Planning Board Approves Changes For Church Addi ALEX MAM

uring the June 1 Planning Board meeting one of the agenda items was in regards to a site plan amendment for the construction of a 7,500 square foot two story building addition along with associated site improvements for the property at 136 Pillsbury Road.

The owner of the property is Orchard Christian Fellowship.

It was explained by Director of Engineering and Environmental Services John Trottier that they were proposing to

the site plan was originally approved in 2012 which would consist of two buildings. He stated the proposal was to build the two buildings in two different phases with the first phase being the sanctuary and the parking and then the second phase being classroom monemunetus and we didand office space.

He said that they were looking for approval to amend the plan for phase 2.

Ian McGregor from North Point Engineering said that instead of having two buildings which was the original plan

just have one building.

It was explained by Keri Owen the architect for the project that they want to match the new building to the existing features on the sanctuary including having the same vinyl siding.

"The sanctuary is very n't want to take away from the feel of the look of the sanctuary," said Owen.

Owen explained the second building will be built into the roof line of the original building.

Owen said that overall they are going to try to make the new build-

ing look similar to the current one.

"The biggest intent is to make it look like it was part of the original sanctuary when it was originally built," said Owen.

McGregor said they also submitted a revised traffic report. He said that it wouldn't create more traffic.

Mcgregor noted the storage shed on site will be relocated to the corner of the parking lot and that some grading will need to be done so it is flat for the shed.

Planning Board Ex-Officio Deb Paul asked

what kind of school they would be having there.

"Primarily this is for our children's ministry," said Pastor Ken Glasier. Glasier said that they are also looking at potentially having it be a childcare center for the Londonderry community. "That is something we are taking a look at,'

said Glasier. Paul also asked if

there is a plan for a fenced area for the kids. McGregor said that

their current plan is for kids to be there for an hour or two at a time. He said if there was a change and they would be looking to operate a daycare then they would have to go back to the Planning Board for a change of use.

Planning Board member Ann Chiampa recused herself from the application as a Planning Board member because she is on the Londonderry Historical Society board which is an abutter of the church. During public comment Chiampa said that they have been a good neighbor to the Society.

Members ultimately approved the plan.

uring the May 26 Heritage Commission meeting one of the agenda items was in regards to a proposed site plan amendment for the construction of a 7,200 square foot building and associated site improvements, for the property of 3 Akira Way which is owned by Fairwind Properties.

It was explained by Brian Pratt of Fuss and O'neill that the original site plan was approved to be 9,600 square feet.

He said that the new developer wanted to do things differently which meant having it smaller.

Pratt explained that as an example the developer wanted to have it as a circulation around the building which meant having five storage units that are bigger instead of eight of them. Pratt said that it is expected for people like plumbers or electricians to have a tools and supplies.

main benefits of shrinking the building was it could all

be on one level making it easier for the customers but also allow a customer to rent out more than one unit at once. He stated that previously as part of the plan there would've been steps involved for some of the units.

Sarah Schaffer from Bruce Ronayne Hamilton Architects explained that they are going to have colors that will be similar to the theme of storage area for their the Londonderry colors.

also have added some green space to the plan.

Pratt explained they don't have specific signage shown because it will be up to each of the individual tennant. He said that the stipula-

The shooting in Uvalde Texas shows the need to restrict the sale of assault weapons to just the military and police.

The shooting revealed numerous factors contributed to the massacre, including warning signs that were missed on social media, the school was not secured, and police showed ineptitude in doing their job.

tored for potential shooter comments, and people should report these warning signs to authorities.

Schools should have entrances reinforced and locked, and only one entrance should be used. Alarm systems should be installed on all entrances except the main entrance. Weaponizing and training a few teachers/administrators should be evaluated. Why wasn't the Uvalde school police officer in the school at the time of the shooting?

Nineteen Texas police officers stood in a hallway outside the Uvalde school classrooms for about 48 minutes waiting for a tactical police force to arrive. During that time students made 911 calls while sporadic shots were heard in the classrooms. These officers should have shot open the door and broken windows to confront the shooter. Local police officers should not be waiting for tactical support in a situation like this, but should immediately stop the shooter.
