## Town Appoints Finance New Director and Tax Collector

Londonderry is starting out 2019 with two new employees joining the ranks at Town Hall.

Beginning next week, residents will see a new face in the Tax Collector's office. Erin Newnan has

been appointed to serve as the Tax Collector.

Her appointment comes after Diane Mulholland's decision to move to another community. Mulholland's last day in Londonderry is Jan. 25.

Newnan comes to Londonderry from Chester, where she served several

years as the town's joint Town Clerk/Tax Collector. In Londonderry, she'll focus on both tax collector duties, as well as duties such as processing vehicle registrations.

In an interview, she said she was looking forward to working in a large

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## Town Council Approves Warrant Articles for Deliberative Session

At the Jan. 21 Town Council meeting, members finalized the 28 articles that residents will discuss at the Feb. 9 deliberative session.

The final proposal for the general operating budget is \$33,858,810. The alternate budget is \$33,865,222. According to the town, the alternate budget is the same as last year's, "with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law."

The budget must be approved by the voters

on March 12 before it can take effect.

If passed, the operating budget would require the town to raise \$19,337,689 in property taxes, which would cause a tax rate impact of \$4.81 in Fiscal Year 2020 based on projected assessed values. This is 13 cents lower than the Jan. 14 estimated tax impact.

According to Finance Director Doug Smith, the town was able to shift some numbers around - including labeling about \$140,195 received from workers' compensation as a "refund" instead of revenue since it was a

one-time payment, minimizing the impact it had on this budget cycle.

Smith said the town also learned of an additional \$320,000 in investment earnings that could be added to the budget as revenue, bringing down the overall tax impact.

Most of the other articles are unchanged from the Jan. 14 workshop.

Article 3 would give an additional \$172,952 to the Department of Public Works to cover the increased cost while providing the same level of services as last year. The increase covers an addi-

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## ZBA Receptive To T-Mobile Cell Tower Plan on Mohawk Drive

T-Mobile's hopes to construct a new cell tower on Mohawk Drive got a boost from the Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) when they approved a special exception for the property at 11 Mohawk Drive to allow the tower to ignore the normal setback requirements.

Attorney John Springer of Portsmouth presented the case on behalf of Bay Communications who would be constructing the tower for T-Mobile. He said that T-Mobile's goal was to improve reception along Route 102 from Mohawk down to the AppleTree Mall. He added that cov-

erage today was good for people in vehicles, but coverage for users in building needed to be improved.

While to start the tower would host T-Mobile equipment, there would be room available for up to four additional carriers if others wanted to lease space on the tower.

According to Londonderry zoning rules, the proposed 140-foot tower, would normally have to be 150 feet from the road and any neighboring property lines. The waiver request was to allow the tower to be placed 128, 39, and 40 feet from three of the lot boundaries, so that it could be located in a corner as far

away from residences as possible. The closest house would be 286 feet away.

Abutting the property are Freightliner of New Hampshire, RightSpace Storage and Mohawk and Horizon Drives. The property is owned by Tahoe Realty Holdings which also own the Freightliner property. They have provided a 50

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# Recently Promoted Deputy Chief Fulone Retires from Londonderry Police

Recently appointed Deputy Chief Paul Fulone of the Londonderry Police Department is retiring from the police force on Jan. 25, 2019. With the recent retirement of Deputy Police Chief Gerard Dussault at the end of 2018, Captain Paul Fulone had been promoted to Deputy Chief a little less than two months ago — on Dec. 1, 2018.

Fulone had been just the second deputy chief in Londonderry Police Department history following the long career and retirement of Dussault last November.

Fulone had started his law enforcement career two years after Dussault, and had reported during Dussault's retirement ceremony that he had followed in Dussault's footsteps because "he is one of the few worthy to follow in this career."

Formerly the Captain

of the Londonderry Police Department, Paul Fulone had received the Chief's Achievement Award for his service from Londonderry Police Chief William Hart a year ago.

In 2017, Fulone returned to the Londonderry Police department after serving eight years as head of command at the Manchester-Boston Regional Airport's a role that also supported Londonderry police presence.

Fulone has spent his entire 31-year law enforcement career in Londonderry.

Current Londonderry Police Captain Patrick Cheetham reported that Fulone is taking a job as a Security Director for a Manchester based organization, though Fulone is not naming that business at this time.

