Resident Addresses Town Council on Salary Cuts

Londonderry resident and former town employee, Dan Bouchard, addressed the Town Council on Monday night, Nov. 16, during public comment on the upcoming budget and setting the tax rate.

Bouchard said that he heard councilors mention some things

that he'd like to address. One thing was the Councilor Deb Paul talked about pay cuts, and was told not to go there, but Bouchard reminded the council

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School Board Approves Plan to Revert to Full Remote Learning

The Londonderry School Board met on Tuesday, Nov. 10, and one of the major agenda items that evening was on the school district decision to fall back to a fully-remote learning schedule for the remainder of the year, after Thanksgiving, and half the month of January.

Before Scott Laliberte, the Londonderry Superintendent spoke on the plan, School Board chair Michael Saucier addressed a question raised about whether the school district had the authority to make that decision.

Saucier said that he had Laliberte reach out to the school's attorney to ask whether the district was within their rights to do so.

He reported that the letter he received from the attorney stated that the decision lies with the superintendent, but that the school board could overturn any of his decisions.

Laliberte's presentation began with him stating that he is grateful for the way that teachers, students and parents have responded to the pandemic thus far, and said that they've been able to keep COVID cases down, which is a credit to the community.

"The decision to make a move at this point came about as a result of work that was done collectively by our entire team," Laliberte said. He explained that even though the decision rests with him; he is not making it on his own.

He also explained that when they first developed that plan of returning to school, the amount of threat to community spread was very low, it has since risen in daily cases per 100,000 to 182.4 in Rockingham County. He feels that anything over 100 is considered substantial community spread.

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December Tax Rate Up 3.71 Percent From Previous Year

The Londonderry Town Council held a special meeting on Wednesday evening, Nov. 11, to discuss what to do about the 2020 tax rate that was handed down to the town by the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration (DRA).

The reason for the meeting was to decide whether the town could help lowering that rate with the use of the Undesignated Fund Balance (UFB) account.

Town Manager Kevin Smith presented the preliminary rate that was given by the DRA for year 2020, which was coincidentally \$20.20 per thousand. The rate for 2019 was 19.39.

The town rate this year was \$4.75, up from \$4.56; the County rate is .86, down from .88; the school rate is \$12.66, up from \$12.04; the state education is \$1.93, up from \$1.91.

Smith said that what we have the opportunity to do at this point is to use some of the Undesignated Fund Balance to reduce the town rate.

He added that the tax rate also includes a loss of valuation of \$45 million from the Granite Ridge Power Plant.

Laliberte said that a major concern to the district is the fact that the holidays are approaching, and with that people will be traveling to Londonderry from other states and they have no way of monitoring whether or not they have the virus or need to be quarantined.

He felt that if they

have a short period of remote learning during this period, it would be easier to control things when they go back to in-school learning.

There were a number of students and parents being affected by the decision that came to the meeting to speak on the subject.

Resident Jamie Tucolo said that he thought the plan sound-

ed great, and mentioned that the idea of being proactive rather than reactive was a good one, but asked why couldn't the school wait until there is a problem before enacting the plan. He felt that going back to having parents home with remote learning would be adding a problem that doesn't exist yet. He asked that the school board take a vote to overrule the districts decision.

Member Jen Gannon

responded to the request by saying that the school board relies on trusting the Superintendent, "We don't have to agree. We don't run the school." She added that when the board micromanages the Superintendent's decisions it undermines his authority, and pretty soon, he'll be looking for another job.

Member Amy Finamore agreed saying that she fully trusts the Superintendents deci-

sions.

Londonderry Fire Chief Darren O'Brien spoke to the plan, saying that he fully supports to decision made by the school district.

Member Steve Young questioned the numbers being used to determine the severity of the pandemic, saying that the 10 per 100,000 number was established over six months ago, and since then many more people are being tested. With those numbers, the school has to take action when 25 people are infected, five if it's just the school population.

O'Brien responded

that not being a scientist; he just goes by the recommendations from the state.

