Zoning Grapples With Contentious Requests

The Zoning Board of Adjustment revisited a variance request that they unanimously approved in Dec. because one abutter had not been properly notified. By law that nullified the earlier hearing and decision,

requiring a new hearing.

The case was a request for a variance to have only 85 feet of road frontage for a proposed duplex at 17 Dan Hill Rd., when 200 feet is normally required by the town zoning ordinance.

One condition of the previous approval was

review by the developer with the Fire Department to see if they were OK with the proposed plan given that Dan Hill Rd., is a dead-end road that switches from a paved road to a dirt road at 17 Dan Hill.

At this hearing, the developer shared a letter **continued on page 6**

Two School Board Candidates On March 12 School Ballot

On Tuesday, March 12 Londonderry voters will be asked to cast their ballot for both school and town.

On the school ballot, there will be two residents running for one three-year seat. We asked each to supply us with why they felt they were the best choice.

Jenn Ganem (incumbent)

First and foremost, I have three children all of whom attend the Londonderry public schools so I have a vested interest in every decision I make as a School Board member and I'm in the thick of it with other parents.

I believe our schools need to remain academically rigorous and continue to support music and the arts, sports, and extracurricular activities so we have well-rounded students.

This year as Chair, I increased student voice by encouraging students to present their ideas for change to the School Board, ensured our faculty and staff was trained for an active shooter situation, and initiated a thorough policy review. If elected, I hope to: help find a solution to the increasing student enrollment in the lower grades, increase student and senior citizen interaction, further increase stu-

dent voice and school safety, increase in-house professional development opportunities for faculty, and collaborate with Town Council to address the lack of state funding.

School Enrollment Down 1.9% Discipline Incidents Up 16.8%

At the Feb. 19 School Board meeting, Superintendent Scott Laliberte provided a student enrollment update. As of Jan. 31, the enrollment district-wide is down 1.9% from the same time a year ago with 4,260 students compared to 4,344 last year.

In the same meeting, members heard updates on the level of discipline issues at LHS and LMS, reviewed many proposed changes to School District

policies and accepted the retirement of five teachers.

Looking more deeply at the enrollment numbers, kindergarten enrollment dropped 18%, LMS dropped 1.8% and LHS enrollment dropped 3.6%. Elementary enrollment went the other direction, increasing by 2.6%, while LEEP remained virtually unchanged. The number of homeschooled students increased by 13.7% from 85 to 92.

Board Member Steve Young asked Laliberte

how many students he expected to enroll next September. Laliberte said that their current forecast is for an increase of 100 students district-wide. He also shared that so far, 228 students are registered for kindergarten with registration ongoing right up to the start of school in the Fall. He said that at this point last year, about 190 students had registered. The district

Absentee Ballot Criteria Now Includes Bad Weather On Election Day

Stand up for your rights and take part in our democracy by voting on March 12, in the Town and School election. There is no real good excuse not to vote, as absentee voting is simple to do and easy to access.

Local elections not only affect tax bills, it is the time to choose the right candidates to direct our community and schools with decisions that will affect all residents for the coming years. This is the time to make a difference. If you cannot get to the polls in March, let it be known, it is not difficult to vote by Absentee Ballot. Last year, a snowstorm slowed down local voting turnout and so there is now a change in the NH state law to accommodate absentee voting even when a blizzard hits via a special new process outlined below.

Absentee voting starts with voter registration. The application forms + procedures are online at the Town's site or available at the Town Clerk's office. If you cannot get to the Town clerk to register to vote, contact the Town

clerk's office by phone, email, fax or mail and they will help you find the best way to register.

By state law, any person who meets the criteria and will be absent from access to the voting polls on the day of any state election from the city, town, or unincorporated place in which he or she is registered to vote can vote by absentee ballot.

Here is the criteria - an absentee voter will need to select one of these reasons below on the form.

1. A registered voter has plans to be absent on the day of the election from the city, town, or unincorporated place in which they are registered to vote.

2. A registered voter cannot appear in public on election day because of observance of a religious commitment.

3. A registered voter is unable to vote in person due to a disability.

4. A registered voter cannot appear at any time during polling hours at your polling place because an employment obligation requires them to remain physically at work or they will be in transit to or from work from the time the polls open until after the time the polls close.

