Zoning Board Denies Appeal of Administrative Decision

During the Dec. 15 Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting Xavier and Kristen Correa Morales went to the Board

to appeal an administrative decision from Nick Codner, Chief Building Inspector regarding the interpretation of what the side or rear yard location should be considered for an accessory

dwelling unit, at 126 Old Derry Road.

Xavier explained that his lot is very unique since they are a corner lot with three surrounding streets.

Woodmont Tax Incentive Conversation Continues

The Londonderry Town Council met on Monday, Dec. 20, and continued to hold a public hearing about the Woodmont Commons Tax Incentive program.

The conversation dealt with the adoption of Ordinance 21-03 of the development plan which would create the Londonderry Commercial and Industrial Tax Incentive Program (RSA 72:81) and it had previously been discussed two weeks earlier, but the hearing was continued.

This proposed ordi-

nance would allow the developers of Woodmont Commons a tax break on new developments. This would not include any already existing buildings.

Town Manager Kevin Smith said he perceives the proposal as an "economic development tool."

"The way we look at it is, better to have at least 50 percent of more tax revenue from development tomorrow, so to speak, than 100 percent tax revenue from no development over the next who knows how many years," Smith said.

During the meeting,

Assistant Town Solicitor Mike Malaguti said that after the last conversation regarding the proposed ordinance, the Town Council talked about making several changes to the proposal.

Malaguti said that the council decided they would like be able to adapt both the duration and the amount of exemption. In order to do this, they talked about breaking the project up into three "tiers."

The Tier One projects would allow developments of greater than \$10M a tax exemption for their first five to ten

Londonderry Superintendent to Retire at End of School Year

During the Tuesday night, Dec. 14, Londonderry School Board meeting an announcement was made that Londonderry Superintendent Scott Laliberte would be retiring at the end of the school year.

Laliberte was not present at the meeting, and no statement was available, but a moment of silence was taken for his mother at the start of the meeting.

In other personnel matters the School Board also accepted the retirement of Elaine Allen the Administrative Assistant to the Superin-

tendent, who plans on retiring at the end of the school year as well.

Also during the meeting the School Board heard budget presentations from the different schools.

For Londonderry High School the budget for 2022 is \$526,973, Principal Jason Parent said.

He said that the proposed budget for next year is \$516,474. Parent said that it represents a decrease of \$10,499 which is also a 1.02 percent decrease.

Parent explained that each year they analyze what textbooks and other materials they

need. This year there won't be any textbooks.

"There are no new text book requests," said Parent.

He also noted that most of the line items are level funded or have reductions this year.

"Our budget is always designed with the intent of remaining level funded," said Parent.

He said that in order to have a detached accessory dwelling unit he needs to have it behind the main residence or on the side of it.

In his presentation to the Board he explained that his front door looks onto Old Derry Road and his garage which

essentially would be the accessory dwelling unit is on the side of Manter Mill road.

He said that they think it's technically on the side and in the back of the main residence.

Codner explained that when they determine it they base it on the relationship to the frontage on the actual road.

"The reason we do

that is so it's fair and consistent," he said.

Codner explained that based on that standard the owners of the property have three front yards and side yard, which the owners were disputing.

Codner also explained that they can't use the configuration of the house to determine the side, front, or backyards.

The Board ultimately

thought that Codner's decision was correct and therefore the Board voted unanimously 4-0 in favor of denying the appeal.

This led the owners to seek two variances. One to allow an accessory dwelling unit in the front yard and to allow an accessory dwelling unit 108 square feet over what is allowed.

Xavier explained that they want to build the accessory dwelling unit on their property so his elderly in-laws can have

a place to live.

Xavier said that if they aren't able to build the accessory dwelling unit on their property it would be a hardship for them because they won't be able to use the property for all it could be used for.

"We won't be able to use the property to its full potential or what we want to use it for," he said.

He said that they won't be changing the exterior of the house in any way.

Xavier said that the

addition of the garage was built in the early 2000s but wasn't permitted as an accessory dwelling unit at the time.

He explained that the accessory dwelling unit would be 815 square feet, and would only be used for their family members to stay and not as a commercial use.

"It's an in-law," said Xavier.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment ultimately approved the two variances with a 4-0 vote.

ent. Over the past 13 years, Parent said that they have cut an average of two positions per year, but this year they won't be cutting any in the proposed budget.

School Board member Bob Slater said that over the past five years they have been able to keep the high school budget within 1 to 2 percent. He said that he was happy they were able to continue that trend this

year.

"Thank you for looking at these line items and for being as efficient as you can," Slater told Parent.

For the Londonderry Middle School budget Principal William Van Bennekum said that the proposed budget for next year is \$171,187 which is a decrease of \$31,022 from this year's budget which is \$202,209.

Some of the budgeted items that were point-

ed out in the budget for activities include \$10,000 for Washington D.C. Trip Scholarships, \$3,000 for assembly programs, and \$5,000 for social well-being.

It was also pointed out that they are reducing one full-time position which will be reallocated in a different area.

Slater pointed out that they are usually plus or minus 4 percent for the middle school budget and said that this year they are at a 16 percent reduction for the operational budget.

