This led the owners to seek two variances. One to allow an accessory dwelling unit in the front yard and to allow an accessory dwelling unit 108 square feet over what is allowed.

Xavier explained that they want to build the accessory dwelling unit on their property so his elderly in-laws can have

Xavier said that if they aren't able to build the accessory dwelling unit on their property it would be a hardship for them because they won't be able to use the property for all it could be used for.

"We won't be able to use the property to its full potential or what we want to use it for," he said.

He said that they won't be changing the exterior of the house in any way.

Xavier said that the

addition of the garage was built in the early 2000s but wasn't permitted as an accessory dwelling unit at the time.

He explained that the accessory dwelling unit would be 815 square feet, and would only be used for their family members to stay and not as a commercial use.

"It's an in-law," said Xavier.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment ultimately approved the two variances with a 4-0 vote.

Hatred Convulses The World

To the editor,

The spate of hatred perpetuated against Asian Americans in the US through physical and verbal attacks; and the discrimination against LGBTQ, Black, Latino, Indian and Jewish Amer-

highlights the persecution of minorities in the U.S. and the world. Blacks and Native Americans in the US have experienced this over the past 300 years. Other minorities in the world have been subjected to persecution and discrimination, and all of the wars in the world have had an element of hatred within them. Genocide has been committed against the Armenians by the Turks, in Rwanda by Hutus against the Tutsis, in Cambodia by the Khmer Rouge, and by the Serbs against the Bosnians.

Jews in the world, especially in Europe, have been persecuted over the millennia, and they experienced the largest genocidal massacre of all time. The Holocaust in the 1930s and 1940s perpetrated by Nazi Germany and the Nazi leaders (who amazingly claimed to be devout Christians'), along with the acquiescence of the vast majority of the German people, exemplified the European hatred of the Jews. An Anti-Defamation League study in 2019 documented widespread anti-Jewish behavior persisted against a miniscule Jewish population of 0.2% of the total European population. Greece was at 67% Jew hatred with Jews only 0.05% of the Greek population, Poland 48%, Ukraine 46%, Hungary 42%, Russia 31%, Spain 28%, Austria 20%, Italy 18%, France 17% and Germany 15%. The United Kingdom, Netherlands, Belgium, Denmark, Norway, Sweden and Finland were 5% to 15%. In comparison the US was 14%, but attacks are increasing by neo-Nazis and Muslims. Muslim countries in the Stop writing letters that Middle East and North

icans in recent years Africa were at 74% Jew hatred.

> Muslim persecution of Christians was recently documented in the "World Wide List, 2021". It states every day in some Muslim countries 13 Christians are killed, 12 are arrested or imprisoned. 5 are abducted and 12 churches are attacked. Extreme persecution of Christians, which includes harassing, beating, imprisoning and raping occurs in 12 nations, nine of which are Muslim-majority countries, including Afghanistan, Somalia, Libya, Pakistan, Yemen, Iran, Nigeria, Iraq and Syria. Nearly 80% of Christian persecution in the world is committed by Muslims. The US has seen a number of Muslim attacks on Christians and Jews. including the World Trade Center, 9/11 and numerous attacks by individuals over the decades..

Some strides have been made in reducing the persecution of people, but there remains a long way to go to overcome the convulsiveness of hatred and violence in the world perpetrated against people who are typically very intelligent, educated and successful.

ZBA Approves Variances for Salon on Commons Drive

uring the Dec. 15 Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting the Board heard a case regarding a variance to allow a hair salon to operate in the C-III District which is normally not allowed.

It was explained by Steve Paquette, who was representing the applicants Diane Rossi and Stephanie Lawrence that the Salon which would be at 1D Commons Drive Unit 19 and 20. Lawrence explained to the Board that espe-

Keep Fireplaces Clean, But **Don't Throw**

ing for a few frigid days and some bitter cold nights in the upcoming weeks. Families all over New Hampshire will be bundling up outdoors and cranking the heat indoors to keep warm.

These days, most people have a "modern" method of heating the home. But on the more biting cold New England winter nights, nothing quite compares the coziness of fireplace or wood stove and soaking in the radiant heat from head to toe.

While it may be a pain to sweep up and gather, the Farmer's Almanac offers a few great ways to repurpose fireplace or wood stove ashes well into winter and beyond.

During winter, wood ashes can be used to

and provide traction. The Almanac states that while they don't work quite as well as their salt counterpart, they are a free and gentle alternative and won't cause damage to animal paws or paved surfaces.

During non-snow months, wood ash can be saved to help remove oil stains on paved driveways. Oil puddles can literally be swept away after letting wood ash sit to absorb the stain for several hours.

The Almanac adds that wood ash is a readily available source of potassium, calcium, and magnesium, which are all essential nutrients for plant health. Wood ash can be added to plant soil to increase the pH of garden soil to boost the health of certain crops.

However, depending

The forecast is call- help melt driveway ice on the condition of soil, it might be best to forgo this gardening tip, as wood ash is alkalinizing. The Almanac recommends gardeners test the pH level of their soil to determine whether or not it would be beneficial for their gardens to add wood ash.

> Wood ash also makes for a great pest repellant, says the Almanac. Sprinkle it around plants that are susceptible to slug infestation and around ant hills to keep the pests away from yards and garden plants.

Wood ash can also be spread around lilac bushes to benefit their growth and bloom come springtime, according to the Almanac. Due to its alkaline nature, wood ash "sweetens" the soil, which makes for the ideal environment for the state flower. Wood

ashes can be sprinkled around lilac bushes regularly during the winter and early spring to help with flower production.

As beneficial as the old-fashioned fireplace and wood stove are, the New Hampshire Division of Fire Safety urges users to keep some very key safety measures in through mind the remainder of these icy days and nights.

The NH Division of Fire Safety states that some common issues pertaining to these heating appliances, which can lead to some worstcase scenarios, include minding clearance to combustibles, maintenance, and proper installation.

The Division of Fire Safety reminds folks to make sure that combustible materials are not stored in too close a

appliances. Even when taking great care to contain a fire, there is always a risk of materials catching fire which could spread to the rest of the house. Whether or not these appliances are in use, any of these materials should be kept at a respectable distance from wood stoves, fireplaces, etc.

Wood and pellet burning systems should be properly cleaned and maintained to ensure safety during use. Dirty appliances run the risk of combusting and billowing smoke into the home, or starting a house fire.

The Division of Fire Safety recommends families with wood burning appliances enlist the help of a certified chimney sweep or other professional to inspect

proximity to heating devices annually to ensure that they are up to safety standards.

Finally, for those looking to either update their current device or to install a new one, it is crucial that these devices be properly installed. Failure to adhere to installation guidelines could result in house fires, property damage, and casualties.

It is best to have these devices professionally installed, or at least professionally inspected before use to ensure they can be used as safely as possible.

Knowing what a valuable resource it can be, and the upmost importance of its regular removal for fireplace safety, storing wood ash (if spatially feasible) is a worthwhile endeavor for every New Hampshire household year after year.