Cheetham understood that Fulone had applied for the job before he was selected for the role of the Deputy Chief two months

ago. Thus Fulone didn't know until a few weeks after his promotion that he was also selected for this Security Director position.

Fulone reportedly stated that this new role outside of his police role, was an opportunity he couldn't pass up.

Fulone's last day as Deputy Chief with the Londonderry Police Department is Jan. 25. The Department is planning a retirement ceremony with a "final salute and send off" at the police station for that day at 3 p.m. Cheetham said Fulone will first enjoy a week's time

off with his family before starting his new Director position.

Chief William Hart

made a statement about Fulone's retirement, "We wish Deputy Chief Fulone and his family the very best. His 31 years of service are characterized by excellence and professionalism at every turn."

Hart emphasized Fulone was the department's first training coordinator and a good one.

"As training became more integral to professional police work in New Hampshire, Paul's logistical skills, planning ability and commitment to expanded police training set a gold standard here in Londonderry," Hart said.

Coincidentally Fulone reported that some of former Deputy Chief's Dussault presence including Dussault's coaching efforts had rubbed off on him as Dussault had encouraged officers to be lifelong learners and to never stop being "a student of the game."

Fulone was captain of the airport division for eight years and served the last year as captain of the services division, which oversees things like training, communications, records, evidence, fleet management and building maintenance.

## Council Appoints Two To Senior Committee, Oks Fund Expenditures

At the Jan. 21 Town Council meeting, Council was presented with an update to the town's Elderly Exemption Policy. According to the town, the policy has been in effect since 1997 and grants property tax exemptions for those over the age of 65.

Town Assessor Rick Brideau presented it to Council. He said there had been a "cost of living" increase in Social Security

benefits, and it would be a good time to look at the policy and ensure that the increase in Social Security income did not cause otherwise eligible residents to lose their exemption.

"I want to ensure people don't lose their benefits," he said. "There won't be a cost to the town or an increase in benefits or anything. We're just making sure the numbers line up."

The new income cap is \$40,800 for a single or widowed person, or if married, a combined net

income of not more than \$50,300 with assets not more than \$137,000.

The exemptions would stay the same - \$98,900 for those between 65 and 74 years old, \$123,600 for those between 75 and 79 years old, and \$164,800 for residents 80 years old or older.

Council will hold a public hearing on the policy update at the Feb. 4 meeting.

At the Jan. 21 meeting, council members also appointed two new mem-

bers to the Senior Resources Committee.

Council accepted the resignation of Delores Stoklosa from the committee. They appointed Suzanne O'Gara from an alternate to a full-time member to fill the vacancy. Council then appointed Lois Dziergowski to an alternate position to fill the board.

Council also approved the use of \$9,445 from the Expendable Maintenance Trust Fund. According to Steve Cotton, \$2,805 would cover winter maintenance like plowing, sanding and salting at town buildings on Dec. 27, 28, 29 and 31, and again on Jan. 1 and 3.

The other \$6,640 would go to repair one of the two boilers at Londonderry Police Department. According to Cotton, the boiler is leaking and two sections need to be repaired. He said the boiler was installed in 2004 and staff intends to have it repaired for as long as possible, since a new boiler would cost over \$20,000.

The next Town Council meeting will take place on Feb. 4 at 7 p.m. in the Moose Hill Council Chambers at Town Hall.

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# Sorellina Boutique and Uni-Cast Granted Variances To Support Growth

The Zoning Board of Adjustment granted variances for two local businesses that have been growing. Uni-Cast, a company that manufactures aluminum castings, was looking to add on to their current building near the airport. Sorellina Boutique on Route 102, was looking to add a sign to differentiate itself from its companion business Salon Bogar.

Uni-Cast needed relief from the ZBA because their expansion at 11 Industrial Drive would extend about 18 feet into the normally required 30-foot setback from the

road. Project Engineer Jeremy Belanger of TF Moran presented the variance request on behalf of Uni-Cast.

He said that in May 2007, Uni-Cast was granted a variance to expand the building, but put off the project due to the economic downturn. They are now ready to move forward, but the original variance request had expired. The building expansion is to allow them to expand their oven to aid in the casting creation process.

