Heritage Commission Reviews Applications for Annual Report

The Londonderry Heritage/Historic District Commission discussed the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources Annual Report during its last meeting, held at Town

Hall on Sept. 26.

The annual report is required to be filed by each Certified Local Government (GLC) and cover Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2019, from Oct. 1, 2018 to Sept. 30, 2019. This year's report is due by the end of this month, Oct. 31.

According to the

report, since Oct. 1, 2018 to the time the report was filled, prior to the commission meeting, seven meetings were held and during these meetings, the commission reviewed 26 applications, in addition to other community projects. All applications

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Woodmont Senior Living Site Plan Gets Green Light

A conditional approval for the construction of a phased senior living facility (62+) at the Woodmont Commons development in Londonderry was given by the Londonderry Planning Board on its meeting last Wednesday (Oct. 9), following a formal review of the plan.

The applicants, Woodmont Commons Planned Unit Development and Edgewood Retirement Community and the owner of the land, Pillsbury Development, could now continue with their plan to build a total of 254 independent living units and an additional 40 assisted living units on

Pillsbury Rd. and Michels Way.

An 80-minute public hearing was held at Town Hall by the Planning Board and concluded with the plan approval. Architect Philippe Saad presented the plan to the board members and public. He said it is a 15-acre open-space site. "When a project gets developed on an open land like this, with a mission such as the Baldwin, which is to integrate the residents into the urban environment that will be built as part of Woodmont Commons, but also sits on a beautiful site... our role is to connect the urban Woodmont Commons with the nature around and this will be seen throughout the approach and the con-

cept, from architecture to landscape to site planning", said Saad.

He added that their inspiration for the plan came from local downtowns and neighborhoods in New England, its townhouses and specifically, in the Southern New Hampshire area. Saad went on to explain specifics of the landscape and the new roads and emphasized the open space that will be created in the new development and the planners will to engage residents, visitors and people who pass by the development. The buildings will also have a garage below the ground.

Ray Breslin, who lives at 3 Gary Dr., near Wood-

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Planning Board Sends Wilson Road Project Back to Staff

An application for formal review of a lot line adjustment between 23 Wilson Road and 55 Wilson Road, and subdivision to create nine residential lots on 23 Wilson Road was brought in front of the Londonderry Planning Board for the fifth time this year by Evans Family Limited Partnership, during the Oct. 9 meeting.

However, once again the applicants and the board and town staff could not agree on an approval that will move

this development forward and following a request made by the applicants' lawyer, it was decided by the Planning Board to continue the discussion on the Nov. 13 meeting.

The previous discussion was held on the Planning Board Aug. 14 meeting. There, the issue with Wilson Road, which is unpaved and that only part of it is bi-directional while the rest is one way only, came up, since the proposed subdivision would be along the one-way section.

Charlie Evans, one of

the applicants, said in the August meeting that they are willing to pay five percent of the total road improvement design, in order to move forward with their development. He refused to pay for more than that and said that this was a

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Planning Board Tables Talk on Portable Storage Ordinance

The Londonderry Planning Board held a public hearing on proposed changes to the Londonderry Zoning Ordinance regarding portable storage structures in the AR-1 District, the Commercial Districts and the Industrial Districts during its Wednesday, Oct. 9 meeting.

The zoning ordinance relates to provisions concerning placement, length and permitted time of the portable structures.

Town Planner Colleen Mailloux told board members that this discussion had been going on for a few months, and that last month, at the Sept. 11,

Planning Board meeting, following a lengthy public hearing with numerous participating residents who expressed their ideas, the board members agreed on the language for the ordinance.

Mailloux recommended to take public input and that the board will vote on whether to recommend the changes to the Town Council or not.

Board member Ann Chiampa said she strongly disagrees with the 40-foot long storage containers on the front yards of residential dwellings.

Business owner, Mark Fortin, of Fortin Modular Storage on Mammoth Road approached the board and responded to

Chiampa's issue by saying, "It was supposedly a problem in 2008 and for the past 12 years, it hasn't been a problem. It came to light just two years ago, when all of a sudden they started issuing summonses."

Chiampa asked, "So why are we changing it?" and to that, Fortin repeated his claim that it has become an issue in recent years. He gave as an example one of his costumers, who has a 20-foot unit (He said he does not know how visible it is from the street) and her daughter moved back home, "The daughter can't even afford the

unit," he said. "The mother is paying for the unit... It's an option for the residents of this town and it's been an option for... My family has been in this town for 72 years. We have been renting these things since the mid-80s. It has been an issue and all of a sudden it's an issue."

