School Board Has Public Hearing on the Use of Surplus Funds

During last week's meeting of the Londonderry School Board, Chairman Michael Saucier took a vote to open the public hearing on the use of surplus funds for the purchase of computers a continuation from last meeting.

Business Manager, Peter Curro, spoke about the fund balance in the private sector, the retained earnings, also with him was John Conley, the Treasurer of the Londonderry School District.

Curro gave a history on the purpose of the surplus funds, the

release they are being used and to vote to approve the surplus funds on laptops and in the next meeting a vote would be whether the board wants to go ahead and actually purchase the items.

Curro went on to discuss what happened at a meeting in March of 2013 when the voters of the school district approved the use or the use of retained surplus funds recognizing the new RSA 198. This law allocates that the school board of each district in its annual report shall state in detail the additional sums of money, if any, which will be required during the ensuing fiscal

year for the support of the public schools, for the purchase of textbooks, scholars' supplies, flags and appurtenances, for the payment of the tuition of the pupils in the district in high schools, academies, and any nonsectarian private school approved as a school tuition program by the school board in accordance with law, and for the payment of all other statutory obligations of the district. Up until that point, school districts were not allowed to keep any fund balance whatsoever, the fund balance was derived by operations of **continued on page 8**

Planning Board Allows Six Month Extension on Dining Out Tents

During the Londonderry Planning Board meeting, held on Wednesday, Oct. 9, through videoconference, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, Town Planner, Colleen Mailloux, asked for the consensus of the board as to whether the town should allow a six month extension on the current temporary emergency permit that allow outdoor dining.

Mailloux explained that the current permit to allow restaurants to have outdoor dining

tents was recently extend until Oct. 31, but the Planning Department has received requests for that time to be extended again due to the fact that the COVID-19 Pandemic is still going on.

She further explained that after talks with the Londonderry Emergency Director, Fire Chief Darren O'Brien, they felt it would be prudent to allow the restaurants using outdoor dining to be extended for an additional six months.

Mailloux added that the establishments tak-

ing advantage of this extension would have to re-apply for the permit and have the areas being used inspected by the Fire Department. Snow load and snow removal is one of the big concerns for the temporary areas, as well as heating **continued on page 7**

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Athletic Director Proudly Shows Off Mack Plaque to School Board

At the School Board meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 6, Howard Sobolov, the Director of Athletics, spoke to the students and community about a few topics. The first was the recognition of the Mack Plaque, which he held proudly in his hands, showing athletes, residents and board members attending the meeting.

"It's been a long time since this plaque has been in Londonderry, in fact it was 1999, so I just wanted everybody to see what is actually looks like cuz you people weren't alive when this was in Londonderry the last time. See so now you know there is a plaque, and you'll notice that there is two screws, they screwed it into the wall at Pinkerton because they didn't think it was ever coming back here. So, you know what? Shame on them for doing that and hopefully its gonna stay here for many years to come," Sobolov said.

He also mentioned the coaches and players and stated what a great

hard-earned victory they had that fall in winning the Mack Plaque.

Another topic he touched on was to bring to boards attention to the schools' commitment to inclusion in meeting the standards of excellence developed by the nation panel of the Special Olympics.

Unified soccer coach Ann MacLean, a health and interactive physical education teacher and also coaches the school's unified basketball and track teams, who work alongside coworker and fellow coach Ashley Tebbetts, who is also a health and physical education teacher at Londonderry High; applied to the Special Olympics NH this past summer.

The application was to earn the designation for Londonderry as a special Olympics Unified Champion Sports School, which they did. Londonderry met the criteria from the National Special Olympics Board to be designated per Sobolov.

Sobolov then added that in going onto the ESPN website to read about the Patriots, there

was a story on the website that recognized all schools around the nation as Special Olympics Unified Champion Schools and Londonderry was listed under New Hampshire.

He also added what a great achievement having some fall sports in session, thanking the community, athletes, coaches, and fans, for "embracing" the protocols, adhering to the guidelines, and rallying

the teams.

He is hoping that all the commitment and motivation as well as hard work will keep the Mack Plaque in Londonderry, as well as thanking everyone for working in unity during this time.

