Top Stories in Londonderry for 2014

The Town of Londonderry saw another year filled with celebrations, progress, school events and achievements. The Town made significant progress with the commercial development on Pettengill Road and proposed a budget that would decrease the tax

rate for the second year in a row, while Matthew Thornton Elementary School was recognized with the Commissioner's Circle of Excellence and Londonderry High School ranked among the top 10 public high schools in New Hampshire.

Perhaps the most inspiring story was the Market Basket takeover in

the summer months. After hundreds of workers and patrons boycotted Market Basket stores for weeks, calling for the return of beloved CEO Arthur T. DeMoulas, Arthur S. DeMoulas sold his shares to his cousin, ending the strike and restoring harmony to the supermarket chain.

Tax Bills Bring in First Revenue from Pettengill

The December tax bills brought in the first revenue for the Pettengill Road Tax Increment Finance (TIF) District, which Town Manager Kevin Smith estimates was around \$110,000 for the FY14 tax year.

The money is to be used to fund a \$250,000 traffic light in the TIF District. Any additional funds the TIF District generates are to be used for improvements in that area.

"Next year we expect it will generate a significant amount more, given

the assessments done in April 2014 didn't include the FedEx and UPS building," Smith said. "The value will have gone up in 2015 and I'm sure the TIF will bring in much more beyond the \$250,000 needed for the traffic light."

Smith said there are no plans to use the money for any other improvements besides the traffic light.

"It certainly is an option the Council may consider, but I don't know that they would be inclined to do that," he said.

As soon as the Town Council meets the Town's obligation to pay for the traffic light, it may dissolve the TIF.

Once the TIF district is dissolved, the assessed value of the new commercial development will factor into the tax rate and any money remaining from the TIF will go into the general fund, to be split between the Town and the School District.

"The School District will see money coming to it from the TIF, just maybe not this year," the Town Manager said.

With Arthur T. Back, Woodmont Road Progress Expected

After almost a year of being held up by disputes and court battles, it appears the Town may finally see progress on the 600-plus-acre Woodmont Commons PUD (Planned Unit Development).

"It's a big deal," Town Manager Kevin Smith said, noting the project was approved in the fall of 2013, but was held up for almost a year when plans for an access road from Nashua Road (Route 102) to Pillsbury Road for a new, much larger Market Basket store stalled.

The Londonderry Planning Board had approved DeMoulas Super Markets' proposed site plan for a new store several years

ago with the agreement that the company would work with Pillsbury Realty to coordinate the appropriate means of providing future access to the former Woodmont Orchard parcel and Pillsbury Road through an easement or other legal agreement to be worked out between the parties.

The future access should allow for an eventual four-lane roadway connection, but could initially be designed as a two-lane roadway. No certificate of occupancy for the relocated supermarket was to be issued until an agreement for the future access was completed and a copy was provided to the Community Development Department for the project file.

The agreement was signed in May 2011, and the new store has been in operation for several years.

In June 2014, relatives of Market Basket chief executive officer Arthur T. DeMoulas, who owned a 49.5 percent share in the supermarket chain, took control of the company, creating uncertainty as to whether they would honor an agreement to build the access road.

Man Dies After Car Crashes into Londonderry Home

A man died after crashing into a Nashua Road home Monday night.

The 59-year-old driver was driving east on Nashua Road (Route 102) when he lost control of the vehicle, Londonderry Fire Battalion Chief Jim Roger said.

The deceased man has been identified as Allan Lee, 59, of Nashua.

Roger said the family - husband, wife and three children - inside the home were "very lucky" they weren't in the kitchen of the home, where the vehicle struck the residence before becoming airborne over a car parked in the driveway and landing by the garage.

"They were really shaken up. If there had been anyone in that area,

there could have been fatalities," he said.

Fire and Police received multiple calls at 9:08 p.m. reporting a car into the house at 300 Nashua Road and a driver trapped in the car.

Fire Rescue 1 arrived on the scene in under five minutes and found a mother and her three children and a family friend in the front yard. The driver, who was unresponsive, was trapped in his vehicle and the rescue crew worked quickly to extract him.

"They had him out of the car and into the ambulance in a matter of minutes," Roger said. "It was great teamwork all the way around by our guys from Londonderry Fire. Their quick response, training, and their experience and judgment really paid off."

Once in the ambulance, the driver went into cardiac arrest and rescue crews were able to revive him on the way to Southern New Hampshire Regional Medical Center in Nashua. The hospital was arranging for ground transportation to Boston when he died.

A 4-year-old who was near the kitchen, where the vehicle struck, suffered a slight head injury and minor abrasions and cuts, according to Roger. Londonderry Detective Christopher Olson said the child was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in Nashua by a Hudson ambulance.

Firefighters at the scene put emergency mechanical shoring devices in place to ensure the corner of the home that was damaged didn't

collapse. The residence was deemed uninhabitable by the Londonderry Fire Department.

"It was great teamwork all the way around," Roger said. "We were lucky because we decrease staffing at 8 p.m., but we had another call around 7 p.m. that crews were returning from. We had an extra firefighter who was just doing

chores and finishing up who was able to go on Rescue 1. Having that extra paramedic was really helpful."