Saucier said to finish that he supports the plan for students to go remote through December saying it gives them a better chance to finish the year in school. He added that even though he empathizes with parents, he trusts the decision by the school district.

The vote on whether to support the plan to go fully remote from Thanksgiving until Martin Luther King Day was approved 4-1, with Young voting no.

that a number of years ago all town employees did take a pay freeze during tough times.

He wanted to ask that the council be mindful of the fact that it will be the last one in that will be affected by any personnel cuts.

He also brought up the comment by Councilor Joe Green on not making cuts to Fire and Police. Bouchard felt that everything should be on the table at this point.

He suggested not filling positions of people who have retired.

He also suggested re-looking at eliminating redundancies and perhaps speaking to the

school on things that can be saved if they worked together.

Bouchard proposed speaking to them about combing health care insurance plans, saying that it was discussed years ago, but nothing ever happened.

Chairman John Farrell spoke to that issue specifically saying that the school district is not interested in having a conversation about that with the town.

He asked that the town look at ways to save money in this regard because the town insurance is very expensive.

Bouchard also added that he thought the snowplowing in town could be done in a more efficient manner.

He also added that

he thought it was commendable that Police Chief Bill Hart chose not to purchase an additional generator this year when it was pointed out that it wasn't needed. He said many people would just have spent the money rather than losing it.

Town Manager Kevin Smith addressed the insurance question he had, saying that the town and schools use different providers. The town uses Health Trust (Anthem product) and the school uses School Choice (Sigma product). He said that years ago they went through what could be done to help reduce the town cost with a consultant and found that the town couldn't do much better, because of the pool

Londonderry is combined with.

Smith also said that insurance costs for both entities were tied into the collective bargaining agreements, so it would take a monumental effort to meld them into one.

Smith finished by saying that he thought the town was doing as well as they can with insurance costs right now.

Also during public comment, Conservation Commission chairperson Marge Badois spoke to the council on a

brochure that the commission is planning to send out to residents who abut water bodies in town.

The pamphlet is called "Living Next to a Stream: How to be a Stream and Fish Friendly Homeowner," and it will be distributed people in town residents who live near a pond stream or river.

The brochure gives people tips on how to better co-exist and ideas on keeping the water clean.

Also at the Monday night meeting, a home-

owner at 15 Dianna Road was granted his request to receive a building permit on a Class VI Road.

That request was granted with a number with conditions. The homeowner will need to upgrade the road to NFPA 1141 standards. A survey will be done to locate the right of way. Permits will be appropriated. A Class VI Release will be signed by the homeowner, and a stormwater management and erosion control plan be designed.

John Farrell explained that the new figures comes out to an overall increase of 4.2 percent but it will seem like a seven percent increase when taxpayers get their bills this year because of

the fact that the July bill was based on last year's figures.

He further added that the Council could bring the town tax rate of \$4.75 per thousand by contributing through the UFB.

The town's Finance Director Justin Campo

was asked what the amount would have to be in order to keep the town's rate flat at \$4.56.

He answered the amount would have to be about \$920,000 in order to do that.

A lot of the discussion focused on making sure that there would be

enough in the UFB to cover any additional losses to the town in the ongoing negotiations with Granite Ridge on what the evaluation will be.

In the end, the council voted 4-1 to contribute \$425,000 from the UFB to drop the tax

increase by .2 percent, to an even four percent, which will mean that the overall increase will be about 6.5 to 6.7 percent from the July tax bill.

As an example: If a resident has a \$300,000 home the taxes due for the year will be 6,033. Last year that figure was

\$5,817, leaving the roughly 6.7 percent difference.

Councilor Deb Paul was the only no vote, she was in favor of taking more than what was settled on, hoping to keep the town portion of the tax bill flat.

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Going Green: Our Pets Can Be Environmentally Friendly, Too

We love our furry friends, but we often forget that they have an impact on our planet. Changing your pets' diet, properly disposing of their waste, and making smart choices with their toys and accessories can make a huge difference.

