Senior Resources Committee Resumes Monthly Meetings

After taking the month of August off due to summer activities, the Londonderry Senior Resources Committee (SRC) met on

Tuesday, Sept. 21, for their monthly meeting.

Beginning with next month's meeting, member Sherry Farrell agreed to assume the duties of Secretary for the SRC.

Chairman Rob Palmer led off by saying he was going to try and arrange a committee meeting during daytime hours with the town's IT person to review the

School Board Votes in New Members and Then Adjourns

To say that the COVID 19 Pandemic has wreaked havoc on the Londonderry School Board can be easily seen as an understatement, considering what has happened over the recent summer months.

Last week the saga continued when the Tuesday, Sept. 21, meeting abruptly ended after a vote was taken to appoint two new members to fill the vacant

seats left by Jenn Ganem and Michael Saucier.

Before the vote, chair Amy Finamore made a few announcements.

She started by saying that the board needed to get back to managing the school districts without the distractions brought on by COVID-19.

Finamore said, "It is time to get back to the business of the School Board, and insuring that we meet the needs of our students, staff members and our teachers."

She added that the

disruptions they have been experiences in past meetings will no longer be tolerated.

Finamore also said that although the public can attend meetings they have no right to speak outside of public comment and if people attending the meeting are disruptive they will be escorted out after having one warning.

A previous meeting, held on Sept. 13, featured five applicants interviewed by the three members of the

Town Council Gets Lawyers View on Saint-Gobain Lawsuit

The contamination of drinking water is a serious concern for many local residents and litigation against Saint-Gobain has raised many questions by local officials.

At the Londonderry Town Council meeting held on Monday, Sept. 27, Town Counsel, Michael D. Ramsdell, and assistant solicitor Michael Malaguti drafted a letter as to the town of Londonderry's legal standing as it pertains to a lawsuit against Saint Gobain.

The letter on the matter was a part of a legal memo, which had the attorney-client privi-

lege waived by the council and the letter was read by Malaguti.

Malaguti began by citing the statutes that exist as a part of New Hampshire state law.

"As a prerequisite to begin a case in New Hampshire, a plaintiff must establish what is called standing. Standing requires a plaintiff to demonstrate a concrete personal injury to that particular person."

Mulagati went on to state that Londonderry has not suffered the effects of PFAS contamination in the eyes of the law. "As Londonderry has no public water system...it has no standing to sue Saint Gobain or any other party at this

time."

While Londonderry does not have the right to bring a lawsuit against Saint Gobain, that's not to say that other forms of legal action are out of the question. Some New Hampshire residents have gone forward with independent lawsuits filed with the assistance of private law firms, "I'm disappointed that this is

SRC website for format and content.

The committee had previously agreed that some of the website information is still relevant and some is no longer essential. Also there could be additional information that could be added to make the site more useful. The committee also decided that some website information should be moved to the Senior Affairs website and those determinations would be made in conjunction with Cathy Blash the Director of Senior Affairs at the Senior Center and the town IT person.

Palmer advised members that the SRC and other town committees are being audited to determine that all committees are keeping track of attendance, providing proper public notifications of meetings, conducting those public meetings, properly recording and posting agendas and minutes in compliance with all legal requirements.

Palmer reiterated that the SRC will meet the third Tuesday of every month unless the members are advised otherwise in advance.

There was a short discussion on whether future meetings should be video recorded and/or put on the town CTV channel so as to get

more input from the community about their concerns or issues that are not currently being addressed by the committee.

Although the last few meetings have been held in the Moose Hill Conference Room due to the pandemic, future meetings may be moved back to the Sunnycrest Room.

A brief discussion was had about the status and titles of the members and alternates currently on the SRC.

It was decided that the Executive Assistant to the Town Manager would be contacted to provide an update of each persons' title, status and time remaining on their respective appointed terms.

