Planning Board Approves Plans Near Kelly Road For Second Time

In an application being heard a second time the Londonderry Planning Board granted conditional approval May 5 for a plan to subdivide one residential lot of approximately 12 acres into eight lots of single

family houses at 40 Kelly Road and Hazelnut Lane, (Tax Map 12, Lot 39) zoned agricultural residential 1, with Jan Gagnon as the owner and applicant.

The planning board had previously reviewed and voted on this application but was required to conduct a new public

hearing on it after learning not all the public was properly notified the first time.

The board further approved the application's requested five waivers: on center line radius reduction, on cul-de-sac length, pipes associated

Water Task Force Keeping Primary Focus on PFAS

The PFAS Community Task Force will concentrate its attention on PFAS for now rather than include other area contaminants affecting local water systems.

The reason for not expanding the scope is to avoid clouding the town's legal argument in relation to the Saint-Gobain plastics factory in Merrimack.

Town Councilor Tom Dolan discussed the subject during a task force meeting May 6. Previously before the Town Council he raised the possibility of the task force also looking at

other sources of drinking water contamination such as arsenic or radon.

The council, however, agreed not to pursue that course for the time being. The task force will maintain its focus on the most studied forms of PFAS: Perfluorooctanoic Acid (PFOA) and Perfluorooctane Sulfonate (PFOS).

Dolan noted its work is separate from legal issues now surrounding Saint-Gobain.

In February 2016 PFOA contamination was found in one of the faucets at the Merrimack facility during water tests. Further testing found wells in London-

derry were affected.

As part of a 2018 consent decree with the state, Saint-Gobain is paying for bottled water for residents and linking private well users to local public water. It is continuing to supply the bottled water to those selected for testing whose water is found to contain PFAS.

The legal issues with Saint-Gobain are a matter of public record, Dolan said, including whether it may have contributed to PFAS. But the company has no role in arsenic or other contaminants, he added.

If certain testing or mitigation efforts are

School Board Approves New Jake Naar Scholarship Fund

During the May 4 meeting of the School Board, members approved the creation of the Jake Naar Scholarship Trust in honor of the student who died tragically in a car accident earlier this year.

Since his death members of the community have helped to raise money in his honor in order to award scholarships to Londonderry High School seniors in his honor.

"The amount of mon-

ey raised in Jakes' honor is outstanding," said Londonderry High School Assistant Principal Katie Sullivan who has helped with the family to organize the scholarship fund.

Business Administrator Peter Curro explained during the meeting that the school district is allowed to accept private donations.

"I wanted to make it clear that there is a path that a school district can take to accept private donations," he said.

He explained that money can be donated

throughout the year to the trust fund. Each year they will have a public meeting to determine how much money they will take out for the scholarships.

Curro said that during the meeting \$120,628 would be deposited in

the scholarship fund so far but could change as members of the community and surrounding communities continue to chip in.

Each scholarship winner will be awarded \$2,222. The selection of the awardees shall be made by a committee of administration, football coach, lacrosse coach and a family member if available.

Also during the meeting the School Board discussed raising the pay for substitute teachers.

It was explained during the last meeting that due to their lower rates per day that they pay compared to other districts they have had a hard time attracting substitute teachers.

Londonderry Superintendent Scott Libberte explained that he came with two different proposals.

One of the proposals was to increase the substitute pay per day. The two pay increases he proposed were \$20 or \$30.

In a memo to the School Board he explained that based on the average amount they pay for substitutes per year that if they raise the rate by \$20

they would pay an additional \$50,340 a year and if they increased it by \$30 they'd pay an additional \$75,510.

The other proposal he made was to have seven designated substitutes in the district which would be hired and scheduled to work four days a week. He said by having them scheduled for four days a week they would be considered part-time and they could pay them the per diem rate.

The designated substitutes would be for one at each elementary school, two at Londonderry Middle School and two at Londonderry High School.

School Board member Bob Slater said that he was in support of both proposals.

"It's been 22 years that we've been at this rate and we need some good substitutes. I know we have some now but we need some that are there for us everyday. I really like the idea of having those seven," he said.

One of the questions that was asked by School Board Chair Michael Saucier was towards Curro.

"Are you comfortable with this increase and how much more could we do," Saucier asked.

Curro explained that he thinks it's important to concentrate more on how they will be able to attract more substitute teachers.

