Woodmont Seeks Approval To Tweak Site Plan, Adjust Lot Line

A representative of Woodmont Commons came before the Planning Board on May 8 looking for the OK to adjust their plans to better accommodate a proposed senior living facility to be located on

the site.

The plan for Edgewood at Woodmont will soon be presented to the Planning Board. In anticipation of that Jeff Kevan said that the owners of Woodmont were looking to adjust their existing site plan that would abut Edge-

wood. They were also looking for several zoning waivers and a waiver from a condition of the Planned Unit Development (PUD) plan that governs development at Woodmont.

Resident Files Complaint With AG on Misleading Warrant Article

At this year's March Londonderry Town election, one of the many warrant articles that passed on the ballot included a funding request with incorrect and misleading information brought to the attention of the Town Council and Town Manager, Kevin Smith by a Londonderry resident.

Specifically, the article called for \$175,000 funding for an emergency back-up generator for the Police Department, with the money to be taken from Unassigned Fund Balance towards the appropriation.

Town citizens most certainly support the Police Department to have a backup generator for electric power in case of a power outage.

After seeing the presentation done at the Deliberative session, Richard Bielinski, a long time Londonderry resident and a former Town Treasurer from 2001 to 2004, attended the next Town Council meeting, which took place just before the March 12 election. He expressed to the council his concern that the warrant article was misleading.

Bielinski also filed a complaint about this article with the State Attorney

General Office on March 4, and received a reply from N.H. Assistant Attorney General, Nicholas A. Chong Yen on May 8.

Bielinski's complaint expressed concern that the passage of a warrant article authorizing the Town of Londonderry's purchase of a new generator for the police department might violate New Hampshire election laws. Specifically, it was alleged that the Town did not give correct answers to the questions asked at deliberative session.

Bielinski became concerned after the Deliberative session about replacing a generator that was

Local Grandmother Reports on Middle School Bullying Incident

Recently a grandmother from Londonderry, Deb Ponte (who authorized her name usage for this story) contacted us, "As a long-time resident of Londonderry, a mother and grandmother, I am hoping that the Londonderry Times can publish my concerns over an incident that occurred at the Londonderry Middle School on May 1st."

"My 12-year-old grandchild attends the Londonderry Middle School. She has been the victim of persistent bullying and is in fear of continuing attending this school. It was recently discovered

that my grandchild, together with several other children's names were on a ...(social media posted bully list) ...authored by one of the students attending the school, who is the principal bully involved in this matter and has been a bully in the past to my grandchild and at least one other student."

School Superintendent Scott Laliberte, reports this incident is currently under further investigation. This reported bullying incident involves a potentially harmful social media post outside of school activities, which is a complex issue for the schools to deal with, as it involves legal and privacy

issues that must be investigated properly and with privacy protection.

Ponte said her daughter (the mom) and granddaughter reported to her that this social media involved a malicious Snap Chat post sent to other students as part of the bullying incident. Ponte says the nature of this communication has driven

Planning Board Approves Subdivision, Deed Transfer Plan

Michael Malaguti, Assistant Town Solicitor came to the Board for their approval to transfer the deed of a quarter-acre parcel at 2 Orchard View Drive from the town to Vernco Apple, LLC. Vernco recently bought and is redeveloping the Apple Tree Mall property.

The town has owned the property in question since 1981. At one point in the past, there were thoughts about extending Orchard View down to Devonshire Lane. This property would have been the right of way if the road had been extended.

There are no such plans anymore. The town

had an agreement with the previous owner, Shaw's, that they could use the quarter acre temporarily as long as the town did not intend to build the road. If the town totally abandoned the road idea, the agreement said that the property would go back to Shaw's or their successor.

When Vernco bought the property, the agreement did not properly handle the quarter acre parcel. Shaw's has agreed to cure the title, then re-deed the property to the town who will then immediately flip it to Vernco. The town benefits because this property goes back on the tax rolls.

This issue came before the Planning Board be-

cause any plans by the town to sell or buy property must be reviewed and approved by the Planning Board and Conservation Commission. Malaguti was not sure how Vernco planned to use the lot but suspected that it might be used for additional parking.