Fortin added that his costumer received a letter from town, saying she must remove that unit and that she does not know what to with it now, as she cannot afford to bring it elsewhere. When Chiampa asked him where that house is, Fortin answered that he

did not ask his costumer yet and that he hoped that she could come to the Planning Board meeting, but that she was not able to do so. Fortin then told the board members: "All of the towns around this town treat these things like any other out-building... If it's there for more than six months, than tax it."

Resident Tony DeFrancesco, who at last month's meeting expressed his concerns with allowing the portable structures in residential areas, said that he agrees with Fortin and that these structures should "definitely" be taxed.

DeFrancesco also responded to Fortin's claims that the reason this has become an issue in recent years is that current ordinance has not been enforced and now it is.

"However, that's if you are going to have them. I don't understand why this is necessary in a residential zone other than move in, move out, fire, remodeling... If it looks commercial, it is commercial and it does not belong in a residential zone."

The Planning Board inevitably decided on continuing the discussion, to its Nov. 6 meeting.

Phase I Finished at Londonderry Central Fire Station

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BRANCH CONSTRUCTION

North Branch Construction of Concord, has completed Phase I of the Londonderry Central Fire Station renovation and addition. Phase I included the addition of an equipment bay on the south end of the existing station along with a 4,620 sf addition housing a new entrance lobby, a secure Regional Dispatch Center, administrative offices, break room, conference room, and a training room. In addition, Phase I of the project included relocation of the station's flag poles and the Department's "Never Forget" Memorial and Last Call bell from the northeast corner of the existing fire station to directly in front of the new administrative entrance. The building has remained occupied and fully operational,

including the critical Dispatch Center, since the start of the project in November 2018.

Phase II of the project is currently underway. Phase II includes an additional apparatus bay on the north end of the building along with a 2-story

Operations addition providing gear storage, a decontamination room, and work, fitness, and living space. Once complete, the addition and renovation will provide the station with an additional 11,000 sf including two additional apparatus bays,

a separate decontamination room, expanded training and ADA compliance upgrades, a secure dispatch facility, lighting and HVAC systems upgrades.

Port One Architects from Portsmouth, NH is providing design for this project.

town road and that even if he pays it still does not guarantee his application's approval, so he does not want to invest additional money without any insurance.

The Planning Board Chair, Arthur Rugg, suggested back in August that Evans approach the Town Council and see if there are any plans of options to make the road improvement on Wilson Road, but on Wednesday's meeting, Evans replied that he had met with Town Planner Colleen Mailloux, Assistant Director of Public Works and Engineering John Trottier and Town Manager Kevin Smith and that Smith told him he discussed the issue with the councilmen and that there is no money available in foreseeable future for this kind of work. For that reason, Evans decided not to go with the subject to Town Council, as he already knew the answer to his question.

Following that, Evans and Rugg had a lengthy discussion on the traffic issued on Wilson Rd. and on the impact that nine more residential lots may have on the road. Evans asked what would be the board's stance in case this development would not create any more traffic on Wilson Rd. and that he believes the traffic flow on Wilson Road could be cut in half and that would be a safe situation. Rugg answered that this is only theoretical and that the town has regulations to protect

public safety. He added that there was some progress between the plans engineer and the Planning Board in the past, but that progress was stopped.

Evans claimed he did not get any comments from town staff on the improvements he proposed after the previous meeting. Towards the end of the discussion, he complained that “working with the staff was not productive at all. I won't be held hostage. It's extortion.” Trottier said that all the improvements were reviewed by staff and the staff's comments are in the memos sent to the board members.

Three citizens who live on Wilson Rd. also gave their inputs to the board members. They believed that any traffic increase on the already problematic Wilson Rd. would not be a good idea, even if the increase is not big. They do not have a problem with the development itself, but they are not sure how the applicants or the town plans to fix the traffic problem it will cause.

Eventually, the applicants' lawyer asked for the continuation, next month. He said that they will have additional input to give and that they want to talk to the town's staff again, as they may have more information after they discuss the situation with their engineers. “Your staff may not change, but we'll have new information”, said the lawyer, before the board agreed to continue the case in a few weeks.