At the North School in the proposed budget the School is proposing the addition of two café/recess monitors for the daily supervision of children at all grade levels. The school is also proposing a reduction of one elementary classroom position.

In the proposed budget, South Elementary School is proposing a 0.4 position increase

for a guidance counselor position to bring South School in line with the other two elementary schools that have two full-time counselors.

The school is also proposing the addition of two cafeteria/recess monitors for the daily supervision of children at all grade levels. They are also proposing a reduction of one elementary classroom posi-

tion.

For Matthew Thornton, the School is proposing the addition of two cafeteria/recess monitors for the daily supervision of children at all grade levels. There is also a proposed reduction of one elementary classroom position in the budget.

The next School Board meeting is slated for Jan. 6 at 7 p.m.

Hatred Convulses The World

To the editor,

The spate of hatred perpetuated against Asian Americans in the US through physical and verbal attacks; and the discrimination against LGBTQ, Black, Latino, Indian and Jewish Amer-

icans in recent years highlights the persecution of minorities in the U.S. and the world. Blacks and Native Americans in the US have experienced this over the past 300 years. Other minorities in the world have been subjected to persecution and discrimination, and all of the wars in the world have had an element of hatred within them. Genocide has been committed against the Armenians by the Turks, in Rwanda by Hutus against the Tutsis, in Cambodia by the Khmer Rouge, and by the Serbs against the Bosnians.

Jews in the world, especially in Europe, have been persecuted over the millennia, and they experienced the largest genocidal massacre of all time. The Holocaust in the 1930s and 1940s perpetrated by Nazi Germany and the Nazi leaders (who amazingly claimed to be devout Christians), along with the acquiescence of the vast majority of the German people, exemplified the European hatred of the Jews. An Anti-Defamation League study in 2019 documented widespread anti-Jewish behavior persisted against a miniscule Jewish population of 0.2% of the total European population. Greece was at 67% Jew hatred with Jews only 0.05% of the Greek population, Poland 48%, Ukraine 46%, Hungary 42%, Russia 31%, Spain 28%, Austria 20%, Italy 18%, France 17% and Germany 15%. The United Kingdom, Netherlands, Belgium, Denmark, Norway, Sweden and Finland were 5% to 15%. In comparison the US was 14%, but attacks are increasing by neo-Nazis and Muslims. Muslim countries in the Middle East and North

Africa were at 74% Jew hatred.

Muslim persecution of Christians was recently documented in the "World Wide List, 2021". It states every day in some Muslim countries 13 Christians are killed, 12 are arrested or imprisoned, 5 are abducted and 12 churches are attacked. Extreme persecution of Christians, which includes harassing, beating, imprisoning and raping occurs in 12 nations, nine of which are Muslim-majority countries, including Afghanistan, Somalia, Libya, Pakistan, Yemen, Iran, Nigeria, Iraq and Syria. Nearly 80% of Christian persecution in the world is committed by Muslims. The US has seen a number of Muslim attacks on Christians and Jews, including the World Trade Center, 9/11 and numerous attacks by individuals over the decades..

Some strides have been made in reducing the persecution of people, but there remains a long way to go to overcome the convulsiveness of hatred and violence in the world perpetrated against people who are typically very intelligent, educated and successful.

Look up Nazi Germany Leaders and Christianity.

years after completion at 40-50 percent.

Tier Two projects would need to be greater than five million-dollar and will have tax exemptions for five years of 30-40 percent.

Tier Three structures would need to be at or over \$2.5 million and will be granted tax exemptions starting at 30-40 percent over five years.

Councilor Deb Paul said that she agreed with the tier system that had been discussed but that she thinks it should

be broken into just two tiers with a more flexible timeline.

"I'm glad that you did this, but I think it needs a lot more work," Paul said.

Paul said she thinks putting too many options out can get over-complicated and that they should come up with a compromised, simpler two-tier system.

After each council member had an opportunity to speak, Chairman John Farrell opened up the discussion to the public.

Resident Bill Hamilton came before the council to share his

opinion on the proposed tax incentive plan.

"It seems like we're rewarding the big guys more than we're rewarding the little guy," Hamilton said. "We're giving 10-million-dollar projects a greater relief than we would be giving to the small guy and I don't know if that sits too right with me."

Hamilton also expressed his concerns about being able to get businesses to fill up the Woodmont Commons.

Chairman Farrell said that the council does not have all the answers which is why they hold discussions such as

these.

Resident Ray Breslin came before the council and said he was concerned about the project changing their vision from its initial intention.

Malaguti and Smith said that the Woodmont Commons are required by the development plan to apply before making any major changes to its current plan. This application would first half to go through the Planning Board.

Chairman Farrell concluded the meeting by saying he thinks that the council needs to continue to talk to people and

develop a plan for the proposal before coming to a decision.

The Town Council will again continue the discussion at the Jan. 10

meeting.

Residents who wish to add to the discussion can do so by attending the next meeting.

ZBA Approves Variances for Salon on Commons Drive

During the Dec. 15 Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting the Board heard a case regarding a variance to allow a hair salon to operate in the C-III District which is normally not allowed.

