## **Town's Budget Workshop Reveals** Modest Increase in FY23 Budget

ondonderry Town Council Chair John Farrell advised there is "very little wiggle room" when it comes to its upcoming budget.

On Nov. 6, town officials met for a fiscal year 2023 budget workshop where concerns of continued pandemic challenges, along with maintaining a balanced financial forecast with taxpayers in mind - especially with an aging community as 1,000 properover the age of 55.

The season is rapidly ramping up to its frantic pace for overindulging on Thanksgiving and buying too much for Christmas. One of the nice things about living here is the generosity that comes out in full force during the holidays. Whether it's a free church-sponsored Thanksgiving dinner hosted and prepared for anyone and everyone who, regardless of their financial status, seem ready to dig into their pockets to help those less fortunate. As side note, recent national news stories report that wealthier people donate less of their income proportionately to charity than people whose incomes are lower.

Our pages are filled with announcements of coat, hat, and scarf collection drives; boot collections; food pantry requests; and wished for gifts for the needy. It starts young, with school children collecting pennies and clothing to help others, older students hosting more extensive collection drives, and adults contributing time, money or gifts to help "adopted" families not in a position to buy gifts for the holidays otherwise.


Local drives make it feasible for most people to help out. uring the most recent meeting of the Senior Resources Committee (SRC) on Tuesday, Nov. 16, a new regime was ushered in after the board's chairman, Rob Palmer, had recently resigned due to personal reasons.

With the reorganization, member Jim Green was unanimously elected Chairman and member Barbara Mee agreed to be interim Secretary pending those absent members who might want to be Secretary. The position of Vice Chairman position was left vacant for the time being.

There were a number of things discussed at the meeting, and one was about how many

individuals were currently members of the SRC and their individual status and remaining terms. It was determined Chairman Green that with assistance from Interim Secretary Mee would compile that information for next months' meeting. The members present agreed that all Londonderry residents, not just senior citizens should be encouraged to participate in the operations of the SRC even if they do not want to become members. The committee felt that there may be town residents who have senior citizen parents or grandparents living with them or living elsewhere in

town who would bring a different perspective to the working agenda of the SRC.

Although the SRC agreed to presently continue the meetings at 6 p.m. they are not adverse to moving the meeting time to a more convenient time to get more participation and input from those that cannot make the 6 p.m. start.

And now, her upcoming appearance as Clara in NEDE production of 'The Nutcracker' casts her in the spotlight.

Caitlin began her dance training at only two and a half years old; now she dances seven days a week.

After leaving school Caitlin attends a variety of dance classes at Londonderry Dance Academy, with rehearsals for Clara and The Nutcracker in between.
