I-93 Exit 4A Connector Road Name Officially Approved

Final approval from the NH Department of Transportation has brought a six-month process to officially name the I-93 Exit 4A Connector Road to a close.

One early issue in the

naming process was that the new connector road heading east off of I-93 would cross town lines. Londonderry Heritage/Historic District Commission Vice Chairman Art Rugg noted that according to the NHDOT, both Derry and Londonderry would have to

agree on a name for the road.

In late summer of 2021, The Derry Town Council and the Derry Heritage Commission submitted two names for consideration, MacGregor Parkway and Ulster Scots Parkway, **continued on page 7**

Town Council Continues Tax Incentive Program Talk

The Londonderry Town Council held a Public Hearing on an ordinance that would create a Commercial and Industrial Property Tax Incentive Program, and after nearly an hour of discussing the pros and cons, decided to have the Town Manager rework the plan slightly to better benefit the taxpayers.

The program was brought to the Town Council a number of months ago by the former Town Manager, Kevin Smith, and it was designed specifically to

benefit an area on east side of Woodmont Commons.

The latest rendition of the ordinance, presented by Town Manager Mike Malaguti, would encompass the entire town, he felt it would be more equitable to the taxpayers.

According to Malaguti, the purpose of the program is to attract commercial and industrial businesses through allowing tax exemptions.

It was explained that the Town Council could grant businesses up to a 50 percent tax exemption as long as the public benefit outweighs the

costs and detriments associated with the project being proposed. This exemption could last as long as 10-years, according to Malaguti.

The Town Manager stressed that the tax benefit would only be given to the part of the project that is new construction, any existing taxes being paid on the property would still be paid.

The latest rendition of the Tax Incentive Program will have an 18-month trail period.

In the plan, the tax relief program would consist of three tiers of **continued on page 3**

New Gas Station Gets Conditional Use Permit From Planning Board

One of the agenda items during the May 4 Londonderry Planning Board meeting was a public hearing for an application for a conditional use permit to allow a 6,000 square foot convenience store with drive through, and gas station with 16 fueling stations and three diesel fueling stations.

The property for the project is 174 Rockingham Road and 178 Rockingham Road.

It was explained previously by Jeff Kevan from TF Moran who was representing the

owners that the proposal is to merge the two lots back into one. The lot would then be a 3.5 acre lot. He explained that the owners have a new tenant called New Sunset Realty who will be operating the convenience store.

He said that they thought it made sense to eliminate the bank and instead add diesel pumps.

Mauri Pollock, an attorney who was representing the owners said that the site can be designed in a manner that complies with the use in the ordinance.

He said that they

have done things to work out the site layout for pedestrian and vehicle flow.

He said that they will have more details about lighting, signage, and landscaping when it is time to submit a full site plan. During the meeting they were only seeking conditional approval for **continued on page 7**

Energy Task Force Discusses Solar Opportunities

During the April 21 Londonderry Energy Task Force meeting one of the presentations that they heard was from Eric Phaneuf, Vice President of Business Development for Aegis Solar.

Phaneuf said that they have helped work on a number of different projects including for municipalities.

“We’ve worked with the federal government, we’ve worked with many municipalities and a lot of private clients as well,” said Phaneuf. Phaneuf explained that when

municipalities look to have solar fields in town they eventually put out requests for proposals but said there are many things that need to be done before they get to that point. He said that site selection is one of the earliest things that happens for a project and is very important. It was explained that one potential site that has been identified in Londonderry is a super fund site on Auburn Road.

“It’s pretty substantial in size,” said Deb Paul, the Chair of the Energy Efficiency Task Force.

Phaneuf said that they did a visual analy-

sis of it.

He explained that they have experience with doing projects on landfills saying that they did the biggest landfill project in NH so far in Manchester.

Phaneuf said that they haven’t done any superfund sites so far but said that the EPA is typically supportive of the projects.

Another one of the first steps that would take place for the project is applying to the utility. Phaneuf said that it doesn’t cost a lot of money in the beginning to do so.

Phaneuf said that they also look to find out

the capacity for the site and to see if they can build what they want. From there they would get a design of the project based on what they think they can do there.

He explained that the more certainties they can have in place before they go to a developer the better the offer they can receive because it lowers the risk.

“That early capital is risk capital,” said Phaneuf.

Phaneuf said that most town’s lower their risk by bringing in a developer early to do the early work.

It was explained by Phaneuf that he thinks

the town could have an appetite for about 2.5 megawatts. He explained that in NH they are able to go up to five.

Phaneuf said that based on the numbers they are likely to need 1 megawatts. It was pointed out by Paul that it doesn’t include the school numbers.

