 14 children packed into a separate room in the club with several garden club members, club member Jackie Dempsey went about explaining what seeds need in order to become full-fledged plants, namely rich soil, water and sunlight, and how the germination process happens.

After a quick lesson about seeds, the children soon got the opportunity to make their own plant pots. Made entirely out of paper, the degradable pots were molded around wooden shapes before being filled with starter mix and marigolds seeds. Marigolds are actually edible flowers sometimes used in salads and made into a poultice that heals scratches and shallow cuts. They can also ward off mosquitoes and rabbits.

The children may have finished the day by planting their pots in the club's outdoor garden in the front lawn, but their work is just getting started. Once or twice a week, they will return to the garden to water their plants and check their status, while occasional-

ly receiving a new horticulture lesson from one of the garden club members.

Club members also focus on avoiding the use of pesticides and educating the children about the dangers of using them.

Around the end of summer, the children will take advantage of their hard work and hold a harvest buffet and sample all the different foods in the garden, giving them an idea of just how much can be accomplished with nothing more than soil, seeds, sunlight, and water.

"It's a big thing at the end of the year", Dempsey noted

This event has been going on for the last decade, originally start-

ed by club member Blanche Garone for the sake of exposing children to fresh, new vegetables and a potential love of gardening, something that Dempsey describes as crucial.

The Derry Garden Club serves as a non-
