To the editor, The planned withdrawal of all U.S. and European troops from Afghanistan by Sept. 11, 2021 will probably allow the Taliban to reconquer Afghanistan and impose a strict Islamist regime within the country, and establish terrorist organizations devoted to attacking the US.

The Taliban followers are terrorists who are aligned with al-Qaida, and they are the same groups who have launched terrorist attacks in the world over the past 30 years, including the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks in the United States.

We need to keep adequate military forces in the region outside of Afghanistan to counter Taliban and al-Qaida moves in Afghanistan and to keep them off balance to prevent attacks against us. Approximately 3000 US troops should be based on the Arabian peninsula in case they are needed as a quick reaction force. U.S. Special Forces in the region will probably have to be beefed up.

We need ground as-Kudos to the Londonsault aircraft available in Saudi Arabia and the UAE. Additionally, a squadron of B-52s should be based in the region.

Conservation Matters: Baby Animal Encounters

Te are blessed in the great state of New Hampshire to live side by side with so much wildlife. Even in our most heavily populated areas we catch glimpses of creatures of all kinds. Educating ourselves about these animals is an important part of living here, especially in spring when we are most likely to find an adorable baby in our neighborhood.

It is easy to assume that any wild baby you find by itself has been abandoned, but this is not always the case. A mother must often leave her young to find food, and you (or your dog) may happen upon the baby at just that time.

Hands Off

Our human nature calls on us to help a baby animal on our travels, and seeing a beautiful spotted fawn lying on its own in a field is probably one of the best examples of this. The mother must leave its fawn to forage, and typi-

lay down and can remain unseen. The mother will come back, barring unforeseen circumstances.

fawn, note the time and its location and leave it abandoned, the best be. A doe will leave a fawn unattended for up to 12 hours in some cases, so if you come back the following day and the fawn is still there, it's a good idea to call for some advice. If the fawn is moving around and calling out, there may be trouble.

Another common encounter is a nest of baby rabbits, called kittens. A simple way to tell if a nest has been abandoned is to crisscross some thin string across the top of the nest. If the string is found to be disturbed the following day, you know the mother has returned to the nest. If the strings are still in place, it may be time to call for help.

Planning Board Recommends to Rezone Young Road

The Planning Board discussed and voted on recommending the rezoning and potential developments of 22 Young Road to the Town Council during their May 2 meeting.

The area currently acts as an age-restricted area and the applicant hopes to create Multi-Family housing.

By changing the zone to R-III, the developers hope to preserve the area from somebody developing a commercial center.

Board Member Jake Butler said that he agreed to make the zone residential but that he thinks a R-III would create harsher traffic conditions. Instead, he suggested that the district be changed to an AR-I.

If the zone were changed to AR-I as opposed to R-III, Butler said it would mandate larger acre lots in the development minimizing

Some members of the public agreed with the rezoning proposal board members about the traffic concerns. Resident Daniel Clark said he liked Butler's idea to rezone under an AR-I.

Clark also said that he does not like the current construction plan but that he also doesn't want to see larger developments.

"I do fear that we potentially could have them turn around and make apartment buildings instead so I'd like that if we could put legal restrictions in there so if

apartments could go in," Clark said.

The board voted on with a motion by Vice Chairperson Chris Davies.

Board member Deb Paul decided to recuse herself from the vote as she knew the issue would be brought to the town council where she has a role and felt it wouldn't be appropriate to vote.

The board carried the motion to rezone the district with a 5-3-1 vote. The plan next faced the Town Council during one of their meetings in the coming weeks.

New Hampshire law requires that the Supervisors of the Checklist verify the voter checklist every ten years. Any person on the checklist who has not voted in the past four years must re-register to remain on the checklist. The Supervisors are sending notice letters to these voters at the address the voter provided when registering. The Supervisors of the Checklist for the Town of Londonderry will hold sessions for re-registering voters who have not voted since April 1, 2017, as well as accepting applications for new voter registration, requests for the correction of the checklist, and changes of political party affiliation on the following dates: Saturday, June 19, from 11 a.m. - 1 p.m., Tuesday, July 13, from 6 - 8 p.m. To register to vote, one must provide: Proof of Londonderry residency, Proof of citizenship (passport, birth certificate, naturalization papers), Proof of age, Photo ID. Applicants for registration who possess proof of identity, age, citizenship, and domicile should bring that proof when they come to register. Qualified applicants who do not possess proof or who do not bring proof with them may register if they sign an affidavit attesting to their qualifications for identity, age, domicile and citizenship.