Uni-Cast is located near a cul-de-sac that provides access for first responder vehicles to the Manchester airport runway in the event of an

emergency. The ZBA confirmed that the proposed expansion would not impact such access. Given that there is very little traffic in the area of Uni-Cast and it is located in an area of similar industrial buildings, the ZBA voted 4-0 to grant the variance.

Sorellina Boutique was seeking approval to put up a sign in front of their retail space in Buttrick Place along Route 102. The boutique is next to Salon Bogar and has the same owner, so a variance is required to have two signs. At the December ZBA meeting, Craig Moore of Barlow Signs represented the applicant. The Board had questions at

the time that he could not answer, so he requested a continuance to the January meeting.

This time Amy Lamparelli, who owns both Salon Bogar and Sorellina Boutique, joined him to answer questions. Moore said that originally, the boutique was within Salon Bogar, but as grew it moved into an adjacent space with an interior door between them. Lamparelli shared that the door between the businesses was locked.

She also added that each business has their own employees and register. And recently, Sorellina Boutique signed a sub-lease to further separate

the businesses. At the time of the December meeting, the sub-lease was not in place. She added that each business sells different products.

During public comment, a representative from MEG Corporation, the landlord for the building spoke in support of the separate sign for Sorellina Boutique, saying that it was important for motorists on Route 102 to know how to find the business in the plaza. The ZBA agreed that while owned by the same person, the businesses were separate enough to warrant a sign for Sorellina Boutique.

In the last order of

business for the meeting, the ZBA voted to rehear a case of a variance that they had approved in the December meeting because one abutter had not been properly notified. That case allowed for a residential duplex to be built at 17 Dan Hill Road with only 85 feet of frontage when 200 feet is normally required.

A new owner purchased an abutting property in June 2018, but the previous owners got the meeting notification. Without the new owners being notified, the previous ZBA ruling was invalid. The case will be reheard in an upcoming ZBA meeting.

# Town Council Looks To Define Zoning 'Exception' Criteria

Town Council heard an ordinance at its Jan. 21 meeting to specifically define what a "special exception" is in the town's zoning code.

An applicant seeking a special exception is asking for permission to use a plot of land for something that is only permitted in a zone after getting approval from the town. For example, an applicant seeking to build a 10,000 square foot convenience store in a location zoned to allow retail stores over 5,000 square feet with specific parking, traffic and drainage requirements would have to apply for a special exception.

The zoning code's

Table of Uses specifically defines what uses are acceptable in each zone, and what is permissible via special exception.

However, according to the planning department, it was recently discovered that there was no specific way to grant a "special exception", even though the term is referred to in multiple places in the zoning code.

Ordinance 2019-01, brought to council by the Planning Department, adds specific language defining a "special exception" as granted by the Zoning Board of Appeals, and lists certain criteria that must be met before a proposed use can receive its exception.

According to the ordinance, to be granted a

special exception from the zoning code, an applicant must ensure that the use follows new, clearly defined guidelines.

Applicants granted special exceptions must ensure that their plan is not "detrimental to the health and safety of residents" - including hazards from "fire, explosion or release of toxic materials - will not create a traffic hazard or "undue...congestion" in the area, or be "incompatible with the surrounding neighborhood."

The special use must also refrain from "creating a nuisance" to the surrounding neighborhood by emitting "odors, smoke, gas, dust, noise, glare, heat, vibration or other pollutants," or with

"unsightly outdoor storage of equipment, vehicles or other materials," and must ensure it does not "result in the degradation of existing surface and groundwater quality standards" or damage local wetlands enough to lose "significant habitat or flood control protection."

Applicants must also ensure that they provide "adequate facilities" for

the use, and that they obtain all necessary state and federal permits to operate.

The ordinance also notes that the Zoning Board has the right to request applicants fulfill other "special conditions" in order to receive an exception, including site plan review and approval from the Planning Board, Heritage Commission and Conservation Commis-

sion.

It also includes a provision requiring that, once granted a special exception, an applicant must act on it within two years or it will expire. Applicants then must begin the process over again.

Town Council voted 4-0 in favor of the amendment to the code. Councilman Tom Dolan was not present at the meeting.

