Retiring Police Chief Candidate for States U.S. Marshal Post

President Joe Biden announced recently his latest nominee for U.S. Marshal and it includes someone with longstanding Londonderry ties.

The nomination of

retiring Londonderry Police Chief, William Ryan Hart, was one of twelve that have been named and is the most recent candidate chosen by Biden for a post as a U.S. Marshal. Hart will serve as the District of New Hampshire marshal

if accepted.

Hart has served as Londonderry's Chief of Police for since 2009 and was previously a Captain, serving under Chief Joe Ryan from 2000 to 2009.

\$286 Million in School Projects Proposed During CIP Meeting

The Capital Improvement Planning Committee met on Monday, July 25, and heard from members of the School District's Building Committee and their Architect on the district's needs over the next 20-years. In that discussion, it was revealed that about \$286 million is going to be needed to achieve all of their building needs. The figures given were in current building costs.

Eric LeBlanc, a Project Engineer with Lavallee Brensinger Architects, presented a rather

lengthy slide show on the findings his firm had come up with on where the six schools in town stand.

LeBlanc explained the district has about seven tasks in the process and they are currently in the fourth stage, which is to prioritize solutions, plot an implementation plan, promote the Master Plan, and integrate maintenance and capital planning.

Each of the schools were looked at and individual needs were accessed and scored.

For the High School, most of the needs are in the oldest part of the

building, the section that was built in 1971. Interior Finishes, Mechanical Systems, Electrical Systems and Structural Systems all scored very low.

LeBlanc added that interior classrooms without access to natural light set students up for lower scores on testing.

The highest need in the high school is an Auditorium/Large Multi-Purpose Area.

Also, the programming needs are to Reorganize the Building; Set up Houses to Integrate with Special Educa-

Heritage Commission Okays Access Road in Kent Allen Forest

The Londonderry Heritage and Historic Commission met on Thursday evening, July 28, and the addition of an emergency road in the Kent Allen Forest.

At the public hearing, Director of Public Works & Municipal Facilities, Dave Wholley, expanded on preexisting plans for the construction of the access road from Mammoth Road through to the Town Forest. He emphasized the road was not for public access and is intended for emergency vehicles,

adding, "I wanted to keep it simple." The plan is to keep the road low-key without taking away from the forest. Public Works proposed a simple chain and stone wall to prevent unwanted access.

"It's a restricted access road, we don't plan to add, but we'll use existing stones to ensure that there's no way to get around the gate," Wholley said. "We may attach a small sign to the chain that says 'Emergency Access Only.'"

Ann Champa of the Londonderry Historical Society asked whether

the road would be strictly intended for emergency vehicles or if the road is designed to bring heavy vehicles into the forest.

"No other vehicles can go through? Like dump trucks?" Champa wondered. "As I understand it, this is more of a utility road, like taking

Private Well Funding Available with PFAS Remediation Program

On Friday, July 29, New Hampshire Executive Councilor, Janet Stevens, announced more information about the Private Well Funding for PFAS Remediation program. This is directed at residents with private wells and for private well owners with quality/quantity issues.

According to the announcement, more than 13 percent of Rockingham County is in a severe drought (National Integrated Drought Information System) which may adversely affect the integrity of private wells (shallow wells) and increase the risk of exposure to unsafe levels of contaminants - for example drought increases risk exposure to naturally occurring arsenic

(USGS).

With nearly 50 percent of New Hampshire residents dependent on private wells for their water supply, I would encourage all to review two new grant programs being launched by the NH Department of Environmental Services - particularly with 100% of District Three residents impacted by abnormally dry/moderate drought conditions.

Water Assistance for Natural Disaster (WAND)

Emergency financial assistance is available for "low-income N.H. homeowners served by residential wells that are experiencing irreversible water supply quantity or quality problems" due to extreme weather conditions (drought, hurricane etc.) or natural hazards (flooding, earthquake

etc.). The Water Assistance for Natural Disaster (WAND) program is structured/classified for reimbursements to vendors to alleviate the burden of initial payment for services. The online application portal - for private well owners and vendors will open in early August and will be posted under NH DES Water Well Rebate.

Low-Income Residential Well Owners - Eligibility

- Tier 1 - 100 percent assistance less a \$250 deductible if below 50% of the applicable MHI

- Tier 2 - 80 percent assistance with a 20 percent cost if above 50% and at or below 65% of the applicable MHI

- Tier 3 - 50 percent assistance with a 50 per-

cent cost share if above 65% and at or below 80 percent of the applicable MHI

According to Commissioner, Robert Scott, "We are watching the drought status and have reached out to well drillers so that they know of the potential for the program to be available should they witness a situation or are asked about financial support".

Removal of PFAS in Private Wells

There is \$5 million available for Removal of PFAS in Private Wells in the Rebate program.