The next Senior Center newsletter will make a request for anyone having an interest in the SRC to express that interest and attend a meeting. The SRC always welcomes any resident of Londonderry to attend a meeting to raise an issue, make a suggestion or just to

attend out of curiosity. No further commitment is necessary. There was a suggestion about changing the meeting to a daytime meeting during the week possibly at the Senior Center. Daytime meetings would have to be further explored as they probably would discourage or

prevent working citizens from participating and/or attending. Another suggestion offered was to consider having periodic open forums on specific dates and times to generate public interest in the committees' work and increase community participation.

board, on their own personal experience and how they would react to various hypothetical situations. While the board was advised on appointing replacements as quickly as possible, the first order of business during the next meeting would be a discussion of which candidates were most qualified.

At last week's meeting Finamore motioned to appoint Nancy Hendricks and Greg DePasse to the vacant School Board seats. Both will hold the positions until March of 2022.

However, not everyone was happy with this decision. Board member Bob Slater immediately voiced his discontent on the matter argu-

ing that the district had received a letter from the residents asking that a special meeting be held in order to make a fair and balanced decision regarding new members.

The board had previously discussed this course of action, and Slater pushed for a citizen's petition to be voted upon. This would confirm a special meeting to take place.

Slater's request was quickly dismissed by the two other members and the crowd in attendance didn't hold back the anger they shared with Slater as the rest of the board appointed the new members in a motion that carried 2-1.

After the vote, the board welcomed the new members and recessed from the room.

After a lengthy break, the meeting

resumed with the two new members being sworn in and then after a number of citizens voiced their concerns from the audience, shutting things down briefly.

The school's attorney, Gordon Graham tried to explain the process, but with too many disruptions from the public the meeting was quickly adjourned.

After the meeting, Slater described this action as "throwing gas on the fire" in relation to the crowd angrily voicing their outrage.

"It's unethical" Slater stated. "We work for the community, the superintendent works for the school board, we have to show the community that we're doing things in the right manner. I was stunned...I would have never dreamed that they would shut me out...I wished the

process that we discussed the week before happened." While Slater is unhappy with the outcome of recent events, he insists that this will not affect the school board functioning as a cohesive unit. "Everyone deserves to have a voice, whether we agree or disagree."

Finamore explained her selection process and what determined the final decision. "All of the candidates gave very good interviews; I was impressed with all of them. I made the motion to elect Nancy and Greg. These were two applicants who had schoolboard experience. This is what I wanted in someone who would be coming in to serve an interim role."

The appointing of new board members wasn't the only topic addressed. While Fin-

amore expressed her gratitude to many parents for being involved with the school district, she was also very adamant that the board would be stricter in enforcing rules of decorum.

Finamore referenced RSA 91A, which sites the public's access to discussions, actions, and records of all public bodies and their accountability.

While this grants access to the public, Finamore also cited its guidelines regarding public behavior. "It specifically states that the public do not have the right to disrupt meetings"

While Finamore was very open about the need to conduct business in a safe and welcoming environment, she also reiterated that the school board is a

collective body of people, each of whom have their own individual viewpoints and objectives for Londonderry. "No single member speaks for the entire board...I'm looking to resuming productive board meetings and making sure that we're serving the district."

The Londonderry School District will conduct a public hearing on the acceptance of the Federal ESSER III Grant funds at their next meeting. The School District is scheduled to receive \$1,564,487.94 to defray the costs associated with the COVID pandemic. Such funds shall be received under RSA198:20-b, appropriations for Unanticipated Funds. It will take place at the Londonderry High School on Tuesday, Oct. 5, at 7 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

where we land." Council chair John Farrell lamented, "I believe the town has been damaged and I wish there was a way for our legal system to support that." In describing his own feelings towards the damage caused by Saint Gobain, Farrell described them as a "offender hiding out in the woods."

Councilor Deb Paul pointed out that there are a group of citizens who were already in the process of taking legal action. Known as the

Londonderry Citizens for Concerned Water. "(they) have been meeting on a monthly basis, getting larger and larger and has been following through...they could move things forward" Malaguti advised that if the group had been dealt personal damage, then they possess every right to move forward regarding legal matters.

