Mack Plaque Trophy Returns to Londonderry After Two Decades

Well it's been a long time coming, but Londonderry sports fans have finally seen the Lancers bring home the Mack Plaque Trophy as they won five of the eight sporting events last week against Pinkerton Academy.

The Mack Plaque games began

in the autumn of 1983 and the rivalry between Londonderry High School and Pinkerton Academy has been mostly dominated by Pinkerton.

The Mack Plaque games were named for Londonderry's Mack family in honor of its many contributions to both local schools over the decades. Londonderry won

Town Council Implements Lawn Watering Restrictions

The Londonderry Town Council opened up discussions on the recently approved ordinance that restricts lawn watering on Monday night, Sept. 28 after Councilor Deb Paul had said during the previous council meeting that she had some issues she'd like to address in the ordinance and wished to re-open it.

On Monday night Paul told fellow councilors that there were three things she'd like to adjust in that ordinance. She felt the fine for a third time offence was too high; asked that the

word municipal be put into the language regarding who the restrictions apply to; and she was concerned about the way the ordinance would be enforced.

Town Council Chairman John Farrell told Paul that because the Town has to abide by the criteria given to them by the state, there are some things they can and cannot do in regard to an ordinance.

He deferred to the town's Assistant Manager Lisa Drabik to give Paul some feedback on her concerns.

Drabik started by saying that they certainly could change the fine

amounts and all she would need is to be provided revisions that she would like, but another public hearing would need to be opened to do that. She added, "The fines that were included here just came out of the model ordinance that's provided by the state with regard to water restrictions, so I think they are the same as other towns."

In regard to enforceability, Drabik said that they would only be able to enforce the ordinance if police see that the water was on when it shouldn't. "It's more of a, putting something in

New Rules In Place For Fall Sports Spectators

Fall sporting events have begun for both Londonderry High School and Pinkerton Academy and with it come the new rules for those spectators planning on attending the games. The new rules for spectators for both High Schools' came out just in time to kick off the start of this year's Mack Plaque events.

Like all Division I high schools around the state, no visiting team fans will be allowed at the event site. For

Pinkerton Academy the decision was made to only allow immediate family of the student-athlete at a game. Those who attend games at Pinkerton Academy are asked to comply with the following while at the games;

- Home contests will be limited to immediate family members of athletes only

- Children must sit with their family the entire event

- Face coverings will be required at all times while at all game facilities

- Spectators must maintain a minimum of 6 feet of social distancing. Families may sit or stand together but should social distance from others.

- All spectators are responsible for screening their own health

Former Councilor Questions Social Distancing on Voting Day

During Public Comment section of the Monday night, Sept. 29 meeting of the Londonderry Town Council, former Councilor and current Democratic State Representative candidate Ted Combs stated that he had a number of problems related to the way social distancing was handled at the polls earlier in the month.

Specifically, he wished to have it explained to him why Republican candidates were allowed to set up their gated area near the entrance to the polls at the high school gymnasium, despite Londonderry Fire Chief Darren O'Brien's order to have all folks with signs set up near the Cable Access Studio.

Combs started by asking why the Chief's Safety Memorandum on Pen Restrictions was

rescinded during the State Primary, and when it was determined that a change was made.

Combs was reacting to a number of things he had seen on social media which stated that there was a legal action taken against the restrictions.

Chairman John Farrell said that he would let O'Brien respond to the issue he raised, but first framed the discussion with how it was enacted.

Farrell said, first there was a conversation with the party heads about putting everyone on the corner of Mammoth Road, but it was decided that it would be difficult for people to social distance and there would be traffic issues. They then decided to put them by the studio, but the Secretary of State intervened.

O'Brien further explained that he had

discussed it with the Attorney General's office, but the Secretary of State told him that they weren't allowed to do so.

"I was told that someone was going to be bring forth a lawsuit to stop that," Combs responded.

O'Brien confirmed that he had heard some threats about a lawsuit and how he was overstepping his authority by imposing restrictions. "I was just looking

for a way of trying to stop those two congregations of people right where people enter the building."

O'Brien also said that through talks with both the Attorney General's office and the Secretary of State he found that both agencies were in conflict on the issue, but the Secretary of State has the final decision. At that point, he said, he tried to spread the areas out and keep them away from people entering the

building.

Combs then questioned what power the town has in regard to keeping people out of that area in the case of another outbreak.

Farrell intervened by saying that as far as he knows, the town can't trace a case to the polls, so they're pretty happy with the way things were put in place.

When asked if in the next election, people in the pens will be required to wear a mask, O'Brien

said that he would have to check. Adding, that he cannot mandate people to wear them when they are going in to vote, since it would be hampering their rights, but he would check on whether he could make people outside the polls wear them.