The Planning Board also gave a conditional approval to an application for formal review of a site plan for the design and construction of a telecommunications facility at 11 Mohawk Drive, near the Crossroads Shopping Center.

The applicants explained that they are proposing a 140-foot monopole tower and had already received a special exception from the town's Zoning Board of Adjustments back in January, to operate the sell tower on this property. They also received the approval from the Heritage/Historic District Commission, in March and are going to build a tower to support four carriers.

T-Mobile, the applicant, will be on the top of the tower, while three more carriers will be located lower. The applicants added that the tower will not be lit and that the area is pretty well developed and that makes this property a great spot to bring coverage to Rt. 102, South Road and Appletree Mall Shopping Center.

The only real concern brought up by the planning board was whether there would be a danger in the event of high winds, and where the tower would drop.

The lawyer representing the applicant told the board that towers are being designed to bend, and collapse straight down now, and there would be no danger to the public, or other structures.

were approved, with three still pending.

On the November 2018 meeting there were two site plans, two subdivision plans and one condominium conversion. In January, three site plans were discussed, as well as two subdivision plans. Two months later, one subdivision plan was presented, as well as two site

plans and a certificate of approval for a historic property. In May, the commission had nine applications, more than any other meeting in the recent year, including five site plans, a conditional use permit, a lot line adjustment, a certificate of approval for a historic property and a section 106 review. In June, the commission only continued a hearing for a certificate of approval and on

the July meeting; there was a site plan, a condominium conversion and a subdivision plan.

In response to a section asking the commission to "briefly describe preservation activities that the CLG sponsored or directed in FFY 2019", the answer on the report was "the commission has been actively working on the redevelopment of the

Kent Allen Forest and participated in the 300th Nutfield celebration."

In response to a request to "briefly describe any problems - practical, political, or financial - encountered by the CLG in planning or implementing its activities during FFY 2019", the report stated the "financial constraints seems to be the limiting factor for

most of the Commission's activities and/or projects." And when asked to "describe any projected activities/objectives for FFY 2020", the answer was "the Commission hopes to provide the Town with a list of his-

toric properties."

Other than that, the rest of the report included the Heritage/Historic Commission Rules of Procedure, as well as a brief presentation of the commission's members.

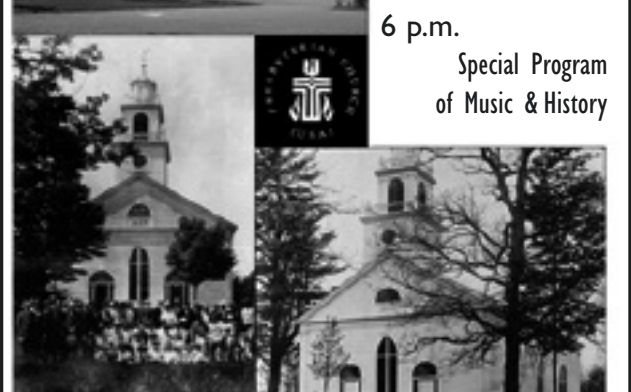

Pelham Wedding Shooting Has Londonderry Connection

Just 11 days after Brandon Castiglione was arrested and charged with second-degree murder of Minister Luis Garcia of the New England Pentecostal Church in Pelham at Castiglione's home at 15 Ridgemont Drive in Londonderry, his father, Mark Castiglione, was attacked during his wedding inside the same church on Saturday, Oct. 12, by Dale Holloway, the late minister's stepson.

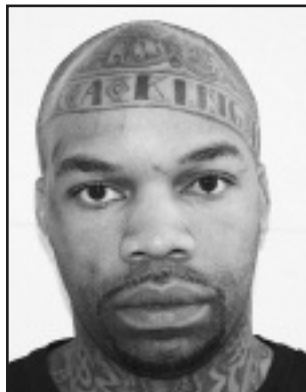
This attack also resulted in the 37-year-old Holloway, who was convicted of a felony in Massachusetts in the past, shooting the church's 75-year-old Bishop Stanley Choate in the chest. Mark Castiglione's bride-to-be, Claire McMullen, suffered a gunshot wound to her arm, while Castiglione himself was hit by Holloway in the head with his firearm, before several of the 40 wedding guests managed to pin him down and held him on the ground until police arrived.

The investigators of this incident quickly said that "preliminary investigation of the matter indicates that this incident does not appear to be a random event."

