Police Investigating Suspicious Death of Women on West Road

New Hampshire's Attorney General Gordon J. MacDonald, New Hampshire State Police Colonel Christopher J. Wagner and Londonderry Police Chief William R. Hart Jr. announced on Friday, Apr.

5 in a news release that an investigation was opened and is ongoing into the suspicious death of an adult female in Londonderry, New Hampshire.

At first, the state and local law enforcement officials did not release the woman's identity, until her relatives re-

ceived the notice, but a State Police Major Crimes Unit's truck was parked for many hours near a property at 118 West Road in Londonderry and the Londonderry Police was present at the scene as well.

Superintendent Proposes Full-Day Kindergarten to School Board

Londonderry School District Superintendent, Scott Laliberte, presented an update of the Facilities Study Committee, regarding full-day kindergarten programs in Londonderry during the recent School Board meeting on April 2.

The current Londonderry kindergarten program is a half-day program at Moose Hill School and has morning and afternoon, two hour and 35 minutes sessions. With the addition of 16 minutes to next year's school schedule, thanks

to the Collective Bargaining Agreement that was recently signed with the district's teachers, those sessions will become two hours and 43 minutes long, with the first one running from 8:37 a.m. to 11:20 a.m. and the second one beginning at 12:30 p.m. and lasting until 3:13 p.m.

Economic development in the area, and a growth in state support and interest and enrollment and town competition were presented as "Outside Londonderry" reasons as to why the discussion about full-day kindergarten programs is necessary right now.

New and current residents with young children, who inquire regularly as to the district's position on full-day kindergarten program was one of the "Inside Londonderry" reasons, next to the need to plan ahead, as there will be a significance need for space if the district is to add this kind of program. A Long-term Space Needs study is already underway for that reason.

In 2009, New Hampshire became the 50th state in the country to require a kindergarten program. The current kindergarten curriculum

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E-Poll Machine Certification May Be Two Year Process

During the Londonderry election on March 12, 2019, an electronic voter check-in was tested, and deemed very successful, but the ability to implement the new system may be a ways off.

The new check-in process was a pilot test project that the town decided to participate in for the past town election. The report that came out after Election Day was very positive, and showed that the new machines had a good impact on both the voters and the Town Clerk.

The paper-based voter checklist is still the offi-

cial list of all registered voters in Londonderry, and in order to fully utilize the method used in the last town election, the New Hampshire Secretary of State must certify the company that provided the town with the necessary equipment used for the electronic check-in at the polls. This is required before the official paper voter checklist can be eliminated in favor of an electronic version.

The state is currently still in the evaluation phase of this pilot electronic check-in process. During the March 12 Londonderry town election, poll workers still had to check off each voter on the official paper check-




list. The results were then compared to the results from the electronic machines, in order to verify that the results were the same for each method.

The process that will eventually certify the company that provides the machines used for electronic check-in during elections in the State of NH is lengthy and expensive. **continued on page 5**

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Budget Committee Regroups, Talks About Keno Vote

The Londonderry Budget Committee held its latest meeting on Thursday, March 28 and began by electing new officers. Tim Siekmann was voted in as Chair, after previously serving

as Vice Chair, recently re-elected member Christine Patton as became Vice Chair (previously served as Secretary) and Chad Franz, who was recently elected to a three-year term, became the committee secretary. Also present at the meeting were

former Chair Kirsten Hildonen and Steve Breault, who was recently elected to a one-year term.

Two main topics were discussed in the meeting. The committee members spoke about having the leadership of the town, school department, police

department, fire station and public works in over the course of the next three months (April, May and June) to give the committee an update on the fiscal year 2019 budget, as well as preview the fiscal year 2020 budget.

The second subject was a discussion about a possible invitation of people in town, who will be sponsoring the potential Keno article next year, to come in and educate the Budget Committee members in the reasons why they want to have Keno in the community. The Budget Committee stated that it would like to start work-

ing with those people as early as possible, in order to make sure that the committee has a full understanding of the warrant article this year, before the budget season.

Keno is controlled by the Lottery Commission. It is mostly found in bars (and occasionally in restaurants), as only businesses that hold an active liquor pouring licenses are allowed to operate a Keno lottery machine. The unofficial results of the March 12 elections in Londonderry showed an eight-vote win for Article 27 that asked for residents' support in bringing

keno to town. But a few days later, as the official results came in, it was announced that Article 27 failed by 32 votes (1,349 No, 1,317 Yes).

