Londonderry School District Changes its Mask Policy

Just over a week after dozens of concerned parents and residents asked for the Londonderry School District to lift the policy that made it mandatory for students to wear masks in school and were denied, school officials have now lifted that policy.

In a press release issued on the Londonderry School District website on June 17 officials have changed the policy in regard to wearing masks at school.

The decision came just one day before

school ended for the summer.

The release stated, “We are writing today to inform you of a change to our current safety protocols in the Londonderry School District. Yesterday afternoon, the New Hampshire Department of Public Health Services released new “Permissive” guidance regarding facemasks in schools and childcare facilities. This in effect gave us their recommendation that masks can now be optional in our buildings going forward. There was no time frame on the guidelines, and indications are that this

will remain in place as long as community spread numbers continue to be low. While it is too early to say with complete confidence, it appears that this guidance could remain in place through the reopening of school in the fall.”

The release added, “Where we are following NHDPH guidance by virtue of our reopening plan, the District is empowered to make this adjustment now. We are currently working on a method by which parents can communicate their choice of

Town Receives \$900K in Grants for Water Quality

The town of Londonderry has been approved for two grants from the Department of Environmental Services (DES) in regards to drinking water in town.

Town Manager Kevin Smith announced to the Town Council at their June 21 meeting that the town would be receiving money from the DES.

Smith said that he had some “very good news” to report to the council from his meeting with the DES, Assistant Town Manager Lisa Drabik and Town Solici-

tor Mike Malaguti from earlier Monday morning.

The DES is a group that was founded as a fund commissioner that is responsible for dividing out safe water drinking grants to communities in need.

Smith, Drabik, and Malaguti went to the commission to present their request for two grants regarding Londonderry’s drinking water.

The first grant presented was in the amount of \$500,000 which would be used to administer a rebate program for residents who hook up a filtration sys-

tem.

This grant would be retroactive to 2019 and would continue through till 2024 or until the funds are expended.

The second grant was in the amount of \$400,000 and was intended for the funding of the Lancaster Drive water hookup in town.

The town previously

School Board Members Looks at District Location Change

School Board member Bob Slater came before the Town Council during their meeting on Monday night, June 21 to propose changing the location of the town’s district offices in London-

derry.

Slater said that over the last few months he has met with the Town Manager to discuss different options for the offices.

The offices were moved to Kitty Hawk Landing almost four years ago and currently

undergo a one-year lease period, which extends for 10-years.

Slater said he asked the School Board what their thoughts on moving the offices would be and the overall consensus was that they agreed.

Gas Station Looks for Multiple Variances from Zoning

The Londonderry Zoning Board of Adjustment met on Wednesday, June 16 and held just one public hearing. That hearing involved an application from RGGGS Realty, Inc., which owns the Mobil Gas Station at 7 Nashua Road. They were seeking four different variances, but with too many ques-

tions unanswered, the board put eventually held off making a decision.

The four variances that were being requested were to allow a changeable electronic message board sign that is otherwise prohibited, to allow a sign 16-feet in height where only 10-feet is allowed, to allow an additional wall sign where only one is per-

mitted, and to allow a free standing sign to be located four-feet from the Nashua Road property line where 15 feet are required and two-feet from the Ela Road property line where 15-feet is required.

Peter Marsh, of NH Signs was representing the owner, and he began by explaining that they want to rebuild their sign to become a digital one instead of what exists currently.

Although they have been given variances for the height of the sign, to have an additional sign, and for the setback they needed to go to the ZBA for an additional sign and for a sign to be electronic.

Marsh explained that the new owners of the Mobile Station are working on improving the convenience store and they want to be able to have a sign for it.

He said that because gas stations only get a few cents of profit per gallon of gas, he said that convenience stores have become more and more vital for companies over the years.

"The real profit comes from the c store," he said.

The owner was previously given a variance to have two signs but doesn't want to take one of them out because

they need it in order for people to see the sign in both directions.

Marsh also explained that they already have been given a previous variance for the setback of their sign which means that they just want to maintain it.

He said that they don't have any other options for it.

"We don't have many other choices to place the sign on the property."

The height of the sign that they are looking to have is 16 feet which is what they were already given a previous variance for.

If approved they are planning on improving

the sign by making it so they are able to control changing the prices on the sign remotely. Marsh said that right now there are some safety issues and concerns with employees doing it manually especially during inclement weather.

Overall, he said that the sign was in bad shape which is why they need to remodel it. "It's essentially falling apart," Marsh said

Since they already were given permission to have a variance for the height and set back, it was asked by Zoning Board chair Neil Dunn why they were seeking a variance for it.

"Why are they here on the height and the set back if that was already granted," he said.