Farrell finished by saying that the Town Council would stand behind any rules that the Chief decided to mandate at the next election.

place so people are aware that there are these restrictions and more likely to take action."

In regard to adding municipal to the language Drabik said that when she talked to the town's attorney, Michael Ramsdell said, "That as long as we are using the property for a governmental purpose, then it's been the law in New Hampshire for a very long time that Municipalities don't actually have to follow their own ordinances."

Paul responded by saying that she knew that, but if you are asking people to do some-

thing, you should lead by example. She added that who is to say that the Town Common is more important than the \$20,000 someone may have spent on hydroseed.

Paul also suggested that the fine for a third time offence change to \$500. "It seems like a natural progression, as opposed to a huge jump."

Farrell noted that in most cases, as long as residents comply, the town usually let the fines go.

Town Manager Kevin Smith backed up his statement by saying, "We do everything we can in the first instance to educate. We're not out there to try and

make money off of it, and try to beat people over the head with it. We just want to educate and have them do the right thing according to what the ordinance is."

Smith also said that he would make sure the town would be shutting off its sprinklers if the ordinance were to be imposed.

Drabik added that she understood Paul's point, but wouldn't want to handcuff the town in case an unusual circumstance came about.

Again, Paul stressed that the municipal lawn are no more important than residents lawns.

In the end, the coun-

cil decided not to make changes to the ordinance, but instead decided to impose the first level of lawn restrictions.

Those restrictions apply to both residential and commercial lawn watering and are:

- Lawn watering by odd numbered addresses is allowed on odd numbered days.

- Lawn watering by even numbered addresses is allowed on even numbered days.

- Lawn watering shall not occur between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m.

before attending events.

• Failure to follow guidelines will result in removal from event(s).

The rules for Londonderry High School are very similar with the only difference being the number of people allowed to see each athlete. Each athlete that plays a fall sport is given two tickets for their parents/guardians to attend an event. There will be no entry into a sporting event without a ticket. "We took into account how much each venue could hold and the social distancing guidelines to come up with 2 tickets per athlete, which is across the board, for all the sports we offer in the fall," explains Howard Sobolov, Londonderry's Ath-

letic Director. Sobolov also mentioned that the same rules apply to Londonderry's Middle School sports. However, they are not handing out tickets to each athlete, they are asking parents/guardians to honor the rules and limit the amount of people on the sidelines watching the games.

The rules put in place for the spectators are there to compliment the hard work of the athletes and coaches. "We are happy to have the kids out playing, it was hard with no spring athletics," says Sobolov. With Mack Plaque taking place the first week of play this fall season, the excitement around the rivalry would surely test the new rules for spectators. However, Londonderry hosting this year, and some of the games

having already taken place, Sobolov indicated that spectators have been "overall supportive and are just happy to have their kids playing."

There is some hope that more spectators might be allowed at Division I athletic events across the state with the Athletic Directors of all the Division 1 high schools meeting further into the fall to re-evaluate the number of fans allowed at each site to watch athletic events.

For those unable to attend home games at Pinkerton Academy some games will be available by stream at NFHSNetwork.com. Those unable to attend home games at Londonderry can watch via their athletics YouTube channel where most games are available to be streamed as well.

the plaque in 1990, 1996, 1997, 1999 and 2000. The schools tied for the plaque - leaving the trophy at the school that won it the previous fall - in 1986, 1992, and 2001. Every other year Pinkerton Academy has won the event.

Editorial

Fire Safety All Year

Oct. 4-10 is Fire Prevention Week this year's theme is "Serve Up Safety in the Kitchen", many fire departments are figuring out how to get information out to the public to educate them. If this was a normal year the month of October would be filled with open houses and events to emphasize fire safety.

"Cooking continues to be a major contributor to the home fire problem," said NFPA Vice President of Outreach and Advocacy Lorraine Carli. "The good news is that the vast majority of these fires are highly preventable."

Nearly half of all home fires involve cooking equipment, with unattended cooking being the most common, according to the NFPA.

This year's messages is about never leaving cooking unattended, keeping flammable objects such as towels and food package at least three feet away from stovetops, and not using stoves while sleepy or after consuming alcohol.

It is so important, to reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan. And the importance of having smoke detectors in every bedroom. Fire officials note, that half of home fire deaths result from fires reported between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., when most people are asleep. They also say that having a working smoke alarm cuts the chances of dying in a reported fire by half.

Other tips: Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from

each room and a path to the outside from each exit. Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out. Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them. Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find. Close doors behind you as you leave this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.

Your local firefighters are ready to talk fire safety to you anytime. With a fire doubling in size every 30 seconds, the importance of taking fire prevention seriously is a no-brainer.

