Heritage Commission Hears Exit 4A Road Name Proposal

One of the agenda items during the Sept. 23 Londonderry Heritage Commission meeting was in regards to the naming of

the Exit 4A Connector Road.

Heritage Commission Vice Chairman Arthur Rugg said that they have to name the road and that Londonderry and Derry both

would have to agree on it. If they don't agree on a name then the DOT would come up with one. The reason why they said it's important to come up with a name **continued on page 7**

Ambulance Service Charges Discussed by Town Council

Londonderry Fire Chief Darren O'Brien, spoke at the most recent meeting of the Londonderry Town Council, on Monday, Sept. 27 on the idea of foregoing an RFP in replacing a vehicle.

With one of the ambulances in the emergency vehicle fleet due to be replaced, O'Brien made a proposal to the town council. While the replacement of an older ambulance is mandatory, O'Brien's proposed

idea is one that would forego the normal protocol.

A proposal such as this is normally subject to an RFP (request for proposal). This ensures transparency between the public and legislation and allows for accountability. An offer to receive proposals for a contract allows price comparison for purposes of budget. O'Brien asked the council to waive the RFP measure, and proceed with American Emergency Vehicles, who have been building

and maintaining Londonderry's ambulance fleet since their partnership began in 1996. He cited that having a single manufacturer will make it easy for maintenance and stockpiling spare parts.

"We can see a new ambulance in the next 8 to ten months..." O'Brien stated. By forgoing the RFP process, Londonderry will get this ambulance much quicker. O'Brien also estimated that going through the RFP process will mean

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Water District Deemed Not Feasible By Town Staff

The issue of clean drinking water in Londonderry continues to be of major concern and during the latest meeting of the Town Council, on Monday, Sept. 27, the possibility of a water district being established in Londonderry was discussed. The idea was brought up at a previous meeting.

Assistant Town Manager, Lisa Drabik, addressed the board to cite some examples of why the establishment of a water district would be a costly and ineffective idea. The primary concern from Drabik was Londonderry's lack

of a water supply.

"Unlike other communities we don't have our own lake, or river or large pond or any surface water sources that would be adequate or large enough to draw water from and support a municipal water system." She went on to mention that since Londonderry has none, water would have to come from an outside entity. Which would "negate any cost savings."

Aside from Londonderry lacking a significant water source, Drabik also explained the large cost of physical equipment and the necessary people needed to sustain such an estab-

lishment. Aside from water lines, storage tanks, routine maintenance, and equipment to move the water, there would also be a need for storage facilities to accommodate each. The staff needed to keep a facility of this nature functioning on an efficient basis would not only require operating staff, but management personal and a licensed

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Budget Committee Discusses Community Services Grants

During the Sept. 23 Budget Committee meeting one of the agenda items that was discussed was expectations of the Committee for Budget meetings.

"We're coming into budget season," said Chairman Chad Franz.

"My expectation for

these meetings is for you to attend. If there is something that you can not attend I expect a phone call," he told the Committee.

He said that it's important for them to attend all of the meetings and be involved with the developments of the different budgets.

"It's important for us.

We are the eyes, the ears, the advocates for the community for the taxpayers," Franz said.

One question that was asked is if they are going to have a calendar like they have had in the past of all the dates for the budget meetings. He said that they will.

One date that they already know is on Nov.

16 which will be for the Town.

For the school district the dates are Nov. 23, Dec. 2, Dec. 9, and Dec. 16.

"Those are what we have so far," Franz said.

Another agenda item was in regards to an update for the community service grants process.

"Each budget year, the Londonderry Town Council decides whether to allocate funds for the Community Services Grant program and, if so, at what amount," the application stated. "They then rely on the Budget Committee to recommend specific grant amounts for each organization requesting funds. Funding is never assured, but as a community, we do our best to contribute to those who assist Londonderry residents."

In order to qualify they have to be a 501 c3 non profit organization and offer services that the residents of Londonderry can benefit from.

Franz said that they

have received seven grant applications from the community so far.

He said that he thinks it would be best for the applications to be sent all at once to the Committee members once the application period closes instead of sending them for their review as they come in.

Franz said that the deadline day is Oct. 1 for organizations to submit their applications.

He said that they will then send the applications to everyone so they can break down how they want the \$50,000 spent by their Oct. 10 meeting. He noted that the Committee members will be able to see the requested amount from each of the organizations and a historical trend of what they usually ask for and what they are usually given.

Franz said that at their Oct. 28 meeting they will be able to see the weighted average from all of the Committee members and then will send the recommenda-

tions to the Town Council for their approval.