Around 10:12 a.m. on Saturday, the Pelham Police responded to a reported shooting at the church after a 9-1-1 call. The caller, said the New Hampshire Attorney General press release, reported that a man came into the church and shot at the presiding bishop.

Nearby officers were on scene within moments and immediately entered the church, where they discovered Bishop Choate suffering from a gunshot wound to the upper chest and Holloway being held by the parishioners. Choate was taken to Tufts Medical Center in Boston, MA and was listed in serious condition, while McMullen and Castiglione were both treated at a local hospital and later released.

Holloway, who was listed as Garcia's stepson in the minister's obituary last week, was arrested on alternative

counts of purposely and knowingly causing bodily injury by means of a deadly weapon by shooting Bishop Choate in the chest. He was charged with a first-degree assault. The next day, the Attorney General annou-

nced in a second press release that additional charges have been brought against Holloway: Attempted murder of Bishop Choate for aiming a firearm and shooting at him with purpose that a murder be committed; Convicted felon in possession of a firearm; second-degree assault for recklessly causing bodily injury to McMullen; Simple assault for knowingly causing unprivileged physical contact with Castiglione by striking him in the head with a firearm.

Castiglione and McMullen's wedding on Saturday morning was

supposed to be followed, on the same location, by a noon Celebration of Life for the late Garcia, who was shot in the neck by Castiglione's son Brandon, according to the autopsy.

Following the shooting, Senator Maggie Hassan tweeted on her account: "I'm deeply disturbed to hear about the shooting in Pelham this morning. Today was supposed to serve as a celebration of life of Minister Luis Garcia. This senseless violence can't continue – my prayers are with the victims of this terrible attack."

mont Commons, approached the board members and asked questions about the process. Breslin, who in the past expressed concerns about Woodmont Commons and the traffic problems the new development can create, said to the board members: "This is a very large development, part of Wood-

mont, It's being explained to me, and correct me if I'm wrong, it's over 62. Are we calling it elderly housing? Yes. But it's also being described as assisted living. Are we talking nursing home here? Just assisted living? So if someone fails, he'll have to move to a nursing home. It looks like a beautiful illustration, what has been presented, but it looks really upscale. I'm

75 and doesn't look like anything I could afford. Do we have any idea what this is going to cost?"

Planning Board Chair Arthur Rugg admitted that at the moment, he does not know if the development has done any pricing yet. "I know that there has been a lot of advertising about the Baldwin", said Rugg and encouraged Breslin to ask the development representatives following

the board meeting. "I'm just wondering if somebody in Londonderry could afford to live there", added Breslin. "I think it's a good question." Breslin went on to express further concern about utilities and water pressure regarding the development and the residents around that area. Following that discussion, the board approved the plan.

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Fourth Annual Jimmy Fund Walk to Take Place Sunday at LHS

The fourth Annual Londonderry Dana-Farber Cancer Institute/New Hampshire Oncology-Hematology Jimmy Fund Walk will be held in Londonderry on Sunday, Oct. 20. Onsite registration begins at 1:30 p.m. and the walk itself kicks off at 2 p.m.

Last year, over \$15,000 was raised at the event, all of which stayed local and was donated to support the Dana Farber Lon-

donderry patients and their families. Organizers hope to see between 300 and 400 participants this time (in 2018, about 100 people walked). "It keeps growing every year. More and more groups are coming and walking with us", said Steven Juster, a teacher at Londonderry High School who is one of the organizers.

The roughly two-mile scenic walk will start in front of the high school, where all the marchers will gather up. The 11 stu-

dents who form the Londonderry High School's Pep Rally team will be operating the event and registering everyone. There is also an option of online registration and fundraising at <http://danafarber.jimmyfund.org/goto/londonderryDFCI>.

One of the Pep Rally team members is in charge of the DJ stand at the start line and the Pep Rally kids select a color for every year – Last year it was white and blue stripes. Whoever raises a

minimum of \$50 will receive a t-shirt to wear at the walk. The team's members will be standing with signs and directing the participants along the route. Juster adds: "Last year there was also a free bake sale. We know that not everybody can donate \$20 or something else, but it is still nice when people come."

Juster also says that the date for this year's walk was chosen carefully: "The Patriots play on Monday night this week,

so it's not during the game and it's also after Columbus Day weekend. We hope that a lot of people will attend and have the opportunity to meet with the Dana Farber Londonderry people and learn about it."