Kevin Smith explained this change on the Mar. 18 Town Council and said that the error occurred due to one of the voting machines producing incorrect vote numbers into the spreadsheet. A request for a recount was quickly submitted by Article 27 supporters, but the Mar. 25 recount showed almost similar results to the official results (1,345 No, 1,314 Yes) and the Article officially failed.

Local YMCA Holds Fundraising Event

The Castleton Banquet and Conference Center in Windham was buzzing on Thursday, Apr. 4, as the YMCA of Greater Londonderry held its Annual Tasting and Benefit Auction. The money raised in the annual event is used to support the YMCA's financial needs and allows the organization to offer free services and programs, such as workshops for parents and teen services. This year, 100 percent of the proceeds from the event benefit the YMCA's Reach Out for Youth and Families Annual Campaign, which helps support the Membership for All Programs, as well as camp and childcare scholarships.

Between 200 and 250 people attended this year's event and had the opportunity to enjoy and taste some of the area's best cuisine and drinks, as 13 food vendors and 15 wine and beverage vendors supported the event and offered different tastings, from all kinds of meet, to desserts and freshly brewed beers.

The YMCA of Greater Londonderry's Executive Director, Lisa Fitzgerald,

said: "This event has been going on beyond my 11 years with the Y. We started at raising \$25,000 and this year, our goal is \$60,000. We have successfully succeeded our goal every year and our hope is to do the same this year. We are so happy to support the community needs and this event helps us to continue service our community". Ms. Fitzgerald could not yet tell the Londonderry Times what amount was eventually raised in the event, but encouraged anyone who still wants to donate to the YMCA of Greater Londonderry to do that through the official website.

Nick Therrien, the Advisory Board Chair of the YMCA of Greater Londonderry, thanked all of the event's supporters and part of his message on the official program was: "The YMCA of Greater Londonderry builds a healthy spirit, mind and body in individuals and families by instilling the values of caring, honesty, respect and responsibility through our practices and programs. Last year we provided financial assistance to over 700 youth, individual and families to ensure

our YMCA is a welcoming place for everyone in the communities we serve".

The event was named Calling All Heroes and the organizers were all wearing capes and masks. Other than the food and drinks, there was a silent auction in four different tables, with a variety of items, from 1/2 hour Massage to some beautiful paintings and sports memorabilia and all the way to fancy cookouts and dinner, and a condo in Lahaina Maui Hawaii.

The majority of the participating food and beverage vendors were from either Londonderry or Derry. Jason Knight, from the Long Blue Cat Brewing of Londonderry, had a very popular stand and served different samples of his brewery's beer: "This is our second event here. All of us went to the Y when we were younger and we like giving back to the Boys Club and the YMCA because they are both good for the community. The secondary thing part of it is the chance to expose yourself to some people who haven't tried you before. Last year no one really knew us. Now, most of the people that are here already came to our place and tasted our beers".

An Important Note to Our Readers

On Monday, April 8, our office at the Londonderry Times got an extremely disappointing phone call telling us that the Londonderry Times will no longer be the paper of record for the town of Londonderry after almost 20 years of dedication to the town.

We were informed that the "out of state owned" rival paper "The Derry News" who's parent company, is Raycom Media Inc., based out of Montgomery, Alabama, will be doing it from now on, and they will be receiving all of the town's legal notices.

From our perspective, this was done in a way that had a blatant disregard for supporting a local business, and a local family, with nearly 20 years of bringing residents their community news. resident in town for 24 years.

With the Londonderry Times no longer running any of the town's legal notices, we also feel this is a slap in the face to the residents of the town. Because, despite their claims, not everyone receives the Derry News.

But maybe that was the real intention here, the town says they want to keep people informed, but is that really true?

Deb Paul, the publisher of the Londonderry Times was told the decision was made because they were cheaper, but was never given the opportunity to counter, or respond to a RFP.

The council has stated many times that cheaper is not always better, except, we guess, when it comes to getting information out to the folks of Londonderry it would seem.

During a phone call with town manager Kevin Smith on Monday Smith said it was "his choice" and that and that the Derry News was 10% cheaper when he showed them our prices.

Paul then asked why he didn't show the respect she felt was warranted as a longtime business partner to the town, to provide a phone call to ask if we would match what they offered. To that, he had no response.

She then asked Mr. Smith why are you not supporting a local business he said "It is only a paper." Smith went on to say "We may not stay with them, and some day, they may use the Times again"

She asked more questions, and received no answers, then was hung up on when trying to get clarification on his quotes.