Calling 911 is another focus of fire safety. With the prevalence of cell phones and the frequent absence of landlines, children and everyone else need to know where quick access to the phone is in the middle of the night.

As the saying goes, they're the ones running into a burning building as everyone else is running out.

Help them out and keep them and yourself safe by learning fire safety and fire prevention tips, and putting them into practice, this month and every month.

Edward F. Ryan



Edward F. Ryan, "Eddie", died peacefully Sept. 22, 2020 at the VA Nursing Home in Tilton, NH, he was 89.

Ed served in the Navy from 1947 to 1951, deploying to the Mediterranean on the USS Fargo and Colleton. Upon being Honorably Discharged, he worked as a laborer helping to build the Callahan Tunnel, as an insurance salesman and joined the Revere Police Department in 1962. He loved being a policeman and dedicated the next 34 years of his life to serving the City of Revere as a Patrolman, Detective, and Shift Supervisor. He was an honest and compassionate cop who believed in giving people a chance, providing many a wayward person with a stern warning and an opportunity to change their lives. In 1971, he graduated from Northeastern University's College of Criminal Justice and then taught Police Procedures and Administration there to thousands of law enforcement personnel until 1983. In 1992, he ran an unsuccessful campaign for Mayor of Revere on the platform of saving the Police Department from neglectful and corrupt politicians. He retired as a Lieutenant in 1996 and enjoyed walking Revere Beach with a good cigar, reading, playing poker in his basement with friends and traveling the world.

He quietly took care of his neighbors wherever he lived, providing meals, trips to the store, companionship and whatever help he could procure when needed.

He was a great storyteller who found humor in life and told his stories with an easy charm that endeared him to friends and acquaintances. He will be sorely missed by his family, friends, and the staff at the VA Home who loved him dearly.

Born in Winthrop on Dec. 4, 1930, he was raised in Revere, MA where he lived for most of his life on Vinal St surrounded by family and friends. He moved to Londonderry, NH with his son and his family in 2005.

He is survived by his daughter Maureen (James)Tully of Peabody, MA, his son Michael (Deena) Ryan of Londonderry, NH, and his daughter Mary A. Ryan Blaney of Lynn, MA. Ed has 8 grandchildren, Ryan (Lisa) Tully, Meaghan (Corey) Cedorchuk, Bridget Tully, Cameron, Connor, Colin, Katherine and Maeve Ryan, and 3 great-grandchildren. Also survived by his sister Kathleen (Gerald) Amore of Revere, and his brother Kenneth (Cynthia) Ryan of Revere as well as many nieces and nephews. Ed was preceded in death by his parents Edward Sr. and Josephine Ryan, his wife of 33 years Noreen (Cunningham), infant daughter Linda & his brother Donald Ryan.

Lancer Football Carries Unbeaten Streak Into COVID Era

After winning its first championship since the late 90s last season, the Londonderry High School football squad was able to keep their winning streak alive with a convincing 23-14 win over rivals Pinkerton Academy in the annual Mack Plaque contest in Londonderry on Friday night, Sept. 26.

The atmosphere of the event was quite different this year, due to precautions being taken during the COVID-19 pandemic, only home team fans were allowed to attend the game, and limited tickets were sold to families this year.

In this first sporting event seen on the Lancer Park field since last year, Londonderry quarterback, Dylan McEachern, had an outstanding first game, leading the team with 207 yards rushing and 119 yards passing.

McEachern also had a 65-yard touchdown run, to complete the first LHA ball possession of the game.

The first Lancer drive of the new season was started when senior

Aiden O'Loughlin snagged an interception inside the red zone, during PA's first drive of the game.

The second touchdown of the game came by way of a McEachern 17-yard pass to Colby Ramshaw, who ran it in for six points, giving the Lancers a 13-0 advantage over their rivals in the second quarter.

Pinkerton quickly came back with two touchdowns of their own in the second quarter. One, on a Evan Wilson 41-yard run, making it 13-6, and the other was a one-yard run by Wilson followed by a Wilson two point conversion.

The half ended with a Lancer 26-yard field goal

by Jake Fawcett, making it a 16-14 LHS lead to finish the half.

The only points tallied in the second half were by Londonderry, and those points weren't until the 10-minute mark of the fourth quarter. Hayden Austin punched the ball in from the one-yard line to seal the deal for his team 23-14.

Londonderry had 365 yards of total offense to Pinkerton's 158 yards. LHS also dominated in Time of Possession, doubling up the Astros with just under 33 minutes to just over 15 minutes by PA.

The number of overall plays was also very lopsided. LHS had 60 plays while PA had just 33.

Londonderry will attempt to keep the winning streak going when they host the Salem High School Blue Devils on Saturday afternoon, Oct. 3, starting at 1 p.m.
