Times Publisher Responds to Town Manager's Allegations

Londonderry Town Manager, Kevin Smith, recently sent a response memo to the Town Council regarding the Londonderry Times' editorial that addressed the town no longer using its hometown newspaper for legal notices.

At last week's Town Council meeting, Chair, John Farrell said that the memo was "confidential" and "very sensitive" and would not be shared that evening. However, the Smith response memo was not kept confidential and was released on social media by Jake Butler, a recently appointed

Planning Board member, and son of a sitting town council member. This was done just after Farrell had tried to shame the Times for their use social media.

In the memo, Smith stated his reasoning for the change was mostly financial, as the Derry News promised rates 10% lower than the Londonderry Times rates. However, Smith never approached the Londonderry Times in any manner to see if the Times would match the rate quoted by the Derry News.

Smith goes on to state that he had hoped the matter would stay out of public domain, and that the Londonderry Times

had, "used its own pages and social media to put forth a misleading story."

While the Londonderry Times acknowledges and appreciates Smith's concerns with bringing the issue to the public, Paul stated that had she been aware of these concerns she would have been willing to come to a compromise.

The "story" that Smith refers to numerous times in his letter, is not a story, but was an editorial. The definition of an editorial is, "An article written by or on behalf of an editor, that gives an opinion on a topical issue." The editorial was written from the

School Board Discusses New Data Network Infrastructure

The Londonderry School Board members were presented during their last meeting, held on Tuesday, Apr. 16 at the Town Hall with the Londonderry School District Data Infrastructure Planning.

The presentation began with an Article 9, saying "Shall the Londonderry School District vote under RSA 35:1 to create a district wide information network infrastructure capital reserve fund to be known as the 'District Technology Network Infrastructure Fund' for the purpose of funding equipment and services for the school district net-

work infrastructure such as, but not limited to, routers, wiring, switches, access points, wireless network improvements or any other equipment software or service that is necessary for the maintenance, improvement, performance or management of the district's network and name the school board as agents to expend the fund; and further raise and appropriate the sum of \$275,000 to be placed in this fund; and further name the School Board agents to expend?"

The intent of the "District Technology Network Infrastructure Fund" is to continually appropriate funds on an annual basis

for the planned updates and improvements, so as to avoid any large expenditure in a given year. The suggestion is to spread-out the overall expenses in order to maintain the network annually with the fund being used as needed.

The presentation showed the complexity of the current situation in the Londonderry School

Pool Study Committee Publishes Report to Town

The Londonderry Town Pool Study Committee has published its final report and recommendation to the Town Council. The committee was created on Aug. 2018 and was charged with researching and making a

recommendation to the Town Council as to the feasibility, interest in, and need for a town pool in Londonderry.

The committee researched the situation regarding the town pools in nearby communities, the construction and ongoing maintenance

costs, including of the personnel operating the facility on a daily or seasonally basis, the liability issues, the potential locations in Londonderry for such pool and the general interest among the locals.

The initial final date for the committee's rec-

Londonderry 18-Year-Old Arrested for Kidnapping Teen

The Londonderry Police Department arrested 18-year-old Alexis "Alex" Martinez, of Londonderry, on Thursday, April 18, and he was charged with kidnapping and simple assault.

Martinez was first arrested on Sunday, April 14, by the Massachusetts State Police and then released on bail two days later. He is now facing charges in two different states.

On April 14, the Londonderry Police Department received a report from the Massachusetts State Police Troop-A3 Barracks, in Concord, Mass.,

that Martinez has been arrested for kidnapping, use of a motor vehicle without authority and negligent operation of a motor vehicle which is alleged to have originated in Londonderry. Martinez was held on a \$20,000 cash bail and arraigned on Tuesday, April 16, in the Ayer, Mass. District Court, where he was released on personal recognizable bail.