Sobolov made note that the games are also live-streamed and can be seen on the community website if you cannot get to the games. Go onto the ESPN web-

Samuel A. Low, 93, of Derry, NH died peacefully at the Elliot Hospital following a period of declining health. He was born in Derry on March 12, 1927, the son of Arthur and Lena (Pearson) Low and was a lifelong resident of Derry. Sam attended Derry schools, graduating from Pinkerton Academy, Class of 1945.

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Rape Investigation Leads to Fire Chief Committing Suicide

Londonderry resident and Manchester Assistant Chief, Brendan Burns, was accused of rape last month and was under investigation by the Londonderry Police Department. On Wednesday, Sept. 30, Burns' body was found in the Frederic Cutter Merriam Conservation Area in Pelham after taking his own life.

According to his obit-

uary, Burns, who was 45, was a long-time resident of Merrimack before moving to Londonderry where he became an active member of the community. Burns was the Executive Vice President of Softball for the Londonderry Athletic Field Association, President of Londonderry Lightning travel softball league, Londonderry Middle School softball coach, and a New England Fusion Fast pitch 16U coach.

According to a Londonderry Police Department Incident Report, Burns was to be charged on two Sex Crimes against the same individ-

ual. The charges were listed as Aggravated Felonious Sexual Assault - Physically Helpless Victim; and Aggravated Felonious Sexual Assault - No Consent.

According to police, detectives arranged to meet with Burns after they had investigated the rape allegations against him. Those allegations were made by a woman who he had drinks with on Tuesday, Sept. 22.

In that Incident Report, police reported having interviews with the victim and her friend, reviewed video from inside and outside her home, police interviewed employees at the restaurant where they were together, along with video there, had a rape examination kit, and a transcription of a

one consent phone call, approved by the New Hampshire Attorney General's Office, in which the victim spoke with Burns.

The report details how it was discovered through the home's video, Burns enters the victim's home after having drinks with her and took advantage of her inebriated state to have sex with her.

The report also contains information on a recorded phone call that happened after the alleged incident, where Burns admits to the sexual incident, but added that it was because both were very drunk, and he apologizes repeatedly.

After the phone call, on Tuesday, Sept. 29, detectives contacted Burns and requested a meeting. The report said

Burns agreed to meet with police that day, but did not show up for the meeting. Police were unable to reach Burns later in the day and a warrant was issued for his arrest on the two charges.

The next day, a member of Burns' family reported him missing.

Police put out a be-on-the-lookout call for Burns and began tracing possible credit card purchases, pinging his cell-phone for locations, and utilizing OnStar on his GMC pickup truck to find the vehicle.

His phone and truck were located in the Pelham conservation area on Wednesday, Sept. 30 by Pelham Police. Burns' body was later found near the truck with a suicide note and a handgun according to the report.

Jenelle, who is an Occupational Therapist that works with children, and was excited to help and has helped to determine the best equipment to add.

Domestic Violence Awareness Month

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Although our towns have very little crime, at least when compared with other cities and towns, offenses such as domestic violence have remained constant over many years. Domestic violence is defined as, "Violent or aggressive behavior within the home, typically involving the violent abuse of a spouse or partner." Though the majority of cases seem to be violence against a wife or female partner, there are also many cases of harm and abuse that come to husbands and male partners.

Thousands of women and men live with domestic violence day to day, afraid to report their situations to the authorities. Unfortunately, it is likely that the prevalence of domestic violence in our own towns is much higher than what is reported for a number of reasons, ranging from fear of not being believed to being brainwashed into believing that the situation is the victim's fault. October is Domestic Violence awareness month, and it is crucial to bring more awareness about what domestic violence is and how the cycle can be broken. Domestic violence involves willful intimidation, physical assault, battery, sexual assault, and other abusive behavior perpetrated by an intimate partner against another.

This violence often escalates from threats and manipulation to verbal abuse to physical violence. This violent behavior not only directly harms

the victim, but it also affects any children living in the home. According to the National Network to End Domestic Violence, approximately 15.5 million children are exposed to domestic violence each and every year. These children will likely grow up experiencing mood disorders such as anxiety, anger, and may even grow to perpetuate the behavior that was impressed upon them from a young age, thus continuing the cycle of domestic abuse.

