Town Council Chairman John Farrell did most of the talking during Monday nights Town Council meeting, when it came to an explanation of why a vendor selling Trump merchan-

dise was given permission to set up shop outside the polls at Londonderry High School the day of the Presidential Primary.

The explanation was given after residents complaining they had been harassed on voting day received numerous com-

plaints.

Before that explanation was given, Farrell invited Police Chief Bill Hart to tell the public how he felt things went during the primary.

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Water Contamination Being Discussed Monday, March 2

On Monday, March 2, officials from NHDES will be at the Londonderry Town Council meeting to discuss the on-going investigations and solutions about the PFOA/S and related chemicals that have created well contamination for residents in Londonderry. Currently there are different areas of town with wells that have been discovered to have significant water contamination including neighborhoods on the west side of Londonderry near Litchfield that have been impacted

by the Saint-Gobain PFOA water contamination issue - that is also affecting 100's of residents in Southern NH. Most recently there has also been a PFOA water contamination discovery in a neighborhood near the Appletree Mall.

NHDES officials will be speaking at 7 p.m. during the public comment section of the Town Council meeting, at which time the public is also invited to speak and ask questions. NHDES has told us that in areas where water contamination problems have been identified, most - if not all brooks and wells - have

been tested in the area, so DES is saying it is not necessary to test the aquifers at this time.

There are however still a lot of questions to ask them about these water issues, so it is a good idea for the community to come to the meeting prepared with their questions and concerns. While some questions may not yet have answers, it is important for residents to stay in the loop to insure all appropriate questions are being asked.

Some questions needing answers include - Who is responsible for

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Zoning Board Denies Nutfield Store Drive Thru Variances

On Feb. 19, the Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustments led by Chairman Neil Dunn met for a public hearing to further consider a Variance request continued from their previous meeting. Last month, Shasta Realty appeared before the board with requests for 4 variances for a business expansion plan for their local country store located at 72 Shasta Drive.

The Nutfield Country Store has been a Londonderry fixture for many years; it is a local variety store that also sells wines and supports a

small Dunkin' Donuts franchise within the location. Since the summer of 2008, the store has been owned by Joe and Rosa Correia, who also own several larger Dunkin' Donut shops located on Route 102 in Londonderry. The Nutfield Country store has been updated over the past years and in the summer time the property has a nice picnic table area for folks to use.

Four different variances were requested to support a plan for a new drive thru area, as well as to allow a new structure to be added for a retaining wall that would be greater than three feet in the Conservation

Overlay District (CO) district, which is prohibited.

In addition, a variance would be needed to reduce the side perimeter landscape buffer from 30 feet to 7.1 feet and to reduce the front perimeter landscape buffer from 30 feet to 14.1 feet. Lastly another variance would be required to reduce the side buffer in a residen-

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Planning Board Agrees to Extension, Partial Property Rezoning

The Londonderry Planning Board met on Feb. 12 with

Chairman, Art Rugg, reviewing discussions and board decisions, along with the 7 additional planning board mem-

bers actively voting at the meeting. The Chairman noted that during the Planning Board's first meeting in March there will be an election for new officers for the Planning Board, while also announcing resignation of Vice Chair, Mary Wing Soares and that a search and process would be set in motion for adding a new member.

Town Planner, Colleen Mailoux, presented board members with the first discussion saying, "I have one item under discussion with staff - we have an extension request for the board's consideration. This is for a subdivision for one lot to divide into two parts located on 7 Litchfield Rd., that was conditionally approved back in February 2017. Subdivisions have a 2-year time frame to comply with conditions of approval. The applicants are requesting an additional 90-day extension to complete their conditions of approval." The Town Planner continued, "Basically, they have been working with Liberty Utilities, Pennichuck and other utility companies on easements. Multiple utilities, along with their attorneys are

involved and it is taking time for them to finalize the draft for those easements, but they are close to completing that now. I recommend the board grant them the 90-day extension they have requested which would give them until May 12, 2020 to comply with the conditions of approval."

The Planning Board voted unanimously - 8 to 0 - with no abstentions to grant approval for this subdivision project's extension to the May 12 date.

The next business heard was for the board to consider 2 related rezoning requests that are properties in close proximity - one of which is on 595 Mammoth Rd., that is currently zoned AR-1 (Agricultural Residential District 1) and another for a property located at 603 Mammoth Road that over time has been set with multiple zoning ordinances on the parcel as the zoning is set up with both AR-1 and C-II zoning with the AR-1 zoning as fitting for neighborhood land set up.