In other business, the Board completed its review of a 10-unit subdivision plan which had been continued at its April 3 meeting. In the previous meeting, resident Neil Dunn expressed concern that the clearing of the land for the development would increase the noise level at his home associated with planes coming to and from the airport.

In the April meeting, town staff advised the Board that they could only apply the town ordinance when reviewing the plan. The town does have an Airport Approach Noise Overlay District which requires special sound mitigation for properties within it. However; they pointed out that the proposed development is not within that overlay district.

Dunn gave information to the Board at the April 3 meeting that they agreed to review prior to the May 8 meeting. In the May 8 meeting, Debra Dunn read a letter written by her husband reiterating their concerns and trying to make the case that the Board is authorized to act

outside the Airport Approach Noise Overlay District ordinance.

Town staff said that they had reviewed the issue with the town attorney who said that the Board could not place noise-based restrictions as a condition of approval since the property is not within the noise overlay district. The Board then voted to conditionally approve the subdivision plan.

The Board also briefly discussed an application that had been continued from the April 3 meeting for a lot line adjustment that would create nine residential lots in the area of 23 Wilson Road. The proposed development would be along a one-way section of Wilson Road

that several town bodies have highlighted as dangerous.

The town has taken the position that no additional development should occur there unless the road is brought up to town standards. In the April 3 meeting, Paul DeCarolis, an attorney representing the Evans Family Trust, questions the legality of the town requiring the developer to pay for all of the improvements to Wilson Road.

The case was continued to June 12 to allow the town and the trust to come up with a mutually agreeable road improvement plan. Town staff said that they may ask the town attorney to attend that meeting.

en her granddaughter into counseling and has also left her with sleepless nights.

Pointe further told the Times, "When my daughter (mom) was informed of the incident about her daughter, the Assistant Principal of the Middle School called her to say my grandchild's name had been found on a "Bully List." My daughter went to the Londonderry Police Dept. at 4:30 p.m. the same day, making a formal complaint about criminal threatening and found the Police were not aware of the situation that had happened five hours earlier at the school. According to the school, the Resource Officer has 48 hours to complete a state form regarding the incident."

Ponte further stated, "On May 2, the administrative staff published a letter sent to parents and guardians. The letter read, "We have processes and procedures in place that involve trained professionals that respond to these events." The school principal also sent out a notice on May 2, to parents of the Middle School calling the situation a "student management situation" that is handled administratively.

School administrators have proposed to oversee Ponte's granddaughter's safety with extra observation attention and hall passes to allow the student to move about comfortably while a complete investigation is conducted. This investigation involves complex circumstances and will take time to reach conclusion.

The Middle School Student and Parent Handbook has a dedicated section that outlines investigation process for a bullying incident. In this section, the Handbook states, "The investigation shall be completed within 21 school days of receipt of the report, if practicable. The Superintendent may grant, in writing, an extension of time to complete the investigation of up to 7 additional days (school days) if necessary. The Superintendent or his/her designee shall notify all parties involved of any such extension."

In the meantime, parents have been advised about this investigation to get to the root of the problem that is being conducted in alignment with privacy laws to protect all parties. This means that information

will be compiled, privacy will be protected and there will be further contact proactively as the process is finished.

Once the investigation is completed, the School Handbook section about bullying states, "If the housemaster, assistant principal, or principal substantiates the bullying/cyber bullying report, he/she shall, in consultation with the Superintendent or his/her designee will determine what remedial and/or disciplinary actions should be

taken against the perpetrator(s) and determine what further assistance should be provided the victim(s), if any."

The Handbook also states that "The housemaster, assistant principal, or principal shall inform the victim(s), the perpetrator(s), and their parent/guardians in writing of the results of the investigation and any remedies and/or assistance provided by the school, including strategies for protecting students from retaliation.

Such communication shall be provided within 10 school days after the investigation has been completed. Such communication shall be in compliance with applicable privacy laws." So, this incident will go through the school districts investigative process for bullying and we will update the community while protecting the privacy of the parties involved about a resolution or related follow up actions concerning this incident.