Nick Codner, zoning administrator for Londonderry, explained that since they are changing the size of the signs it means they need to get a new variance.

After some discussion Codner explained that if they are able to do more research on the previous variances that were granted, they may not have to seek as many variances in this case.

It was ultimately agreed on to continue the application until the next meeting.

had issued a warrant article in March for the project, but instead this grant would supplant the warrant article.

According to Smith, the grant would allow for the project to be put into place without the taxpayers having to put any money towards it. The grant would also mean that the residents in that area would not have to pay anything for their water hookup.

Smith said the only possible contributor would be the responsible party.

Both of the grants presented by Smith, Drabik, and Malaguti were approved by the DES.

"Really the bulk of the credit here goes to both Lisa and Mike who did two separate presentations for these two grants," Smith said.

Smith said that the commission voted unanimously to give the town both grants in the full amount of money that was requested.

"This is fantastic," Smith said. "Really a feather in our cap."

Smith also said that prior to these two grant approvals, the DES had spoken with town leaders before regarding the issues Londonderry has had. The commission had described the town as "proactive" and a "model community" for their "wholistically thinking" response to these issues.

The DES also noted to Smith that they were expecting more funding to be distributed in the area.

Under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding that came from Washington, the state of New Hampshire is set to receive large amounts of money in the near future.

According to Smith, the Chairman of the DES believes that water is an issue in a lot of areas in southern New Hampshire which will require attention.

"They seem willing and ready to throw a lot of funding in order to have a permanent solution to this issue so that was very good news out of the DES this morning," Smith said.

Londonderry Old Home Day Plans Continue to Unfold

Plans continue to come together for this summer's Old Home Day in Londonderry returning in full after a year's absence in the wake of the pandemic.

As discussed at a June 15 meeting of the Old Home Committee, gift baskets are being prepared for bingo during senior night. Cather-

ine Blash, senior affairs director, is seeking to have soda donated for the event by Coca-Cola.

At the same time Prime Source Foods has offered to provide meats, Town Manager Kevin Smith said.

For the Thursday Battle of the Bands a flyer will be in circulation along with publicizing of the activities Aug. 18-22 on social media. Because sign ups by

groups don't tend to occur until weeks before, he added, food and drink arrangements have not yet been confirmed.

Friday will be the softball game between Londonderry and Derry followed by fireworks at 9 p.m. Once the food vendors have been finalized, there will be a food flyer distributed with menus.

Fiesta Shows is experiencing an unprecedented labor shortage and has no one to work the Mid-Way Games, Smith noted. He has contacted another amusement company in Rindge. But Old Home Day may have to forego

some carnival games and just have food trucks on Friday night.

On Saturday for the baby contest, he is waiting to hear from a contact person to run it. The suggestion was made at the committee meeting that if the contest were moved to Wednesday night on the Town Common, seniors could come with some acting as judges.

If done then on the Common, setup would be taking place at the same time for the concert. But an alternative to Wednesday would be moving the contest to Saturday morning as part of the kidz events at the Matthew Thornton

School if carnival activities are in doubt.

The organizers are waiting to hear from the railroad company, about exotic animals, a magician, and having a Touch-A-Truck and car show.

Kona Ice will be coming. The Portsmouth Naval Shipyard outreach program may be able to provide a 1,000-gallon dunking tank and a robot.

Smith pointed out that Saturday tends to be a chaotic time though the baby contest could be run by volunteers from the Londonderry Moms Club if they were willing.

For the parade on Saturday most participants will line up at the Middle School. The number of participants is growing with Recycled Percussion confirming their attendance.

Commitments may be needed for use of convertibles for such parade participants as Citizen of the Year, the Grand Marshal, and baby winners, Smith said.

In securing the booths on the Common, of those who had them in 2019, five artists

booths are confirmed for this year and five others have not yet responded. There is room for 12 artisans and others from the wider area beyond Londonderry may be invited to come.

As to bandstand activities, there will likely be professional entertainment and interactive events such as the strong person competition, the kiss a pig fundraiser on the stage, and apple pie eating contest.

The New Hampshire Academy of Dance is coming and the Londonderry Dance Academy and New England Dance Ensemble are being contacted.

The Historical Society is having a pig roast and a float in the parade.

Sunday activities will be determined by the clergy association.

Old Home Day is currently on the town website under boards. But much of the content will be moved from the existing site to a page on the town site to make it more prominent, Smith said. There is also a Facebook page.

The committee's next meeting is July 6 at 6 p.m. at Moose Hill

Recycling Motor Oil

To the editor
The recent article about recycling used motor oil missed an important detail - what to do in Londonderry!