The applicant, Vincent Iacozzi and Thibeault Corporation of N.E. (Owner) were requesting this rezoning as a change

for all the parcels to be rezoned to C-II (Commercial Zoning II). This request and hearing was continued from a Planning Board meeting that had previously occurred on Dec. 4, 2019 where the applicant and the board, as well as, public residents came to testify and discussed the situation at length. Nearby residents and the board were not of mind to change the property zoning on 595 Mammoth to commercial zoning with Planning Board members pointing out that this rezoning was not really viable as it could impact other properties in the area and could possibly create a hardships for the neighborhood; some of the residents pointed out in December that this could also affect an historical Londonderry zoning situation.

After long discussions, brain storming,

board recommendations and presentations by the applicant, the Planning Board agreed for the property located at 603 Mammoth, that was currently zoned AR-1 and C-II, could be recommended to the Town Council to be rezoned to a C-II district classification. The board approved this with unanimous consent, so the entire parcel at 603 Mammoth would now be recommended to the Town Council to be rezoned to a C-11 district classification.

However, the Planning Board was adamant and unanimous that the property at 595 Mammoth Rd., should not be recommended to the Town Council for rezoning and that it should remain with an AR-1 zoning classification. Thus, this property map and address was not set for approval to be changed to the C-II classification.

The first week of March is marked in many local schools as Read Across America Week. This week celebrates children's author Dr. Theodor Geisel, better known to the world as Dr. Seuss. Dr. Seuss's birthday was March 2, the Saturday of winter vacation, so this is the week when most celebrations are taking place.

True to the famed children's author, school activities focus on reading. Read Across America Week was created by the National Education Association and no matter what people think of unions, we hope everyone can agree on the importance of reading, and of reading to children - early and often.

Escalating School District Budgets

To the editor,

As a Londonderry taxpayer for over 40 years I am concerned with the Londonderry School District budget increases. These budgets account for about 70% of the total tax-

payer budget each year.

Our Londonderry School District budgets keep escalating year after year, but our school enrollment keeps declining. Herein are some statistics.

The NH Department of Education lists enrollment statistics from 2007 to 2018. As examples Londonderry High School (LHS) enrollment in 2007 was 1828, the seventh grade was 418, the fourth grade in three schools was 126-147, and kindergarten was 308. In 2018 LHS enrollment was 1444, a decline of 21%; seventh grade was 306, a decline of 27%; fourth was 84-96, a decline of 34%; and kindergarten was 226, a decline of 27%.

During the same period of 2007 to 2018 our total school district budget went from a little over \$55 million to over \$72 million, an increase of 31%.

I know the class size went from 27 to 22, but maybe we should be looking at something between 22 and 27.

In summary, during the study period of 2007 to 2018 our school budget increased 31% while our enrollments decreased on the order of 21% to 34%, depending on grade levels.

Going forward, the Londonderry School District (LSD) contracted with the New Hampshire School Administrators Association (NHSAA) to provide updated forecasts of student enrollment for each year during the period 2019 to 2029. The NHSAA consultants determined the best guideline of three models to forecast future student enrollments was the One-year cohort method. As examples the NHSAA forecasts included the following for Londonderry:

I know there have been cost increases in health insurance, pensions, salaries, etc.; and there have been cuts in state aid; but enrollment is way down and the school budget is way up. Looking at the enrollment projections for five years out, which might be close to coming to fruition, there is only a 7% increase in grades K-5 over the next five years, a

3% increase in grades 6-8 over five years and a 9% decrease in grades 9-12 over the five years.

Shouldn't we be looking at cutting costs and reducing our school budgets to reflect sound financial principles.

Furthermore, the Londonderry School District budget in fiscal 2018 was \$72 million, in fiscal 2019 it is \$73.5 million, in fiscal 2020 it is projected to be \$75.8 million, and in fiscal 2021 \$78.8 million. By fiscal 2021 the Londonderry School District budget will have increased almost another 10% since fiscal 2018.

Also, how can we justify the Londonderry School Board's request of somewhere between \$38 million to \$70 million to fund capital projects when our school enrollments

have been consistently declining over the years?

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Londonderry School District Renewing Technology, STEM Focus

As outlined at the recent Town deliberative meeting, the Londonderry School District is updating support for technology and is putting emphasis on STEM curriculum integration across schools. The concept of STEM education has been around since 2001. STEM curriculum, as put forward by the U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF), is designed to support educators and students. The STEM acronym is derived from certain key skills spread across today's global workforce culture - Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM).

Over the past 5 years, as lead by MIT educators and other prominent U.S. educational system leaders, the concept behind STEM has been evolving into "STEAM" to include STEM disciplines with added integration of the arts - humanities, language arts, dance, drama, music, visual arts, design and new media - video,

audio, graphics, and now beginning to leverage Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Virtual Reality (VR).

