Council Discusses Wording on Public Water Warrant Article

The Town Council discussed the initial draft of a non-binding warrant article that would be asking residents if they would be in favor of an expansion of the town water system.

The Londonderry’s Assistant Town Solicitor, Mike Malaguti, was asked to look into formulating the language to be used in the article by the members of the PFAS Committee and he brought some of findings forward at the Town Council meeting on Monday night, Oct. 19.

The initial wording that was presented by

Malaguti read, “Are you in favor of the Town pursuing the expansion of water to residents and business across town, whether by means of a municipal water district, expansion of existing regulated utility systems, community water systems, incremental improvements to existing systems and supplies, a combination of these, or through other means? It is anticipated that these measures would be funded by a combination of state or federal grant and loan funding and municipal taxation.”

He added that the language being used was somewhat informed by a

call that town staff had with DES last week. He said that through that call the town learned a number of things. One, they got information on a feasibility study being done by DES. He added that the study is specific to Londonderry. He said that the objectives to that study are to prepare a preliminary evaluation for an expansion of the public water system in Londonderry. Provide an assessment of connecting existing, small public water systems in Londonderry to serve areas where existing groundwater wells have been impacted by PFAS.

Conservation Commission Hears Eversource Pole Project

During the Oct. 12 Londonderry Conservation Commission meeting the Commission heard an application for a conditional use permit which would allow Eversource to replace poles on 13 miles of transmission lines on the right-of-way.

It was explained by Elise Ward from Eversource that in Londonderry there are 249 poles that Eversource will be replacing with steel structures. Currently they have wooden ones.

She also explained that they have 22 that are in wetlands and 68 that are in wetland buffers.

Ward said that wood turtles were observed in the area, and said that contractors will do daily sweeps of the areas they are working on and will remove them from the right-of-way and report them if they find them.

One question that was asked is if they are going to be the same structures throughout.

Ward said that they will all be the same.

“The old are wood, the new are Steel,” she

said.

Ward also told the Board that they are going to try avoiding wetlands as much as possible and won’t put any of the poles on any new wetlands.

She said that any chance they get they will try to move them

During the Oct. 13 Planning Board meeting the board held a conceptual discussion for a proposed residential development

on Rockingham Road and Perkins Road.

Jason Lopez from Keach-Nordstrom Associates presented the plan in an area that is currently wooded.

The zone where the


properties are located is for mixed use development which combines residential and commercial use on the same property.

explained by Lopez that they were looking at only doing residential due to people not having interest in the property for commercial use.

"In 2011 a site plan was developed for Map 15 Lots 51 & 59. The project known as the "Shops at Londonderry" proposed 100,592 sf of retail space, a 7,138 sf restaurant and a 2,250 sf bank.

Ultimately the project did not complete the

approval process with one of the factors due to "market demand," Lopez stated in a letter to the Board. The properties have been for sale since that time with only a few interested parties, but ultimately no buyers. The landowner is a residential developer and not interested in commercial projects. With the recent decline in demand for office space and retail business models changing, the landowner has received real estate advice of the highest and best use being a residential development.

Therefore, the landowner seeks to propose a multi-unit townhome style project."

He said that as part of the project they want to build 149 townhomes on the 47 acres of land. Each townhome would be between 1,200 and 1,700 square feet with their own garage.

Board member Giovanni Verani, President of Verani Realty stepped off the board during the discussion.

Arthur Rugg, Planning Board Chairman, said that the point of the meeting wasn't to make

any decisions at this time and instead to have a conversation about the proposal so they could give feedback on the plans.

"It's just a good frank discussion," he said.

Lopez said that before Gagnon spent a lot of money, time and energy having designs done for the project that they wanted to find out from the Planning Board if they would be okay with allowing the residential use and to see if they have any possible feedback.

Jose Lovell, Assistant Director of Public Works and Engineering told the board that one of the major concerns they see with the property is in regards to the traffic for the area.

"Traffic is going to be a concern here with the density of this use," he said.

His suggestion was that they consider requiring a full traffic study because it's a residential use in a mixed use zone.