To vote using an Absentee Ballot, one cannot just make up an arbitrary reason, such as that you do not have the time to go to the polls. If you can go to vote, then you must do so. Any person who votes or attempts to vote using an Absentee Ballot, who is not entitled to vote by absentee ballot shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

On the application for the Absentee Ballot, enter your name, voting address (your home address), date of birth, the mailing address for the ballot. You will need to declare that you are registered to vote in the Town and that you will be absent on March 12. Follow the full instructions on the form.

There is a provision to be able to assist disabled voters to fill out their absentee ballot. Once you complete your vote using the Absentee ballot, there are several ways to process it. If you mail the absentee ballot in, it must be received by deadlines as outlined. Note the Town Clerk will not take Absentee Ballots on the day of the election, so you must go to the polls and vote on election day if you can.

A recent NH law updates Absentee Voting cri-

teria regarding bad weather conditions. When the National Weather Service has issued a winter storm warning, blizzard warning, or ice storm warning for election day applicable to the town:

(a) A person who is elderly or infirm or who has a physical disability, who otherwise would have voted in person but has concerns for his or her safety traveling in the storm, may vote absentee on the Monday immediately prior to the election.

(b) A person who cares for children or infirm adults who reasonably anticipates that school, child care, or adult care

will be canceled, who otherwise would have voted in person but will be deterred from voting by the need to care for children or infirm adults, may vote absentee on the Monday immediately prior to the election.

(c) As required, the clerk's office shall be open to receive applications for absentee ballots, to provide voters the opportunity to complete absentee ballots, and to receive returned ballots on the Monday immediately prior to an election at a minimum from 3 - 5 p.m. The clerk may designate a deputy clerk or assistant to provide this service, pro-

vided the individual has taken the oath of office and has been trained in the requirements for using an absentee ballot and the procedures for issuing and receiving absentee ballots.

Every vote counts. The last local election outcomes for many issues and officials have been separated by only a select few votes.

Your voting participation benefits both you and your town. So, we issue a friendly reminder: Election Day is March 12. For your own good and that of your community, please take the time to study the candidates and warrant articles, then go out and VOTE!

Prepare to Vote

Election Day most towns in the state is March 12. In the days between now and then, we hope you'll listen to candidates speak, read their words, and ask them about the issues that concern you.

The March election has no state or national candidates, and that's traditionally bad news for voter turnout. We remind you, however, that your vote has far more impact on local government races than it ever will on the state or federal level.

Equally important are the warrant articles on both the town and school ballots whether it's the school budget or a request for a something, funding for other things. Town and school requests should be handled the way you handle your checkbook can you afford it? Is it a necessity or a luxury? Is it something you can put off, or is that a false economy that will cost much more later on?

If you don't understand what you're being asked to approve, seek the answer. The right to vote is important, but it carries with it the responsibility of understanding the issues. It shouldn't sway your vote that the budget committee or your neighbor favors or dislikes a warrant article or candidate.

There are also Needs versus wants on many ballots. Choose wisely.

Candidates were asked why they're seeking office. Also warrant articles were reviewed, and have been written about for several weeks in this paper. Here are a few pointers: On a bond, pay attention to the financial obligation imposed for each year of the bond. The money will come out of your pocket for the life of the bond.

How about a union contract? If it covers just one year, its costs are likely to be clear. But most contracts are for two to four years. Make sure you understand the costs attached to each additional year you won't be asked to vote on it in future years, but the money will be added to the overall budget and will be part of your tax bill.

And money isn't everything. Are workers paying more of their insurance these days? Get the full picture. Because the choice is yours, and each article has pros and cons, and it pays to listen to both sides.

Many people like to pride themselves on their patriotism. There's not a much better way to express your patriotism than by heading to the polls and making informed choices.

So for your own good and the good of the community, please vote March 12.

Why Vote "Yes" for Rail Trail Article #24

To the editor,

A "Yes" vote on Rail Trail Warrant Article #24 will mean construction of 2 miles of trail from North Londonderry Village to the perimeter of the airport.

A "Yes" vote enables Trailways/Town of Londonderry to receive \$800,000 in NHDOT Alternative Transportation grant money specifically designated for construction of the airport perimeter trail. This is a big deal! It would be years before Trailways could fundraise \$800,000, and Trailways doesn't get every grant it applies for.