The report that was received by the Londonderry Police Department from the Massachusetts State Police said that the MSP received a 911 call on Sunday, at about 5:50 p.m. that a juvenile female was being held against her will by her ex-boyfriend, Mar-

inez. A Massachusetts State Trooper located the vehicle that Martinez and the victim were driving in Littleton, Mass., on I-495 near Exit 31.

The trooper then received assistance from the Littleton Police Department and other state troopers and took Martinez into custody. The victim was rescued and was soon reunited with her mother. While trying to fight Martinez and defend herself, she suffered minor injuries to her hands and forearm and was afforded medical treatment.

The woman reported that she and Martinez came to Londonderry that Sunday and he began to

follow her, driving on Route 102. His vehicle eventually passed hers and at that moment, she pulled to the side of the road, to allow him to continue.

Instead of doing this, Martinez then allegedly also stopped his vehicle, left it and approached her vehicle.

The woman's vehicle was locked, but Martinez, as she reported, gained entry into it, despite her efforts to prevent him from doing so. He then pushed the victim from the driver's seat into the from passenger seat and is alleged to have then driven the vehicle away.

While doing so, he left his own vehicle parked on the side of the roadway.

After he was arrested, Londonderry police officers located Martinez's vehicle on the side of the road, where the victim said it will be, confirming her report regarding the situation.

The initial arrest was made possible after the victim was able to send text messages during hers and Martinez's drive from the place he entered her vehicle to Littleton. The text messages assisted in locating the vehicle in Massachusetts.

Detective Justin Hallock of Londonderry Police Department led the local investigation and

sought warrants charging Martinez for kidnapping (a felony) and simple assault (misdemeanor). Martinez was then re-arrested in Londonderry on Thursday and released again on personal recognizance bail with an arraignment date in the Rockingham County Superior Court in Brentwood on May 3.

Senior Resources Committee Talk With School Board Rep

The Senior Resources Committee (SRC) met last Tuesday the 16 of April, and agreed to approach the Town Planner about requesting a permanent Senior Resources Committee (SRC) sub-committee having a limited liaison role in the town's pursuit of the Age-Friendly Community status particularly as it would relate to seniors aging in place.

Guest speaker, Jen Ganem of the school board expressed her desire to have the school district more engaged with the town's senior citizens. Ganem said attempts to do this the past have been somewhat fragmented and therefore, mostly unsuccessful. She mentioned several possible ideas

such as: a seniors speakers bureau to share interesting life and work experiences with students; a seniors mentoring program; a "seniors" type prom; student workshops to instruct seniors regarding the use of cell phones, computers and other electronic devices; and better dissemination of student activities such as sports and musical events that seniors (and other community members) would be interested in attending. The SRC agreed that a part-time liaison from the school district would be an asset to the committee. There was also consideration given to making a recommendation about merging the school activity calendar with the town district calendar.

Chairman Doug Thomas

handed out an AARP study of statistics on Aging in New Hampshire. Chairman Thomas also had a Tufts Healthy Aging Data Report for 2019 with an insert specific to Londonderry, which would be copied and made available later to all SRC members.

Member John Wilson recommended that the school and town should consider linking their websites. All SRC members were asked to think about any short-term goals for the rest of the year that the SRC could discuss next month.

Cathy Blash, Senior Affairs Director mentioned that she has advertised for a part time senior transportation coordinator. Blash also mentioned she will be organizing the Senior BBQ for Old Home Days this year.

Editorial

Nothing to Hide

When people volunteer for public service, whether it's to run for elected office or to seek appointment to town boards and commissions, they've signaled their commitment to do what's best for the greater good - the entire community.

And just as we all have personal reasons for making such a decision, we also have biases that we bring to those posts, along with our experience and expertise.

With that said, the only way to conduct the public's business in as bias-free a manner as possible is to be as transparent as possible. That means business must take place in public session.

There's no way to force residents to pay attention to public meetings, even with the ease of watching them on public access TV in the privacy of their homes. But whether or not anyone is watching, elected and appointed officials have to conduct their business in the public eye.

We're not talking about decisions - those are made in public session. But the background leading to those decisions, the conversations and debates, the questions and the arguments, are rarely part of what the public gets to see.