It was pointed out by Phaneuf that it is important to find that out because based on the proposed site he thinks they may have to pay close to a million dollars to expand the wires, and said that one megawatt wouldn’t work economically.

He said that they

could look at different sites for the town as well. He said that the best way to do it is usually on a site that is already in use for something.

Phaneuf said that there are a number of different ways they can get their benefits from the developer they choose including getting discounted rates or just a check.

One question that was asked was who would be in charge of the wires and other infrastructure if solar is installed.

Phaneuf said that whoever owns the project would be responsible.

Planning Board Gives Conditional Use Permit For Eversource

During the May 4 Londonderry Planning Board meeting one of the agenda items was in regards to a conditional use permit to allow Eversource to replace and remove some of the transmission lines in Londonderry.

Conor Madison from GZA, the consultant for the project said that they are replacing a total of 13 transmission lines.

“Our scope includes a total of 13 utility structures to be replaced and the removal of one. This is wood to steel structure replacement,” said

Madison.

Madison said as part of the replacement project they won't be clearing any trees.

“Were not clearing any trees or widening any of the right of way,” said Madison.

Madison said that it's going to be off of nine roads.

It was explained that the proposed replacement is based on the utility structures being subject to environmental damage. It was also explained that the proposed structures to be replaced are based on site visit evaluations.

Madison said that they will be working with New Hampshire

Fish and Game to look for any endangered species and would have erosion controls and regulations in place.

Londonderry Town Planner Colleen Mailloux said that the project was reviewed by the Conservation Commission and they recommended approval for the project.

“I think this is a fairly straightforward project,” said Mailloux.

Planning Board member Jeff Penta asked what applicants from the state need to be ready before they can start the work on the project.

“What applicants need to be signed and delivered,” Penta asked.

Madison said that they need to have the wetland permit, alteration of terrain permit and they are also working on getting Department of Transportation permits secured.

“We have quite a few DOT permits that we are working on,” said Madison.

Nelson told the Planning Board that they are hoping to be able to begin working on the project in the beginning of June if all goes according to their plans.

Penta asked how many months they expect it to take to be completed.

“We will probably be in to 2023,” said Nelson.

He said that he expects it to be completed in early spring of next year.

Planning Board member Jason Knights asked how long the new transmission lines are supposed to last for.

Nelson said that they have about a 70 year lifespan. He said that the wood ones usually last 30 to 40 years depending on the site.

“It's often site dependent,” said Nelson.

Another question that was asked was how abutters are notified about the projects. It was explained that Eversource notifies abutters about upcoming work by mail and in some cases they try to do

door-to-door notifications for those who are going to be most impacted by it.

Planning Board Chairman Arthur Rugg offered Conservation Commission Chairman Marge Badois the opportunity to give any feedback the Conservation Commission had in regards to the project.

“We had absolutely no problems,” said Badois. She said that they have worked with Eversource on other similar projects and they have been cooperative with any requests they had in the past.

The Planning Board unanimously approved the conditional use permit.

Continued from page 1 business. Those that have a new construction estimate of over \$30 million would be considered a “Tier One” project. Tier Two projects would be an anticipated increase of over \$15 million, and Tier Three projects would need to be \$2.5 million or more.

Each tier would be granted up to a 50 percent tax exemption in the first year the project is completed.

In tier one that amount would be stepped down by 10 percent each year for a five year plan or four percent each year for a ten year

plan.

For Tier Two projects, the maximum discount would be between 30 and 40 percent and would step down by 7.5 percent for four years.

Tier Three projects would be allowed a 20 to 30 percent reduction in taxes the first year and that amount would step down in five percent increments for the four years following.

The Town Council would determine how much of a percentage projects in each tier would get.

Malaguti gave an example of how the plan would benefit the town comparing two properties in town, one residential and one com-

mmercial, both worth \$100,000.

In the example he showed that the two properties would appreciate at different rates. The commercial would show a much slower appreciation.

After the presentation, Councilor Joe Green asked Malaguti if he could put together a variety of examples of how giving businesses a discount on their taxes would benefit the community.

Malaguti responded that in his first month as Town Manager he as received calls from developers about what kind of incentive programs are available. He noted that Derry has

incentives for businesses, but we do not.

He also said that he had been contacted by a commercial real estate agent that was inquiring about a potential project that is worth as much as \$90 million.

Malaguti and Town Assessor Steve Hamilton both said that it would be difficult to project without a real project.

Green also suggested reaching out to Derry to find out how the program has benefited them.

Councilor Deb Paul wasn't comfortable vot-

ing on it and thought the town should put the idea to the voters on a Warrant Article.

Councilor Chad Franz verified that the tax exemption would be on property value that the town is not currently getting, so it would be tax-positive even with the discount.