Teen Driving This Prom Season

A driver's license mixed with a few drinks, texting, and pot is dangerous for anyone, but the reckless combination can be even more so for inexperienced drivers. Even when a parent trusts his or her own teenager to be conscientious, being certain that other teenagers will do the same is impossible.

As prom and graduation season approaches drunk-driving fears of parents escalate and school activism against such activity increases. Though teens will ultimately make the final decisions in terms of their own safety, it doesn't keep parents from waiting up at night. When it comes to teens and drunk driving, there is both good news and bad news.

The good news is that teen drunk driving nationwide has gone down. The bad news is that car crashes are the leading cause of death for teens, and about a third of those are alcohol related, according to Mothers Against Drunk Driving. Not every child makes it home safe, and only some live to tell about it. We hope that students are talking not only about the dangers of drinking and driving, but also about texting and driving and the importance of wearing a seat belt.

Still, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among U.S. teens. This is something many people live with and see on a regular basis, so the message must be spread.

I am a firm believer that if we can educate them at a young age, we are

going to be able to save their future, as well as our own. Start conversation with kids early. Every time you hear a story about the subject, share it. It's important for your children's safety. If nothing else, when your child goes to prom or graduation parties, try to find a little comfort in the transportation arrangements. Parents, be smart, be proactive, and have conversations constantly. It has to be in the forefront all the time, a priority.

The dangers of drinking and driving have heightened considerably due to the proliferation of cell-phones. Study after study has shown an increase in accidents connected with texting while driving.

Explain your own position concerning your teen's drinking and texting while driving. Discuss your family's rules about alcohol and agree on the consequences for breaking the rules. Discuss reasons for NOT drinking and the bad consequences that can result from drinking. Always tell you children that if they find themselves in an uncomfortable situation or they have made a poor decision about drinking or drugs that they can always call you and you will pick them up and bring them home. Mothers Against Drunk Driving offers a handbook on its website to help parents talk to their teens about alcohol.

Now, more than ever, local schools, parents, police and community members need to work together to make sure that no family has an "empty chair" after proms and graduations.

Nutfield 300th Anniversary Celebration Planning Continues

As preparation for this year's Londonderry Old Home Day continues, the Nutfield 300th Anniversary Committee held a meeting on Monday (May 6). This year's traditional Old Home Day celebrations will be a special one, as the community of Nutfield is celebrating its 300th anniversary. The celebrations had already begun in other towns, including the a 300th Gala which was hosted at the almost full Derry Opera House on Saturday, Apr. 13.

In its latest meeting, the committee continued to discuss the design for the Londonderry special coin, which will be produced for the town's part of the celebrations. Each of the four towns that are part of the Nutfield community (Londonderry, Derry, Windham and Derryfield) will designs its own side of the coin, while the other side will have the shared Nutfield 300th logo, the same one that appears on the coin

that was created for the 250th anniversary in 1969.

After looking in previous meetings at various designs which were sent by local artists, the committee suggested contacting the artist Kevin Jankowski and see if he would be willing to take parts of the mural that can be seen at Londonderry's Town Hall and create the town's side of the coin from it.

Questions were raised regarding this suggestion were the time it would take for the artist to send his design and whether or not he would be expecting payment.

Eventually, a different solution was offered, and accepted by the committee members.

Member Kirsten Hildonen took advice for the members and put together a design incorporating different elements of Londonderry's history then went on and combined these photos into a design of her own.

She acknowledged that the result still needs some work, especially

changing the font and adding some light to the dark areas that were copied from the original photos, but wanted the committee's approval before moving on and putting more time in this design.

Hildonen said once the committee agreed to move forward with the suggested design, she would make some edits and send the committee members the next draft, as soon as possible this week, as time is slowly running out (The Old Home Day celebrations are scheduled to take place this year between Aug. 14 and 18).

In Hildonen's first draft, before the editing job, there are several old houses from around Londonderry and in the front, three people, a woman and two men, which Hildonen already said will be part of the editing, as their figures are not very clear and mostly dark. The top of the coin has a caption saying: Londonderry 300th 1719-2019.

Ann chiampa suggested adding Reed Clark's

family images since they were involved in the original celebration.