Planning Board Ex-Officio Deb Paul said that she liked the idea of

it but was concerned with the extra traffic it would cause by having that many more people living in that area.

"I really, really think there is a traffic issue so maybe less is more for you guys," she said.

She also said that she was concerned about the runoff going into the wetlands.

Planning Board member Lynn Wiles said that he was learning towards being okay with the townhome concept but said he would prefer it to be something closer to the master plan.

Planning Board Secretary Al Sypek said that he wouldn't have a problem with it since it's been there for a while and hasn't been sold as long as it meets the regulations especially for wetlands and drainage.

"I wouldn't have any problems with it if it meets the standards," he said.

Planning Board member Jake Butler said he didn't think the proposal was a terrible idea but thought it may be a little bit too dense and had concerns with the traffic

increasing.

Rugg said that he thinks the townhomes are a good use for the property but said he thinks it would be good to combine it with some commercial use to service the people who live there.

"That's what brings people in," he said.

Lopez explained that the owner doesn't do commercial development so if there was a need for a commercial aspect of it in order for it to be approved then it would make more sense to use one of the parcels as a commercial property.

Michael Speltz who serves on the Conservation Commission but was at the meeting representing himself said that he thinks they should find a developer who will develop it for the way it is zoned right now.

He urged the Board during the meeting to not compromise on the standards they already have in place.

"I think this is an ideal spot to do mixed use development," he said.

out of the wetlands.

It was also asked if the heights of the poles would be the same as before.

Ward said that they generally would be about the same height. They will also be using existing accesses whenever possible throughout the project, she said.

One question that was asked was if the conditions of the wooden poles was what led them to wanting to replace them.

"These poles in par-

ticular, while they are a little bit newer compared to their entire system, are made up of a laminate wood. And through our rigorous annual inspection program we have found that the laminate wood has not performed as we have expected," she said.

She said that they have some concerns about the current poles and want to do something about it sooner than later.

"We're being proactive with it," Ward said.

They will all be one to one replacement, she

said meaning they won't be adding any poles or losing any.

As far as a timeline, Ward said that they have a small list of poles they want to replace before the end of the year, pending on when they get approval to start.

The Commission unanimously approved recommending to the Planning Board that the conditional use permit be approved.

One request that they had was to have as much possible done in the wetlands when the ground is frozen.



Removing the mask debate from discussion, I hope all community members and taxpayers are concerned with the recent actions by the school board. If you're not familiar or aware, refer to the recent Londonderry Times article, dated Sept. 30, 2021, titled "School Board votes in new members and then adjourns". If the title doesn't concern

you, you should read the actions by two board members. Two sitting board members voted (vote 2-1) and elected, by themselves, the new interim members. Out of five potential candidates they decided on Nancy Hendricks and Greg DePasse.

Nancy, who was the only one to interview by phone instead of in-person, previously sat on the school board but gave up her seat in 2020.

Greg DePasse ran in the March 2020 school board elections and lost.

The three other candidates were all strong, prepared and informed, but the board decided to elect Nancy and Greg? That seems rather odd.

Our schools rely on our property taxes and when our taxes go up, we are not happy. Did you know that .63 cents of every tax dollar in the tax increase is going to the school board? On top of the .75 cents per dollar that they already get prior to the tax increase. They already have an 80 million dollar budget (information courtesy of Rachael Killian who will be running for a school board seat in March. Feel free to reach out to her or the director of finance in town with questions). With a school budget and tax increase like these, and an upcoming budget session, the voters should have had the opportunity to provide input on the interim candidates, not the board.

Even if you do not have children in the school system yet or anymore, your tax dollars support the schools and you should have a say in who is overseeing the funds. Fortunately,

the 2 seats are interim and the election to permanently fill the seats is in March. Prior to elections, familiarize yourself with the candidates and don't be afraid to ask questions. And vote.

system upgrades, as necessary, in Manchester Water Works and Pennichuck East Utilities Water systems. And to establish budgetary cost estimates for the entire project.

Malaguti explained that the feasibility study is being divided into two phases.