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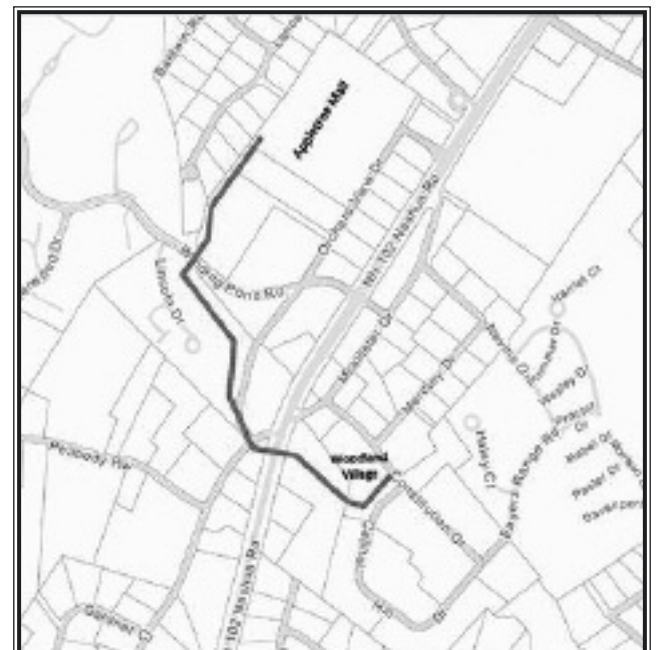


## Town Warns Drivers of Sewer Work Which Lasts Until Spring

tional \$79,841 in road maintenance costs, \$50,724 in waste collection costs and \$42,837 in recycling costs. If approved, it would create a \$0.043 increase in the tax rate.

Article 4 would take \$532,668 from the Police Outside Detail Special Revenue Fund to cover police outside details. It has no tax impact.

Article 5 would dissolve the Sewer Special Revenue Fund and transfer the funds to the Sewer Enterprise Fund beginning on July 1, 2020. It has no tax impact. Article 5 must pass with a 2/3 majority vote.

Articles 6 and 7, which would fund the sewer fund, are null and void if Article 5 passes. They

have no tax impact.

Article 8 would place \$650,000 in the Roadway Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund. \$162,500 would come from the town's Unassigned Fund Balance, but the town would have to get the other \$487,500 from taxes, causing the rate to increase \$0.121 if the article is passed.

If Article 9 passes, the town would place \$28,000 in the Geographic Information Systems Capital Reserve Fund. Like Article 8, \$7,000 would come from the unassigned fund balance and the rest would be funded through taxes. That would cause, if passed, a \$0.005 cent impact.

Article 10, \$48,942 to allow Public Works to lease two International 6 Wheelers and a Morbark chipper, would create a

\$0.012 increase.

Article 11 would add \$180,000 to the Expendable Maintenance Trust Fund - \$45,000 from unassigned fund balance and the other \$135,000 from taxes. If passed, the impact would be \$0.034.

Article 12, adding \$100,000 to the Pillsbury Cemetary Expansion Capital Reserve Fund - \$75,000 from taxes and \$25,000 from unassigned fund balance - would have an impact of \$0.19.

Article 13 adds \$10,000 to the Cemetary Capital Reserve Fund from the unassigned fund balance, and has no tax impact.

Article 14, \$37,500 for the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund, which includes \$25,000 for purchasing and training to add 20 defibrillators to vehicles in both the Pub-

lic Works and Fire Departments, would have an impact of \$0.009.

Article 15 would use \$175,000 from unassigned fund balance to fund an emergency backup generator for the police department. It has no tax impact.

Article 16 would use \$235,000 from unassigned fund balance to pay for drainage improvements to the Londonderry Town Common. It has no tax impact.

Articles 17 and 18 are tied together. Article 17 would rescind a 1984 warrant article allowing the SAU to have offices on a town-owned property. It has no tax impact.

Article 18 would allow the town to take back that building and spend \$378,500 from the unassigned fund balance to improve it and convert it to additional town offices. If Article 17 fails, this article is automatically nullified. It has no tax impact.

Article 19 would add a part time Conservation Land Ranger to the Londonderry Police Department staff at a cost of \$75,000 a year. The position would be fully funded by the Conservation Fund for fiscal year 2020, half by the conservation fund

and half by the general fund in fiscal 2021, and fully by the general fund beginning in fiscal 2022. There would be no tax impact in fiscal 2020, an impact of \$0.009 in 2021 and \$0.019 in 2022.