Some signs that you or someone you love may be involved in a domestic violence situation include: feeling trapped, chronic humiliation from a partner, verbal insults, physical violence, controlling behavior from a partner, unpredictable mood swings, alienating friends and family, and manipulation to name a few.

If you or someone you love is involved in a domestic violence situation, it is important to report your situation as soon as humanly possible. Local authorities and abuse help hotlines are able to assist with removing the abuser from the situation and in helping victims find resources ranging from places to stay to legal help and advice.

Domestic violence is as brutal as it is unnecessary, but it does not have to be a way of life for those who are currently suffering. If you see something, say something. Together we as a community can help put a stop to the cycle of abuse.

Important Votes This Year

With the election less than a month away, it is important to see how our Representatives voted on issues important to us. I am a Democrat and I know that my choice of legislative issues below may not be your choice. I do hope, however, that many of you care about keeping firearms away from those who may pose an immediate risk to themselves or others;

that taking care of our family is important to our community too; and that global climate change is an issue we can no longer ignore.

With that in mind, let's look at three bills that came before the New Hampshire House this year. First, "HR 687 AN ACT relative to extreme risk protection orders." The language of the bill says "the general court finds that allowing family or household members or law enforcement officers to petition for a court order to temporarily restrict access to firearms by individuals who are found to pose an immediate risk to themselves or others would advance public

safety." Here is how our Londonderry Representative voted on this bill - Baldasaro, Dolan, Lundgren, McKinney, Packard, and Thomas Nay. Warner Yea

Result Governor's Veto Sustained

Next, "HB 712 AN ACT relative to a family and medical leave insurance program". The bill language say "The general court finds that family and medical leave insurance will help New Hampshire attract and retain workers, including younger workers, will enable parents to bond with biological, adopted, or foster children, will help meet the needs of an aging population, will advance the health of New Hampshire's workforce and workplace stability, and will enhance worker retention and productivity. The general court therefore finds that it is in the public interest to establish a system of family and medical leave insurance (FMLI) with benefits to be provided to qualified

workers on a limited basis." Again, here is how our Representatives voted: Baldasaro, Dolan, Packard, and Thomas Nay. Lundgren, McKinney not voting excused. Warner Yea

Result: Governor's Veto Sustained

Finally, "HB1664 AN ACT establishing greenhouse gas emission reduction goals for the state and establishing a climate action plan." And from the Act "Climate change has a demonstrated and researched-backed impact in New Hampshire and around the globe on human health and safety, including increased natural disasters and

increased, intensifying extreme weather, causing damage to ecosystems, agriculture, forestry, social systems, and infrastructure; increased risks of waterborne and foodborne diseases, increased risks of vector-borne diseases, and increased range and distribution of disease-carrying insects." and allowing emergency egress if sides are put on the structures.

She asked if the board would be comfortable allowing the Planning Department staff to handle these permits administratively as opposed to having businesses appear before the Planning Board.

She said that even though the Governor has lift the restriction on 50 percent occupancy and now allows 100 percent, many of the restaurants in town are still at 50 percent due to the

six-foot social distancing guideline.

Member Ann Chimpa asked Mailloux if she is seeing any of the establishments are exceeding their original capacity now that they have the extended outside dining.

Mailloux responded that if restaurants are constructing plexiglass shields inside to maximize their space, the tents would need to be removed.

The board's consensus was that they would allow the Planning Department to continue handling these permits on their own.

Continued from page 1 that year and was automatically returned in the form of revenue for the ongoing December tax rate. Members of the Association of School Business Officials or ASBO and New Hampshire Scholl Administrators Associates or NHSAA had gotten together and explained to the State officials the benefits of schools being able to keep surplus funds. That was when the RSA 198 was approved by the State and that it had to be enabled by each local district.

At the time this was approved, school districts could keep up to two and a half percent of the net assessment; the net assessment, taking all the revenues minus the budget. In other words, all appropriations the net to be raised or the net assessment.

Depending on the net assessment the districts could keep up to two or a maximum of two and a half percent of the net assessment. Recent legislation has changed that to five percent; however, the proposed warrant article still needs to be voted in. Curro them referred to RSA 32, which talks about the way in which, as in this case, the process in which school districts can use surplus funds.

The district has to identify a need or an emergency, again in this case the need for additional equipment due to the pandemic; it wasn't planned during the budget process due to the needs not being warranted at the time.

