Safety Committee Proposes Town Speed Limit Reduction

At the latest Traffic Safety Committee meeting held in mid-July, Chairperson Bob Ramsay began the meeting by proposing the committee vote to recommend to the Town Council a binding Warrant Article that would reduce the speed limit throughout the town to 30 mph.

The committee has been struggling over the past few years with what to do about the residents concerned with

motorists disregard to the current speed limits and Ramsay made the motion for the town-wide reduction.

The motion was immediately given a second and a discussion was brought forward by Town Manager Kevin Smith.

Smith said that he felt the article needed to be carefully constructed because he thought that a number of residents already think it's under 30 mph, and the article might have people thinking that we are raising

the speed limit. Smith added, "There's going to have to be a lot of education about what roads in town this actually affects."

Police Chief Bill Hart agreed saying he felt that there should be a number of safety announcements. He said, "Speed tends to be the single most common complaint brought to police department's attention right now. It has been for quite some time, so it seems to me that we should provide

Reopening Task Force Ends With 21 Recommendations

"Masks recommended but not required for staff and students" were the final words given at the end of a four-hour meeting that concluded the School Reopening Task Force on Thursday, July 29.

The meeting scheduled to take place on Aug. 3 was cancelled since the charge of the task force has been completed.

The task force heard from a large amount of residents during their previous meetings and came up with over 20 recommendations to the school board and voted on each of them to conclude their charge.

During the committee's last meeting, public comments were heard just before they voted on their recommendations, with many of the community members asking that the decision of wearing masks be left up to individual families.

All the recommendations that were voted on may change if COVID numbers go on the rise during the school year.

The committee voted and approved on the following 21 recommendations, which were passed on to the school district and will be discussed at the Tuesday, Aug. 10 School Board meeting.

Those recommendations are as follows:

Masks:

- Masks are recommended but not required for all staff and students

Visitors & Volunteers:

- Request masks for all visitors when in transit around the school buildings with the option to be removed when they meet their destination.
- Limit visitors as needed.

ZBA Approves Variances for Mobil Gas Signage

During the Wednesday, July 21, Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustments meeting one of the more lengthy cases heard was in regards to the Mobil Gas Station at 7 Nashua Road.

The four variances that they were seeking were continued from the previous meeting, with one of the variances asking to allow them to build a new sign for the business.

Representing the owner at the meeting was Peter Marsh, from

NH Signs, who explained that they wanted to be allowed to build a 48 square foot sign. Currently their sign is 38 square feet.

Marsh argued that they should be permitted to have that size of a sign because they were

Zoning Board Allows Property to Continue as Daycare

One of the cases heard during the Wednesday, July 21, Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustments meeting was in regards to correcting the zoning of a property at 40 Mammoth Road.

Daniel Muller, a lawyer representing the principal owner Mary Lou Brown, explained to the board that she has operated a daycare there for the last 16 years.

He explained to the

board that they bought the property in October of 2005, with the intention of operating a daycare.

The owners before they bought the property made an inquiry to the town of Londonderry to see if the daycare would be allowed. They were given a letter by the building inspector at the time stating they would be allowed to operate.

Based on that information they began operating their daycare business.

Over the years Muller said that they had to get license renewals every three years from the state of New Hampshire.

As part of the renewal process they also are required to get verification from the town stating that there are no issues with the zoning.

Muller said that they never had any issues getting the verification from the Town.

Recently they decided to sell the business and the property and when the potential own-

ers called the Town to make sure the zoning for a daycare was permitted they were told it was not.

It also meant that the current owners had to seek a variance to be able to continue to operate.

Muller argued that since they operated it for so many years without one that they shouldn't be required to seek a variance.

Londonderry ZBA chairman Neil Dunn said that he didn't know how they could dismiss the

requirement but said they could hear the application for a variance.

One of the abutters to the property is Jennifer Gray whose driveway enters through the daycare's parking lot. She said she is in favor of the variance being granted. She said that they never had any issues with them and if they are going to have a business on the property it is good that they close at a reasonable hour.

She also said that it is

good to have a daycare accessible in the area, and that her own kids went there.

One of the discussions was in regards to hours of operation.

Brown said she would be okay with the hours being what they currently are now.

The board ultimately approved the variance. The one restriction that they put on it is that they are only allowed to operate from

Monday thru Friday and the hours will be from 6 a.m. until 7 p.m.

some education for this recommendation."

Hart added that the educating before enforcing has always been the way his department has handled change of this magnitude.