The NH DES has tested 9,000 private wells in New Hampshire for PFAS, a synthetic chemical used for a myriad of purposes: stain resistance, petroleum fire suppression etc. Certain PFAS chemicals are no longer being made in the United States, yet consumer goods imported internationally may contain PFAS (textiles, carpeting, packaging). "Studies have shown that chronic or repeated ingestion of water with certain PFAS over a person's lifetime may be associated with increased cholesterol and liver enzymes, as

well disorders of the cardiovascular, immunological." The half-life of certain PFAS compounds may exceed 3.5 years - hence these chemicals have been labeled the "forever chemicals".

Of the 9,000 private wells tested, more than 3,500 private wells had elevated levels in excess of NH's Ambient Groundwater Quality Standards (Four PFAS compounds). Responsible third parties have provided alternate water supplies to 1,000 well owners. However, 2,000 contaminated private wells have not been linked to a specific site/third party - thus have not received financial relief for necessary upgrades. Funding from this program will potentially assist these residents, private well owners who used a private vendor for testing, or other private wells not tested to date by either NH DES or a private vendor.

Program specifics:
One-Time Funding for Qualified Well Owners

- \$10,000 to connect to existing public water system

- \$5,000 for purchase installation of treatment system

Eligible Recipients

1. Owners of single/multi family homes with private wells in excess of NH PFAS AGQS (no alternative water supply)

2. Tenants serviced by private wells in excess of N.H. PFAS AGQS (landlord has not applied).

3. Vendors and subcontractors can apply on behalf of eligible applicants.

Additionally, property owners who have tested their wells with a private vendor are eligible for funding. Email pfasrebateprogram@des.nh.gov to request to be added to a list for notification. They will also be sent a notification/invitation letter

Any resident with a private well - not included in the initial DES testing or has not had their well tested for PFAS - can request sampling online

(Southern NH PFOA Investigation Private Well-Testing Request Form Survey (survey-monkey.com)).

Senior Resources Committee Prepares for Uncoming Events

The Londonderry Senior Resources Committee met this month on July 19 and had a disussion on future events and new strategies to spread the word about the goal of bringing more services to the elderly community of Londonderry.

Increasing exposure has been a central goal of the Committee. One ongoing issue has been to establish a presence at the upcoming Old Home Day.

Deputy Chief of Police and Committee member, Kim Bernard, announced he had secured a booth at Old Home Day.

"They fill up fast and made sure we got the paperwork to approve right away" Bernard stated while expressing a desire to get a banner approved for Old Home Day. "Maybe the Senior Resources Committee can hold this banner, go down to the parade route, and when we're

done with the parade, hundreds of people will see this banner."

The Committee talked about completing the design of its booth for Old Home Day with appropriate information. Printing pamphlets to hand out during the celebration was discussed, along with refrigerator stickers containing relevant information with a toll-free number for Londonderry seniors, allowing them to easily access town resources.

One important piece of information the Committee wants to include is the value of getting a File of Life card. Such cards contain personal information including medications and medical conditions in case it is needed by emergency personnel.

"If people don't keep it up to date, it can do more harm than good." Committee member, Jim Green, said. He suggested having extra Files readily available at the Old Home Day booth,

and members discussed handing paperwork out yearly to encourage people to keep their information updated.

Bernard also completed the paperwork for the first Londonderry Senior Informational Expo to be held at Londonderry High School on Oct. 16 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The Expo will provide community information from Londonderry Police and Fire Departments, Town Hall, tax information, and

local business. The Informational Expo will be free, and everyone is welcome to attend.

Bernard promised support from the police department, "we're going to do a booth, to give out information on scams." He also secured the support of several local for-profit companies.

Non-profit contacts will include information on the Department of Elderly Affairs, the AARP, and Meals on

Wheels. Another booth will encourage sign-ups for related non-profit groups looking for volunteers. The Londonderry Fire Department, Community Caregivers, and Greater Community Health Services will have separate booths.

Mobility Works in north Londonderry also offered to bring a demonstration wheelchair and handicap-accessible van for display. The

Amramp company from Manchester also offered to provide information on wheelchair ramps and stairlifts available for residents. Bernard promised to vet any company looking to set up a booth.

The Londonderry Senior Resources Committee meets on the third Tuesday of every month in the Sunnycrest Conference Room at 6 p.m.

tion; an Additional Gym; Modernize Café/Kitchen; Add Small group Classrooms; and Create Flexible Classrooms for Larger Groups.

The total cost for the high school needs was said to be about \$98,750,000 in today's dollar amounts.

The middle school upgrade needs totaled \$50,600,000.

That building's oldest portion was built in 1982 and the newer section was built in 1997. It had low scores in Interior Finishes, Mechanical Systems, Fire Alarm Systems and Structural Systems.

The largest issue at LMS is the cafeteria size and kitchen needs. They also talked about reconfiguring the entrance, adding a third Physical Education Space and to create a Learning Com-

mons.

Matthew Thornton, the school district's oldest building had a price tag of \$31,600,000 for its upgrading needs.

The sections built in 1949 and 1960 had low scores in Interior Finishes, Electrical Systems, Mechanical Systems, Fire Alarm Systems and Building Automation.