Article 20 would add a fourth School Resource Officer at a cost of \$120,720. The impact would be \$0.03.

Article 21 would allow for the use of \$64,356 from the Police Details Special Revenue Fund to buy two vans - one for the special operations division and one for animal control. It has no tax impact.

Article 22 would allow for the use of \$25,000 from unassigned fund balance to pay for the upcoming Nutfield 300th Anniversary Celebration. It has no tax impact.

Article 23 gives the town \$60,000 from unassigned fund balance to purchase new assessing software. It has no tax impact.

Article 24 allows \$1,625,000 to be used to complete phases 5 and 6 of the Rail Trail project. \$225,000 of the money comes from the Londonderry Trailways Committee. \$800,000 more will come from a grant from

the state, and the remaining \$600,000 will come from unassigned fund balance. It has no tax impact.

Article 25 would provide a "non-binding recommendation" to Town Council to petition the NH Department of Transportation to decrease the speed limit from 55 mph to 45 mph on NH-102 from Mammoth Road to the Hudson line. It has no tax impact.

Article 26 is a citizen-petitioned article that would allow for the use of \$20,000 from the unassigned fund balance to pay for repairs to the historic Londonderry Town Grange building. It has no tax impact.

Article 27 is a citizen-petitioned article that would allow establishments in Londonderry to hold Keno games. It has no tax impact.

The town council voted 4-0 to recommend all of the articles at its Jan. 21 meeting. Councilman Tom Dolan was not present.

Residents are asked to provide input on the articles at the Feb. 9 deliberative session, which will be held at 9 a.m. at Londonderry High School.

by 50-foot area on the property for the tower.

Springer said that they preferred to add their equipment to an existing tower because that is a far less involved process, but there were none close enough with space available. They did look at many other potential locations in the area, but some were in agricultural/residential districts where communication towers are not allowed; others were too far away; and the rest were closer to residences than the 11 Mohawk site.

He presented pictures of the balloon test showing that the tower would be clearly visible from Route 102 and Mohawk

and Horizon Drives. There would be no lights on the tower and no guidewires. The only traffic to the site would be a handful of maintenance people per month. The tower would be surrounded by a fence for safety. Bay Communications said they are willing to add plantings to help provide natural screening.

During public comment, the Board read a letter of objection from Patricia and Robert Panciocco who own two nearby rental properties. They felt that the tower would diminish their property values and require site plan waivers.

Granting the variance, required the ZBA to consider seven factors. First, is a tower allowed in the zoning district? Yes, it is allowed in a commercial

zone. Will it create a nuisance or hazard? They felt not. Is there an appropriate plan to handle traffic and keep the public safe? Again, they answered yes.

Are there enough parking spots? Yes, given the lack of traffic to the site. Would lighting not bother neighbors? Yes, since there are no lights. Is there a plan to handle storm water runoff? Yes, a plan exists. Finally, is there another tower within a mile that could take the equipment? The only tower within a mile already has T-Mobile equipment on it.

The ZBA voted 5-0 in favor of the exception with the condition that protective screening be added and that the Planning Board review and approve the site plan.

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# Be Safe and Warm During the Winter: And Be Mindful about Home Safety

Winter in New Hampshire is a time for warm cozy fireplaces and stoves. Also, many people will be using electric or fuel powered heating appliances for small rooms to augment home heating systems.

And this time is also when hidden dangers lurk, so it's important to prevent tragic accidents by being mindful of key safety issues. As the temperature drops outside, wood and pellet stoves along with space heaters may be fired up inside the home. What many people may not realize is that heating equipment is a leading cause of winter

home fires.

State of New Hampshire Fire Marshalls have prepared information that can save your life! Here's some important thoughts to remind you about winter safety. It is recommended to have a qualified professional install stoves, chimney connectors, and chimneys. Stoves should also have a LABEL from an independent testing laboratory.

Burn only dry, seasoned wood in a wood stove; for pellet stoves, burn only dry, seasoned wood pellets — ask your supplier about pellet source. It is important for chimneys and stoves to be inspected and cleaned by a certified chimney sweep every fall just before heat-

ing season.