"If the citizens of the town wish to go forward with this on their own behalf, I would certainly encourage it" said councilor Tom Dolan. "It certainly seems like the right thing to do from their point of view."

Dolan also noted that "Having been advised that the town as an entity has no standing in the legal process and can't bring a suit against the offending party, I see that as an expensive, bottomless pit that the town cannot afford." This is a sharp contrast with the town of Merrimack, who currently have a suit against Saint Gobain, mainly for the [purpose of holding the company accountable for the changes they have agreed to undergo.

This ongoing discussion regarding litigation against Saint-Gobain comes at a time when

town officials have been looking at ways to provide clean drinking water to residents affected by contamination without having to ask taxpayers to pay for the infrastruc-

ture needed.

Town staff was asked to look into whether it was feasible to set up a water district, which Assistant Town Manager Lisa Drabik told the

council that such an endeavor would be far too expensive to undertake since the town does not have a large enough water source to draw from.

Domestic Violence Awareness Month

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Although our towns have very little crime when compared with other cities and towns, offenses such as domestic violence have remained constant over many years. Domestic violence is defined as, "Violent or aggressive behavior within the home, typically involving the violent abuse of a spouse or partner." Though the majority of cases seem to be violence against a wife or female partner, there are also many cases of harm and abuse that come to husbands and male partners.

Thousands of women and men live with domestic violence everyday, afraid to report their situations to the authorities. Unfortunately, it is likely that the prevalence of domestic violence in our own towns is much higher than what is reported for a number of reasons, ranging from fear of not being believed to being brainwashed into believing that the situation is the victim's fault. October is Domestic Violence awareness month, and it is crucial to bring more awareness about what domestic violence is and how the cycle can be broken. Domestic violence involves willful intimidation, physical assault, battery, sexual assault, and other abusive behavior perpetrated by an intimate partner against another.

This violence often escalates from threats and manipulation to verbal abuse and or physical violence. This violent behavior not only directly harms the victim, but it also affects any children living in the home. According to the National Network to End Domestic Violence, approximately 15.5 million children are exposed to domestic violence each and every year. These children will likely grow up experiencing mood disorders such as anxiety, anger, and may even grow to perpetuate the behavior that was impressed upon them from a young age, thus continuing the cycle of domestic abuse.

Some signs that you or someone you love may be involved in a domestic violence situation include: feeling trapped, chronic humiliation from a partner, verbal insults, physical violence, controlling behavior from a partner, unpredictable mood swings, alienating friends and family, manipulation, etc.

If you or someone you love is involved in a domestic violence situation, it is important to report your situation as soon as humanly possible. Local authorities and abuse help hotlines are able to assist with removing the abuser from the situation and in helping victims find resources ranging from places to stay to legal help and advice.

Concern for Our School District

To the editor,
I am speaking as one school board member and do not represent the entire school board.

I am writing this letter out of concern. Concern for our community, our building administrators, our teachers, our parents, and most importantly our children. The pandemic and recent board resignations have led to passionate points of views and meetings over the last few months. For our district to move forward and improve it is vital for our community to support and respect the district. In turn, it is vital that the board and administration team also listen, communicate with full transparency, and respect the community.

Roughly three and a half years ago an issue with the school district concerned me. I attempted to bring new solutions to the school board. The board disagreed and moved forward with their decision. From then on, I attended every school board meeting. I spoke to other issues that concerned me, and each time, attempted to bring solutions on what I felt could be done better. Two years after my first presentation to the school board I was voted on to the board by our community. I appreciate that trust to this day.

Immediately as I started my term COVID hit. Discussions I intended on having about how to improve falling test scores, older facili-

ties, the rising budget, and improving curriculum options were soon overtaken by discussions about social distancing, remote learning, and zoom meetings. A year and a half later, due to continuing pandemic issues and the unprecedented resignation of the Chair and Vice-Chair of the School Board within one week of each other right before the school year, we are still dealing with unexpected topics that have overwhelmed the community, district, and meetings.