Pet Food: Choose More Than Beef

A 2017 study by UCLA found that meat-eating dogs and cats create the equivalent of about 64 million tons of carbon dioxide per year, which is roughly the yearly emissions of 13.6

million cars. Several dog food brands use beef as their primary meat, which is an unsustainable source of protein for both pets and humans. Instead of just beef, check your pet's food labels to see if the ingredients include animal bone meal and organ meat.

Although it may not sound too pleasing, this pet food ensures that the animal source that produced the food was used entirely. These secondary food products have the same nutritional value for your pet. As for treats, there are

countless recipes online for healthy and eco-friendly snacks for your pet. And if you have a green thumb, consider growing catnip at home.

Safely Dispose of Pet Waste

Cleaning up after your pet is another important way to be eco-friendly. Dog and cat waste may have harmful pathogens. Unfortunately, rain can carry animal waste into water sources and make people sick when not disposed of properly. Pet waste that gets into water runoff may also

lead to toxic algae outbreaks that could harm marine life, as well as humans and animals. So make sure to bring doggy bags when taking Fido out for a walk, and dispose of them in a trash can, not along the side of a road or trail.

Try switching to biodegradable products, such as litter made from walnut shells. You'll avoid all the dust generated by clay litter, get much better absorbency and very little tracking. You can also make your own kitty litter at home from sawdust, wood

shavings or recycled newspaper. And remember: Cat litter is not flushable. While some products may say they are, none have been thoroughly tested and deemed safe for septic systems. If you are unsure about a product's flushability, contact the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services' Waste Water Engineering Bureau (www.des.nh.gov).

Sustainable Pet Care Tips

- With so many options to avoid plastic, don't forget to do this with your pets, too! Many toys, leashes and pet beds are made from dye-free, organic, recycled and upcycled materials. Avoid toys, treats and products that come in excessive packaging, but when it can't be avoided, make sure to recycle what you can: cardboard and plastic treat contain-

ers; dog and cat food cans, rinsed off; separated paper and plastic portions of toy packaging.

- Donate your pet's old stuff. Drop off gently used items like toys, dog bowls, leashes, blankets and beds at your local pet shelter.

- Wash your pets outside in an area of your lawn that needs water, using nontoxic shampoos.

- When giving your pet fresh water, don't put the old water down the drain. Give it to your plants and shrubs instead.

- Use washable and reusable containers to store food and treats instead of plastic bags.

- Remember that it is UNSAFE to compost cat or dog waste.

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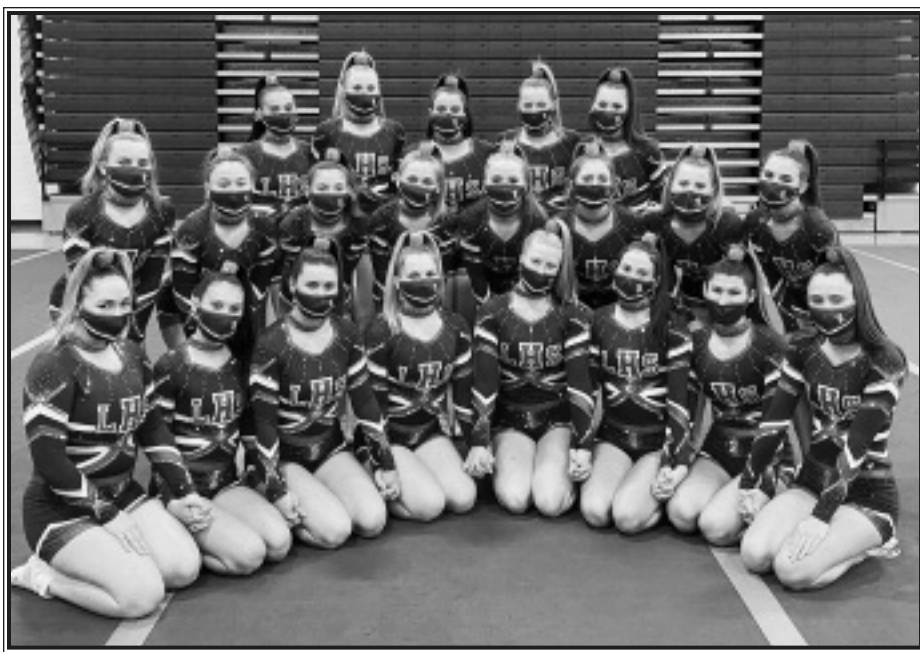