"I think it's more important that you focus and zero in on what rate you want for your substitutes in order to entice people to come to Londonderry and not look somewhere

else," Curro said. "I think it's more important for you to be more competitive in the market to attract people to come here and let the budget flow accordingly."

The Board ultimately agreed to increase the pay for substitute teachers by \$20 per day starting next school year. This means that non-certified substitute teach-

ers will make \$80 per day and \$85 for certified ones.

They also approved to have seven designated substitutes and they will receive an additional \$20 a day.

In personnel news the board accepted the resignations of Moose

Hill Special Education Assistant Meredith Barry, South School Special Education Assistant, and Jennifer Bernard, a teacher at South School.

They also accepted the retirement of Antonette Hand, a special education assistant at the South School.

Senior Resources Committee Discusses Best Way to Communicate

The most recent meeting of the Londonderry Senior Resources Committee (SRC) was held last month and Richard Flores stepped down as Chairman as Rob Palmer stepped in as the new chair. Town Clerk, Sherry Farrell, agreed to assume the duties of Secretary in coordination with Chairman Palmer.

Member Jim Green talked about providing some type of a window sticker to local businesses who offer special services or discounts to seniors. The details will need to be worked out in subsequent meetings but the SRC is wholly supportive of recognizing and encouraging

businesses that cater to seniors, particularly the most needy of that elder population. The SRC would like to have a database of these types of businesses but compiling such a list requires more thought and planning.

Palmer had researched information about how other cities and towns communicate and provide notifications to seniors. He discovered that some cities and towns email or direct mail newsletters to seniors on a periodic basis. Since it was noted that many seniors probably do not have access to or knowledge of current technology there was a discussion about how best to communicate with seniors. That discussion will continue at

subsequent meetings. Although the Londonderry Senior Center mails periodic newsletters the SRC believes they only go to members of the Senior Center. Once again the need for an email address specifically for the SRC was mentioned and hopefully the committee can get the Town to approve an email address specifically for the SRC. Although the Town website has some relevant referral information for seniors the SRC has not formally communicated to seniors what resources are available and that is what this current committee would like to address.

There was a lengthy discussion about how the local newspapers,

the Town website, Facebook and businesses in general can assist in getting and helping the SRC implement a system of communicating relevant information to all seniors. It was noted by a committee member that the Town has outsourced various citizen issues to a paid organization in Derry which provides free assistance to citizens. The individual who handles those issues is a resident of Londonderry. Further information will be obtained and provided at the next meeting.

The SRC encourages anyone to attend a meeting on the third Tuesday of every month at 6pm at the Town Complex if they have ideas or suggestions that would benefit seniors. Chairman

Palmer will re-evaluate the status of the various liaisons such as fire, police and town council attending the SRC meeting over the next few months. Palmer noted that other towns' senior groups have periodic guest speakers talk about topics of interest to seniors and he would encourage members to bring those types of things to the attention of the committee.

Jen Ganem, School Board Liaison to the SRC stated that there is a school blog for parents to advise them of events and other relevant student information and she will find out if seniors and other citizens can sign up. The school board is considering other possible uses of the blog and she will

relay the interest of including seniors. Ganem noted that there is the same information available on the school district website.

Member Barbara Mee is thinking about bus trips for seniors who may not be able to get out of town. She would like to share her passion for travel with others and will be trying to determine when, where and what trips might be of interest to seniors such as to Boston or Portsmouth.

In closing, the SRC was going to prepare an email outline of what the local newspapers might consider doing to help implement a program to identify and support local businesses who offer special recognition to seniors.

Editorial

Invaders in Our Midst

Are your neighbors' plants making a home in your shrubbery? Is greenery you never bought strangling your trees? Are leaves from unknown aquatic greens traveling on your boat to find a home in your favorite lake?

Conservation officials remind us that invasive plants are a local problem. And they're a problem in our waterways as well.

According to the state's invasive species coordinator, invasive plants impact endangered or threatened species, reduce diversity and wildlife habitat, affect water quality, damage property and lead to starvation of birds.

Japanese knotweed, bittersweet, purple loosestrife, multiflora rose, and burning bush thrive locally, and literally have a stranglehold on portions of our woodlands and roadsides.

But we don't have to leave our yards to encounter invasive. All it takes is ignoring an invective's presence in one location, and soon it has taken over the neighborhood.

What invasive do is simple – they take over, crowding out native plants. It's a battle we may be losing, and we can't wait for someone else to take care of it – if the plants have arrived, they'll be in your yard soon.