It should also be noted that Sherry Farrell, our town clerk, who is married to the John Farrell the chair of the Town Council, writes for the Derry News.

We also hope that this it is not in retaliation for Deb Paul running for Town Council against Farrell, this past March.

We would like to think people are not that so shallow.

in Londonderry focuses on Emergent Literacy and Numeracy, with a play-based component.

The challenge to the program is the developmental and academic range of abilities at which the local students enter the kindergarten program.

Another challenge is the national and state curriculum shifts.

Laliberte presented some of the full-day program's advantages and disadvantages to a half-day program. Some of the advantages would be a higher achievement for students that come from low-income families, higher reading scores in early grades and more time for individual

instruction, independent reading, free play and socialization and interaction with children and adults, as well as access to breakfast and lunch.

On the other hand, the full-day program critiques claim that it gives less time for informal learning, focuses less on learn-by-doing, has no long-term academic benefits and causes separation anxiety, while increasing fatigue, irritability and aggression among the children.

The committee's study found that the current Moose Hill building would not be able to accommodate a full-day program. The needed changes in order to allow that would be the addition of a lunch room and

kitchen facilities; an indoor activity space (Such as a multipurpose room, a gym, etc.); the hiring of "Specialists", as classroom teachers require prep and lunch; A Dedicated Library Media Center space that would free up a classroom and provide a long-term solution.

Mr. Laliberte ended the presentation by giving the School Board members matters of discussion going forward. Is the district interested in pursuing any further research regarding a change to the current kindergarten structure and if so are there specific models that are of interest and what information can the administrators provide to inform the discussion.

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Londonderry Police Officer Charged in Fatal Car Crash

T Tyler Berry, a Londonderry Police officer, was arrested on Saturday, April 6, at the Catholic Medical Center and charged with Felony Aggravated Driving under the Influence of Alcohol after an alleged DUI car crash killed 21-year-old Sierra Croteau, of Manchester.

According to the New Hampshire State Police press release, on Friday, April 5, at approximately 11:30 p.m., the Amherst Police Department responded to a serious motor vehicle collision on Route 101. Based upon the police initial investigation, a pick-up truck, driven by Berry, was traveling westbound when it crossed the yellow center

line and struck Croteau's car, head-on, as it was traveling eastbound.

Berry, 27, of Amherst, was off-duty at the time of the fatal crash. He sustained serious bodily injuries and was taken to the Manchester hospital, where he was eventually arrested and charged.

Croteau sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced dead on the

scene.

State Police added that due to the seriousness of the crash, Amherst Police Department requested that the New Hampshire State Police Collision Analysis and Reconstruction (C.A.R.) Unit respond. The unit was assisted on the scene by Amherst Police Department, as well as by Troopers from the Troop B Barracks, Amherst Fire/EMS and Bedford Police Department. Due to the collision, Route 101 in the area of Manchester Road was closed for approximately five hours.

Police also said that at this time, it appears that impairment was a factor in the crash. However, all aspects remain under

investigation and anyone that may have further information related to the collision or who witnessed it is encouraged to contact Trooper First Class Bryan Plamondon, the investigator of this collision, at 603-223-8677 or email him at Bryan.Plamondon@dos.nh.gov.

On Saturday, Londonderry Police Department released a statement: "The Town of Londonderry and the Londonderry Police Department have been informed of the tragic events which unfolded last night in Amherst, New Hampshire involving Sierra Croteau and Londonderry Patrol Officer Tyler Berry. First and foremost, we send our heartfelt thoughts and prayers

to the family and friends of Sierra Croteau. It is our understanding that Tyler Berry has been arrested and charged in connection with this matter. As his employer, we will cooperate fully with the investigation and take appropriate action when more facts are known."

When approached by the Londonderry Times on Monday (Apr. 8) night, before the newspaper went to print, Sargent Christopher Olson from the Londonderry Police Department said that the State Police is still investigating the case and that the Londonderry Police Department cannot provide any further updates at the moment.

sive. The initial vendor investigated by the New Hampshire Secretary of State regarding the certification process of the E-poll registration book informed the State that it would cost \$250,000 for the certification. Since then, the price was lowered to \$50,000, but that amount is still much higher than what other states have paid for a similar certification of the E-poll voter registration lists. Other States have indicated the cost for the certification is anywhere from free to \$10,000. In a small state like New Hampshire, where the different communities will not need many voting machines from the vendor, the profit margin is too small for the vendor to make such an investment. Until the State can agree on a price for the certification of the E-poll voter registration

lists, the process is on hold. Londonderry may have to go back to the official paper voter registration books with ballot clerks crossing off names in the books with a ruler.