So why is there a war-

rant article to expend \$600,000 from Undesignated Funds?

1.) Because the State requires \$200,000 in matching funds from Trailways/Town of Londonderry in order to get the \$800,000 grant money.

2.) The airport section will cost more than \$800,000 to construct.

3.) The Little Cohas Marsh section which will connect the existing trail to the airport perimeter section costs more than the \$225,000 specifically donated to Trailways for that section.

Therefore, a "Yes" vote will meet the \$200,000 matching funds requirement to receive the grant, pay the additional cost to build the airport perimeter section, and along with the money Trailways has fundraised, cover the cost to complete the connecting Little Cohas segment.

Please join with the Town Council which voted 5 - 0 and the Budget Committee which voted 6 - 0 in support of the Article. Now we need you to vote March 12th, and encourage others, to pass Rail Trail Town Article #24!

from LFD indicating that that were OK with the plan if the developer included a hammerhead turnaround on their property. The developer agreed and incorporated that into their plan.

In the last meeting only one member of the public provided input. At the new hearing, many current residents of the area, most on Dan Hill Road spoke against granting the variance.

A common theme among the objectors was that the addition of the duplex as a rental unit would decrease the property value of the existing houses. In general, the ZBA did not agree with this argument because duplexes are allowed in AR-1 zones and this was only for a single duplex.

A second concern raised by neighbors was that granting the frontage variance could lead to additional development on the 15-acre property. The developer stipulated that if approved for the variance, he would accept a condition that only the one duplex be allowed.

Town Associate Planner Laura Gandia pointed out that it was not within the remit of the ZBA to restrict further development on

the property. She added, however, additional development of the property would require establishing a subdivision and that such a plan would be reviewed by the Planning Board.

Several residents of Dan Hill Road made the case that it is a very narrow road that could not handle the additional traffic generated by two additional families in the duplex. They highlighted that the road was so narrow, that two cars approaching each other would require one to pull off to the side to allow the other to pass.

They expressed concern about the additional traffic endangering adults and children walking along the road, pointing out that students must walk to the end of Dan Hill Road to catch school buses.

The majority of the ZBA did not buy this argument pointing out that existing residents bought their houses knowing it was a narrow road, so why should the new residents at 17 Dan Hill be deprived of the same opportunity?

A few objectors said that they would be OK with the project if it were building a single-family home rather than a duplex. They believed that this would lessen the safety concerns from additional traffic and fit better in the neighborhood.

They also added that if the developer was building a single-family house, then the variance to allow only 85 feet of frontage would not be as drastic because a single-family house only requires 150 feet of frontage.

The developer said that if he was restricted from building the duplex, he would look at the option of building a subdivision with multiple houses to get an appropriate revenue stream from the property.

In the end, the ZBA voted to grant the variance by a 3-2 vote with the condition that LFD and public works approve detailed construction plans for the hammerhead turnaround.

In the second case of the night, James Reid, owner of Northern New England Excavation, sought permission to have an office for his business at his residence at 46 Auburn Rd. Reid is planning to build a detached garage that would have office space over it.

According to the town's zoning ordinance, having a commercial office in a residence requires meeting many conditions including that the office be limited to a certain percentage of space in the house; that the office does not change the rural character of the neighborhood or increase traffic; that any employees at the site must be immediate family members; that no

external renovation or construction occur; and that no equipment or machinery be stored outside.

Most of the discussion focused on the potential storage of excavation equipment and trucks at the residence. At one point, Reid said that in the last year there were only three or four times that he had equipment at the residence. At another point he said that equipment was always stored at job sites and moved directly from job to job. Then he said that there was downtime in the winter when trucks might be stored in the new garage he is building.

ZBA member Jacqueline Benard reiterated to him that if the exception were granted equipment and machinery could never be on the property. The board seemed skeptical that equipment would not be stored there, but since Reid claimed that would not be the case, they had to take his word for it.

Benard said it would be up to his neighbors, several of whom were at the meeting, to object to the exception, to report him to the town if they saw equipment on the property.

The Board struggled with how to interpret the zoning ordinance regulating the size limitation of the home office. In the case of the office being in a detached building, the applicant has to demon-

strate "that the home occupation does not exceed...fifty percent (50%) of the existing normal living area of the primary residence."