It is a best practice to clean the inside of a pellet or wood stove using a wire brush as the accumulated soot may limit efficiency or even result in fire combustion. Allow ashes to cool before disposing of them. Place ashes in a covered metal container. Keep the container at least 10 feet away from the home and other buildings. Do not use a shopvac or regular vacuum to clean stove ashes. Get a proper ash cleaning vacuum — properly designed for ashes with fireproof metal chambers and hoses.

Keep a close eye on children around a wood or pellet stove. Remind them to stay at least 3 feet

away from the heating stove.

Stoves and space heaters need space. Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away from the stove. Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed and be ready if the heat stops working.

INSTALL and maintain smoke detector and carbon monoxide alarms (CO) outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. For the best protection, interconnect the CO alarms. When one sounds, they all sound. Test all smoke detector and carbon monoxide alarms once a month.

Plan two ways out of

the home in case of an emergency. Clear driveways and front walks of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home. Make sure your house number can be seen from the street, so firefighters will be able to find you. Clear 3 feet around all sides of your nearest fire hydrant. In the event of an emergency don't let snow be the cause of delay.

Be ready in case the power goes out and have warm and cozy and safe!

flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries and never use candles. Electricity generators should only be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open. Not following these guidelines can lead to fatal CO poisoning.

er town. "Chester has about 5,000 residents, while Londonderry has 26,000," she said. "I'm looking forward to having a busier office."

Prior to her service in Chester Town Hall, she worked in administrative support at both the Concord and Chester Fire Departments, spending

Newnan will begin her duties on Jan. 28.

Later in the year, the Finance Department will also see a little shake-up. Finance Director Doug Smith announced that he will retire, effective March 30.

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# New Hampshire Offers Miles of Snowmobiling Trails

“If you climbed into your car in Manchester, New Hampshire, and drove to Sacramento, California—and back—you’d cover a little more than 6,000 miles.”

This introduction, posted on visitnh.gov, highlights the abundance of snowmobiling trails New Hampshire has to offer avid and novice snowmobilers alike. The site then goes on to boast that the state has enough trails to cover the aforementioned long-distance trip and then some—over 7,000 total miles, to be exact.

Snowmobiling is a popular winter pastime in New Hampshire. While it is a fun way to explore the state and shake the winter blues, there are a fair amount of regulations and guidelines to ensure safety for everyone involved and for the maintenance of snowmobiling trails.

In the state of New Hampshire, a snowmobile must be registered prior to being operated anywhere other than an owner’s own property, according to the website for New Hampshire State Parks. Registration can be obtained in person at any authorized registration agents throughout the

state, at the New Hampshire Fish and Game Headquarters, or by calling the NH Fish and Game Department at (603) 271-4300.

Fees for registering a snowmobile vary based on how many are being registered, residency status, and whether or not a registrant is a member of a snowmobile club. A comprehensive list of snowmobile clubs is available on the NH State Parks website.

These registration fees are divided between the NH Fish and Game Department and the NH Department of Resources and Economic Development, Division of Parks and Recreation’s Bureau of Trails, says NH State Parks. Additionally, one dollar from each registration goes into the Fish

and Game Search and Rescue Fund, three dollars goes to the registration agent, and two dollars goes to the vendor of the electronic registration system.

According to nhstateparks.org, about 70 percent of New Hampshire land is privately owned, ergo the majority of trails fall on private land. These private land trails are maintained by local snowmobile clubs, which are responsible for obtaining landowner permission to have them open to riders, as well as maintaining the trails based on the landowners’ wishes.

Snowmobilers are advised to respect the wishes of any private trail landowners’ wishes and their land. “NO RESPECT = NO TRAILS.” says NH

State Parks.

In addition to registering a snowmobile and adhering to trail etiquette, it is strongly recommended that potential snowmobilers take a certified snowmobile safety course. This will help riders learn how to operate their snowmobile safely and what to do in the event of emergencies.

State law requires that all operators 12 years of age and over must possess either a valid driver’s license or must have successfully completed an approved OHRV or Snowmobile Safety Education Class when operating off of their own property.

The official online NH OHRV/Snowmobile Rider education course is available on the NH Fish and Game website.