The recommendation from the school administration was to use the fund balance or surplus funds or unassigned fund balance for this purpose and not use any money from the general fund.

Now that the need has been identified, the process is to bring the issue up to the School Board, who would then vote the approval of using the surplus funds and instruct the superintendent to send an application or a letter to the Commissioner at the Department of Education (DOE) to allow the fund balance to be used for the particular purpose.

There were three factors stated by Curro as to why ASBO and NHSAA strongly recommended and allowed the school districts retain fund balances. One was financial planning, two being a sum of money available for emergencies, using this as an example, but also for emerging convergence. An example for this Curro used the power line at the High School, when that happened in June, it wasn't \$100,000 cost they expected, but was \$500,000, that would have put the budget into

a deficit. "That would have been a perfectly legitimate and legal reason to then go and use surplus funds for that purpose and the other is for the mitigation of financial risk and what that means is, Steve (Young) and I are the only ones that have been here long enough over the years when we've had several bonds or we've sold and treasurer knows about this too when we've sold bonds on the latest ones being for North and South schools when we changed over from the portables to the I'll say permanent construction the red flag the only red flag that the rating agencies would raise is the lack of surplus funds that the District retains."

This led to Peter Curro explaining that at that time he was not able to retain surplus, even though he wanted to, and needed to, for interest rates to be lower on bonds and notes. He

reiterated how hard he and his department worked along with the Treasurer, John Conley, to keep the District in a good financial.

Therefore, the District has a fund balance and why at the last School Board meeting it was recognized and supported to keep a minimum of 1.1 million retained.

Curro went back to the reason for this public hearing was to recognize that if the board believes that the equipment being requested by the administration is necessary.

Member Steve Young was concerned about the cost, \$500 per laptop, the need of 150 for students to use and the lack of a purchase order showing the Vendor, the actual purchase price, how many laptops and that it will not exceed \$75,000.

Peter Curro responded with what the public hearing's purpose was; if the board agrees with the administration to

purchase additional equipment that the source of funds is from the designated fund balance or unassigned fund balance. "I mentioned what the process says, the board the local board has to approve it first then it goes up a letter has to go up from the Superintendent to the DOE Commissioner, requesting to release the funds from surplus a little bit more is we cannot purchase the computers in this case without the funds until authorization is approved. "That is one of the things that's very clear, so we couldn't have bought this in September."

Saucier, came in to finish the public hearing with how he needed to procedurally take a vote to close the public hearing with motion to approve Peter Curro to go to the State DOE for funds. The School Board members voted 5-0 in affirmation.

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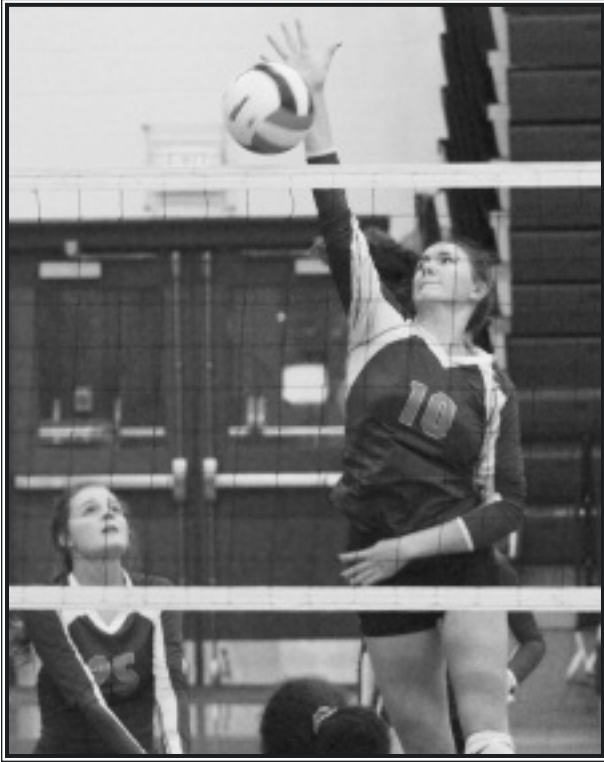
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Lady Lancer Volleyball Team Chalks Up Two More Wins