Mr. Smith informed the committee members that the 603 Brewery, who recently announced its relocation plans and the opening of a new Beer Hall in Woodmont Commons development in Londonderry, has plans to reveal a special brew during Old Home Day. The brewery's initial idea was to release the new brew when it will open the new facility, but as this would be a big event anyway, the idea now is to save the special 300th brew for the August celebrations.

HERBICIDE USE NOTIFICATION

National Grid plans to apply herbicides along certain rights-of-way in New Hampshire in 2019. In accordance with administrative rules of the State of New Hampshire Pesticide Control Board, no application of herbicides shall be made to rights-of-way, during the months of June through October 15, without first providing notification to Town officials, the public, and residences near the rights-of-way. This announcement serves to provide notification to the public. The following herbicides will be selectively used to control certain tall-growing vegetation on the rights-of-way: Rodeo (Glyphosate), Garlon 4 (Triclopyr), Vastlan (Triclopyr), Milestone (Aminopyralid), Escort XP (Metasulfuron Methyl). National Grid will conduct maintenance on the following rights-of-way in the associated Towns, beginning June 17, 2019:

Individual landowners whose property abuts the right-of-way, or over whose property the right-of-way passes, may request and receive individual notification thirty days prior to any treatment. A Notification Request Coupon is provided below. To receive individual notification, fill out the Notification Request Coupon and return to the specified address. Coupons must be received by National Grid no later than June 3, 2019. Requests received after this date will not be granted until the next treatment cycle.

In addition to the Personal Notification by mail, as an individual landowner whose property abuts the right-of-way, or over whose property the right-of-way passes, you have the right to request and receive the approximate date, plus or minus 5 days that pesticides will be applied to the right-of-way in your area. Requests should be made to the contact listed below.

Rights-of-way may be identified by locating a metal tag on a pole or structure with the following initials: "NEPCO" or "GSECO" and usually appear with a pole or structure number and the right-of-way number; see list above.

In accordance with State Regulations, it is the duty of each landowner or resident to make National Grid aware of the location of potentially affected private water supplies, and of any other environmentally sensitive areas where herbicide application should be further restricted.

Tennis Courts to be Officially Named After Beloved Coach on Saturday

This Saturday, May 18, a dedication ceremony will be held at the Londonderry Athletic Fields Association tennis courts. The tennis courts will be officially named after beloved local tennis coach, Skip Burbine, who sadly passed away on Oct. 14, 2018, at the age of 65. The ceremony this Saturday, with the Burbine family, will begin at noon at the tennis courts.

Burbine taught and coached tennis in Londonderry for many years, after moving into town from

Portsmouth in 1996. In 2010, he coached the Londonderry High School's Boys' Varsity Tennis team to its first ever State Championship and in 2014, helped the Girls' team repeat that great achievement.

For the dedication ceremony, money was collected and a memorial bench, with his name, will be unveiled. The additional monies that were raised through generous donations will be used for scholarships in Burbine's name. A group of local tennis players already contacted Art Psaledas, Direc-

tor Londonderry's Recreation Committee, and reserved courts for a weekend tournament to raise further monies for the Burbine Scholarship Fund. The tournament will be open to public and is not expected to be highly competitive, but more of a fundraiser.

Psaledas also said during the committee's meeting on Monday, May 13, that he had been contacted by two women who are looking to continue Burbine's tradition, and give summer tennis lessons to local kids.

Burbine had hoped to

continue with his coaching before he fell sick last summer. The summer lessons will continue his tradition and follow the way he used to coach. This is a good and not too expensive way to introduce the Londonderry kids to the game of tennis.

During the meeting, Psaledas also presented this year's planned summer camps. Currently, there will not be camps in softball and wrestling. There will however be many other sport camps that will provide kids of different age groups with an opportunity to play and

compete during the coming summer season. Girls' basketball will have a camp, led by Londonderry High School varsity basketball coach, Nick Theos, for ages third to eighth grade, to be held July 15 to 19. The boys' basketball camp, led by another Londonderry High School varsity basketball coach, Nate Stanton, for ages third to tenth grade, will be held from July 22 to Aug. 2.