Ethics is defined as a system of moral principles and rules of conduct. Meeting in small groups so as not to invoke a quorum may technically not violate the law, but it smells of circumventing the law. So

is that ethical?

Ethics is the core element to local government and its management. Accountability is an important part of any organization, but it's especially important in local government. Governments must responsibly use their resources to provide services that meet the needs of constituents. Local governments answer to state and federal laws and guidelines for effective operations. But most of all, they answer to the people they serve.

Ultimately, government accountability is about maintaining the trust between government officials and citizens. For local governments, core values such as integrity, equality, and transparency should provide the foundation for every decision and policy. Citizens should be able to see how the government is spending their tax money, what services the government is providing, and how government officials are working to improve the community.

In public life, appearances count. When residents don't know what their representatives are up to, they listen to rumors and conspiracy theories and finally end up distrusting the decision makers.


We're all adults here. The public's business should be conducted in public. Keep us informed of what you're doing, every step of the way. We shouldn't have to worry that our officials have something to hide.

Derry Man Arrested for Having Child Abuse Images

According to a press release that was sent out last week, a 75-year-old man living in Derry was arrested on multiple counts of Child Pornography as well as on Distribution Of Child Sexual Abuse Images.

According to the release, on April 18, after a months long investigation, the Londonderry Police Department arrested Richard Gale, of Derry, for three felony counts of the Possession of Child Pornography (NH RSA 649-A:3) and one felony count of Distribution of Child Pornography (NH RSA 649-A:3-a).

The investigation began in May of 2018 when

the Londonderry Police Department received a Cybertip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children that led investigators to Gale.

The Londonderry Police Department and the New Hampshire Internet

Crimes Against Children Task Force (ICAC) conducted an investigation with the assistance of the Department of Homeland Security which ultimately resulted in Gale's arrest.

Gale resided in Londonderry during the time of this incident and the investigation.

Gale was released on an unsecured appearance bond and his court appearance is scheduled for May 3, 2019 at the Rockingham County Superior Court. Anyone with any further information about this investigation can contact Detective Michael Tufo at the Londonderry Police Department.

District, regarding the Data Network. There are eight buildings, with 18 data closets, 42 switches, 151 Wi-Fi access points, almost 3,000 Ethernet ports and over 3,500 wireless clients every day. There also 25 servers, nearly 3,500 computing devices and over one hundred smart boards and other accessories. All of the above is part of the local data network and the current connections between the different parts of the network is done through the old SAU district office building, due to current fiber terminations. The majority of the Ethernet ports have

End of Support next year (2020) and by 2021, this number will rise to two-thirds.

The new suggestion is to address the End of Support products in place at the moment, lessen dependency on cabled infrastructure with continued emphasis on wireless, leverage multi-gig Ethernet support for the next generation wireless and wired needs, ensure throughput aggregation points are properly sized for downstream throughput, enable "Single Pane of Glass" Infrastructure Management, currently not supported and improve network security through access to wireless and wired networks per port access and man-

age a Bring Your Own Device and Guest access for security and efficiency.

The presentation marked several positive impacts to staff and students, should the new infrastructure be created: Continued support, better fault tolerance/reliability, improved speed, improved security and network accessibility, improved manageability and the introduction of metrics.

A Request for Proposal has been developed for the new infrastructure. The School Board had consensus regarding the infrastructure that was presented and agreed to move on with the subject.

Speedway Gas Station Granted Variance For Changeable LED Sign

A representative of the Speedway gas station and convenience store on Route 102 came before the Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) seeking permission to convert an existing manual sign to a changeable electronic sign. The sign in question displays the current prices for gas.

A variance was required because Londonderry zoning ordinance 7.7.E.3 states that "Animated, moving, flashing, and noise making signs are prohibited. Changeable electronic message board signs are prohibited in all zoning districts."