The Board was not clear whether the ordinance defined the "pri-

mary residence" as the current house or as the current rent house plus the planned detached garage and office space. As a result, they decided to continue the case to March to allow time to consult with the town attorney.

projects that roughly 256 kindergarteners will enroll next Fall.
Katie Sullivan and David Sutherland, Assistant Principals at LHS and LMS, respectively, gave their semi-annual discipline updates. For LHS, there were 410 disciplinary incidents during the first semester, up 16.8%

from last year. The data shows that the vast majority of the issues were violations of school rules, however, roughly forty issues were more serious in nature including fighting, alcohol and drugs, theft, bullying and truancy.
Commenting on the increase in issues year over year, Sullivan attributed it to more robust focus on reporting and

categorization of issues and an increase in vaping offenses. She added that all of the discipline issues were caused by just 11% of the student population. The 170 students making up that 11% had on average 2.4 issues per student. Further, 21 students alone accounted for 180 of the 410 issues.

For LMS, there were 709 disciplinary incidents during the first semester, up 7.1% from last year. The data shows that the vast majority of the issues were violations of school rules, however, roughly a dozen issues were more serious in nature including fighting, theft and bullying. Sutherland said that 192 incidents were managed in the classroom so that

students learned from their mistakes without missing instruction time being referred out of the classroom to administration. The remaining 517 incidents were referred to administration. Just 32 students were responsible for 54% of the administrative discipline totals.

In response to past public concern about bullying, hazing and harassment in the district, a new reporting structure and intensive teacher training was put in place to make sure that these types of issues were captured, categorized and investigated properly. This past semester was the first were the new approach was applied.

At LHS, there were sixteen reports. Upon further

investigation by the administration, eight were classified as bullying, five as harassment and three as derogatory comments. At LMS, there were twelve reports. Upon further investigation by the administration, one was classified as bullying and one as harassment. The remainder did not rise to the level of bullying or harassment and were categorized as peer conflicts and mean behavior.

At the elementary schools, there were thirteen initial reports of bullying or harassment, nine of them were substantiated as such. The remainder were classified as teasing, mean behavior, or as a peer conflict in which both parties acted inappropriately.

In other business, the Board held the second of three public hearings on proposed changes to school district policies. A review of the current policies by the district found dozens that required updated language in order to be compliant with related RSAs and others that were outdated or duplicate.

The Board was informed about five long-time teachers who will be retiring at the end of the school year. They are: Laurie Daily (Matthew Thornton), Karen McCarty (South School), Denise Hepburn (North School), Bridget Kilgore-Prugh (LHS) and Aurielle Nazro (LHS). Collectively, the group has roughly 200 years of experience in the district.

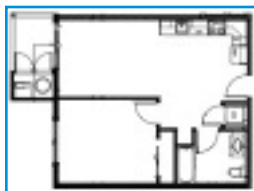

Lancer Boys Basketball Team Drops Two Tough Games

Most of this regular season was a big celebration for the Londonderry High School Boys' Varsity Basketball team, who were able to win some very close games.

May tried to save the game for Londonderry with two late, wild three-pointers, but it was not enough in this physical and emotional game.

The team will close out its regular season on Friday, March 1, 6:30 with a road game, against Nashua North. The playoffs are scheduled to begin with the Preliminary round next Tuesday, March 5.