Resident Robert LeBreux spoke on the idea and felt it wasn't a good idea for Londonderry. He thought the amount being given was excessive and the length of time was too long. He

also felt that the town shouldn't giving things away feeling businesses could be attracted to town with other incentives.

Resident Christine Perez was in favor of the program cautioning that there may be things in the works at the state house that may take away these opportunities in the near future.

In the end, the council decided to have Malaguti to continue working on the ordinance, lowering the incentives and the timeframe.

Editorial

Invaders in Our Midst

Are your neighbors' plants making a home in your shrubbery? Is greenery that you never bought strangling your trees? Are leaves from unknown aquatic greens traveling on your boat to find a home in your favorite lake?

Conservation officials remind us that invasive plants are a local problem, and they're a problem in our waterways as well.

According to the state's invasive species coordinator, invasive plants impact endangered or threatened species, reduce diversity and wildlife habitat, affect water quality, damage property, and lead to starvation of birds.

Japanese knotweed, bittersweet, purple loosestrife, multiflora rose, and burning bush thrive locally all literally have a stranglehold on portions of our woodlands and roadsides.

But we don't have to leave our yards to encounter invasive. All it takes is ignoring an invasive's presence in one location, and soon it has taken over the neighborhood.

What an invasive does is simple – they take over, crowding out native plants. It's a battle we may be losing, and we can't wait for someone else to take care of it – if the plants have arrived, they'll be in your yard soon.

Homeowners can help control these invaders by learning to identify them, joining in volunteer efforts to control them, and following professionals' instructions about disposing of any soil and plant matter that gets

on clothes, shoes or tires during the eradication.

Meanwhile, if you think the water is safe from unwelcome visitors, think again.

State officials regularly issue warnings to boaters to pay attention to what they might be putting in the water. Summers in New Hampshire now demand a new way to look at hitchhiking and littering – boats, trailers, motors, fishing equipment, bait buckets, and diving gear can carry aquatic weeds, leaving an infested lake in their wake.

With no natural predators, the plants quickly dominate native plants, fish, and aquatic life. That translates into impaired water quality and reduced shorefront property values.

If you enjoy a kayak or canoe ride, pay attention to the plants in the water as well as the scenery and birdlife you are paddling out to enjoy. If you've had your boat in another body of water, examine it carefully before returning to your home lake. Encourage fellow boaters to do the same.

Prevention is the name of the game, and it's the job of each one of us to preserve the quality of the lakes we love. And back on land? Contact your local conservation commission, Extension Service or the state for advice on getting rid of invasive plants. This battle won't be won unless each of us does our share.

The Lancer team consisted of captain and senior Austin Kilgore along with sophomores Nathan Ferrick, Brendon Saranich, and Xander Cogan. The team was coached by Peter Willis.

In the first round of the game, correct answers were worth 10 points and there is no loss of points for incorrect answers. Londonderry's Austin Kilgore picked up the first points in the match by correctly answering a question about Olympic bronze medals.

Francis Powell of Portsmouth picked up the next 10 points by naming the Charleston as a dance named for a South Carolina city. Rio Marcus of Portsmouth

added 10 points to his team's score by knowing that Myanmar was once known as Siam. Josie Sedam added another 10 points to Portsmouth's score with a question about kimchi.

With just under a minute left in the round, Portsmouth had a commanding lead of 240-70.

The final question of the round was about Paul McCartney and was correctly answered by Kilgore of Londonderry and the round ended with Portsmouth in the lead by a score of 250-80.

In the second round of the game, correct answers were worth 20 points. The second round also usually includes the 40 for 40 Question from a past season of Granite State Challenge, which celebrates the 40th season of the game.

Londonderry's Kilgore, who picked up the first points in the first round, also picked up



the first points in the second round by naming Joseph Heller as the author of Catch-22. Nick Dahlen of Portsmouth picked up the next 20 points in the round with a question about smallpox.

Powell correctly named the Bronx as the New York borough that is home to a stadium with plaques honoring Mickey Mantle and Joe DiMaggio with the 40 for 40 Question from season 25, adding 40 points to

Portsmouth's score.

Cogan of Londonderry picked up 20 points with a question about the Gulf Stream.

The round ended with Portsmouth in the lead by a score of 510-160.

The third round of the game was the Three Strikes and You're Out Round. Each team picks a 10-question category and each team member, starting with the captain, gets one question. The team continues to answer questions until they miss three questions. Each team also

has three passes in each round. If a team answered all 10 questions correctly, they pick up an additional 10 points.

Londonderry chose the category Top Hats. All of the answers in the category were related to hats. Kilgore answered the first question about the Cat in the Hat. Ferrick passed on a question about the sorting hat at Hogwarts, but Saranich was able to answer it correctly. Nathan was later able to identify the Mad Hatter from Alice's Adventures

in Wonderland.

