A FREE Weekly Publication Planning Board Discusses Change to Elderly Housir

he Londonderry Planning Board met on Wednesday, Oct. 14, and discussed eliminating the elderly housing ordinance.

The ordinance put in place a number of years back, gave developers incentives to build 55 and older housing. The town put in place the ordinance as a means to help relieve the pressure of school age children and give the 55 and older community an affordable option for housing. Now the Planning Board is pushing for the amendment to the zoning ordinance for the elimination of the elederly housing.

the ordinance coming who is in favor of elimibefore the Planning Board is due to the unintended effects of the ordinance, which is mainly the affordability aspect of said housing. Due to the incentives for developers to create such housing, the prices for such housing have surpassed ordinary housing prices. The changes to the ordinance would take away the incentive of a density bonus and units per acre. This would give the developer a standard 1 acre with 150 ft. of frontage. The developer may choose to put an age restriction but will not receive any incentives for doing so.

nating the elderly housing ordinance. Verani in agreement with the fact that ordinance did not benefit the town as they had hoped is also in favor of getting more creative to supply affordable housing for the employees of the growing industrial community in town. Verani's concern is that the encouragement of industrial growth without supplying enough housing will negatively impact Londonderry. "It is hypocritical of us to say bring all your industry and growth and tax revenue and let surrounding towns deal with supplying our housing needs." continued on page 9

The Lancer Cheerleading Team hosted the first ever, virtual cheerleading competition in the Granite State this past weekend. The 603 Showdown took place on Sunday, Oct. 25, with 15 Varsity, Junior Varsity, Youth/Recreational, and Unified teams performing in the event.

The competition was sanctioned by the NHIAA and was judged by the Elite Spirit Officials of NH.

The Grand Champion of the competition was Dover High School with the highest score across all divisions.

The Londonderry High School Varsity and Junior Varsity teams were excited to perform at their first competition of the season, but did not compete in the first-ever

virtual competition since they were hosting the event.

According to Londonderry Spirit Head, Coach Chelsea Dennis, that with the start of the sports season beginning with not much certainty, a lot of talk among the area cheerleading coaches was about canceling the spirit season completely if competitions were not held, and with nothing to work toward. The COVID-19 restriction guidelines also prohibited some schools from stunting, depending on each school's Athletics Department, some schools allow stunting while others did not.