I understand the frustration of not being heard, not having your views taken into consideration, and not getting questions answered, but cursing, yelling, and threatening is not going to make anyone listen, or accomplish anything. It will have the opposite effect. Please, continue to be involved, attend meetings, ask questions, speak during public periods, bring policy ideas, anything that can help, but please do so in a respectful manner.

If you are not pleased with the school board's behavior and decisions at these meetings, there are more productive ways of showing it. One such way is the election next spring.

Please remember that our actions have an impact on our children's education. They also affect the teachers and administrators, many of whom have no say in the decisions of the board.

The board needs to be able to complete all the business on the agenda, or all will suffer.

Let's make a difference together, respectfully and productively!

Lancer Football Continues its New Streak Over Astros

After over two decades of the Londonderry High School football team being defeated by the Pinkerton Academy squad in Mack Plaque games, the Lancers started a new streak in back 2019 with a 42-24 win and since then, they have won three in a row. The latest win, to continue the streak, came on Friday night, Sept. 24, in Derry, with a 21-10 win over the the rival Pinkerton squad.

Both teams were undefeated heading into the game, and overall, the stats were pretty close in the contest with PA getting 243-yards of total offense and LHS accumulating 294, but the Londonderry shut Pinkerton down in the second half after trailing 10-7 for the convincing victory.

Lancer quarterbacks Aidan Washington and

Drew Heenan combined efforts in the win with Heenan throwing for 11-yards and rushing for 47, while Washington added 10-yards passing.

Two long runs for both sides in the first quarter started the scoring in the game, Lancer Jake Schena ran for 92-yards on their second play of the game for LHS and a touchdown with Dylan Wrisley adding the point after kick for the 7-0 lead.

Pinkerton followed that with some impressive runs of their own. Cole Yennaco ran for 20-yards and then for 40-yards through some very heavy defensive traffic for an Astros touchdown with the point after kicked by Picasso Bates for the 7-7 tie to start things.

The only other offense mustered for either side in the first half was by the PA with Bates kicking 34-yard field goal before the half.

In the second half, on the initial drive by the Lancers, Heenan connected with Trevor Weinmann for a 26-yard completion to set up ideal field position into PA territory.

The second LHS touchdown came with a Heenan pass completion to Andrew Kullman for 38-yards into the end-zone at 9:02 in the third quarter. Heenan hit Kullman from the 45-yard line to the 12 and the LHS receiver ran it in. Wrisley's leg added another extra point for the 14-10 Lancer lead.

The Londonderry defense was able to keep the Astros out of the end zone in the second half despite some very good runs by Yennaco and Jacob Albert.

Londonderry widened their lead with 5:11 left in the game when Heenan ran the ball in from the two-yard line. Wrisley's kick added to the 21-10 final score and

the Lancer celebration.

Schena led the way in rushing for LHS with 103-yards on 10 attempts. Heenan had 47-yards and Weinmann had 11-yards on two carries.

Lancer Anthony Salcito had 44-yards in receiving yards with Kullman getting 38-yards.

Although the win didn't have an impact on keeping the Mack Plaque in Londonderry, with Pinkerton winning five of the nine games played over the week, it was the Lancers third win in as many years against PA.

The Lancers will try to continue the undefeated season with a home game against Alvirne on Saturday afternoon at 1 p.m.

Madi Saucier managed seven kills and six aces while junior Abby Sakellar got two aces and three digs to help with the win.

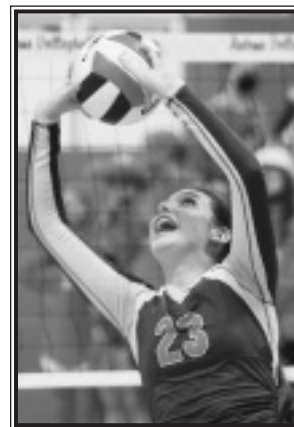
Senior Lexi Small had three aces and 11 assists and fellow senior Kelsey Sanborn added six digs