Kevin Smith, Town Manager, informed the Town Council, at their meeting held on April 1, that the feedback regarding the use of the E-polling equipment was very positive. The overall recommendation was to pursue certification.

Now the company that supplied the town with this equipment must design it's business plan on how to proceed through the certification process with the State of New Hampshire. Smith explained that a town like Londonderry would only need to buy about half a dozen E poll registration books and half a dozen of the printers that provide the paper copy for all the results. The combined cost of each E poll voter

registration book and printer is roughly \$1,500. The total cost to meet the needs of the town is not nearly enough to justify the cost of the certification, as long as it stays at \$50,000.

The New Hampshire Secretary of State office recently decided on another company to certify E-Poll books. However, because of the cost issue and the fact that more pilots programs using this method must be completed, the entire certification process might take as long as two years. Unfortunately, even though the voting process was quick and smooth at the March 12th election, it is likely the old alphabetical voting system will be in place for the 2020 Presidential Elections. The town announced that this situation is unacceptable and they are investigating other solutions.

news release, the woman was identified as 41-year-old Maureen Argie. Police involvement in this case began, according to the news release, when in the evening of Thursday, Apr. 4, officers from the Londonderry Police Department conducted a welfare check at a residence on 118 West Road and found Ms. Argie inside the house, and classified it as a suspicious death.

An autopsy on Ms. Argie's body was conducted the next day, on Friday, April 5, by the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, but the results were inconclusive and the cause and manner of Ms. Argie's death are pending further studies and investigation, according to the Attorney General's statement.

As the investigation on this death case is active and ongoing, officials asked anyone who may

have information to contact Detective Sergeant Justin Rowe of the New Hampshire State Police at 603-223-4381 or email him at Justin.rowe@dos.nh.gov.

Online records show that Ms. Argie moved to 118 West Road, Londonderry from Salem on Dec. 18, 2006. She was married to William Argie, 46, who is listed as a physician assistant. It was confirmed that Ms. Argie was an office volunteer at the Community Caregivers of Greater Derry, who's office is in Londonderry.

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LHS Robotics Team Qualify for New England Competition

The PVC Pirates, Londonderry High School's Robotics team, will be competing in this year's New England District Championships that are scheduled to take place at the Worcester Polytechnic Institute in Worcester, Mass. between April 10 and April 13.

The Pirates participated in their second competition of the year over the weekend, March 29 to March 31, in the FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) New England District event at the University of New Hampshire. The team had a successful competition, where they were the recipient of a prestigious award, and when it was all said and done, they secured a ticket to the major regional tournament, where they will be competing next to the other 63 best teams in New England.

The team's robot performed very well at the UNH event, leading the Pirates to an 11th place finish in the qualification rounds. The team had 12 matches in the qualification round and won seven of them, including five of

the last six. The next day, the Londonderry-based team was selected as the playoff alliance partner by the number four seed. In the qualification rounds, alliances are random and in the playoff, teams can select, after doing their scouting, other teams that will compete next to them.

With their partner team (The PowerKnights from Manchester) and the third team that joined their playoff alliance (The Blue Devils from Salem), the Pirates were able to win both quarter final matches, after losing in the same round at the Southern New Hampshire event, which was held at the Bedford High School gym between Mar. 15 and Mar. 17.

In the UNH semifinals, Londonderry's team and its alliance lost in two matches to an alliance of teams from Alton (Big Bad Bob), Bedford (Red Storm) and Randolph Center, Vermont (Robovines), who, in its turn, lost in the finals 2-1. The Pirates current rank in the New England District is 24th, out of 202 teams. They finished their weekend in Durham with 49 total points: 16 for the qualification round ach-

ievements, 13 for the alliance, ten for their playoff performance and ten more for the award they received.

The award the team received was the FIRST Chairman's Award, considered the most prestigious award a FIRST team can win. It honors teams

that are a model for other teams to emulate and best embody the mission of FIRST by transforming the culture to inspire greater interest in science and technology, and encourage more of today's youth to become science and technology leaders.

The Pirates, who promote STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education in the community and provide leadership and resources to other local Robotics teams, are funded entirely through donations, providing no-cost membership for all

students. The team was formed in 2003 and its students build the robot almost entirely in-house, from welding to electrical and machining to programming. The team's lead mentors are Kenny Kutney, Brendan McLeod and Pat Pettengill.