The original Jimmy Fund Walk takes place in Boston every September. Nearly 10,000 walkers and volunteers participate every year and since 1989, its first edition, the event had raised over \$100 million for Dana-Farber Can-

cer Institute's fight against cancer. The Dana-Farber Cancer Institute/NHOH satellite in Londonderry has been providing cancer care to patients in that area for over a decade. The clinic provides patients access to a variety of programs and resources and the Londonderry Jimmy Fund Walk helps in funding of these programs.

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Awareness and Education Key To Conservation Land Safety During Hunting Season

The fall brings out novice and experienced trail walkers and hikers alike, with the crisp weather and colorful foliage. But during this time of year, outdoor enthusiasts share the same spaces with hunting sportsmen, and it is important to be aware and safe during hunting season.

In New Hampshire, hunting is allowed on state lands unless posted or prohibited by law, and per New Hampshire Fish and Game website, a small percentage of state lands are closed to hunting. In fact, the website states that nearly 80% of New Hampshire's forestland is privately owned, to include city and town conservation lands. Most private

lands remain open to hunters across New Hampshire, unless otherwise posted against hunting.

Outdoor enthusiasts wishing to use locally controlled conservation land can check with city or town conservation commissions to see if hunting is permitted or prohibited on specific trails or public areas.

Per NH Fish and Game, NH state law reads that hunters are prohibited from discharging firearms or a bow and arrow within 300 feet of a permanently occupied dwelling without permission of the landowner.

"Hunters are prohibited from discharging firearms within 300 feet of any developed recreation area when occupied (including parking lots), ad-

ministrative and maintenance facilities, dwellings, camps, cabins and yurts, bathhouses, campgrounds, campsites, playgrounds, athletic fields, beaches, pavilions, picnic areas and boat launches in state parks and forests," according to NH Fish and Game resources.

September 1 was officially the start of the hunting season in the Granite State. It starts with black bear, followed soon by the popular deer and turkey seasons. Pheasant and Moose hunting both start in October. Specific dates vary on firearm or hunting method used, as posted by the NH Department of Fish and Game. Many hunting seasons, specifically firearms seasons, can be shorter in dura-

tion than expected.

With safety precautions and awareness, hunters and conservation land users can happily co-exist.

Here are a few safety tips for this time of year:

1. Know When Hunting Season Is: Fish and Game has details for when hunting seasons start and end, to include deer and small game. Bow hunting and firearms also have different seasons.

2. Know Where Hunting Is Allowed: Check with a local conservation committee or state agency to see if the area allows hunting. Follow and respect posted signage. Some states allow hunting near trails while other states do not, to include closing hiking trails to non-hunters during hunting seasons. Even if you

do not hunt, check out state and local hunting agencies to know where hunting will be.

3. Dress Appropriately: Wear brightly colored clothing or clothing that will stand out, such as red or orange. Avoid white, black and browns and muted colors that will blend into the background. This includes any pets, who could be mistaken for a woodland creature.

4. Stay On The Trails: Hunters tend to stay away from heavily used trails because of safety. Hunters will be looking for movement in wooded areas, away from used or populated areas so stay on the path.

5. Pay Attention To Signs: Paying attentions to signage will tell you where you should and shouldn't

be and what activities are appropriate for conservation land users.

5. Make Noise: Animals will likely stay away from noise, and so will hunters. Staying in groups or making a little extra noise makes sportsmen, and animals, more likely to be aware of your presence, and keep away from the noisy foot traffic trails can bring.

6. Dawn And Dusk: These times of day are typically active hunting times because it is when deer and other animals are most active and because of the lack of light, hunters may have a harder time making out shapes and colors.

NH DHHS Reports on First Vaping-Related Lung Injury

The first person with lung injury associated with e-cigarette use or "vaping" has been identified in New Hampshire after an investigation by the NH Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Division of Public Health Services (DPHS).

The individual was an adult from Sullivan County, who developed respiratory symptoms and had chest imaging showing

evidence of lung injury, consistent with other cases reported nationally. This person reported recent vaping of nicotine products. The individual was hospitalized but has since been discharged.

DHHS has been working closely with health-care providers and with the investigation conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the U.S. Food and Drug Adminis-

tration (FDA) to identify individuals affected by vaping so we can better understand what is causing these preventable life threatening health complications.