The Londonderry Times spoke with District Superintendent, Scott Laliberte, at the school district's town meeting deliberative and he told us, "Yes, we support the basic concept of STEAM and our schools have active programs that promote such critical thinking across curricula. And we are also rolling out more "blended learning" support as we update technology resources - as needed by students and staff - that are within our budget and current technology capabilities."

Blended learning integrates digital online connections or virtual media classrooms in ways that are also integrated with face-to-face teaching. This is also where STEAM and rich media content is becoming more important for education and student opportunities today - specifically in a disruptive job market that is transitioning workforce roles.

STEAM is actually not a new concept. People such as Leonardo da Vinci have shown us the importance of combining science and art to make discoveries. The idea of STEAM is also as a focus for critical thinking processes with an understanding that critical thinking can be based on a creative thought processes.

STEAM education in schools provides students with the opportunity to learn creatively, using 21st century skills such as critical problem solving. A STEAM focus in the school system highlights the importance of these skills in the future workplace. These capabilities are crucial to growing a future-ready workforce that understands the potential of "what if" when solving problems that occur in real life. They also point us in the direction of key skills needed for our kids to be successful - connection, care, community and cul-

ture.

The idea and definition behind STEM in the Londonderry School district is to create lessons that are cross-curriculum, involving multiple subject areas at a time. These lessons provide hands on learning and are often project based. Students will use a design process to explore an existing curriculum in order to encourage student led problem solving, creativity, and perseverance across multiple disciplines. The District STEM Leadership Team created this definition specifically for the Londonderry School District.

STEM (or STEAM) plays an important role in the Londonderry Schools because it supports college, workforce and career ready goals. In a STEM (STEAM) lesson, students are guided to solve real life problems using their own designs so they can learn to persevere when things don't work, or ideas are running

flat. The Londonderry School District guides students to "own their projects" and the products or solutions that they create. Students are also directed to learn the art of practice when it comes to the redesign portion of a STEM (STEAM) lesson.

Londonderry schools currently have students in grades K-12 working with STEM (STEAM) curricula. For example, LHS students' classrooms and school organizations are working on robots and rockets while history and physics students collaborating with them to create project launchers. At LMS, there is a STEM (STEAM) class curriculum for all sixth-grade students to experience over the year.

All three Londonderry elementary schools are conducting STEM days/weeks/assemblies and there is a BOSCH funded Electronics Club. Elementary school kids are also experiencing the Hour of Code through the Math

Enrichment program. At Moose Hill, Kindergarten students are even working on STEM (STEAM) projects that may directly relate to child hood stories like building houses for the "Three Little Pigs" where the big bad Wolf is not able to blow them down!

Another important aspect of STEM is developing relationships with businesses throughout the Londonderry community. The Londonderry School District is thankful to be working with different companies located in the community and across the region.

The current technology budget set by the School District, as articulated at the town meeting for FY 2020-21 is \$867,425. The school district balances needs vs. funding to support Londonderry school students with access to the right tools they need to learn from in our fast growing, evolving technology-driven culture.

And she knows the townspeople, having watched Londonderry grow and reported on our daily trials and triumphs as the owner/publisher of this paper. Deb will bring valuable experience and a fresh perspective to the Town Council.

police department's perspective, he thought things went reasonably well, with voter being able to get in and out of the polling station in about 20 minutes. Saying this was due to the traffic flow configuration and the new electronic check-in system.

They also discussed the upcoming Presidential Election, saying that there would be a series of meetings to prepare for that.

After that, the chairman opened the floor up for public comment on the subject, and resident Tammy Siekmann was the first to address the vendor issue.

She started by show-

ing the council some pictures that had been taken of the tent set up outside the polls, and then asked Farrell how the vendor situation came about without any public knowledge.

Farrell admitted that he was out of the state that day, but his understanding was that this vendor contacted the town hall and the town clerk and asked if he could put up the tent, and was told no by the town clerk. The Town Clerk is John Farrell's wife, Sherry Farrell.

He went on to say that the vendor was told by the clerk to ask the Town Moderator, Tom Freda, and he also said no to this request.

Farrell went on to say that he had learned later

in the day that the State Attorney General's office had gotten involved, and he told the vendor that the property owner has the final say on if someone can sell at the polls.

Farrell said, Business Manager, Peter Curro was contacted at the school, and without any conversation with the Town Manger, the Town Moderator, the Town Council, he said my understanding was the School Board and the Superintendent were not notified, as well and the vendor was told they could put their tent on the premise and sell this gear.