This year's performers of the summer's annual Concerts on the Common series were announced recently by the Londonderry Arts Council.

With the exception of the first show, all con-

certs will be held on Wednesday night's in a span of two and a half months over the summer. The concerts will begin at 7 p.m. and last for about 90 minutes. The concerts, as the name of the program suggest, will be held on the Londonderry Com-

mon, which is located at the corner of Mammoth Rd. and Pillsbury Rd., unless inclement weather forces the show indoors.

The annual program has been a local tradition since its inaugural year back in 2002. Each week, a different band, usually a local band, takes the stage and the public is invited to arrive with their lawn chairs and blankets and enjoy a variety of musical styles as a community. Refreshments are sold on location and the benefits go to the Londonderry High School Math Team. The performances are free and in case of rain, the concerts usually relocate to the nearby Matthew Thornton Elementary School on Mammoth Rd.

The Londonderry High School Music Showcase, featuring Jazz Lab, Rock Orchestra and Jazz Ensemble Groups will open this year's program with a Monday, June 3 performance. This will be the last concert for the Lancer band seniors. In case of bad weather, this concert will be moved to the Londonderry High School cafeteria.

On Wednesday, June 12, the Windham Swing Band will be performing. The band was part of Concerts on the Common in previous years and its music is a chance to trav-

el back in time, to the days of top hats and tuxs.

The next week, July 3, there will not be a concert because of the Fourth of July holiday.

Performances will resume the following Wednesday, July 10, with the Bruce Marshall Group, who has also been part of the event on several occasions. The band plays Blues, R&B, Rock and Southern Boogie.

Amity Drive will perform on July 17. The band was formed last year, has six members and plays original songs, as well as covers for country, rock and pop songs.

All Summer Long, one of New England's premiere Blues, R&B, Rock and Southern Boogie cover bands, will take the crowd back to the 1960s' on July 24.

High South, a Nashville-based band with impressive three-part harmonies, is scheduled for July 31.

On Aug. 7, the very popular Beatles Cover band HELP! will return to the common stage with the last concert of the 2019 series. One of HELP!'s members, Paul Lussier, is a Londonderry resident and it will be the fourth time the band has performed in the event.

This year, on Aug. 14, there will be a bonus concert by Foreigners Journey, a special concert that was arranged by the Old Home Day committee and will kick off the festivities of Londonderry's main event for the Nutfield 300th celebrations and the 120th year of the Old Home Day.

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
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Students Get Some Exercise During Turn Off Screens Week

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
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Addams Family Musical Fills Derry Opera House at Saturday Show

LHS Track and Field Team Aiming for a Top Five Finish

With a home meet at the Larry Martin Track, the Londonderry High School Boys Varsity Track and Field team opened its outdoor season this Tuesday, April 9 in the bitter cold and snow.

In that meet, Lancer athletes competed with two other schools: Salem High School and Timberlane Regional High School. The results of that meet were released after the Londonderry Times went to press.

Londonderry is scheduled to host a second straight home meet on Tuesday (Apr. 16), this time against the visiting teams of Dover High School and Winnacunnet High School, before competing at the Nashua North High School Invitational, four days later, on Saturday, Apr. 20.

The next challenges for the Londonderry High School team will take place during May. On May 7, the Lancers host Manchester Central High School and Spaulding

High School for another home meet and two days later, they will be traveling to Merrimack, to participate in the Merrimack Track Invitational at the local high school. They will close their season with an away meet in Exeter High School, against the local team and their rivals and reigning champions, Pinkerton Academy on May 14 and the biggest event of the regular season for them, the Londonderry Track Invitational, which is scheduled for Saturday, May 18, at 10 a.m. After that, the top athletes will go on to compete for a state title on May 24 (The competition will take place at the University of New Hampshire this year), the Meet of Champions, on Jun. 1 (also at UNH) and the New England Championship, on Jun. 8 (Location yet to be announced).

The Londonderry High School Boys team finished in the ninth place at the Indoor Track and Field State Meet, which was held on Super Bowl Sunday on February at Dartmouth. The Lancers

had one State Champion in Patrick Hagearty, who dominated the Shot-Put event throughout the indoor season. Hagearty is competing in Discus Throwing in this outdoor season. The Londonderry High School 4X800 Relay runners, Kerry Daley, Kyle Hogle, Matthew Griffin and William Heenan, also had a great competition in the State Meet, where they finished in the fourth spot. Justin Cassidy took the sixth place in the 300 Meter Dash.