Baseball camp for six years old and up will have two rounds: Pitching camp will be on July 19 and 21 and for all players, the summer camp will run

between July 24 and the 27. Varsity football coach at the high school, Jimmy Lauzon, will lead the youth and high school football camp. The dates for those camps have not yet been set. Other camps will be a youth camp for golf, youth and high school camp for field hockey (Aug. 12-14), 11- to 17-years-old lacrosse camp, run by boys varsity coach, Roger Sampson, (June 24-27), soccer camp (details on the Londonderrysoccer.org website), volleyball and tennis camp (ages five to 11 from July 8-18).

Pillsbury Road near the old Woodmont apple farm building. This road would mostly run along the former Appletree Lane.

The original plan for First Avenue was a straight road, but the developer was looking to add some curvature to the road to allow it to be further away from existing storm water detention ponds.

Moving the road necessitated a couple of small changes to two planned buildings. In one case a single-family home will be converted to a duplex. In the other, a building will be made slightly smaller.

Kevan said that while not part of the current plan, Woodmont was in

discussions with the state Department of Transportation about running First Ave., all the way through to the bus station at Exit 4. He felt that this would relieve some of the congestion around Garden Lane going to the bus station.

Board member Peter Commerford expressed concern that the original traffic study done for Woodmont did not reflect this potential connection. John Trottier, Assistant Director of Public Works and Engineering said that traffic counts would have to be updated if this idea becomes a proposed plan.

Member Mary Soares asked if there would be roundabouts on First Ave., like there are today on Michels Way. Kevan said that this was not in the plan. He said that this road would get less traffic

than Michels Way and would also be the primary road used by delivery trucks which would have a tough time navigating the small roundabouts.

Members Wing Soares, Chris Davies and Roger Fillio said that they would prefer to have the roundabouts in place. Kevan said that there would be stop signs at all intersections along First Ave.

The Woodmont PUD requires that roads like First Ave. have parallel parking spots on both sides of the road. Kevan said they were seeking a waiver from this PUD requirement to have parking along just one side of First Ave.

There would also be a

side road connecting from First Ave., running parallel to Pillsbury that would provide a second entrance into Edgewood. This would be a dead-end road with a water pumping station at its terminus.

The developers were also requesting several waivers related to drainage requirements. Based on recommendations from town planning staff, the Board approved some and continued others to their next meeting to give staff time to further review the requests.

The request to have parking on only one side of First Ave., was approved. A decision on the overall site plan changes was deferred to the June 12

Planning Board meeting.

Relating to Edgewood, the Board also reviewed a request to adjust a lot line between two Woodmont parcels to allow enough room for the Edgewood facility. The Board approved the movement of the lot line.

In consultation with town planning staff, Woodmont reached the conclusion that Edgewood would be classified as an institutional building. According to the PUD, an institutional building cannot have more than 100 feet of frontage and

300 feet or less of depth to the property.

Kevan said they were looking for relief from these requirements since the Edgewood parcel would be much larger than that.

He said that Edgewood would be more of a campus layout rather than one large building. Town staff felt that the Edgewood buildings would be consistent with the intent of the PUD. Based on that, the Board approved the waiver from the PUD frontage requirement.

15-years-old. He logically understood that the age of the currently used Cat generator was less a reason for replacement than the working order of the unit, and the amount of time this generator had been used. Also, he had understood from Deliberative discussions that the old generator would be part of a trade-in for the new one.

During his fact-finding research, Bielinski said it was reported to him that the Police Department did not have a new back-up generator listed as a must have need, though they thought another generator would be a nice to have. Specifically, according to Bielinski, police captain Patrick Cheatham expressed to Bielinski that it was a want not a need.

When Bielinski originally spoke with Steve Cotton Administrative Support Coordinator. Cotton stated he understood the warrant article in the same way as Bielinski. It was at that time Cotton told Bielinski that he had found out the current generator was not being traded in, contrary to what was stated at deliberative.

Bielinski was advised the request for the new

generator for backup was actually for a backup to the current back-up generator and that the current generator was not going to be traded in.

Bielinski said, "My main concern with the Warrant Article was not how it was worded, but the misinformation that the town presented at the Deliberative Session, which may have swayed voter decisions." He added, "That same information was relayed by two town employees, when questioned after the Deliberative."