At the meet, held at Nashua South High

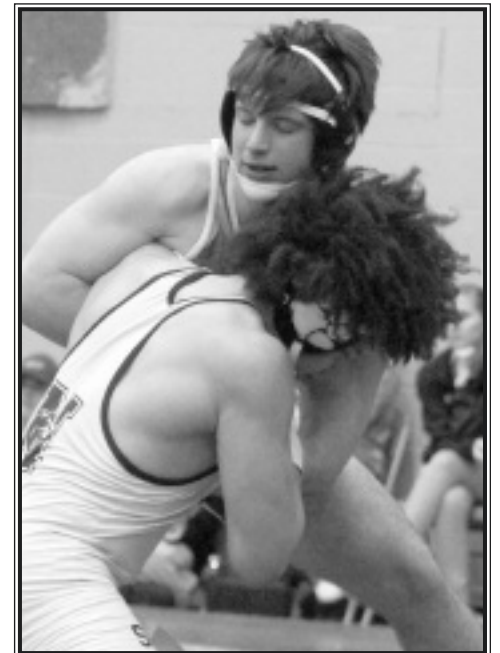
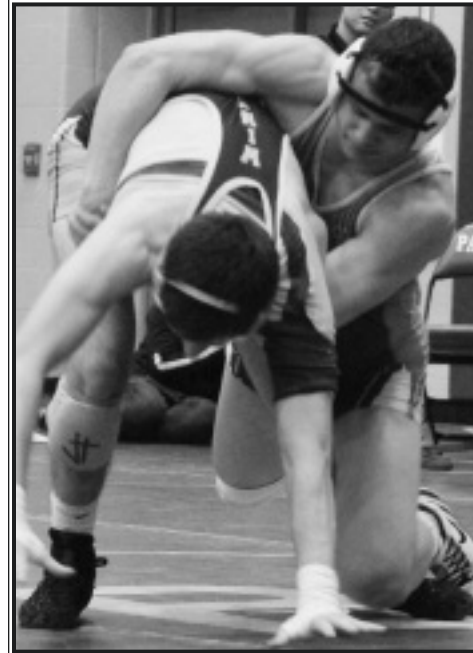

Lancer Shot Put Star Readies to Represent Granite State

Londonderry High School Senior Patrick Hagearty is doing it all. First Team All-State in football, State Champion in Shot Put, All-State Team in Track and Field. On Saturday (Mar. 2), Hagearty will be representing Londonderry and the state in the New England's Meet, at the Reggie Lewis Center in Boston. Before that, he gave an interview to the Londonderry Times.

"When this year began, I was hoping I will be able to put something like this together, but when I entered high school, I did not think this

will be even close to possible," Hagearty revealed.

"As a freshman I played on the defensive line a little, but it was only my second year in football and I wasn't very good," admits Hagearty, who was key in the 8-1 2018 season of Lancers varsity football, "I needed time to get used to this game. For track, I have had a few coaches, but no one was like coach Daniels, who is my coach now and really taught me everything about shot putting. When I entered high school I had no expectations to be able to accomplish all of this. My coaches, trainers and

family really helped to do that".

His response to football coach Jimmy Lauzon saying he was a late bloomer Hagearty responded. "When I was a sophomore, one of our defensive linemen broke his leg, and they threw me in the mix, and I was able to hold my honors and thought that I can do this. From there, it was keep getting stronger and better, keep working.

Asked which of the two sports is his favorite, Hagearty does not have a clear answer, but he knows in which of the two he is (a bit) better: "You can't beat the team

aspect of football, but in track you are competing against yourself every day. I can't pick one, but I would say I am probably better in track than in football. I am hoping to do at least one of them in college. I haven't decided on a school yet, but I am looking at UNH, WPI and Northeastern. I can do track in any of them, and in WPI I can play football too if I want to".

When asked how playing football helped him in track. "Football helped me get in the weight room, and our trainers do a great job with us. My strength increased a lot thanks to football and my footwork thanks to track. And for an offensive lineman, having a quick first step and being fast off the ball is a key. Those two sports really complement each other well".

Hagearty has a number of role models. "My grandfather was a semi-pro baseball player and played football in college. He is a hard worker and so deterrent. My sister and parents taught me

there and I want to improve my personal record and hopefully place in the top five. Definitely qualify to the final. And then I have the outdoor track season and hopefully I can get the state record in Discuss. I'll have a good season, I think I will be able to do it".

This is a big deal! It would be years before Trailways could fundraise \$800,000, and Trailways doesn't get every grant it applies for.

3.) The Little Cohas Marsh section which will connect the existing trail to the airport perimeter section costs more than the \$225,000 specifically donated to Trailways for that section.

Therefore, a "Yes" vote will meet the \$200,000 matching funds requirement to receive the grant, pay the additional cost to build the airport perimeter section, and along with the money Trailways has fundraised, cover the cost to complete the connecting Little Cohas segment.

Please join with the Town Council which voted 5 - 0 and the Budget Committee which voted 6 - 0 in support of the Article. Now we need you to vote March 12th, and encourage others, to pass Rail Trail Town Article #24!