Coach Matthew Smith shared that 53 kids will be part of this year's outdoor season roster, a higher number than what he was expecting before the season. Smith and his team aim for a top five finish at this season's Division I State Meet: "Some of our guys are going to be competing for individual titles and we think we will be right up there at the end of the season," he says.

Smith is looking forward to the Londonderry Invitational, "This year will feature some great teams from Southern New Hampshire. It always pro-

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Lancer Boys Lax Squad Itching to Get the Season Started

April showers may bring May flowers, but they also bring spring game cancelations. Londonderry High School Boys' Varsity Lacrosse team was ready to open its new season on Tuesday, Apr. 9, with a road game in Concord, but a few rainy hours made that field too muddy and the game had to be postponed. Instead, Londonderry's season will begin at home, this Friday (Apr. 12), with a 4 p.m. game against Bedford.

The Lancers played five scrimmages prior to the season, against Cape Elizabeth, Winnacunnet, Hopkinton, Derryfield and last Saturday, Yarmouth High School from Maine. They won three of the games and had a draw and a loss, while playing many young players: "We were getting looks at kids and they are developing nicely", said coach Roger Sampson during the team's practice on Monday. "We still have some things to work on, so we are fortunate to get this little break. It gives us more time".

However, Sampson knows that his players were ready to go: "They were all bummed out when the first games got canceled. We have been

practicing since March 18 and wanted to play. It was beautiful yesterday and then today we got this rain all day. But that is alright, we will get our games in and it is going to be interesting to see how this season plays out."

Last year, Londonderry returned to the state's Final-Four after four years of absence. The Lancers finished with a 13-7 record in the regular season, before losing to eventual runner-ups in the tournament, Bishop Guertin. "I think this is going to be a competitive season," believes Sampson. "Possibly 10 of the 14 Division I teams are pretty competitive, with a lot of guys who improved. Souhegan, Hanover, Exeter with their goaltender. Pinkerton and BG are who they are and they always reload. We have never been on a championship field and our goal is to get there. That is all I tell my players. We had a great run last year for a team that was not expected to do anything."

After almost a month of preparations, Sampson knows his team's strengths as well as the spots that still need improvement: "I am impressed by our offense and defense. Our specials still need some help, but we will get that dialed in. I

have a solid group of hard chargers, a good mix of seniors and underclassmen. We have an opportunity to develop those underclassmen and give them a good experience. Our goaltending is outstanding. All in all, we are where we are supposed to be and at this point, you got to go out there and execute. As the coaching staff, we got to make sure that we are looking at all the details. Our focus right now is to fix the little things and if we can do that, we will be in great shape to start the season."

One of the team's captains is Anthony Federico, who just finished a great season on the Varsity Ice Hockey team, "We expect to get to get back to the Final Four, even go to the Championship game," he says. "We know we can get there now. We have done it before. It is definitely going to be tough with the teams in front of us, but we can do anything, especially with the kids that are coming up. We have a good group of young kids. They are hungry and want to play with the seniors together, for the Championship. With all the support from our coaches, there are no excuses. We should be on the top tier of teams. Everyone expects this from us, and we do too.

We hold ourselves accountable and we will be ready, no matter what, whether the game is tomorrow or any other time."

Senior Derek Felix added, "We lost a couple

of players, but we are building with what we have and can be a serious competitor this year if we just keep our heads up." and senior Blake Melnik already marked two games on his team's schedule: "Easily, Pinkerton and Bishop Guertin. Pinkerton, being our number one rival, and Bishop Guertin is up there too. We really want to take it to them this year and get a win against them."

Noelle Lambert Starts New Season at UMASS Lowell Lacrosse Team

Noelle Lambert continues to amaze. The Londonderry native, who was a three-sport athlete, played varsity soccer, basketball and lacrosse for the Londonderry High School teams. She lost her left leg in the first year of college when her moped collided with a dump truck in Martha's Vineyard, on July 2016.

That day, a long process began for Lambert, who never gave up until eventually, using a prosthetic leg, she made her comeback and rejoined the UMass Lowell River Hawks' Women Lacrosse team. The team's season started two

months ago and out of the first 13 games, Lambert, now a senior, participated in four: a 12-14 loss at Fresno State on Feb. 10, a 15-5 home win over Holy Cross on Feb. 27, a 15-8 win over Merrimack on Mar. 5 and five days later, a 17-3 loss at Wagner College in New York City.