He also said that overall, many drivers run between five and ten miles over the speed limit, so if the speed limit is reduced that should be about the same amount.

He finished by saying, "We need to be care-

ful. We need to be thoughtful, but we need to deal with the speed problems."

The discussion included whether the speed issue is just a perception issue with residents of if the speed limit reduction would help slow drivers down.

Ramsay felt that having the Warrant Article on the ballot would give residents a final say on how they felt about the speed people a traveling through the neighborhood.

The discussion ended with a positive vote on

recommending that the Town Council reduce the speed limit to 30 mph.

There was also a discussion about have signage off Harvey Road near Stoneyfield Yogurt alerting truck drivers not to drive south toward High Range Road.

Committee members also added that there has been contact with some of the GPS apps makers and have asked that routes be corrected for "No Thru Trucking."

Hart said that there is a company that works with major truckers and have input to the driv-

ing/trucking apps and he said it appears that it has had some impact.

The company will be attending a future meeting to reveal what their exact numbers are.

The sign idea was tabled until October.

Also covered at the meeting, Mammoth Rd., resident Steve Kelly attended the meeting to share his concerns with the intersection he lives at.

He said that most of the accidents he witnesses at the intersection of Mammoth and Grenier Field Road are due to drivers not pay-

ing attention. He said he big concern is the number of children that live near the intersection.

"You can put up all the speed limit signs you want, drop it to 30 mph, it doesn't make any difference, they're not looking at it anyways," Kelly said.

Kelly suggested installing a gate at Mammoth Road near the Grenier Field Road intersection.

Another suggestion, brought up by Ramsay, was to make that section a one-way road going northbound, but Kelly said that wouldn't solve

the problem since many of the accidents involved people traveling north.

Speed tables were also suggested to slow traffic down, but in the end Hart felt more research needed to be done and he thought placing traffic counters and forming a subcommittee would be the best way to go.

The issue was then tabled until October.

Speeding on Sargent Road at the LAFA complex was discussed briefly, and police will continue to monitor the situation.

Londonderry ZBA Approves Renovations For Office Building

At the July 21 Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustments meeting one of the cases that they heard was related to the property located at 213 Rockingham Rd., which is owned by Paula Gagne.

The case was in regards to four different variances. One variance was to allow them to encroach 35 feet into the 60 foot front setback for an existing non-conforming building and a proposed addition. Another variance would be to allow them to encroach five feet into the 30 foot side setback for an existing nonconforming building.

For the third variance they requested to encroach 13.7 feet into the 15 foot perimeter green landscaping buffer for a paved parking area. The final variance was to allow them to en-

croach 30 feet into the 30 foot front perimeter green landscaping buffer for a paved parking area.

It was explained by Karl Dubay from the Dubay Group who was representing Gage that she bought the property about a year ago to relocate her office there. He said that the existing building is about the size of the Londonderry meeting room. Their goal is to expand the office in the rear part of the building to accommodate a bathroom and conference room.

Dubay explained that normally they would've been allowed to do their proposed renovations without receiving a variance approval from the Londonderry ZBA, however it was required due to the fact that the lot is slightly under three acres of land which is the required minimum amount.

Because the expan-

sion would be set far back enough people wouldn't see it from the road.

For the new parking lot Dubay said that the current lot has a lot of pavement and as part of the renovations they will be removing some of it on the side abutters property line.

Dubay said that the owners have been cleaning up the site since they bought it.

"We're really making the situation look better," he said.

The board approved all of the variances without any restrictions.

In other news the Londonderry ZBA also continued two cases to its regularly scheduled meeting on Aug. 18

The cases were in regards to Rivard Pizza, LLC and Renegades Pub which is located at 103 Nashua Road.

For the first variance it would be to allow them to reduce the required 33% green landscaping area to 11 percent with the addition of an 8 feet x 12 feet extension to the existing patio. The other variance would be to allow them to encroach 32.2 feet into the 60 foot front setback for the additional roll up/down plastic barriers on an

existing patio.

Seven letters were sent in support of the variances being approved. They all said the same thing.

"The owners/operators of this establishment are hard working members of this community and have a successful business that generates jobs, and supports the local economy. Not only

are the owners known for giving back to this wonderful community in many different avenues but they have transformed the business into a thriving business," the letters stated.

"What they are asking for will help them and hurt no one," it went onto state.

Since they only had four members since ZBA

member Suzanne Brunelle had to recuse herself and they didn't have any alternative members present for the meeting the owners were given the choice of continuing the case. In order for a variance to be approved it requires three yes votes.