It was explained by Steve Paquette, who was representing the applicants Diane Rossi and Stephanie Lawrence that the Salon which would be at 1D Commons Drive Unit 19 and 20. The two units would essentially

be individual office suites for hair stylists to have their own business without needing their own brick and mortar location.

"It's a great way for someone starting off to lease a small space," said Paquette.

He said that Rossi has owned the Blank Canvas Salon since 2017.

"Recognizing the additional demand, and the desire to create entrepreneurial spaces for new start ups, the applicant is proposing to create 11 individual

suites that will be rented by self employed stylists. This novel approach represents a greatly reduced barrier to entry for new self-employed stylists and significant additional business revenue for the local community," Paquette told the Board.

Each of the two units would have a total of seven chairs and each stylist's studio will have one chair each while three of them will have two.

Lawrence explained to the Board that especially with the pandemic

it's becoming very popular for stylists to want their own space that they can create their own business out of, without necessarily having a large space for themselves.

She said that through their proposal they will be allowing stylists to have this option in Londonderry.

"They're really big across the country," Lawrence said.

Paquette in his presentation to the Board explained that they wouldn't be making any changes to the exterior

of the building and it won't have any negative impact on the surrounding businesses.

Lawrence said that they will have one manager there for the business throughout the day who will be able to help answer any questions the stylists have, to help direct patrons to the right stylist, or to help with any issues that might emerge there.

One concern that the chair had was in regards to them potentially having nails there and if there would be any additional regulations

required including for ventilation.

It was explained by Paquette that they have no intentions of having nail services at the location.

"There will be no nail services," said Paquette.

He also told the Board that they would have no problem with the Board putting a stipulation in place saying it could only be used as a hair salon.

The Board unanimously approved the granting of the variance for both of the locations.

Keep Fireplaces Clean, But Don't Throw Away The Ash

The forecast is calling for a few frigid days and some bitter cold nights in the upcoming weeks. Families all over New Hampshire will be bundling up outdoors and cranking the heat indoors to keep warm.

These days, most people have a "modern" method of heating the home. But on the more biting cold New England winter nights, nothing quite compares the coziness of fireplace or wood stove and soaking in the radiant heat from head to toe.

While it may be a pain to sweep up and gather, the Farmer's Almanac offers a few great ways to repurpose fireplace or wood stove ashes well into winter and beyond.

During winter, wood ashes can be used to

help melt driveway ice and provide traction. The Almanac states that while they don't work quite as well as their salt counterpart, they are a free and gentle alternative and won't cause damage to animal paws or paved surfaces.

During non-snow months, wood ash can be saved to help remove oil stains on paved driveways. Oil puddles can literally be swept away after letting wood ash sit to absorb the stain for several hours.

The Almanac adds that wood ash is a readily available source of potassium, calcium, and magnesium, which are all essential nutrients for plant health. Wood ash can be added to plant soil to increase the pH of garden soil to boost the health of certain crops.

However, depending

on the condition of soil, it might be best to forgo this gardening tip, as wood ash is alkalizing. The Almanac recommends gardeners test the pH level of their soil to determine whether or not it would be beneficial for their gardens to add wood ash.

Wood ash also makes for a great pest repellent, says the Almanac. Sprinkle it around plants that are susceptible to slug infestation and around ant hills to keep the pests away from yards and garden plants.

Wood ash can also be spread around lilac bushes to benefit their growth and bloom come springtime, according to the Almanac. Due to its alkaline nature, wood ash "sweetens" the soil, which makes for the ideal environment for the state flower. Wood

ashes can be sprinkled around lilac bushes regularly during the winter and early spring to help with flower production.

As beneficial as the old-fashioned fireplace and wood stove are, the New Hampshire Division of Fire Safety urges users to keep some very key safety measures in mind through the remainder of these icy days and nights.

The NH Division of Fire Safety states that some common issues pertaining to these heating appliances, which can lead to some worst-case scenarios, include minding clearance to combustibles, maintenance, and proper installation.

The Division of Fire Safety reminds folks to make sure that combustible materials are not stored in too close a

proximity to heating appliances. Even when taking great care to contain a fire, there is always a risk of materials catching fire which could spread to the rest of the house. Whether or not these appliances are in use, any of these materials should be kept at a respectable distance from wood stoves, fireplaces, etc.

Wood and pellet burning systems should be properly cleaned and maintained to ensure safety during use. Dirty appliances run the risk of combusting and billowing smoke into the home, or starting a house fire.

The Division of Fire Safety recommends families with wood burning appliances enlist the help of a certified chimney sweep or other professional to inspect

devices annually to ensure that they are up to safety standards.

Finally, for those looking to either update their current device or to install a new one, it is crucial that these devices be properly installed. Failure to adhere to installation guidelines could result in house fires, property damage, and casualties.

It is best to have these devices professionally installed, or at least professionally inspected before use to ensure they can be used as safely as possible.

Knowing what a valuable resource it can be, and the utmost importance of its regular removal for fireplace safety, storing wood ash (if spatially feasible) is a worthwhile endeavor for every New Hampshire household year after year.