"Vaping-associated lung injury is a national problem, and unfortunately New Hampshire is the latest state to be included in the national outbreak investigation," said Dr. Benjamin Chan, NH State Epidemiologist. "The ongoing investigation into these illnesses has not yet identified a specific cause. And even though a majority of patients report vaping THC products, some have reported only vaping nicotine products. Until we have more information from the national investigation, no vaping is con-

sidered safe."

As of October 1, there are 1,080 lung injury cases reported from 48 states and 1 U.S. territory. Of these reported cases, eighteen deaths have been confirmed in 15 states. All reported patients have a history of e-cigarette/vaping product use. The majority (80%) are under 35 years old, and more than one-third (37%) are 20 years of age or younger, highlighting the significant impact this outbreak is having on our adolescents and young adults. The latest findings from the national investigation suggest products containing tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) play a central role in the outbreak because the majority of affected individuals have reported

THC vaping product use; however, a number of individuals have reported only nicotine e-cigarette use. The specific chemical exposure causing the lung injuries remains unknown at this time as no single product or substance has been linked to all lung injury cases.

Symptoms of vaping-related lung injuries include cough, shortness of breath or chest pain. Some patients have also experienced gastrointestinal symptoms such as nausea, vomiting, diarrhea or abdominal pain. Other symptoms include fatigue and fever. Individuals who use e-cigarettes or vaping products and are experiencing any of these symptoms should ask their healthcare provider to check for lung

injury.

The CDC recommends not using e-cigarettes, or vaping products, particularly those containing THC. E-cigarettes should not be used by youth, young adults, pregnant women, or adults who do not currently use tobacco products. Adults who use e-cigarettes because they have quit smoking should be offered FDA approved quit therapy, and should not return to smoking cigarettes.

The DHHS Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Program provides help quitting all tobacco and nicotine products by contacting Quit Now NH, online or by calling 1-800-QUIT-NOW. Teens can visit My Life, My Quit online, call or text 1-855-891-9989.

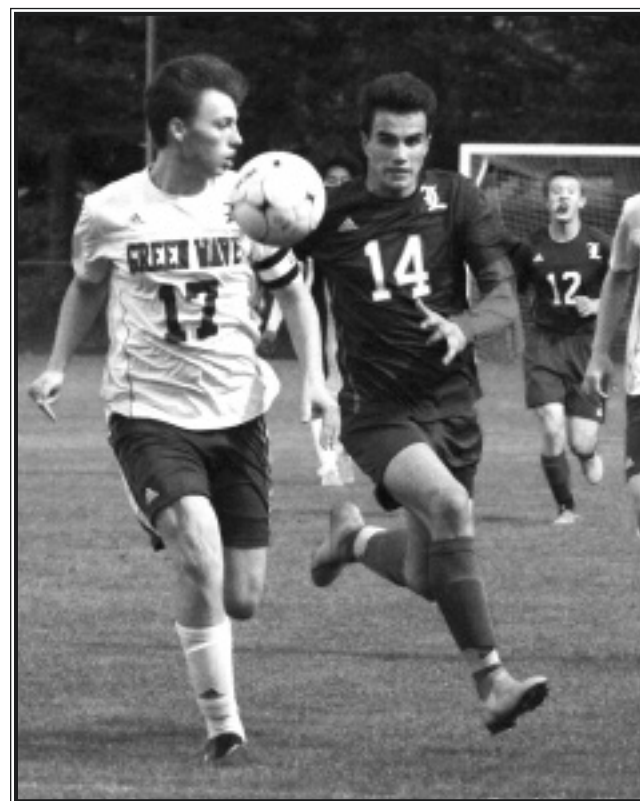

Hunter Smith Takes on a Dover defender during last Friday nights contest at home.

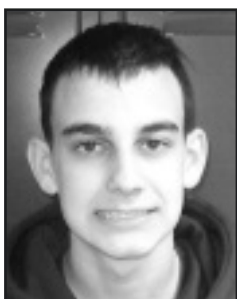

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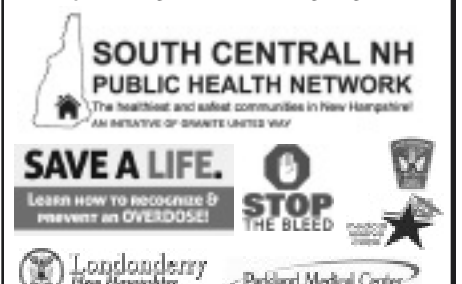