The Salem Blue Devils were a mere .4 points less with a 97.2 for third. Another .2 points separated the third and fourth teams with Londonderry taking fourth with an even 97 points.

Dennis commented on the season overall, "How lucky we were to be able to have a season this fall. We fought as hard as we could from the start. First to bring this season safely to life, and then to offer competitions for athletes across the State to get the chance to participate."

About the fourth place result, Dennis said, "These cheerleaders never gave up and refused to back down. We performed a routine with the most difficulty we've ever had. They accepted the challenge and executed it to the best of their ability. We couldn't be more proud of them and all we were able to accomplish this season."

Dennis also thanked the administration for the opportunity they were given this year despite the issues with the pandemic, "We are so grateful to everyone who made this season possible from the Londonderry School District to the NHIAA."



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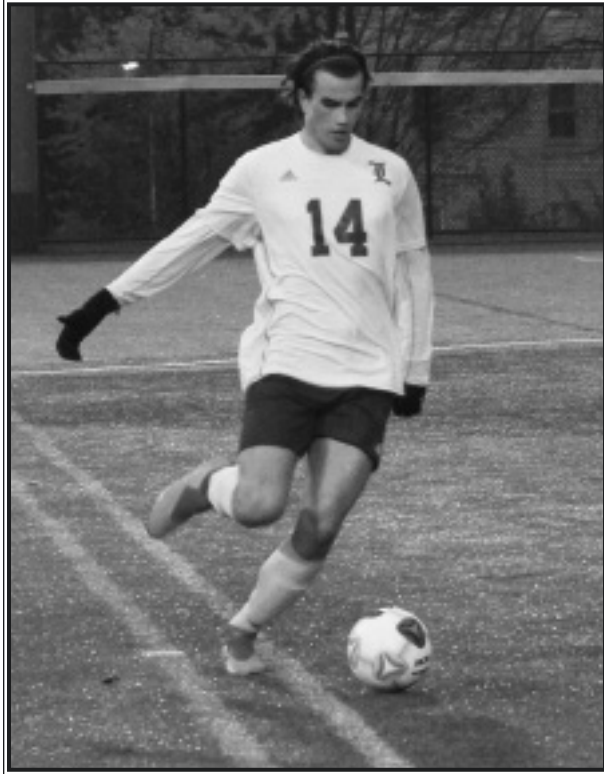
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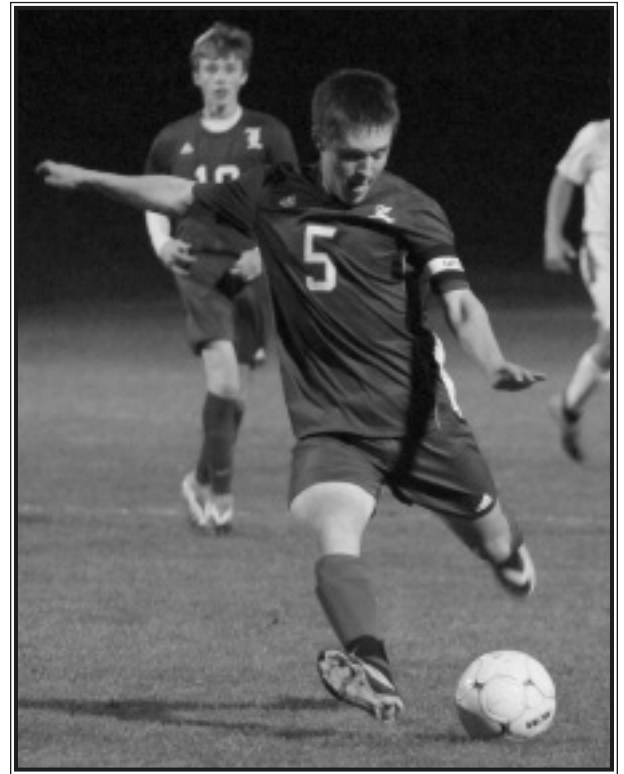