Before Speedway presented their case, the ZBA read into the record a letter from resident David

Colglazier expressing concerns about the proposed sign. He said that based on similar signs he has seen elsewhere, he was concerned that a frequently changing sign could be distracting at night and may appear ugly and cheap. He asked that if granted, Speedway only be allowed to change the sign 1-2 times per day.

Presenting on behalf of the applicant, Carolyn Parker said that Speedway wanted to make the sign change to make it easier and safer for employees to change the fuel price display. She noted that today they have to use ladders or long poles to physically change the prices and that in snowy or wet weather this can be dangerous.

She added that the prices would be the only

part of the sign that would change during the day and that she expected they would change once or twice per day. She added that when the prices changed, the change would be instantaneous with no flashing or blacking out, so that unless someone was staring at the sign, they would not notice the change.

Parker also said that she did not believe that the intent of the ordinance was to prevent signs of this type. She felt the intent was to prevent electronic advertising that contributed to visual clutter and that changed frequently.

She added that the upgraded sign would not change the character of the area since it is in a busy commercial zone

and that making the change would not impact the health, safety and welfare of the public.

ZBA member Suzanne Brunelle asked why the numbers showing the price would be red since the current sign has white numbers. Parker said that it is a standard in the industry to show prices for gasoline in red and diesel in green.

Member Mitch Feig asked Parker how the pro-

posed sign compares to those at other gas stations in town. She replied that every company and brand has their own unique requirements.

Brunelle pressed Parker to explain what made this property unique since that is one of the five criteria that must be met to grant a variance. Parker talked about the new trend to use LEDs in signs and the improved safety from not having to

manually change the sign.

Feig asked why the ZBA had granted similar variances in the past. Other board members said that the uniqueness came from the federal requirement that prices be displayed and the safety risk of making changes manually in a high traffic area.

After brief deliberation, the board voted 5-0 to grant the variance.

ommendation to the Town Council was Dec. 1, 2018, but Assistant Town Manager Ms. Lisa Drabik, who was representing the town in the committee, indicated that it was unable to complete the task and requested for more time, which was granted.

Eventually, the committee gave its final recommendation in the Town Council Meeting last month (Mar. 18), recommending against the idea of building an outdoor town pool in Londonderry.

The committee mentioned as part of its recommendation the lack of an easily "buildable" spot in the town for an outdoor public pool, the estimated high cost of this

kind of facility (\$1.2-\$1.5 Million) and the very limited summer times in New England, where the pool will actually be available for public use. Other than that, the fact that around 35 percent of the residents in Londonderry already have their own backyard outdoor pool, and many others (An exact number was not given) have an access to a pool through their condo or apartment complexes, made the estimated number of people who will be using the town pool to low and led to the committee's recommendation against building one.

The committee did vote in favor of a different, much larger recommendation and urged the Town Council to "pursue a community center which would better serve the needs of Londonderry residents than would a

standalone, outdoor pool", per the committee's report.

The estimated cost of a community center is between \$5-\$10 Million (As the committee's researched found out) and the committee recommended that the town would engage in discussions with the YMCA about the potential private/public partnership. These kinds of community centers can be found in different towns in New Hampshire.

The Town Pool Committee members were Ms. Drabik (Chair, Town Manager designee), Al Sypek (On behalf of the Planning Board), Kevin Foley (On behalf of the Recreation Committee) and residents Noelle Bristol, Cheryl Hass, Debbie Johnson, Laura Pallotta, Sy Tebbets and Jen Kenney.

The Role of the Zoning Board of Adjustment Explained

The role of the Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) is one of the least understood among town boards, councils, committees and commissions. Its decisions are technical in nature, sometimes require legal interpretation and are guided by a strict set of rules that must be followed.

Before getting to how the ZBA works, it is useful to understand how they fit with the other entities that deal with zoning. There are four such groups involved with the formulation and administration of the town's zoning ordinance and map: The Planning Board, Town Council, Zoning Administrator/Code Enforcement Officer, and ZBA.

The Planning Board is primarily responsible for proposing the initial zoning ordinance and the zoning map, recommending amendments, holding public hearings on its own and petitioning amendments.