Things needing to be addressed are: The addition of Small Group/Breakout Space

for Services; The PALS Program needs a larger area; A STEM Lab is wanted; Nurses need more space; Conference Rooms are needed; and they want a Central Commons Area.

North Elementary School scored the highest, thus needing far less to be upgraded. The cost for adding a new kitchen, staff restrooms, offices, conference rooms and small group intervention testing areas was about \$18,750,000.

South School was said to have the most needs and had a nearly \$57,000,000 price attached to it.

It was also mentioned that it would make sense to completely replace the school instead of making additions to the existing structure. A new two-story school would be built directly behind the current school.

The 1978 section of the building had highest needs in Interior Finishes, Exterior Envelope and Fire Alarm Systems.

The top priority in the school was said to be a completely new kitchen.

Other items needed are: STEM Room; Small Group Meeting Rooms; a Computer Lab, Individual Work Areas; a Life Skills Training Suite; Larger Sensory Room; MPR Room for indoor recess; More Classrooms; Larger Nurse Offices; Hearing Impaired Lunch Room and a Learning Commons.

Moose Hill Kindergarten had two phases of additions totaling nearly \$30 million.

Many of the upgrades are based on whether full-time kindergarten moves forward in town.

It would need a Kitchen and Cafeteria, a Multi-Purpose/PE room, Media Center, more classrooms, Art/STEAM Rooms, Music Room and Support Spaces, Special Ed Space, a Reading Room, Little Flex, Speech/Therapy Areas, Storage, Larger Nurse Area.

Also added in the presentation was the idea that the adaptive reuse of the school's over the past 50-year has created an Environment that is "inefficient and

poorly suited to today's educational needs."

The CIP Committee was asked to prioritize the overall plan that evening, but there was some confusion as to why the School Board has yet to approve the plans.

It was explained that the School Board will give their input throughout the process.

Overall, the committee was looking to schedule the project four to six years down the road. For many members, including folks in the audience, were hoped that more residents would be involved in the process as it moves along.

Currently the School District has five projects set in the of the CIP plan. The Kindergarten and Elementary School Space project and District Wide School Renovations are set at a Priority Two, meaning necessary within three years.

An Auditorium, LHS Gym Renovations/Turf Field and the SAU building were set at a Priority Four, meaning they can be held out for six years.

Exit 4A Project Gets Underway with Brief Ceremony

The long-awaited construction of Exit 4A officially began on Tuesday morning, Aug. 2 with a groundbreaking event on Trolley Car Lane.

The Commissioner of the New Hampshire Department of Transportation, Victoria Sheehan, welcomed State, Federal and Town offi-

cials along side the southbound lanes of I-93 to start the ceremony. Mentioning all those attending, and how they have contributed to the progress of the project.

Sheehan began by saying, "The purpose of this project is to reduce congestion, improve safety and reduce traffic on local roads, while promoting economic vitality to Derry and

Londonderry."

She explained the first phase of the project would be to construct a new interchange with access to the east of Londonderry and Derry.

The first contract of \$45.5 million was awarded to Weaver Bros. in June and construct will now be underway.

Governor, Chris Sununu, also spoke before shovels were put

to dirt.

Sununu started by saying, "I'm not going to lie, I wasn't sure if I'd ever be standing here." He added the plans for this have been around since he was on the Executive Council and his father was the Governor.

He also thanked all involved that were in attendance and added this project really

defines the opportunities the state has been trying to create with the expansion of I-93.

"Nothing negative will come from this," he said. "It just opens a big door of opportunity."

This phase of the project is expected to take two to three years to complete.

After the rather brief statements made during the ceremony, key fig-

ures were invited up for the first shovels in the ground.

They included: Sununu, Sheehan, U.S. Congressman, Chris Pappas, Executive Councilors, Janet Stevens and Ted Gatsas, Derry Town Manager, Dave Caron, Londonderry Town Manager, Mike Malaguti and Adam Bates of Weaver Brothers Construction Company.

Green explained there are a lot of phrases from that time referring to loading muskets, which Welch will talk about during his display.

The event will also showcase some basic

skills needed during colonial times including a demonstration by blacksmith, Stephen Galperin, Insmithing with Larry Leonard, flax processing with Michelle Parish, Gina Gehard, and Diane Howe, and a presentation from horn smith Charles Walker.

The arts will also be

represented by spinner’s Betsy McKinney and Jane Grady, country musicians Sarah Jane Nelson and Cathy Mason, corn husk doll making with Bill Jennslon, and weaver Caroline Morse.

Kenny Houdrey will also be at the event with his vintage engine display, which Green said is popular with a lot of the guys who come to the events.

Inside the Morrison house will be genealogist, Heather Rojo, who will answer questions about people’s family history. Members of the Cowasuck Pennacook, Abenaki Paul and Denise Pouliot, will also be at the event to describe the history and culture of Indigenous People.

Green said she is excited for the “fun filled” day of events and that she is hoping to get

a lot of people.

In addition to all the events taking place, Green said the Historical Society will also be selling merchandise and trying to recruit new members for the association.

Green explained getting new, younger people involved in the association would help the society open up to doing more events at the Morrison House.