The next regularly scheduled Londonderry ZBA meeting is slated for Aug. 18 at 7 p.m.

Leach Library Receives Grant Funding for New Collection

Leach Library was recently awarded an American Rescue Plan Act subgrant for \$3,898 from the Institute of Museum and Library Services and the New Hampshire State Library. The funding will be used to offer a new Playaway Launchpad collection that will be available to patrons later this summer.

Donna Plante, Head of Reference and Technical Services, applied for the subgrant in hopes of expanding patron access to digital learning content through circulating devices. Playaway Launchpad tablets are pre-loaded with interactive games and apps

that do not require an internet connection.

Each rechargeable device features a different theme and can be easily navigated through a touch screen. Patrons can look forward to checking out tablets on a variety of subjects including language arts, math, critical thinking, and even dinosaurs!

The new collection will work toward the library's mission in providing materials that meet residents' personal, educational, and recreational needs.

Residents can check the library's website, Facebook, or blog for updates on the new collection's unveiling.

This project was made possible in part by the Institute of Museum and Library Services and the New Hampshire State Library.

given previous variances to have up to 65 square feet.

Londonderry ZBA chairman Neil Dunn said that they needed to clarify what the size of the sign could be.

"We needed more clarity on the sign because they keep getting bigger and bigger," he said.

Dunn also pointed to minutes from a 2006

meeting that stated that if the sign was bigger than 32 square feet it would have to come down.

Marsh said that since its 38 feet it must be a legal sign or otherwise there be an enforcement action against it.

Dunn disagreed. "We don't go around measuring every sign," he said.

Marsh asked if they would be okay with 38 square feet.

"I think that's some-

thing we would all consider," Dunn said.

Another variance that they were seeking was for an additional sign.

For the variance for the additional sign, Marsh said it would be used only for the convenience store. He said that convenience stores are crucial for gas stations because they have a small profit margin on gas.

Currently they have two Mobile signs which Marsh said it's needed for people to see it from either side.

One question that was asked was whether or not they would have the new sign lit up the same hours as the

Mobile signs.

Marsh said that would be the case.

The variance for the electronic message board was approved, but was given a restriction that it could only be used for the actual gas station, and can only be used for digits. It can't be scrolling or flashing.

It was decided to grant the variance allowing for a 16 foot sign where 10 feet is allowed without any restrictions.

For the variance allowing an additional wall sign, the board agreed to allow it but stipulated that it can't exceed 24 square feet and can only be illuminated the same hours the gas station signs are.

They also approved a variance which will allow them to have four feet six inches of set back where 15 feet is

required for the property line on Nashua road and for it to be two feet for the property line on Ela road.

- Continue to restrict in-building volunteers, but they are permitted to participate in outdoor activities.
- Social distance, if appropriate and it does not impede learning.
- In-person IEP/504 meetings, but offer virtual.
- No restrictions for special services visitors.
- Have a check-in.
- Request that parent volunteer activities take place outside.

Vaccine Privacy:

- Follow state law.
- Vaccine status remains private; ensure not to tether.
- Host the state to conduct vaccine clinics delivered by licensed professionals.

Buses:

- Refer to bus company task force policy.
- Maintain the highest cleaning standard.
- Buses to child care centers to resume.

Social Distancing:

- Full time, in person learning for all students
- When indoors, follow DPH guidelines for 3 feet distance if appropriate and do not impede learning.
- No cohorts except for Moose Hill.
- Allow interactions between all students.
- Request consistent staff supervision at recess, i.e., same staff monitoring the same area.

- Quarantine Policies:**
- All people that live and sleep in the same household will need to quarantine for 10 days following a positive COVID 19 test regardless of vaccination status.

Contact Tracing:

- Notify New Hampshire Department of Public Health if confirmed positive COVID 19 case at Londonderry schools.

Sports, Music & Clubs:

- Maintain clubs and sports as they have been running throughout the summer.
- Allow outside agencies to use facilities if they follow specific guidelines.

Communication with Families:

- Multi version communication - digital, paper, bi-lingual.
- Provide information on where to receive a vaccine and update when the vaccine is available to other age groups.

Remote Learning Options:

- Full time in person learning for all students.
- Exceptions made for students that have an IEP/504 plan.
- Ensure communication with parents to make them aware of this option and how to access it.

Nursing Policy:

- Nurses are to be made aware of pre-existing conditions of a student via a doctor's note.
- Strict sick policy - If new symptoms arise,

then parents are called and notified.

- Nurses to offer a list of symptoms that would trigger parent communication.