You can bring your waste oil to Londonderry’s collection station behind the Central Fire Station (280 Mammoth Rd) every first Saturday of the month from 10 a.m. - 12 p.m. (July 3rd will be an exception due to the holiday weekend.) Each year, several hundred gallons of collected waste oil are used to heat the town highway garage, saving the town a few thousand dollars.

The do’s and don’ts are pretty simple: Don’t bring any oil that has been contaminated with antifreeze, water, brake fluid, or other liquids. Do bring oil in clear containers if possible, to make it easier to check for contamination.

If you are unable to make one of the Saturday collection times, you can also take your waste oil to Tisdell Transmission at 27 Ash St. Call ahead at 603-432-3201 to schedule a drop-off time.

Police Association Raises Funds for Eight-Year-Old Boy

Eight-year-old Jack McKay of Londonderry was diagnosed with a Genetic Disorder in 2020 which was the first of its kind in the U.S. and the eighth known in the world.

According to a letter the McKay family wrote to the town of Londonderry, Jack was also previously diagnosed with other disorders: Hypotonia, Global Developmental Delay, Autism, Epilepsy, and potentially Atypical Parkinsonism when he is in his 20s.

“Jack wants many of the same things as his peers—friends, fun, and

endless snacks,” The McKay’s said. “But behind those similarities lie many challenges that impact his abilities day to day, minute by minute.”

The McKay family said that Jack “needs constant attention” because he does not have general awareness to dangerous situations such as “heights and ledges, streets, and impeding other’s space.”

In recent months, the family has considered the possibility of getting an assistance dog for Jack.

“We have long discussed wanting a dog as a family but more and more recently we’ve

been learning about assistance dogs and what they can do for Jack,” The McKay’s said.

A service dog for the McKay’s’ situation would help Jack with his coordination and awareness of his environment, self-calming when he has escalated, seizure alters, and continuing to help his interpersonal skills when meeting new people.

“We are so very lucky that he is a charming boy that has a magnetic personality and is getting better each day at making new friends in all kinds of place,” The McKay’s said.

“He works harder than anybody I know to improve so many things each and every day. He inspires us.”

After hearing Jack’s story, the Londonderry Police Association has decided to help the McKay’s make their dream for Jack getting a service dog come true.

The organization has set up a “Great Golf Ball Drop” fundraiser where the closest pin will win \$10,000. All proceeds made from the event will go to getting Jack’s service dog.

The event is scheduled to take place during

the 2nd annual LPA Scramble on Friday, August 27. There are 200 slots available, and each ticket is \$100 upon entry.

According to the organization, individuals do not have to be present or partake in the tournament in order to enter for the prize money.

LPA announced on June 19 that there are 70 golf balls still available to be sold out of the 200 slots that are being offered. Those who wish to purchase one can do so via the website set up by the LPD Association:

The McKay family said they are grateful for all that the Londonderry Police Association is doing to help them in their hope for a service dog as well as all the support they’ve gotten in town.

“We are really excited to begin this new chapter and eternally grateful for all of the support that we have all gotten in town – from the schools, to neighbors and friends, and now the LPD Association and their incredible efforts and generosity,” The family said.

masking for their child to the schools, which will likely be either a form or a permission slip. You will receive details on that method of communication from the buildings as soon as it is ready. Our summer programs start on June 28 and we will certainly be ready by then.

In regard to the new school year starting in August, the release states, “Relative to masks in the fall, we do

believe that this recommendation will still be in place by then, given the absence of a significant spike in COVID cases and a subsequent change in guidance from the NHDPHS. We intend to continue forward with our planning process to collect data as well as parent and teacher feedback over the summer, and to present our update to the reopening plan to the School Board in August.

The School District also caught some nega-

tive feedback from the fact that the school board meeting video, where many parents spoke out against the mask policy, was taken off YouTube shortly after it was posted.

To that, school officials released a statement on June 15.

That statement read, “Over the past weekend, it has come to our attention that YouTube has deactivated the video of the June 8 meeting of the Londonderry School Board. The District regularly broadcasts meet-

ings of the School Board on this format, and posts recordings of meetings in order to be sure that Londonderry residents have the ability to see meetings that are of interest to them. In the case of this particular video, we have been informed that the video has been taken down because it violates the YouTube Community Guidelines, and specifically their prohibition of content that contradicts the guidance of the WHO and the CDC regarding COVID-19 protocols. We have been alerted by YouTube that subsequent violations of this policy could result in the District’s channel being deactivated. The District has initiated an appeal of this decision, and in the meantime has posted a recording of the video on our own internal website. Residents may now view that video linked on the School Board page of the district website. It is of vital importance that members of our community have the ability to see what transpired during this meeting and all meetings of the School Board.”