The Town Council adopts the zoning ordinance and approves any changes that are proposed. The Zoning Administrator/Code Enforcement Officer administers and enforces the ordinance and map as written.

The ZBA reviews applications for zoning variances, special exceptions, equitable waivers of dimensional requirements, and hears appeals from the decisions made by Zoning Administrator/Code Enforcement Officer or Building Inspector.

Of the four types of cases the ZBA can hear, most of them are requests to allow variance from the town's zoning ordinance. Generally, the requested variances have to do with relief from a specific zoning ordinance, for example, a road frontage or building setback rule. Less often, developers seek variances to allow a type of project or business on a property where it is not allowed by the zoning regulations.

VARIANCES

In considering a variance request the ZBA considers five factors, all of which must be met to grant the variance. The ZBA does not have the discretion to grant or deny a variance because they like or do not believe the project is a good idea. Likewise, they cannot reject a variance because abutters do not think it is a good idea.

The five criteria are: (A) the variance will not be contrary to the public interest; (B) the spirit of the ordinance is

observed; (C) substantial justice is done; (D) the values of surrounding properties are not diminished; and (E) literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance would result in an unnecessary hardship.

For criteria A, the ZBA considers whether the variance is contrary to the public interest. To determine this, they determine whether the variance alters the essential character of the neighborhood or threatens the health, safety, or general welfare of the public.

For criteria B, the ZBA looks to the ordinance in question to see if the variance would violate the explicit or implicit statement of purpose in the ordinance itself. Beyond that, the ZBA also considers whether the proposed use would alter the essential character of the neighborhood and whether it would threaten the public health, safety or welfare.

Criteria C is difficult to assess since there are no rules that can measure or determine justice. The ZBA must judge whether any loss to the landowner outweighs any to the general public. They also examine whether a proposed development is consistent with the area's present use.

Criteria D requires a decision on whether the proposed variance will diminish the value of surrounding properties. Just because abutters think that it will is not enough of a reason alone to make that determination. Sometimes developers

provide letters from real estate professionals to make the case that property values would not be diminished. In the end, it is the judgment of the ZBA, though.

Criteria E, relating to hardships, tends to be the hardest one for applicants to understand. It is usually also the hardest one to prove to the satisfaction of the ZBA. To start, only when some characteristic of the land in question makes it different from others can unnecessary hardship be claimed.

Then the landowner must show that no fair and substantial relationship exists between the general public purposes of the ordinance provision and the specific application of that provision to the property.

The ZBA may ask, is the restriction on the property necessary in order to give full effect to the purpose of the ordinance, or can relief be granted to this property without frustrating the purpose of the ordinance? Likewise, they could assess whether the full application of the ordinance to this particular property is necessary to promote a valid public purpose.

In addition to the above, for criteria A, an applicant must also show that because of the special conditions of the property, the proposed use is reasonable.

SPECIAL EXCEPTIONS

Unlike a variance which grants permission to use a specific piece of property in a more flexi-

ble manner than allowed by the ordinance, a special exception is a specific, permitted land use that is allowed only when clearly defined criteria and conditions contained in the ordinance are met.

Providing for special exceptions makes it possible to allow uses where they are reasonable in a controlled manner, but to prohibit them where the specified conditions cannot be met. When the ZBA considers a special exception, it cannot vary or waive any of the requirements set forth within the zoning ordinance.

APPEALS OF ADMINISTRATIVE DECISIONS

The ZBA hears appeals if it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by an administrative official in the enforcement of any zoning ordinance. Typically, this means reviewing decisions made by the Zoning Administrator/Code Enforcement Officer or Building Inspector.

The ZBA may reverse or affirm, wholly or in part, or may modify the decision. When they hear the appeal, they must apply the strict letter of the law in the same way that the administrative official must. It cannot alter the ordinance or waive any restrictions under the guise of interpreting the law.

