The developer had modified his variance request from earlier meetings and was hoping the board would grant him the ability to build 45 homes where only 20.66 are allowed by the town.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment heard a case regarding a variance request to allow a single family house to be built on a lot with 100.58 feet of frontage where 150 feet are required during their April 20 meeting. The property is located at 8 Wiley Hill Rd.

Representing the owner Belize Real Estate Holding was Doug Macguire. He said that they originally submitted their variance request in December, and said that the case was continued to January because only three voting members were present.

He said that they went back to the Board and it was continued again.

"There were concerns about traffic at the intersection of Willey Hill Road and High Range Road," said Macguire.

Macguire said that

when they went to the were only two voting members so they decided to continue the hearing.

MacGuire explained that he met with the direct abutter, and said that they felt that the original home location proposal would be too close to the property line.

Because of this he said that he moved the location to be more centrally located on the property making it 93 feet of distance from the property line.

MacGuire explained that the property frontage is reduced by the abuttig property. He stated the abutting property utilizes frontage that isn't directly in front of their home to accommodate their frontage. Because of this it creates a different shape for his client's property.

He said that aside from the frontage they would meet all other criteria.



The School's SRO (School Resource Officer) took a report regarding an alleged sexual offense that took place off campus during off-school hours," the letter read. "The SRO submitted an "Offense #" which initiates the report and investigation. There is a "Location" sec-

tion on that police log, which references LHS, because that is where the report was taken, not where the offense allegedly occurred. In the future, the LPD will not use a school address in a report if an incident did not occur within the school building."

Loughlin said that she wanted the community to know that they are looking into what is brought up during the meetings.

"We want the community to know that we are looking into all these topics that get brought up during public comment," said Loughlin.