Homeowners can help control these invaders by learning to identify them, joining in volunteer efforts to control them, and following professionals' instructions about disposing of any soil and plant matter that gets

on clothes, shoes or tires during the eradication.

Meanwhile, if you think the water is safe from unwelcome visitors, think again.

State officials regularly issue warnings to boaters to pay attention to what they might be putting in the water. Summers in New Hampshire now demand a new way to look at hitchhiking and littering – boats, trailers, motors, fishing equipment, bait buckets, and diving gear can carry aquatic weeds, leaving an infested lake in their wake.

With no natural predators, the plants quickly dominate native plants, fish, and aquatic life. That translates into impaired water quality and reduced shoreline property values.

If you enjoy a kayak or canoe ride, pay attention to the plants in the water as well as to the scenery and birdlife you are paddling out to enjoy. If you've had your boat in another body of water, examine it carefully before returning to your home lake. Encourage fellow boaters to do the same.

Prevention is the name of the game, and it's the job of each one of us to preserve the quality of the lakes we love. And back on land? Contact your local conservation commission, Extension Service or the state for advice on getting rid of invasive plants. This battle won't be won unless each of us does our share.

with catch basins, having less than three feet of cover on a pipe top, and allowing the specified fill and cut slopes within the right of way.

One of the abutters, Michael Cuddyer of Londonderry who lives in the School House Square development, stated at the hearing the development would affect his home and the neighborhood. Knowing there was available land he did not anticipate 8 homes going in on the adjacent site.

The developer has met all the requirements, Chairman Arthur Rugg responded. "Once they do that it's established that the planning board has to pass it. If it's going to deny it, it's got to have a real good reason."

Londonderry faces a high demand for housing, Rugg said, even on parcels that hadn't been previously developed.

On two additional site plan amendments, the board also took action.

In one, the plan called for construction of a 3,900-square-foot garage/storage unit, impound lot, and associated site improvements at Four Enterprise Drive (Tax Map

15, Lot 62-1), zoned commercial II, with Enterprise Drive Recovery, LLC the owner and Bauchman's Towing, Inc., the applicant.

The board continued this application to June 9 pending an engineering review on site design in conformance with town standards, and state, driveway, and DOT permits.

This project is considered to be two separate sites that can function separately. Its use is as an impound lot and for storage. The unit is to store 12 cars at a time.

There is no need for public access as the location is only accessed by staff of Bauchman's Towing in storing and retrieving cars on the impound lot.

The objectives are an

outdoor storage area, three parking spaces, driveway access and pavement limit, and achieving a landscape buffer within a riprap slope.

Some board members raised concern about fluids from crash vehicles that might drain on the property. The applicant is addressing this by absorbing fluids with a pad underneath and otherwise containing the fluids by placement in a HazMat barrel.

As to another issue cited, the woods and vegetation by the nearby Rail Trail can obscure the view of cars on the property from the walking area.

The planners also conditionally accepted site plan changes to an approved stormwater management system at 11 Industrial Drive (Tax Map 28, Lot 21-1) zoned industrial II with UNICAST, INC., the owner and occupant.

The nature of this request was an unknown site condition related to the project, said Nick Golon, a principal with TFMoran civil engineers. During excavation of an infiltration basin, ground water was found higher than evaluated, he told the board.

The bottom of the stormwater basin was

brought up one foot resulting in some loss of storage volume within the basin. An expansion by some 5,000 square feet of the basin was sought to replace that storage.

This condition could not be handled in the field due to the impact to the conservation overlay

district, Assistant Public Works Director John Trottier noted. The applicant also was asked to obtain all project permits and provide the permit approval numbers.

The required conditions are to be fulfilled within 120 days of the approval.

Walk-A-Thon To Honor LHS Guidance Counselor and Support Youth In Need

According to the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), the COVID-19 pandemic has increased students' adversities, isolating them from friends, teachers, coaches, and other supportive adults.

The effects from any of these can be devastating and long-lasting for students, potentially holding them back from getting as much out of their education as their peers, while also making them susceptible to conditions such as depression, and increasing their risk for substance abuse and self harm.

Now more than ever, these young people need an advocate. The Kate Sherwood Foundation strives to be that advocate.

Londonderry High School Guidance Counselor Kate Sherwood was a "lifelong learner," with two Master's degrees and well on her way to a Doctorate. With the help of her education and nearly two decades of experience in the educa-

tion field, Sherwood channeled her skills and devotion into a mission of building trauma-informed schools and advocating for students facing adversity.