EQUITABLE WAIVER OF DIMENSIONAL REQUIREMENTS

This provision was approved by the legisla-

ture to address the situations where a good faith error was made in the siting of a building or other dimensional layout issue.

When a lot or structure is discovered to be in violation of a physical layout or dimensional requirement, the ZBA may grant a waiver only if each of the four findings is true: (a) lack of discovery of the violation in a timely manner; (b) good faith error in measurement or calculation; (c) no diminution in value of surrounding property; and (d) the cost of correcting the mistake outweighs any public benefit.

While state law gives cities and towns the option to have ZBA members elected or appointed, in Londonderry, the five voting members who have volunteered to serve are appointed by the town council to three-year terms. In addition, three alternate volunteer members are appointed by the town council.

Ideally the term expiration dates for members are equally spread across three years to avoid too many expirations in one year; however, currently six of the eight current members have terms expiring at the end of 2019.

In general, qualifications to serve on the ZBA are the same as those for any other position of trust in town: time, an interest in serving, impartiality, and a willingness to understand the process. While it is not required, some current ZBA members have legal backgrounds.

point of view of the Londonderry Times to inform its readers of a change.

Smith went on to say that because the town is utilizing taxpayer monies to publish legal notices, it favors the lowest bidder first and foremost. However, the town also considers factors such as quality, service, and previous experience. Smith then references the municipal code, specifically Title VI, Chapter VI section, purchasing policy.

The Times would have been more than willing to match the rate given by the Derry News, but was never given that opportunity. The Publisher of the Londonderry Times was unaware of the negotiations between Smith and the Derry News concerning their rates for publication of legal notices, until after Smith made his decision to move the legal notices regarding the Town of Londonderry to the Derry News.

Smith also stated that recent events with regard to operations of the Times had, "raised sufficient concerns, such that I no longer believe that the Times meets the required standards the town seeks when choosing vendors for professional services."

Smith cited a letter

dated March 28, 2019 by the New Hampshire Attorney General citing several alleged election law violations, "With regards to the Times owner and publisher, Deb Paul's advertisements related to her own candidacy for elected office." Smith states that the political advertisement failed to comply with RSA Chapter 664 in several respects.

Smith stated that Nutfield Publishing failed to file any rate card with the secretary of state office, to which Paul responded, "I informed the Attorney General's office, at the time, that my rate card is published online for all to see." I then asked, "Do all other papers that run political advertisements have their rate cards on file with you office?" His answer was, "I can't respond to that, we don't monitor it."

Smith mentioned that Paul's candidacy, while, "both legal and commendable," created numerous ethical concerns, while still owning and publishing the Times, as it allegedly violated the Code of Ethics to "Act Independently," and "Avoid political and other outside activities that may compromise integrity or impartiality, or may damage credibility." Furthermore, Smith referenced the Committee expressly stating that journalists or anyone

involved with journalism should not run for office themselves.

It should be noted and I quote directly, "The SPJ Code of Ethics is a statement of abiding principles supported by additional explanations and position papers (at spj.org) that address changing journalistic practices. It is not a set of rules, rather a guide that encourages all who engage in journalism to take responsibility for the information they provide, regardless of medium. The code should be read as a whole; individual principles should not be taken out of context. It is not, nor can it be under the First Amendment, legally enforceable."

The Society of Professional Journalists is basically a group that anyone can join. Not all journalists belong to this organization. It is merely an organization of journalists and the Code of Ethics provides suggested guidelines. Paul said, "I am not a member of this organization and frankly had never even heard of this group. After looking at this Code, I strongly feel I did not violate any of the suggested guidelines."

Smith also stated the Town has received regular complaints regarding inaccurate or unedited information in articles, which according to Smith,

"... causes confusion and has required the Town to spend additional monies to correct said misinformation."

Paul responded, "I was not made aware of any complaints, but I would be more than willing to hear and address them myself." Furthermore, Paul reiterated that any mistakes the paper makes, should they be brought to the Publisher's attention, are addressed with a correction and there is never a charge. "In the instance Smith is speaking of, I mistakenly wrote May instead of March in a Bio for the Town Council story we ran. When it was brought to our attention I told the Town we would run a correction, which we did, but they insisted they wanted to run a legal notice as well. This was the first time that the town felt the need to run a paid legal notice for a mistake we made."