Farrell again reiterated that he was not there, but heard that someone from the AG's office was at the polls said, "They let them put it out there?"

That's not a good idea."

Siekmann responded by asking that in the future if there is something happening that the town is aware of, the moderator should be sharing that knowledge with both republicans and democrats.

She also said that Londonderry State Rep, Al Baldasaro, was running around while this was going on, talking to the moderator, and no one on the democratic side was given any information. "There needs to be better communication," she added.

Siekmann compared what was going on outside the polls to a carnival, saying, "It made us look really bad."

Town Manager Kevin Smith mentioned that he had talked to Peter Curro after the election and was told no vendors would be given permission to sell during elections moving

forward.

Mack Leathurby, a resident and Londonderry Times writer also spoke, saying, "What's to say, moving forward these product sales couldn't turn into a bartering thing related to voting. It's just a slippery slope."

He also supplied the council with pictures of people chasing voters across the parking lot arguing their political views, and this added to the circus-like atmosphere.

Resident Adriana Komst pointed that while she knows the moderator is in charge of what goes on inside, and it's not the police department's responsibility to manager who is allowed in the caged area in front of the polls, this is an area that can be improved upon in upcoming elections.

Farrell then asked Chief Hart to clarify what

the police department's role is during the election.

Hart was visibly uncomfortable about the situation, saying, "There has been a devolution of behavior on the part of human beings, be they republican or democrat, over the last 10 or 15 years. So what might be considered polite behavior in 2000 is now considered political advocacy. What the police do is protect others from physical harm, so that people who wish to vote have that opportunity without intrusion."

Hart added, "What might be harassment to one, might be free speech to others, so we encourage polite behavior."

Farrell ended by saying there would be a series of workshops with the moderator and police involved to see if they can make the process better in the future.

the contamination at the Appletree Mall area? What was the source of the Appletree Mall water contamination and when did it happen? What can be done to connect residents with clean public water supply sources for their homes? Who will pay for updating water lines? What grants could the Town apply for to help residents get public water connections with viable cost offsets?

Who in the town should have their wells tested for PFAS, PFNA, PFOA and PFOS contami-

nants now? And who is going to pay for this testing or is there a source for low cost water testing that residents should use? What are the health hazards exactly for PFAS, PFNA, PFOA and PFOS contaminants? What about the NH State laws supported by DES that specifies levels for these contaminants as unsafe that is now under litigation?

There are many more questions and DES will have answers for many of them though some answers are work in progress or will need further investigation to find the facts, or to know what actions can be taken and when they can

be taken.

The Londonderry Times discussed the Londonderry water contamination issues with Town Administrator, Kevin Smith about the Town's role in this situation. Smith reported he will be meeting with representatives of the Lancaster-Baldwin Neighborhood Committee that has been impacted by the Appletree Mall Water issues on March 1st before the Town Council meeting to align status and discuss specific issues with them. Smith has also been in communications with other Londonderry residents affected by the Saint-Gobain water con-

tamination issue.

Smith told the Londonderry Times, "As I mentioned, with regard to the Town's role in all of these PFOA/S contamination issues, our chief concern is that the residents ultimately are given a permanent solution to ensure they have clean drinking water. While it's important to note that NHDES is the lead agency on all of these matters, the Town, working through its attorney, will do all it can to leverage state and federal dollars to meet this goal, as well as hold the responsible parties accountable for the role they will be expected to play in miti-

gating the contamination they may have caused. It would be our hope that any funding we are able to receive could be used toward a permanent solution of providing a municipal water supply to the affected wells, in addition to offsetting the costs of future well testing."

With regard to the Appletree Mall water contamination - James Young, of Cooperstown Environmental, who has supported water testing for certain residents impacted by the Appletree Mall water contamination health hazard has provided the Londonderry Times with no updates that they can report at

this time. Young has asked that any resident questions regarding the Appletree Mall water contamination situation be referred directly to NHDES - not to Cooperstown Environmental.

Young told the Londonderry Times that the Cooperstown was not able to provide further statements at the time this story is to go to press but told us he felt certain information that had been printed previously was inaccurate. The Londonderry Times asked Young to provide any correction statements for our readers - though Young could not provide such information at this time.

tial district area from 50 feet to 7.1 feet and to reduce the front buffer from 50 feet to 14.1 feet.

Attorney Josh Lanzetta, from Dover NH and specializes in land use law, represented the applicants and he directed a presentation for the zoning board and the public for the variance requests. The Attorney first discussed the business variance request to allow a drive-thru window in the store's zoned district, which is prohibited. He brought several land use experts with

him to provide support for the engineering and environmental analysis, as well as for traffic study data that was positioned for consideration of the variance.