He said that by using the weighted average it makes it fair because everyone on the Committee is able to give equal input on how the money is divided.

During the liaison reports Budget Committee member Jonathan Kipp explained that the fire department requested a reimbursement from FEMA for \$653,295. He also explained that they ended 2021 in the "black" by \$180,000. He said that it was because they made cutbacks due to COVID because they weren't sure how the reimbursement process was going to work out.

He also noted that they are down six positions in the department due to struggling to find people because of the low number of candidates, however, he said that they have some interviews scheduled.

The next Londonderry Budget Committee meeting is slated for Oct. 10 at 7 p.m.

an ambulance will not be available for a period of up to 16 months. The chief went on to explain that because of the worldwide microchip shortage, here was a larger necessity to expedite the process of getting a new ambulance as soon as possible.

Council member Joe Green disagreed with O'Brien's proposal at first, and voiced his opinion for the benefit of having an RFP. "What about the possibility of one of the bidders coming back with a better price?" O'Brien responded with "I'd hate to fix something that's not

broken." He then went on to discuss the benefits of having a relationship with AEV, and how they've been providing quality work on a consistent basis since the partnership began. "I'm an RFP guy" council head John Ferrell stated. "I'm also a supply chain guy, getting access to parts becomes critical...if we're going to be an aging community then I would be in favor of having the best equipment to provide the best service to our community."

However, not every citizen in Londonderry is content with the current ambulance fleet and the services they render. Londonderry resident Neil Dunn took the opportunity to express

his grievance over a recent ambulance bill. "They're saying I owe \$104.00 for an ambulance that went nine miles. I asked for a breakdown of the bill and they said it was \$800 for the EMT's and \$200 for the wear and tear on the vehicle." He began to allude to other people having the same issues and that these expenses should have been covered with taxpayer money.

The council members took the time and listened to him plead his case.

It was determined that this was a matter of what insurance companies cover and not the taxes collected from the citizens of Londonderry.

October is Italian American Heritage Month

Italian Heritage Day/Indigenous People's Day was first created in 1989 when President George W. Bush wanted to honor the contributions and legacies of Italian Americans and recognize that the Native people are the first inhabitants of our country.

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Londonderry Heritage Commission Stays Firm on Site Plan

During the Sept. 23 Londonderry Heritage Commission meeting one of the agenda items was in regards to stone walls that was approved for a 83 lot conservation subdivision located at 17 Old Derry Road known as Lorden Commons.

Representing the owners at the meeting was Jason Lopez from Keach-Nordstrom Associates.

He explained that the Board previously approved the project in 2018, and one of the things that was part of the subdivision plan was to remove and replace

the stone walls in the back portion of the property. He said that they completed all of the sections but one so far.

The one that they haven't completed is for a lot that they have already sold.

He explained that they ran out of stones and then when they went to build it the owners said that they didn't want it built on their property. He said that they built the stone wall on one side of the property and the other side, which is about 60 feet long, hasn't been built.

When they explained the situation to Londonderry Town Planner

Colleen Mailloux she recommended that they go back to the Commission and explain the situation to them.

Heritage Commission member John Mahon said that he thinks they should require them to put the stonewall in.

"I have to be honest with you, I think we should take a hard line with the homeowner. They may complain to the Town, but on what basis they would complain particularly if it's in the purchase and sales agreement," he said.

He pointed out that he doesn't think it's going to look right with one side having rocks and the

other not having it.

Mahon also said that if there was a hardship for the homeowners he may be inclined to allow them not to build it.

"I don't see it," he said.

Lopez explained that if the Commission requires them to put the wall in on private property it could turn into a legal and or law enforcement issue if the homeowners don't allow them onto the property.

"Local PD might be called in," he said. "I'm looking out for my clients best interest."

One question asked was if the stone wall would be able to be built on Town property.

Lopez explained that it can't be built on the Town's right away, saying that they originally had some in the right away but had to remove them because the department of public works wouldn't allow it.

Heritage Commission Vice Chair Arthur Rugg said that if they are requiring the stone walls to be built the building inspector could get involved saying that they are allowed to enter private property.

Heritage Commission Chairman Krystopher Kenney said for him it comes down to whether or not it was in the sale and purchase agreement that they needed to have

a stone wall put on the property.

"Ultimately pushing a government agenda on a homeowner is rocky territory for me," he said.

Lopez said that it was on the original site plan to have stone walls on the property.

Lopez pointed out to the Commission that homeowners would be able to remove the stone walls in the future if they wanted to.

"There's nothing really in place to prevent that from being removed in the future," he said.

The Commission ultimately approved enforcing the stone wall to be built.

