

Safety Committee Proposes Town Speed Limit Reduction

t the latest Traffic Safety Committee Ameeting held in mid-July, Chairperson Bob Ramsay began the meeting by proposing the committee vote to recommend to the Town Council a binding Warrant Article that would reduce the speed limit throughout the town to 30 mph.

The committee has been struggling over the past few years with what to do about the residents concerned with

ne of the cases heard during the Wednesday, July 21, Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustments meeting was in regards to correcting the zoning of a property at 40 Mammoth Road.

Daniel Muller, а lawyer representing the principal owner Mary Lou Brown, explained to the board that she has operated a daycare there for the last 16 years.

He explained to the

Also covered at the meeting, Mammoth Rd., resident Steve Kelly attended the meeting to share his concerns with the intersection he lives at.

He said that most of the accidents he witnesses at the intersection of Mammoth and Grenier Field Road are due to drivers not pay-

ing attention. He said he big concern is the number of children that live near the intersection.

"You can put up all the speed limit signs you want, drop it to 30 mph. it doesn't make any difference, they're not looking at it anyways," Kelly said.

Kelly suggested installing a gate at Mammoth Road near the Grenier Field Road intersection.

Another suggestion, brought up by Ramsay, was to make that section a one-way road going northbound, but Kelly said that wouldn't solve

the problem since many of the accidents involved people traveling north.

Speed tables were also suggested to slow traffic down, but in the end Hart felt more research needed to be done and he thought placing traffic counters and forming a subcommittee would be the best way to go.

The issue was then tabled until October.

Speeding on Sargent Road at the LAFA complex was discussed briefly, and police will continue to monitor the situation.

Londonderry ZBA Approves Renovations For Office Building

t the July 21 Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustments meeting one of the cases that they heard was related to the property located at 213 Rockingham Rd., which is owned by Paula Gagne.

The case was in regards to four different variances. One variance was to allow them to encroach 35 feet into the 60 foot front setback for an existing non-conforming building and a proposed addition. Another variance would be to allow them to to encroach five feet into the 30 foot side setback for an existing nonconforming building.

For the third variance they requested to encroach 13.7 feet into the 15 foot perimeter green landscaping buffer for a paved parking area. The final variance was to allow them to en-

croach 30 feet into the sion would be set far back existing patio. green landscaping buffer see it from the road. for a paved parking area.

Karl Dubay from the current lot has a lot of Dubay Group who was representing Gage that she bought the property about a year ago to relocate her office there. He said that the existing building is about the size of the Londonderry meeting room. Their goal is to expand the office in the rear part of the building to accommodate a bathroom and conference room.

Dubay explained that normally they would've been allowed to do their proposed renovations without receiving a variance approval from the Londonderry ZBA, however it was required due to the fact that the lot is slightly under three acres of land which is the required minimum amount. "We're really making the situation look better," he said.

The board approved all of the variances without any restrictions.

In other news the Londonderry ZBA also continued two cases to its regularly scheduled meeting on Aug.18

The cases were in regards to Rivard Pizza, LLC and Renegades Pub which is located at 103 Nashua Road.

For the first variance it would be to allow them to reduce the required 33% green landscaping area to 11 percent with the addition of an 8 feet x 12 feet extension to the existing patio.The other variance would be to allow them to encroach 32.2 feet into the 60 foot front setback for the additional roll up/down plastic barriers on an

Seven letters were sent in support of the variances being approved. They all said the same thing.

"The owners/operators of this establishment are hard working members of this community and have a successful business that generates jobs, and supports the local economy. Not only

for giving back to this wonderful community in many different avenues but they have transformed the business into a thriving business," the letters stated.

"What they are asking for will help them and hurt no one," it went onto state.

I have always believed that there are way more kind and caring people in our world than selfish and uncaring.


We are all different, and we all have differing views. The plain and simple truth is that we need to listen to each other with respect and kindness

Leach Library Receives Grant Funding for New Collection