Tragically, the tireless efforts of this educator, mentor, family member and friend were cut in February of this year, when Sherwood unexpectedly pass away.

Sherwood's passing devastated those whose lives she touched. But her determination was catching, and her vision will live on through the collaborative efforts of family, friends, colleagues, and her beloved students.

The Kate Sherwood Foundation was formed by loved ones of Sherwood to further her endeavors. Through the help of community members, the Foundation seeks to identify and support students who have faced adversity that has prevented them from reaching their fullest potential.

"Kate was determined to help these kids, and this organization is going to do everything it

can to carry on Kate's work in a way that reflects her values and her kindness." Said Sherwood's husband, Dougan Sherwood.

The Foundation obtained some seed funding through its Kind Hearts For Kate campaign, which Dougan Sherwood said served as a wonderful reminder of his late wife's spirit, and "the love she had for life and the people in her life." From here, the Foundation hopes to grow in order to continue supporting youth in the community.

On Sunday, May 16, from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m., LHA will be holding the first annual Kate Sherwood Foundation Walk-A-Thon to raise funds needed to continue Sherwood's calling.

LHS Senior and Student Council President, Amara Cote, said that the council took inspiration for the fundraiser from their time raising money for the Jimmy Fund, stating that it was a walk-a-thon that had helped them raise a significant amount towards the cause, and was hopeful that this event would draw in the support they needed for this one.

Sherwood's spirit

rubbed off on all who had the privilege of knowing her, and to those called her friend, her presence in their lives leaves a lasting impression.

Melissa Romein, Director of Program Services at LHS and good friend of Sherwood's, gave a heartfelt testimony to Sherwood's character.

Romein spoke of Sherwood's dedication, stating that Sherwood carried her passion over to benefit multiple schools in the district, of her mission to create a trauma-informed learning community, and all the ways she showed selfless dedication.

"There are things I'm still learning now that she did for people that she never mentioned," said Romein. "She just quietly did things for people...it's what she dedicated her whole life to."

LHS Math teacher and co-Advisor on the Student Council Hannnah Daly also weighed in on the impact Sherwood had on Lancer Nation, and the Londonderry community.

"She was the biggest cheerleader in peoples' most difficult time," said Daly. "She was really a ray of sunshine."

Romein expressed admiration for Sherwood's unceasing dedication to helping any and all she

met reach their fullest potential, stating there was "no limit to her capacity to help kids."

Though Sherwood went above and beyond her call of duty as an educator, working well into the evenings and nights and weekends, Sherwood was still very much a dedicated mother, wife, sister, friend, and more, Romein remarked.

Dougan Sherwood echoed Romein's sentiments, adding that he hopes as his children grow that they will be comforted by the positive impact their mother had on the Londonderry community and beyond.

Mr. Sherwood also commented on the foundation's members, expressing how important they are to his family during this time and going forward.

"I'm so honored and looking forward to this Sunday's walk to be with them," said Mr. Sherwood. "To raise money, but more importantly, just to be together."

Community members are encouraged to sign up at no cost for either a one-mile or two-mile walk, through the trails behind the high school.

The event will also have live music and raffles, with prizes including multiple gift baskets,

upwards of 40 to choose from. Participants could go home with a Red Sox Basket, a Hair Care Basket, and a Coffee Basket, just to name a few. Gift cards will also be raffled off at the event, including a \$50 gift card to Mr. Steer, and a \$100 gift card to Revive Salon & Spa.

One hundred percent of proceeds from the Walk-A-Thon and raffles will directly benefit the Kate Sherwood Foundation.

For those who knew her personally, there will be a memory box made by LHS wood shop teacher, Thomas Ciccarello, to collect messages and memories for Sherwood's family to cherish, said Cote.

Daly added that although it will be a bitter-sweet occasion, she hoped to see people come and enjoy themselves at the walk-a-thon.

Though the event is a "Walk-A-Thon," walking is not required to participate, and the community is encouraged to visit for any amount of time they may be able.

"The Student Council hopes that people show up, even if it's five to ten minutes," said Cote, adding that Sherwood's family would be in attendance.

The Kate Sherwood Foundation Walk-A-Thon will take place at the LHS track from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday, May 16. Participants can complete a registration form at kindheartforkate.org/events.

conflated with PFAS or other contaminants, in his view, that may not help the town's position in seeking possible restitution regarding PFAS. Londonderry is not a party in the case as action was brought by the state.