The LHS team picked up 50 points in the round.

Portsmouth picked the category Barking Up the Wrong Tree. All of the answers in the category included the word tree or were related to trees.

Portsmouth picked up 50 points in the round, missing on questions about tree kangaroos, the novel A Tree Grows in Brooklyn, and giant sequoias. The round ended with Portsmouth in the lead by a score of 560-210. In the final round, correct answers are worth 20 points, but an incorrect answer will cost a team 20 points and leads can be quickly lost or gained. Unfortunately, Londonderry was not able to catch up in the round and Portsmouth High won the game by a score of 760-330. Portsmouth moved on to face two-time defending champion Merrimack High in the championship game.

Continued from page 1 both which honor the heritage of the original Londonderry settlers. But soon afterwards, the name MacGregor Parkway was removed from consideration by Londonderry's 911 Commission to prevent confusion for first responders because the name sounded very similar to the existing MacGregor Cut on Stonehenge Road in Londonderry. At the

Sept. 13, 2021 Town Council Meeting, when Town Manager Kevin Smith discussed the name of the Exit 4A connector road, he suggested Derry's name of Ulster Scots Parkway for consensus by the Council, to be passed along to the Heritage Commission for approval.

At the Sept. 23, 2021 Londonderry Heritage/Historic District Commission meeting, after some discussion by the Commission on Derry's

submission for the exit 4A connector road Londonderry resident Ann Chiampa, a member of the Londonderry Historical Society, suggested naming the connector road the "Old Rum Trail." This would mark the importance of the historic first road laid out in Londonderry which carried a significant amount of goods, including a good bit of rum across it, and which still to this day traverses that Woodmont Com-

mons property east of I-93. She had originally spotted the name "Old Rum Trail" listed on a map of Londonderry a number of years before and read about it in a volume in the series of Green Books produced by the Londonderry Historical Society in the 1960's. She also walked the actual trail on that same Woodmont Commons land east of I-93 with Londonderry Town Councilor Jim Butler back in 2014.

If that name wasn't chosen, Chiampa's alternate suggestion was the name, Rosecrans Road, after Rosecrans W. Pillsbury, son of Col. William S. Pillsbury and a Dartmouth graduate who was in the shoe manufacturing, agriculture and newspaper businesses as well as being an attorney, state legislator and author. He owned the orchard land that would years later become a significant

part of the Woodmont Commons landscape and the home he built in the late 1800's still sits proudly on the hill overlooking the former Woodmont Orchards storage building and offices. It's worth noting that Rosecrans Pillsbury introduced the first Macintosh Apples to the Londonderry area.

In the end it was the name "Old Rum Trail" which found support with the Londonderry Heritage/Historic District Commission at that September meeting, and also when the new preferred name went back to the Londonderry Town Council. Since there was some question if the NHDOT would accept the word "Trail" as a recognized designation for a road, Ms. Chiampa suggested the Old Rum Road be approved by the Town Council as an alternative.

When Ms. Chiampa approached Derry Town

Manager Dave Caron with the consensus of the Londonderry Heritage/Historic District Commission and Londonderry Town Council to name the Exit 4A connector road the Old Rum Trail, he surprised her by saying that Derry had decided to let Londonderry name the I-93 Exit 4A connector road to the Derry town line. Derry will be responsible for the Derry road name(s) from the Londonderry town line eastward through to Route 102.

Finally, Londonderry's Town Manager was able to give the NHDOT the name of the Old Rum Trail as Londonderry's choice for the new Exit 4A connector road. It has a name! The New Hampshire Department of Transportation has now officially designated the "Old Rum Trail" as the name for the new I-93 Exit 4A connector road to be built in Londonderry!

the use.

"All the things that go into a full blown site plan package," said Pollock.

Kevan said that they did an updated traffic study. He said that they will have a restriction for no left turns out of the parking lot.

Planning Board member Ann Chiampa said that she was still concerned about the traffic.

"Hopefully that can be worked out in the future," said Chiampa.

Ex-Officio Deb Paul

said that they are in the process of updating their groundwater ordinances and asked if it would be possible to incorporate it into their plan.

"I would really hope you would consider updating that," said Paul.

Kevan said that they would consider it.

Another question that was asked by Paul was if they are considering putting in electric charging stations since electric vehicles are starting to become more popular and readily available.

"Its not ruled in or

out at this stage," said Pollock.

Pollock said that they also haven't ruled out putting solar on the roof.

Planning Board member Jason Knights said he was looking forward to having something other than a gas station at the location and thought a bank at the location would've been good but didn't have any objections to the use.

The Planning Board ultimately approved the conditional use permit.

The next Londonderry Planning Board meeting is slated to take place on June 1 at 7 p.m.