Smith also mentioned in the memo that Paul regularly engages in social media, "... in the dissemination of inaccurate information and unsubstantial allegations regarding the Town."

Paul responded that in these particular instances, she is engaging as Debra Paul, not as the Londonderry Times publisher or as Nutfield Publishing. "As a citizen, I have every right to voice

my opinion and perspective on anything I want. The President does it on a daily basis."

Finally, Smith cited Nutfield Publishing's difficulty paying federal taxes in late 2016. Paul responded, "Yes, I owe federal taxes, but the reason the town was notified back then, was because a payment was missed during difficult financial period." She added she has an agreement with the IRS and is in the process of rectifying the situation.

Paul added, "I fail to see how this makes me a bad vendor," Paul stated. "And the fact that this notice was made public by the town, and also

given to our competitor at the time, brings into question the ethics being used at town hall."

The Londonderry Times, is open to any and all feedback from the residents it serves, had little to no opportunity to address these concerns. The goal of the Times, as is the goal of all of Nutfield Publishing newspapers, is to engage readers and keep the people informed.

The Londonderry Times invites its readers to bring any concerns to the publisher's attention, so the newspaper can address those concerns properly.



Eagle Project Completed In The Musquash Conservation Area

A young Londonderry resident, Justin Jolicouer, completed a variety of improvements to the Musquash Conservation Area as part of his Eagle Scout service project. Working in consultation with the Conservation Commission, he greatly expanded the number of trail signs to make it easier for the public to navigate the roughly 1,100-acre conservation area.

Jolicouer, who frequently mountain bikes in the Musquash, got the idea while on one of his rides. Charlie Goodspeed, owner of DG Cycle where Jolicouer works part-time, put him in touch with the Conservation

Commission to get their input.

Jolicouer, of Troop 521 in Londonderry, presented his plan to the Conservation Commission, his troop Scoutmaster and a local Board of Review for approval last year. He then worked during the Fall to fundraise and complete the work.

The signage improvement effort started with navigating the over ten miles of trails to identify locations where more signs were needed. After reviewing the locations with the Conservation Commission, he then created and installed trail signs on trees in upwards of twenty locations.

He also added many "you are here" signs at trail junctions. These

signs include localized maps, GPS coordinates and directions to the nearest Musquash trailhead. Years ago, Londonderry Trailways started installing such signs on heavy duty wooden posts. That work fell off but was finished by Jolicouer.

In many cases he created and added the signs to the empty posts that Trailways had installed. In other cases, he updated the maps to correct errors and reflect changes. In a handful of cases, he had to carry in the heavy posts and install them in holes that he dug by hand.

In addition to the trail signs, Jolicouer also built a small woodshed at the Landing Area to store firewood that is used by the Conservation Commission during the winter Musquash Field Day. He also constructed a plank walkway at one spot along the new Mathes Trail to allow trail users to cross over a small stream.

Jolicouer spent

approximately 70 hours on the service project. He said the most time-consuming part of the project was creating the "you-are-here" signs on Microsoft Publisher using maps provided by the town GIS department.

Now a senior at LHS, Jolicouer has been in the scouting program since second grade. Starting as a cub scout, he advanced to boy scout and then worked through the Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star and Life ranks before finishing at the highest level, Eagle.

Jolicouer has completed all the requirements for Eagle Scout and will receive his rank in a ceremony planned for June 2019. In addition to the service project, Jolicouer had to earn 21 merit badges, assume a leadership position in his troop, document other leadership roles inside and outside of the troop and provide personal references to vouch for his character.




the third, before Keene closed the game with a 25-20 fourth set.


Two days later, the Lady Cardinals of Bishop Guertin proved to be just too strong for the Lady Lancers, winning 20-4 at