The first would be: The consultant will make recommendations to DES and will focus on Manchester Water Works and Pennichuck East Utilities infrastructure improvements, establishing water line extensions into Londonderry and supporting infrastructure as necessary. This would focus on the area impacted by PFAS

contamination.

He added that that first phase would be done some time in January and would include a cost estimate.

The second phase will be focusing on water lines to serve public water to each water customer impacted by PFAS. An additional review of Fire Flow availability would be accessed under Phase II to make sure flow rates are adequate. Those studies would not be done until March or April.

He told the council that this is good news for Londonderry, since the state would be paying for these studies, not Londonderry.

He finished by saying that the spirit of the warrant article that he brought forward was to

gauge whether or not the voters would support the efforts of the town to expand public water.

Town Councilor Tom Dolan spoke to the proposed language saying that he felt the article needs to be clear that it is just to assess taxpayer opinion and does not authorize any expenditure of funds. He also wondered if staff has been notified on any long-term solutions in the Saint Gobaine consent decree area in town.

Assistant Town Manager, Lisa Drabik responded that no information has been shared with them about that area yet, or what steps are being taken by DES.

Dolan felt that the solution in the Saint Gobaine consent decree area would be a good

model to be used moving forward.

Concilor Deb Paul felt that it should also be made clear that if water is run throughout town, they should know whether water hook up would be made mandatory.

Malaguti responded that he did some investigating as to whether or not town's have made it mandatory for residents to connect to water lines and didn't see any evidence of that.

He also added that it might be easier to draft the warrant article with the results of the state's feasibility study in hand, and he is trying to keep the article broad enough and specific enough for people to know what they are voting on.

No vote was taken on the language.

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Conservation Commission Hears Plan for Large Woodmont Building

During the Oct. 12 Londonderry Conservation Commission meeting the Commission heard from Steven Hawk from VHB who presented a site plan for an auto owner insurance company at the Woodmont Commons Office Development. Hawk explained that

their plan is to have 100,000 square feet worth of office building, which would be built in two phases.

The first phase would consist of a 60,000 square foot office building with associated parking, landscaping and stormwater.

Hawk explained that per Londonderry regulations they will be required

to have 192 spaces but they are proposing to have 282 spaces as part of phase one.

For phase two they will build another 40,000 square feet worth office building. In total they would be required to have 334 spaces but instead are proposing to have 502 spaces.

The number of spaces led some Conser-

vation members to question why so many were needed.

It was explained by Hawk that the tenant feels that they need that many parking spaces.

"This particular user has multiple buildings like this across the country," he said.

Hawk explained that the standard for the company is to have five spaces for 1,000 square feet.

One question asked was if they plan on constructing all of the parking for both phases at the same time.

"The first phase will just be constructing the 282," Hawk said.

It was also pointed out that they will be constructing everything needed for the stormwater for both of the buildings during phase one of the project.

Hawk explained that based on the wildlife

analysis there's potential for two endangered species that could be potentially found in the area of the site. However, he said that when they walked their portion of the site there were no signs of the species. He said that they will be using wildlife friendly erosion control measures on the site.

Another question that was asked during the meeting was in regards to snow storage.

It was explained by Hawk that the State is currently reviewing their operations and maintenance manual and they have snow storage as part of it. One of the things they are considering is giving up some parking spaces in the parking lot during the winter season to use it for snow storage.

For the sign for the company it was

explained by Hawk that the plan isn't to ask for a variance for a sign and instead they will build it within the regulations.

Members of the Commission also were curious about the event space that was listed on the site plan.

Hawk explained that it would be a grass area that could be used as a place to have corporate events or just a green space for their employees to have during the work week.

Some of the recommendations that the Commission had for the site plan included having snow storage on the plan, providing the data for why additional parking is needed, minimizing tree cutting for the purpose of the sign's view, and having pictures of the endangered species to help contractors identify the wildlife.

Robert E. Introne Jr.