So, the funding request evolved to become a backup of the backup generator that was still in good condition as the current Cat generator in use for the Police Department only had approximately 533 hours of usage over the 15-year period.

Research informed Bielinski that these generators have a minimum life expectancy of 15,000 hours and a maximum life of about 50,000 hours with a typical lifespan of 30,000 hours.

New Hampshire RSA 39:2 govern what a town must include in its warrant article. Particularly relevant here, is the following requirement: "the subject matter of all business to be acted upon at the town meeting shall be

distinctly stated in the warrant."

RSA 39:2.

In Assistant Attorney General Chong Yen's reply to Bielinski, he pointed out that, "In this case, the Town posted warrant article #15 identifying its intent to appropriate \$175,000 for the purpose of purchasing an emergency back-up generator for the Police Department. The warrant article also identified what the source of the funds would be, as well as the impact on Londonderry's taxes if the warrant article was passed."

Chong Yen wrote, "The Town officials attempted to rectify any

possible confusion caused by these statements at the Deliberative Session by sharing the information regarding the future of the existing generator with the voters on election day through the use of a large poster situated at the entrance to the polling place."

Chong Yen concluded, "While we acknowledge that town officials should be clear in the matter of appropriations, notably, the Department of Revenue Administration reviewed the warrant in question with a town official and found the language of the article was consistent with the pur-

pose of the purchase. Based on the foregoing, we conclude that the Town of Londonderry's warrant article did not violate New Hampshire's election laws."

On the subject of the poster at the town election, Bielinski said, "I didn't see it, and didn't know it existed until after the election. I think most people who vote at local elections pretty much have their minds made up before hand, and would know to look for signs clarifying an article."

Adding to the frustration, the Londonderry Town Access Center did not properly capture the Deliberative Session for replay of the information given.

In response to the letter from the AG's office, Bielinski asked Chong Yen, "If a warrant article was correctly written, is it ok for the town to misrepresent the facts about the article?"

Londonderry Middle School student Alex Aranzabal's eyes lit up the second he was asked about his favorite piece to play on his cello: "The Bach Suites," he immediately answered. When Bach wrote music, he left the cello six suites, six collections of music. Each suite has five pieces and all of those are dances. It is the religion of the cellists and we have

to follow it really closely. We, as cellists, have to figure out what Bach meant and add some of our personality to it too. So we can make it whatever we want, but must be strict with what he wrote. This is what we follow."

He will be part of the NYO2, an extremely competitive program that brings together 14-16 year old musicians from across America to perform in some of the most famous places in the world. This

year, the program will be running between July 10-31, traveling from New York to Florida and playing at Carnegie Hall, as well as the New World Center in Miami Beach.

The programs conductor is Carlos Miguel Prieto, one of the leading conductors in the world: "It's amazing. Many great musicians are going to be there", he says. The program's main purpose is to give a big chance and a big stage to musicians

from under-represented areas, such as New Hampshire.

Aranzabal is 14 years old, lives with his family in Londonderry and attends Londonderry Middle School. He first started playing the cello four years ago, following in his older brother's footsteps. He sent in the National Youth Orchestra video application at the last possible moment and is thrilled to have been accepted into the program. He is very happy to travel with the group, but he adds, "I'm going to miss the school dance. That stinks."

His parents say that the school has been very supportive of Alex and mentioned that his teacher, Donna Salviati, has been an important influence on Alex's development as a musician. Alex's parents, Jamie and Mariel, moved here from Peru over 20 years ago, but neither comes from a musical family. Ms. Salviati was the one who pointed out to them that Alex is very talented and advanced for his age. She offered sending Alex to Harel Gietheim, who is

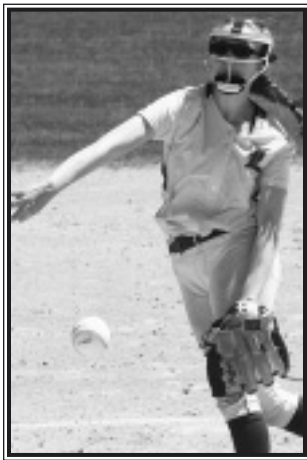
Lancer Softball Team Falls into Rut, Drops Three in a Row
