Community Caregivers Need Publics Help With Location Change

n May 31, the Community Caregivers of Greater Derry/Londonderry lost their lease and had to relocate by Sept. 30.

This was an unsettling time for the organization, partly due to the pandemic. Those who rely on their services made it very much vital to continue without interruption. The "stay at home order" made it difficult to search for a new space, but the groups realtor, Scott Reiff, came through with a dream property.

Their new space is located in the historic Depot Square Office Building in downtown Derry and the Caregivers have leased the whole basement level.

This space was the for- Caregivers mer home of the Children's Metamorphosis Museum a number of years back.

The new space is much larger than their current location, 4,100-square-feet, it almost triples where they are now. Staff members will have their own offices, the Loaners Closet with have 900square-feet of dedicated space. They will also have room for a HUB-SCRUB and for equipment tune-ups.

There is also a 400square-foot multipurpose room that can accommodate support groups, clinics, meetings, and senior friendly education.

As this point, the organization is looking for help with everything from new toilets, to a refrigerator, and dry wall to doorknobs. "We need to hire a moving company. We need to convert a playground to an ADA compliant parking lot and install a handiaccessible capped mechanical entry door."

fter departing Manchester-Boston Regional Airport on May 1, New Hampshire students have traveled to more than 20 nations around the globe.

Through a flight simulator and streaming video, they've flown over the Eiffel Tower in Paris, traversed the Sahara Desert, visited the Taj Mahal in India, and skirted Mount Everest. But on Saturday, Aug. 15, the Aviation Museum's 'Around the World Flight Adventure' will return home to Manchester, where it all began 3 months ago.



being registered as Un- Anyone who has the http://sos.nh.gov/vvirus or been exposed to someone who has the virus or is concerned about exposure to the virus will be allowed to vote in both the Primary and the General Election by way of an absentee ballot. In most elections only voters who fall into very specific categories are allowed to vote by absentee ballot. However, this year (only) as a result of the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic anyone who desires to vote may apply for an absentee ballot and check the special Covid-19 exception on the application form. Alternatively, voters may also check the "disability" exception on the application form. Governor Sununu vetoed the bill that would allow for voting by mail in all future elections in NH. The exception for absentee votes is only allowed for the 2020 elections. An application for an absentee ballot may be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office at the Town Hall where you currently reside. You can find the contact information for your Town Clerk at the end of this article. You may also get an application for an absentee ballot on the website for the NH

Secretary of State at:

otingemergency.aspx.

In the event you want to vote by absentee ballot using this exception or any of the other exceptions it is highly recommended that you request your absentee ballot as early as possible. Late ballots will not be counted. Check with your Town Clerk to find out the deadline for requesting an absentee ballot and when your absentee ballot must be returned and received by your Town Clerk's office in order to be properly counted. At the discretion of the Election officials in your town drop boxes may be made available, but you must check with the Town Clerk to find out if drop boxes will be made available for absentee ballots in your town.

You may also contact the Town Clerk's office if you need to register to vote. The town websites all contain a lot of important information. See contact information at the end of this article.

In the event you decide to vote in person at the polls it is most important that you check with your Town Clerk's office to find out the location for voting in your town this year. Some towns have changed there voting locations due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Voter turnout in New Hampshire for the 2016 presidential election reflected that more than 78% of registered voters in the State cast a ballot. In April of 2020, there were 1,002,904 names on the voter checklist registered at the NH Secretary of State's office: Undeclared (Independent) voters numbered 377,754, **Democrats** numbered 323,430 and Republicans numbered 301,720.

The safety of all New Hampshire voters is a prime concern of all of the election officials involved in our elections. Everyone who is entitled to register to vote should register. You can learn how to register by contacting your Town Clerk. The State of New Hampshire also allows same day registration at the polls on the day of the election. This year 2020 is a big election year and it is most important that everyone who is eligible to vote cast a ballot. Every vote counts in our Country and this is an honor and a duty of all of our citizens.