Robert E. Introne Jr., 79, of Londonderry, NH, died unexpectedly Monday, Oct. 11, 2021, while travelling in Phoenix, AZ. He was born on April 27, 1942 in Weymouth, MA, son of the late E. Margaret "Peggy" (Laine) & Robert E. Introne Sr.

Bob devoted his life to a career of service. He served 21 years in the U.S. Air Force, ultimately achieving the rank of Lt. Colonel. In 1968, he did a tour of duty in Vietnam stationed in Saigon and Pleiku in the Central Highlands. He came under frequent rocket attack & had several harrowing experiences helping the Montagnard against the Viet Cong. He was a senior meteorologist at Cape Canaveral from 1969-1973 during the heyday of the Space Race, supporting the launches of Apollo 11 through 17, as well as early planning for the Apollo-Soyuz mission. When Apollo 11 made its famous ascent to land a Man on the Moon, Bob was on the tarmac at Patrick AFB, supporting ARIA aircraft operations which enabled spacecraft voice and telemetry data to get back to Mission Control. Bob would go on to provide weather forecasting for over 100 Defense Department mission launches from the Cape.

Bob had various assignments across the country and Europe, where he was a key member of Air Weather Service & supported development & operations of sophisticated air & space systems including the F-117A stealth fighter & various weather & reconnaissance satellites for the Secretary of the Air Force Special Projects. He had a command role as a Weather Squadron Commander for a fighter wing at England AFB from 1979-1981; & survived a Baader Meinhof Gang terrorist car bombing of HQ USAF at Ramstein, Germany in 1981 just after arriving in country. Bob was a highly decorated officer, who received both the Purple Heart & the Bronze Star Medal.

Upon his Air Force retirement in 1987, Bob transitioned to the private sector, taking a job at TASC. In this capacity, he continued to contribute to National Security, eventually retiring from there as a Division Director after 13 years of providing vital technical analysis & studies for the Intelligence Community and Department of Defense. At this point, he transitioned into politics, when he was elected to the NH State House of Representatives. Bob represented Londonderry from 2000-2016 & was considered an integral and influential member of the state's Republican Party. With his education, experience & background, he was a natural choice for Chairman of the Science, Technology & Energy Committee.

Bob was a proud graduate of Penn State University, earning a Bachelor of Science in meteorology. He followed the Nittany Lions as a staunch supporter his entire life & regularly could be found on Saturdays cheering for the team. He also received his Master of Science in meteorology from Colorado State University. In all facets of life, Bob was truly "The Weatherman" & all looked to him for his views on the short- & long-range forecast.

Besides his love for meteorology & all Boston sports teams, his greatest personal passion in life was sports car racing. He spent over forty years volunteering within the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA). He was a driver, nationally licensed Corner Marshall, and Chief/Operating Steward. Once again, he rose through the ranks as a recognized leader. He served as the Regional Executive for the New England Region, Area Director, & was ultimately Chairman of the SCCA National Board of Directors from 2006-2008. Through his leadership, he helped facilitate the development of new tracks in the northeast. Bob was a constant presence at local track events & was a regular face for over thirty years at the annual National Championship Runoffs. Hundreds of drivers can credit their introduction & growth in competitive motorsports to his mentorship.

Additionally, his dedication to fellow veterans & his community included support & membership in the Military Officers of America, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Lions Club, American Legion, & the American Meteorological Society.

Bob is survived by his beloved wife of 56 years, Carol (Kuryloski) Introne of Londonderry, NH; 2 sons, Robert E. Introne & wife Wendy of Centreville, VA, & Steven D. Introne & wife Melissa of Windham, NH; daughter, Christina Introne of Derry, NH; 6 grandchildren; & one brother, Douglas Introne of Orono, ME. He was preceded in death by his sister, Carol (Introne) English of Chatham, MA.

Funeral services will be held on Friday Nov. 5, at 10 a.m., at the Orchard Christian Fellowship Church, 136 Pillsbury Rd., Londonderry. Friends are welcome to attend to pay their respects and offer condolences to the family. A private interment with Military Honors for the family only will follow at the NH State Veterans Cemetery in Boscawen, NH.