Prior to moving, the offices use to be in the center of town near all of the schools. Now, they are located near the airport and are not under the town's control.

According to Slater, the district can opt out of resigning the one-year lease with an eight-months' notice and

would be obligated to about \$40,000 a year. If the district stayed where they are, they would owe about \$200,000 in five years to continue to lease the property.

Slater said this means that for each year the district gets out of this building, it will be a "net gain" for both the town and taxpayers.

"Looking at all the

other cost of property today, it would be nice to get the district under a town owned property where we're paying \$130,000-\$140,000 a year in a lease towards the purchase of a bond and in 20-years it's ours," Slater said.

Slater said the new location would be a two-story building with about 9,000 square feet reserved for the district offices.

"With the assistance of our town manager we weighed the pros and cons of a raw piece of land compared to a piece of land that has all the utilities and infrastructure," Slater said.

The Town Manager had also been looking for some open space for offices and storage.

Within the past year, the Town manager had discussed his want for more space, but because of the expenses included with this the conversation had been temporarily tabled. Slater suggested that combining

the two would be more cost efficient.

He also stated that the property that makes the most sense was where the school district office was previous to their current location. That property, next door to the Town Hall was torn down two years ago.

Slater said his purpose of coming to the Town Council was to see what members thoughts were and if they had any concerns with the proposed plan.

"I think it makes a lot of sense and I really appreciate you doing all that homework because numbers don't lie," Councilor Joe Green responded.

Councilor Tom Dolan said that he also thought it was a great idea but wanted to ensure that it would not negatively impact taxpayers.

Councilor Deb Paul asked if Slater had a timeline for when the project would begin.

Slater said that if they get the ball moving soon, he is hoping to have the proposal on the ballot for the March town elections.

In the meantime, Slater said he will formally present the project to the School Board at their June 22 meeting and do a facility study for the proposal the following day before coming back to the Town

Council.

"I'm hoping for the support," Slater said. "I think it's a win/win for the community and to get our district offices into a place they can call home."

Conservation Matters: Baby Animal Encounters

We are blessed in the state of NH to live side by side with so much wildlife. Even in our most heavily populated areas we catch glimpses of creatures of all kinds. Educating ourselves about these animals is an important part of living here, especially in spring when we are most likely to find an adorable baby in our neighborhood.

It is easy to assume that any wild baby you find by itself has been abandoned, but this is not always the case. A mother must often leave her young to find food, and you (or your dog) may happen upon the baby at just that time.

Our human nature calls on us to help a baby animal on our travels, and seeing a beautiful spotted fawn lying on its own in a field is probably one of the best examples of this. The mother must leave its fawn to forage, and typically leaves it in high grasses where the fawn can lay down and remain unseen. The mother will come back, barring unforeseen circumstances.

If you come across a fawn, note the time and its location and leave it be. A doe will leave a fawn unattended for up to 12 hours in some cases, so if you come back the following day and the fawn is still there, it's a good idea to call for some advice. If

the fawn is moving around and calling out, there may be trouble.

Another common encounter is a nest of baby rabbits, called kittens. A simple way to tell if a nest has been abandoned is to crisscross some thin string across the top of the nest. If the string is found to be disturbed the following day, you know the mother has returned to the nest. If the strings are still in place, it may be time to call for help.

Important to note is that in any situation, jumping in to physically help the animal without first consulting a trained wildlife specialist is not advised. After all, animals have survived without human interference for

ever. If you are concerned that an animal has, in fact, been abandoned, the best thing you can do for it is to contact the professionals.

NH Fish & Game is, of course, a great resource. There are also many licensed wildlife rehabilitators in our state that have different areas of focus. You can find a comprehensive list on NH Fish & Game's website at wildlife.state.nh.us/wildlife/rehabilitators. They are listed by county and by which animals they are licensed to care for.

Not every animal encounter will require a rehabber; however, they are your best resource to help you help the animal. Here in Rockingham County we are fortunate to have Millstone Wildlife Center in Windham, run by Frannie Greenberg. Frannie has been a great resource when questions come up, but she is also always willing to help any way she can, no matter how small the animal is, and no matter how insignificant one may think the situation. I have even witnessed Frannie feeding a baby mouse with a dropper!

Once those babies are nursed back to health and are ready to return to the wild, the rehabbers will release them in an appropriate place.

The excitement of coming across baby animals in the wild often makes people act without thinking through the repercussions of moving

or handling the baby. This is probably the only time I suggest whipping out your phone to get an insta-worthy shot before acting on what you're seeing! So get out there, enjoy our beautiful trails (or even just your yard) and keep your eyes peeled. You never know what you may find!