Continued from page 1 Environmental Engineer operations manager. These factors, on top of liability insurance would amount to loss of \$350,000 per year.

However, member Joe Green "In order to make a decision, I need to see both sides, and I only see one right now...I don't think we should do anything until there's a DES study." Green went on to suggest that the council discuss possible alternatives. Bob Kerry, an

Environmental Engineer decided to share his opinions on the matter. He began by saying that the concept of a town water district "doesn't really make sense."

Kerry described a rebate system that would reimburse Londonderry residents who have spent money on water filtration systems for their houses, even though Kerry described this as a "short term solution." Continuing a point made by Green

earlier, Kerry also talked about a DES feasibility study that would be regional because Kerry stated that it's still unknown where the water would come from. "It's important to us, so we can see what direction we need to go...It's a new process but there is progress being made. We have to be patient...I don't know if we can accelerate that."

The possibility of Pennichuck, a water

supplier having lines installed was also discussed, but a point of contention was made about the feasibility and payment to do so.

Council member Deb Paul proposed another solution which involved the use of man-made reservoirs. "Many towns have created their own reservoirs to supply water to the town...there are towns bigger than us and smaller than us who have their

own water department. I struggle with they can do it and we can't." Paul also stressed about the possible installment of water lines and how they would be paid for. "I don't think we're looking at the big picture with businesses and population and a quantity of good quality water. I've heard about extending pipelines, who's paying for that? Is Pennichuck putting in those lines, or are we the tax

payers putting them in for a for-profit company?"

Chairman John Farrell pointed out that the discussions that took place during the meeting were merely a brainstorming session, and things would ultimately be decided by the ballot. Ferrell also asked town attorney Michael Malagutti if he could have legislation written up by Oct. 18, which he agreed to do.

now is because they want to include it in the plans for Exit 4.

It was explained that Derry's Heritage Commission and Town Council recommended the names Ulster Scots Parkway and MacGregor Parkway, however the 911 Commission said that MacGregor Parkway wouldn't be allowed because it sounds too much like MacGregor Cut which is located in Londonderry.

One name that was proposed by Town Council Liaison Jim Butler was Saint's Way to honor the St. Germain family, who have been longtime residents in Londonderry.

Another proposed name came from Ann Chiampa, a member of the Londonderry Historical Society.

Her proposal was to name it Old Rum Trail, which is a road that spanned through Derry, Londonderry and other communities, or Rosecrans Road, which would be named in honor of Rosecrans Pillsbury who has historical roots in both Londonderry and Derry.

The Heritage Commission decided to submit Old Rum Trail and Rosecrans Road to the Town Council as two suggestions for the road's name. If the DOT doesn't accept Old Rum Trail they would recommend Rosecrans Road as an option for the road name.

Both names were proposed to the Town Council last week by Chiampa where they asked the Town Manager Kevin Smith to bring it to Derry as a possible name.

Also during the Commission meeting it was explained by Rugg that they got an email from Smith, who told them that the two pine trees near the corner of Mammoth Road and Pillsbury Road are dead or are dying and need to come down soon. This was determined based on an arborist's report.

It was explained that

the Commission needs to make a decision if they want anything to be planted in their place and if so what they want to put there.

One resident, Ray Breslin asked if they had any particular diseases or if they were dying due to a different reason. He also said that he thought they are a different type of tree other than a pine tree.

It was ultimately decided that they would wait until they get the report at the next meeting so they can review it before making a decision on what to do next.

Fellow junior Olivia

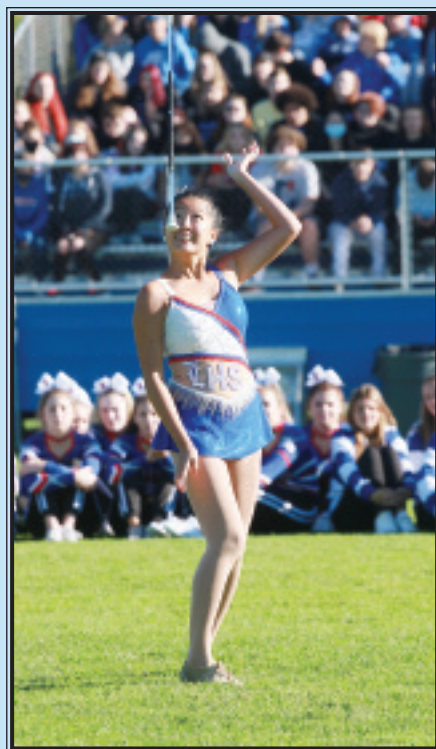
Colliton-Savina scored the tie-breaking goal.