The Attorney stated, "We are not proposing to manipulate how this building looks or where it is located on this lot. What we are proposing generally is to put a horseshoe shaped drive-through on this property. The property itself is also heavily encumbered with a utility corridor for the electricity utilities in the area."

The legal and expert support team for the

business owner noted there are wetlands running along the south and the west side of the site. And these wetlands are associated with 50-foot and 100-foot buffers, as per the area ordinances. The current store parking lot is however about 7 feet from the wetlands area in its current layout condition. Most of the site and the store itself are within 60-foot buffer areas of the property parcel.

The plan for proposed drive-through is to support a 10-car stack with a bypass lane and be retrofitted with the existing building. The building would also be expanded for more freezer storage and a new dumpster area would be added. The lawyer went through the criteria with information that he positioned as appropriate for a variance to be granted by the Planning Board.

During the public hearing session, multiple residents came forward

to argue against granting the variances. Their reasons included - that increasing the size of the Dunkin Donuts products could lead to additional roadside littering, more traffic would be hazardous in this area and that conservation buffers for the wetland areas would be ignored. One resident said, "This plan fails all five criteria for granting a variance." Another resident who lives across the street from the country store, spoke in opposition to the request for the variances, and expressed concerns about traffic safety in an area that is already safety challenged.

After a lengthy applicant presentation, in depth public discussions from residents that did not support the variances and board deliberation - the members expressed concerns about the wetlands, how the conservation overlay that would be impacted,

changes to the character of the neighborhood, as well as traffic safety issues granting these variance requests not in the best interests of the town.

Board members cited that variance criteria as articulated in this case did not meet the spirit of the zoning ordinances for

this area. In the end the Planning Board voted by a majority for denials of all 4 of the variances. Thus, the business was not been approved with variances that would support business expansion for the site as per the design plan presented to the Londonderry Planning Board.

Lancer Wrestling Squad Sends Five Wrestlers to MOC's

The Londonderry High School Wrestling team will be sending five of their wrestlers off to state's Meet of Champions after they competed at the NHIAA Division I State Championship on Saturday, Feb. 22 in Londonderry.

Out of the 12 wrestlers the Lancer squad brought to the event, just under half made it to the championship round, thus allowing them to compete at the Meet of Champions next weekend.

A total of 14 schools attended State Championship at Londonderry High School on Saturday and Timberlane Regional High School was once again crowned the State Champions with a total score of 310.5 points. This was Timberlane's 19th Division I title since 2000, with the school's only loss in the last 20 years coming from Londonderry High School in 2015. Concord placed second with 271.5, Salem took third with 168, and LHS came in eighth place with 87 points.

The Lancers wrestling team left the mat that

afternoon with some positives, as one Lancer finished in second place and they will have a total of five wrestlers competing in the Meet of Champions. Nicolas D'Alessandro (113 lbs), Brandon Drake (132 lbs), Johnny McKinnon (152 lbs), Nicholas Walter (170 lbs), and Josh Bean (182 lbs) all punched their ticket to the Meet of Champions and will represent their Lancer squad.

Senior Nicholas Walter was the only Lancer to wrestle for first place in the state. Walter got to the Championship round by pinning Matt Breton of Salem in his first match, and then by pinning GJ Gimiranzi of Concord in the second round. Walter was matched up against Kyle Gora of Alvirne High School in the championship bout, where he lost by a technical fall, 17-2.

Brandon Drake placed third with a pin over Concord High School's Trey Fortier in the weight class of 132 lbs. Drake also had wins over Dan Ethridge of Bedford, a 19-7 major decision, and a pin over Ayden Spencer of Alvirne.

Drake was happy to have placed third, but has

his eyes set on the Meet of Champions. "It's going to be awesome, its going to be a pretty good experience. It's a lot of good wrestling we're trying to get better." He also went on to talk about how his team has battled all year. "We've been pushing towards the end of the season, we've been working on adversity trying to push through the season." Senior Brandon Drake went on to say.

Nicolas D'Alessandro earned fourth place in the class of 113 lbs. with three wins and two losses.

Josh Bean placed fourth in his 182-weight class. Bean had wins over his competitors from Nashua South and Exeter, but was pinned by Cooper Kelley of Timberlane in his first and last matches.

Lancer Johnny McKinnon placed fifth at 152 lbs. with a pin over Exeter's Gage Bolduc in the final match of his day.

Londonderry head coach Jason Cucolo was proud of all his guys for all the work they've put into their season, and especially happy for the five wrestlers competing in the Meet of Champions.



The fourth quarter had teams trading baskets until Manchester hit a buzzer beating three-pointer to end the game.