Her final home game will be played this Saturday, April 13, during UMass Lowell's Senior Day, when the River Hawks will host the University of Vermont. But that was not the only big moment for Lambert this month. On April 1, the foundation she founded after the accident, the Born to Run Foundation,

made its second donation.

A little over three months after presenting three-year-old Isaak Depelteau, from Amherst, NH, with an athletic prosthesis, Lambert's foundation donated a new waterproof prosthetic to the 24-year-old Emma Graham in a ceremony held at the Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital: "With her new waterproof prosthetic, it will surely make life easier for this amazing young woman!", said the announcement on the Born to Run Foundation website. "We are incredibly grateful to help her and be a part of her journey."



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Basketball State Champ Reflects on Decision to Go to BG

Last month, the Bishop Guertin High School Girls' Varsity Basketball team was crowned New Hampshire Division I State Champions. The Cardinals beat a surprising Portsmouth team in the finals, held at the Southern New Hampshire University arena, 46-33, to claim their fourth state title in a row.

For the past three years, Bri Wilcox has been a part of this title-winning team. Wilcox, a junior who scored 10 points and had three assists and three rebounds in that final, was born and raised in Londonderry, but decided to attend Bishop Guertin for High School and no, she does not regret that decision at all, "I went to Matthew Thornton for elementary school and then Londonderry Middle School, before going to BG", she tells the Londonderry Times in an interview, "A lot of my friends keep asking me to go back and play for Londonderry High School. I get asked about that every game and I do love coach Nick Theos. He is really a great guy. But I don't regret anything."

Wilcox grew up in one household with her mother, aunt, little brother, cousin, grandfather and grandmother, which she says is her role model, "She pays for everything I do, including my tuition. She is always there, push-

ing me and pushing me. She always has my back, no matter what I do. Everybody already knows her as Nana Wilcox."

Wilcox plays as guard or forward and loves Michael Jordan, "Whenever I think of basketball, I always think of him. That is my number and that is what I represent. I hope to hold the same rank and have the same memorable moments as he did." Her basketball career started in preschool and she joined travel league around third grade, before moving to AAU Basketball, where she played in Derry for the Lady Spartans and the Lady Saints: "My AAU coach, Dave Constant, has my heart. I can't say how much I owe him."

After not playing in eighth grade, Wilcox was contacted by Brad Kreick, Bishop Guertin's coach, "He said that I am a strong player and that I should come to the school and check the program. Just have a walk through BG and if I don't like it, he will not push me to do anything." She liked it. "I was kind of following my grandmother's footsteps. She went to a catholic school growing up and loved it a lot. Everyone from my family, including my mom, had gone to Londonderry High School, so it was a nice change, to go and try something different. And I am not even catholic, but Bishop Guertin has been a lot of fun and very interesting experience."

Wilcox confesses that

she was not very sure in the beginning, "I got there, to BG, and I did not know how I will get along with everyone else. But after my freshman year, we really connected and built good chemistry between us. It was definitely nerve-racking to join a team that just won the championship. I don't know if I was totally ready to go into the team. I was extremely nervous as a freshman and tore my hamstring right before my first season there started. So I played major minutes on the Junior Varsity team and here and there, got to play the last 30 seconds of a Varsity game."

Things quickly changed on Wilcox's sophomore season: "I put a lot of work in my game before that year and became the team's Sixth Man and sometimes, a starter." That year ended with Wilcox winning her second title, the one she personally enjoyed the most so far, "Because I was very close to the one senior we had. In the last few seconds of a title game, you think to yourself 'this is really happening again' and your heart just starts pounding. Emotions rise up and there are happy tears all over the place. It just shows how close we all are, like a family."

Now, as often happens with high school teams, Bishop Guertin is facing big changes as two starters left and reclassified at St. Andrew's Prep School, "It just gives more opportunities for

others to step up", believes Wilcox, "I think it is going to be a great year. New girls will get more playing time in the spotlight and we have a group that always keeps fighting."

Wilcox says that she hopes to go to a nice college, study either Marine Biology or Sports Biology, and then something with Math, which she really loves. She wants to play Division I basketball, but "Division II works for me too, because I love to have some free time and if you play Division I, you are attached to the game, no matter what. But I can't wait to go to college and see what life has to bring me. I hope to play after college too. My dream, like every other girl, is to play in the WNBA. People don't always look at girls' basketball as they should."

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Recreation Committee Concerned About Earth Day Fair

During the monthly Recreation Committee meeting, held at the Londonderry Town Hall on Monday, Apr. 8, the committee members expressed some concerns regarding the planned Earth Day Fair, which is scheduled to take place in Londonderry on Saturday, Apr. 20.