NH State Parks advises

riders to familiarize themselves with snowmobile trail signage to keep from getting lost in the trails, avoid possible crash hazards such as gates and bridges, etc. A copy of snowmobile trail signs is available on the NH State Parks website.

The State of New Hampshire OHRV and Snowmobile Digest of Regulations advises riders to be cautious when riding across ice. Though all ice could potentially be dangerous, the Army Cold Regions Research and Engineering Laboratory in Hanover, NH states that there should be a

minimum of six inches of hard ice before foot travel, and eight to ten inches of hard ice for snowmobile or ATV travel.

It also states that riders should be aware that ice can be weakened by objects that have been frozen into it, such as docks, fallen trees, and large rocks, as they will retain heat from the sun. The digest also cautions riders to avoid areas with springs or moving water underneath the ice.

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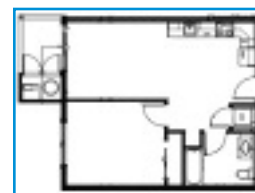
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# LHS Girls Basketball Team Winning Streak Ends at Four

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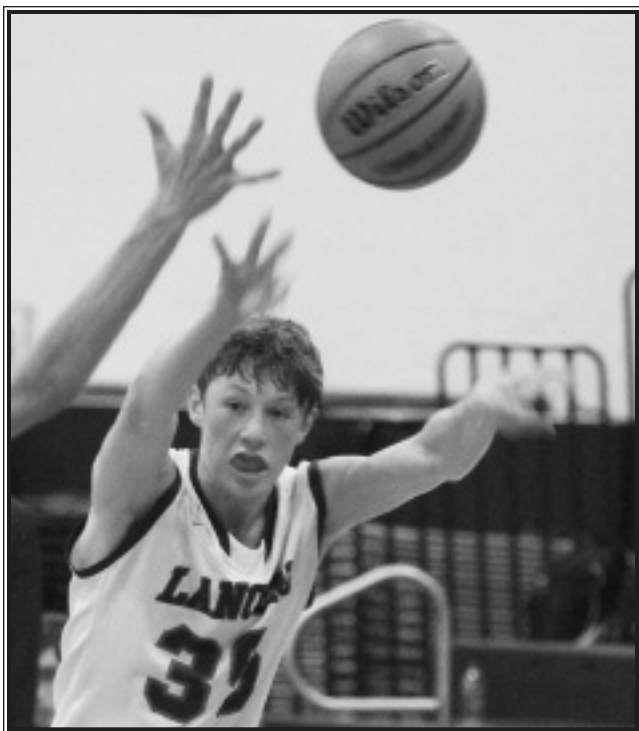


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# Londonderry High Boys Hoops Team Wins at the Buzzer

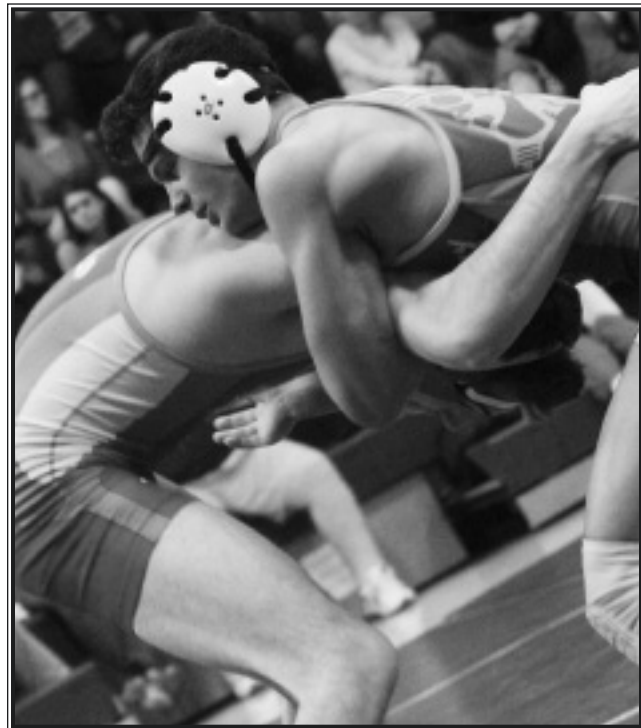
points for his 170 lb. win and another forfeit.