The NH Department of Environmental Services has indicated it's not inclined to expand the boundaries of its ongoing lawsuit. Earlier this year the agency sued Saint-Gobain for not installing an air filtration device it had mandated.

DES at present has water testing only for PFAS. Individuals have to pay for any other tests sought.

"If I want to clean up my water coming out of my well, I'm not sure I want to do it piecemeal, one chemical at a time," Dolan told the task force.

As the town's concern is over drinking

water contamination for consumers of public and well water, when the current legal process draws to a close, the council could take up a broader initiative, he said.

At the same time DES has financial help for PFAS treatment. Some residents already have their own filtration systems.

DES is conducting an

interactive virtual Town Hall on PFAS May 20 at 6:30 pm for Londonderry. It will have general information and review actions taken to date. One of the speakers will be a toxicologist.

Members of the local congressional delegation and state representatives are being invited. Those participating by phone, as a function of

the program, won't be able to speak during the hearing.

A registration link will be available on the PFAS task force page. The forum will also be publicized on the MOMS Club of Londonderry Facebook page.

In addition, a workshop on water testing and mitigation will be held June 17.

The sure-handed lefty


senior, Owen MacDonnell took the mound for the win, giving up just four hits in four innings. He had eight strikeouts and one walk in the very convincing win.

After finishing last week with a massive 18-3 victory over the Windham Jaguars, the Londonderry High School Varsity Softball squad continued the winning by blanking the Nashua South Purple Panthers in two games last week.

The combined score of the two contests was an impressive 19-0 with sophomore pitcher, Mia Gaspie, getting the two wins, pitching a combined seven innings with eight hits and nine strikeouts.

In the first game, on Monday, May 3, the Lady Lancers hosted the contest and came away with a 6-0 shutout.

The offense started rather slowly in this contest, with Londonderry getting their first run due to an error at third

base in the bottom of the second, which allowed Sarah Frazier to score after stealing third and continuing home.

The offense continued in the fourth inning when junior Samantha Minton hit a double into center field and drove in two runners that had been given walks.

Two more miscues by the Lady Purple Panthers allowed two more runs in that inning, giving the LHS squad a comfortable 5-0 lead.

Minton singled in another run in the sixth inning to solidify the victory.

Left-fielder Minton went 3-2 at the plate and had three RBIs, while second-baser, junior Olivia Chau, had two runs with two hits.

Gaspie and freshman Olivia Cutuli combined for eight strikeouts with just one walk. Gaspie

gave up just two hits in the effort.

In the second game of the week against the same team, on Friday, May 7, in Nashua, the Lady Lancers capitalized on more errors by their opponent and took advantage of solid hitting and pitching for a 13-0 win.

The scoring began in the top of the third in this game, with Gaspie and Noelle Dobe walking to start the inning and Chau got onboard thanks to an error at shortstop.

Minton drove in the first run with a fly to left and Makenna True drew a walk to force the second run in.

A single by Sarah Frazier drove in the third run and an error at third brought in the fourth run and more walks and errors brought in four more runs to bring the score to 8-0 going into

the fourth.

In the fifth, Frazier tripled to drive in a run and Aliceyn Lacey singled to bring her home for another.

Londonderry got its 11th run on a fielder's choice for the final run of that inning.

Lacey got another single in the sixth inning for the 12th run of the game and Frazier added the final run on a pass ball at the plate.

Emily Rivera and Chau both had doubles in the game.

Gaspie got the win, pitching three innings, with three hits and striking out three. Sophomore Lauren Laudani had three innings in relief, allowing just two hits and striking out five.

The Lady Lancers finished the week at 6-3 and will be facing Nashua North, Bishop Guertin and Exeter this week.

Voter Information

New Hampshire law requires that the Supervisors of the Checklist verify the voter checklist every ten years. Any person on the checklist who has not voted in the past four years must re-register to remain on the checklist. The Supervisors are sending notice letters to these voters at the address the voter provided when registering. The Supervisors of the Checklist for the Town of Londonderry will hold sessions for re-registering voters who have not voted since April 1, 2017, as well as accepting applications for new voter registration, requests for the correction of the checklist, and changes of political party affiliation on the following dates:

Monday, May 17, from 6 - 8 p.m., Saturday, June 19, from 11 a.m. - 1 p.m., Tuesday, July 13, from 6 - 8 p.m. To register to vote, one must provide: Proof of Londonderry residency, Proof of citizenship (passport, birth certificate, naturalization papers), Proof of age, Photo ID. 
