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anning Board Reviews Woodmont Building Design

The Londonderry Planning Board held special а meeting on May 26 through videoconference to review the design of the latest site plan amendment for a projet being designed for the Woodmont Commons development.

The applicant's design proposal is for a two-story medical office building on Michels Way in the Woodmont Development area.

Board members held "non-binding" discussion regarding the layout

and appearance of the building, which was presented by the applicant, Chris Nickerson.

Nickerson and the board have gone back and forth with recommendations to his design in order to finalize the project.

Among the new changes Nickerson brought to the meeting were the fencing surrounding the structure and some of the materials used on the building.

Each member of the board went around on the virtual conference to share their opinions on the updated rendering.

"I think the elevations look really attrac- 13 years ago. tive and the fencing around it is a great use, I'm seeing here in front "Ex-Officio Giovanni Verani said. "Hopefully you get it in the ground soon and welcome it to the town."

All board members were in agreement that they liked the design and thought it had improved significantly from when the board first saw the project.

Town Council chair John Farrell said he liked the design and felt it captured what it the board intended when they first started talking

about the development

"I believe that what of me is within the spirit of the agreement," Farrell said. "These are the types of things that we're looking for that we can manage and make blend together into the environment and I believe that this new rendering does that."

Nickerson said that the goal of the design was to create a model that would incorporate the town's "traditional" interests which he said reminded him of a "college campus style."

The "Other CRT": **Culturally Responsive** Teaching

To the editor,

I'm concerned people are opposing the **Proposed Priorities from** the Department of Education due to the nearhysteria level response to any mention of "CRT". To be clear, those priorities are NOT Critical Race Theory, they are leaning into Culturally Responsive Teaching. I work in education developing Culturally and Linguistically Responsive instruction for millions of students. Culturally Responsive Teaching, also abbreviated CRT, is NOT the same as Critical Race Theory. Please read

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flate these two acronyms and inhibit this crucial work proven beneficial for all learners.

This CRT provides an instructional approach and content that allows a broad range of students to see themselves reflected in their schoolwork. Studies show that representation leads to increased engagement and higher growth rates for students of color. Teachers draw upon their student's varying cultures to shape lessons while validating and affirming culturally different behaviors. (Culture does not only include race - it is variations of race, ethnicity, gender, age, religion, socioeconomic status, region, and disability.) It asks teachers to vary instructional approaches to engage more kids and be aware of their potential biases. For example, in some cultures, avoiding eye contact is a sign of respect. Unfortunately, it can be misunderstood in the classroom as the exact opposite and end


> CRT promotes respect for student differences and focuses on diverse representation in content. A previous letter stated, "but kids should just be reading the classics!" I ask, whose classics. Traditional literature was written predominately by white men. CRT aims to include diverse voices and perspectives. It does not prohibit teaching the classics, it urges teaching more than just the classics. The goal of CRT is solely to support ALL students. It is not about morals, it is not about politics, it is not about opinion. It is about teaching and examining true and honest history while embracing the unique experiences every student brings to the classroom.

To anyone still opposed to Culturally Responsive Teaching (this form of CRT), or convinced it will make white kids feel bad or make kids of color feel like

thing, I ask you this don't we owe every student respect, truth, and a chance to thrive? Why are you fearful that kids will be indoctrinated by any discussion on race or diversity? Does Sex Ed lead to more teens having sex? No, it provides them with information to make informed decisions while understanding safety measures and risks. Does Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) teach kids to lash out or cry at any moment? No, it gives them skills and strategies to self-regulate and understand their feelings. So why do we think this way about either CRT? In my opinion, as someone actively doing this work, it's only doing a disservice to students of any race to oppose and conflate this approach so adamantly. Trust me, students can handle learning these things, I hope more adults can start to do the same.

The recognition of these four


members of Lancer Nation is indeed an inspiration to not just their fellow students, but the community at large.





Tuition rates are: Preschool: \$150 per month for a 2 day per week program and \$200 a month for a 4 day per week program. Prekindergarten: \$180 per month for a 3 day per week program and \$200 a month for a 4 day per week program. Applications are available online on the Moose Hill School website.