William Leo York



William Leo York passed away with family at his side at Elliot Hospital in Manchester, NH on Nov. 8. William, known as "Opa" by his family & as Bill by his friends & colleagues, was born in Canton, ME to Leo C. & Avis E. York on Nov. 15, 1935. He was predeceased by his parents and his sister Jacqueline. After attending schools in Boston, MA during the WWII years, the family returned to ME in 1945 & Bill graduated from Canton High School in 1953 & was voted "most likely to succeed" by his close knit graduating class.

Bill made the decision to serve his country & enlisted in the US Army reporting to Fort Dix, NJ for basic training. After his training, Bill was selected for a staff role supporting an Army Intelligence division & he reported to his new position in Frankfurt, Germany. Bill took pride in his time serving & the opportunity to be part of teams managing "safe-houses" that helped move scientists & educators from Eastern bloc countries.

During off duty time in Germany, Bill met Helga Oettinger, a young German woman. The two were often found dancing together, & spent time getting to know each other with the help of a German/English dictionary. They didn't know it at the time, but they were in the early stages of a relationship that would define the rest of their lives. As the end of his 3 year service commitment neared, Bill wanted to come back to ME & to bring his new fiancée with him. As Helga has always said, her life began when she met "her Billy".

Shortly after returning home, Bill and Helga were married in Canton, ME on Jan. 26, 1957. Bill enrolled at the Farmington State Teachers College & began work on his teaching degree. In 1960 Bill graduated from FSTC & took his first job teaching & coaching middle school basketball in Madison, ME. In 1964 Bill & Helga welcomed their first child, Ronald Joseph & in 1966 their second child, Susan Kimberly. In 1966 the family moved to Brunswick, ME & Bill took a teaching & assistant administration position at the Dike School in Bath. In 1968 Bill gained his Master's Degree in Education from the University of ME at Orono.

In 1969 Bill recieved the Principal position at Marcia Buker Elementary school in Richmond, ME. Bill loved the school & community & proudly served this role for 20 years, retiring from teaching & administration in 1989. Bill was heralded for his fair but firm approach in overseeing the school & for advocating for his teachers, staff, students & their families.

After retirement from teaching & administration, Bill went to work as a seasonal employee in the Returns Department at LL Bean in Freeport. Bill enjoyed this position & his co-workers thru the winter seasons for 17 years.

In 2007 after 41 years of living in Brunswick, Bill & Helga moved to The Villages, Florida where they enjoyed the activities & beautiful weather for the next 10 years. In 2017 they moved back to NE near family in Londonderry.

Bill loved the outdoors & was an avid hunter, boater & fisherman for many years. He took up the game of golf more seriously in his 20's. He became an accomplished player over time, being a 40 year member of the Brunswick Golf Club. He served on committees & the Board of Directors, & was one of the leaders of the daily "Gangbusters" group for many years at BGC. Bill loved the game, enjoyed his partners & had an knack for making "holes in one" as he had nearly 10 in his lifetime, the last at The Villages in 2016.

Bill is survived by his wife Helga York of Londonderry. Bill cherished their relationship & what they started in Germany became a 64 year love story. He also leaves his son, Ronald Joseph York & his wife Rachael York of GA; his daughter, Susan Kimberly Skov & her husband Conrad Skov of Londonderry; 4 grandchildren, Haley Skov of CA, Annika Skov of CO, Austin York & Eden York, both of GA. "Opa" was revered & loved by his grandkids & always kept up on their activities & accomplishments; he was always a comforting & supportive voice.