The event is organized by Millennium Running, the same company that is behind the annual Millennium Mile on Mammoth

Road every Jan. 1. The Earth Day Fair will begin at 10 a.m. with a Stonyfield 5K run and for about four hours, different stands will serve the participants.

These stands will be located around the Londonderry West Soccer Fields and according to the Londonderry Recreation Director, Art Psaledas, the organizing company promised not to let anyone on the actual field, but the committee members were not sure that this will be possible,

as thousands of people are supposed to attend the event.

Members of the Football Club of Greater Londonderry (FCGL) will be putting caution tape around the field and the gates will be locked, but the grass is still recovering from the winter season and if the field will be ruined by too many people walking and running on it during the Earth Day Fair, it might not be playable and will be lost for the rest of the year. Another field-related con-

cern is that the event is being promoted a "Dog friendly event" and that people will let their pets on the field.

The West Road fields are scheduled to be opened for the season on Sunday, April 14, if the rain does not interfere until then.

Psaledas told the group that the Nelson Road softball fields' lights should be connected sometime during the month of April, but for that to happen, the fields still need to be dryer, so it

might take a few more weeks.

Psaledas told the committee members that it will take more time to open the Londonderry Athletic Fields Association (LAFA) fields, as that area has more water in it and it is still not ready.

Psaledas also said that the strong winds in Southern New Hampshire lately even tore part of one of the tennis nets and it needed to be fixed.

Another new subject that came up was the Future Fields Scheduling

meetings. For the past few years, there was a possibility to register in order to use a field during a season, but that system was not working well enough and in many cases, residents and teams have asked to reserve a field, but never used it.

The committee decided to go back to the previous arrangement and hold a meeting, where each team will send representation and receive its playing time and location.

The Town of Londonderry and the Dragon Mosquito Control, Inc. issued last Monday, April 1, a Mosquito Control notice. The public notice announced that the Mosquito Control program was scheduled to begin on Monday, Apr. 8, with crews from Dragon Mosquito Control checking the different swamps, marshes, woodland pools, ditches, storm drains and other spots with shallow and stagnant water around the town for mosquito larvae.

The notice said that whenever mosquitos were to be found in these tests, seven different types of insecticides may be in use: VectoBac

(Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis 2.8%), Natular (spinosad 2.5%), AquaBac 200G (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis 2.86%), Fourstar MBG (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis 3.0% and Bacillus sphaericus 3.0%), VectoMax FG (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis 4.5% and Bacillus sphaericus 2.7%), CocoBear MLO (mineral oil 10%) and BVA 2 Mosquito Larvicide Oil (mineral oil 97%).

Londonderry's main event in this summer's Nutfield 300th celebration will be the week between Aug. 14 and Aug. 19, with the longtime traditional Old Home Days festivities. In preparation to this event, said the Mosquito Notice, control of adult mosquitos may be done

at the Town Common, at the Matthew Thornton Elementary School, at the Londonderry Middle School and at the Londonderry High School. control of adult mosquitos would be accomplished using one or more of a total of four products: Cross Check Plus (bifenthrin 7.9%), Permanone (permethrin 10.0%), Duet (sumithrin 5.0% and prallethrin 1.0%) and Merus (pyrethrins 5.0%).

Should the inspectors find Eastern Equine Encephalitis or West Nile Virus in Londonderry or near it, then emergency spray treatments may be done at the town common, elementary school, middle school and high school, as well as at Moose Hill School, Nelson Fields,

North School, South School, Victory Church Fields and West Road Fields.

The notice emphasized that it is not possible to predict if an emergency spraying will be necessary at any point of the process and that the spray schedule is based upon mosquito surveillance data, disease test results and weather conditions. If an emergency spraying will take place, the town would provide more information

prior to that.

The notice also says that if there are any residents who do not want their wetlands to be treated by the Mosquito Control program, they may use the town's online No-Spray Registry at www.dragonmosquito.com/no-spray-registry or send a written request to the Dragon Mosquito Control (P.O. Box 46, Stratham, New Hampshire 03885). Whoever decides to send a written letter to

the mosquito control must make sure that they include their full name, physical address, phone number and a description of their house and acreage.

Any request sent will expire on Dec. 31, 2019 and requests must be reaffirmed each year to remain current, meaning that a request that was sent in 2018 does not apply for this year's Mosquito Control's program and actions.