Dining Services:

- Students have the option to eat in various places
- Recommend to keep outdoor tents.
- Allow social interaction, encourage social distancing if appropriate.

Trigger points:

- Suggest that reopening task force remains as an advisory committee throughout the school year
- Formulate a matrix similar to that of Pelham School District.

Facilities, Maintenance, and Cleaning

- Ensure cleaning "introduction" to all students at the beginning of the school year.
- Purchase gentle and effective products and moisturizing lotion.
- Continue cleaning once a day unless there is a positive COVID 19 case. The exception to this is Moose Hill, cleaning twice a day, in-between sessions.
- Continue ventilation as a critical component.
- Open windows where appropriate for fresh air.
- Allow and encourage outdoor teaching and learning.
- Allow sanitizer from home.

ment is updated to include COVID 19 risk.

Addressing Social, emotional, and mental health needs

The district continues to hold student and staff mental health to high priority and remains committed to focusing on relationship building as schools reopen. District initiatives already in place to support social emotional needs include: social-emotional curriculum, advisory time, and a district mental health committee. Other actions the task force recommends are as follows:

- Monitor all students to recognize those that need additional social-emotional support. Explore resources/tools that may be helpful in this.
- Provide parents and students information

and connect them to mental health resources (including school staff such as school counselors and/or school psychologists and community mental health providers).

- Encourage the development of community-building activities for students and staff as well.
- Provide staff training and professional development regarding student social-emotional needs and self-care.
- Provide time for staff to collaborate with colleagues to ensure they have a support network.
- Promote tolerance around different choices regarding masks or vaccines. Establish respectful dialogue and an open, transparent, and safe process to

discuss differences of opinion.

- Continue to research the procurement of additional resources to support increased student and staff social-emotional needs.

Special Services:

- In-person meetings for IEP/504 plans, but offer remotely if needed.
- If the district needs to go remote, consider in-person services for all special services.

Addressing Learning Gaps:

- Follow the RTI model at all schools.
- Screening and assessing to meet needs of students.
- District guidance plan regarding Math and Literacy.

Youngest Learner (Moose Hill):

- No cohorts at recess.

On what turned out to be a gorgeous Wednesday, July 21, after predictions of rain and thunderstorms the three largest Over 55 Senior Communities in Londonderry teed off at Candia Woods Golf Links in Candia. This was the fifth annual tournament for The Nevins and Hickory Woods and the first year invite for Cross Farm.

All three communities were built by Mesiti

Development Inc. (and related companies) founded by the late Anthony “Tony” Mesiti. This is more of a social event for the men and women of the three communities to get to know each other but there is stiff competition for several golf prizes, raffle awards and the Mesiti Cup Trophy for the winners. The prizes are funded by John Kalantzakos, who succeeded Tony Mesiti as head of the development companies.

This year’s two person team match ups were no different than the previous four years in that most matches were very close. However, there was a winner with Hickory Woods recapturing the trophy for the third time barely beating their archrival, The Nevins.

This year the Nevins red on white colors and the Cross Farm grey on white colors was no match for the mighty blue on beige colors of

the Hickory Woods team.

The winning community gets to engrave the trophy with the year of victory, their name and proudly display it in their own clubhouse for an entire year or until they lose it to another team.

The Nevins has won the trophy twice and since it was Cross Farm’s first time in the tournament everyone is certain that they will win their share of tournaments.

There were four closest-to-the-pin prizes, awards to the top scoring team in each of the three communities and this year there were four raffle prizes. The rule is that no one person can win more than one prize and there is a specific order for determining awards to avoid any duplication.

The prizes were fairly even this year and finally one of the lady golfers did win closest-to-the-pin while another lady missed by 1 inch.

The tournament is coordinated by volunteer members of each community on a rotating basis and next year Cross Farm will have the opportunity to select the venue, format and date of the tournament. The golf outing is followed up with a generous banquet and unfortunately (this year) a long awards ceremony. This year’s tournament was the largest so far hosting 54 players including 8 women. The communities are hoping to interest more women in joining in on the fun, the competition and especially the organizing

to make the event bigger and better each year.

The Nevins was built in 2006 and contains 128 stand-alone units. Hickory Woods was built in 2014 and contains 98 stand-alone units.

Cross Farm is still under construction; about half complete and will have approximately 186 stand-alone units upon completion in about the next two years. These are probably three of the largest five individual communities of any kind in Londonderry and they share many common interests since all residents are over 55 years of age. By most participant accounts this year’s tournament was a success and many seem to be looking forward towards redemption next year.