The Fire Department contacted the Red Cross to provide assistance to the family in the damaged home. They have relatives in Londonderry with whom they arranged to stay.

Members of the Fire Department drove the family to their relative's home in two cars and made sure they were safe for the night.

The accident remains under investigation, but as of press time it is thought that excessive speed as well as drug-related impairment may have played a role.

Investigation Continues into Shooting of Londonderry Woman

Police in Saco, Maine, continue to investigate the shooting that left Rachel Owens, 55, of Londonderry critically injured.

Steven Chabot, 55, and his wife Carol, 55, were awakened on Dec. 18

when an unknown intruder forced entry into their Saco home. The couple sought refuge in separate rooms upon being confronted by the intruder and Steven Chabot was shot several times. Carol Chabot hid under furniture and was unharmed. Owens, who was pres-

ent in the Chabot home at the time of the invasion, was attacked in a separate bedroom and suffered multiple gunshot wounds.

Steven Chabot and Owens were transported to Maine Medical Center in Portland where they underwent surgery for

their injuries and have been recovering. Just after 4 a.m. on Dec. 18, Saco Police called the Londonderry Police Department and requested assistance checking Owens' residence to determine if anyone was in the home.

Police met Owens'

husband, Greg Owens, who was taken to the Police Department for questioning.

His vehicle was seized during a search of the couple's home by Maine and State Police. Owens was released after questioning and he was never arrested, according to

Londonderry Det. Chris Olson.

Saco Deputy Police Chief Jeffrey Holland said "the investigation is moving forward, continuing with added interviews," but the department had nothing new to release at this time.

Conservation Commission Supports Design for Town Fair Tire

The Conservation Commission expressed support for design plans for a new Town Fair Tire at 31 Nashua Road, which features construction of a commercial structure and a retaining wall at the rear of the property.

Project Engineer Michael Laham said at the Commission's Dec. 16 meeting that there's a wet area on

the property that doesn't appear to be a wetland or conservation easement but they plan to leave it as is.

"In our research and that of previous surveyors, we haven't found documentation of the easement," he said. "The water does flow there and it's not a bad drainage swale. It's functioning well and doesn't hinder our development. It's a nice

little stream, mainly supplied by overflow from the drainage facilities across Route 102."

Commissioner Mike Speltz asked how the plan addresses the increase in impervious surface resulting from the development.

"How do you retain additional water coming off?" he asked.

In the site's existing condition, most impervi-

ous surfaces drain out onto Hampton Drive and Palmer Drive, according to Laham, who noted they tried to work with the site and lower drainage to the rear.

"We could've designed it to drain off-site, but what we've done is design it in a way so runoff from our pavement will run towards the site and a subsurface infiltration system will catch runoff from the impervious surface," he explained, noting he is a proponent of minimal impact swales.

Laham said if the system fails, it would have to be dug up and cleaned out.

"It's a lot of work, but it

can be done," he said.

Speltz noted the Town is wrestling with the issue of how to manage drainage systems and ensure they don't fail down the road as a result of not being properly maintained.

"We don't have a building inspector. What safeguards can we put in place to ensure someone has a management plan and acts on it?" he asked, adding he is concerned a new property owner in the future may not be as diligent about maintaining the system.

Laham said the Planning Board will require a management plan as part

of approval for the design, and Speltz asked that the management plan be included on the actual site plan.

Additionally, Speltz recommended the engineer add repairs to the eroding pipe, through which draining in the manmade wetland on the site runs.

Laham agreed with Speltz' assessment and said he will add materials under the pipe to address the erosion.

Chairman Deborah Lievens said "everything looks good" and they presented the appropriate plans for the site.

Editorial

New Year's Resolutions

As we mark the start of winter and head into the New Year, we traditionally take time to reflect on the year just ending, and resolve to do some things differently in the days ahead.

So while there's nothing wrong with the usual resolutions – exercise more, eat healthier foods, take more time for yourself, pay more attention to loved ones – we suggest a different direction, which in the long run may yield more lasting results.

What about a resolve to compromise instead of pursuing “my way or the highway,” to look at all sides of an issue, rather than only the one that benefits yourself? It's not easy to be open minded, but it's worth the effort. And in politics, we're not supposed to be electing “special interest” representatives. Our officials should represent all of us. That means being open to other views.

The Timberlane School Board, for example, could take a lesson from that book.

It's been an interesting year in our towns. So it's a particularly apt time to add civic involvement to your list of resolutions.

How about running for office? Volunteers are needed to help our towns operate. And while it takes no effort to complain about what goes on at town hall, it can be much more rewarding to participate in the process. The filing period for town and school offices runs Jan. 21-30.

If putting your name on the ballot is too stressful or time consuming, volunteer posts on boards, commissions, and committees in town often go begging. There's a variety of interest areas, from conservation to housing – in which to offer your time for the betterment of your community. And these positions are important – in Londonderry in 2014, the Zoning Board of Adjustment turned down variance requests for yet another workforce housing project, paving the way for updated information.

Budget hearings and deliberative sessions are coming up in January and February. Resolve to attend those events and share your views and facts, politely and reasonably.

In Londonderry, the first funding request for a proposed multi-million-dollar auditorium will be on the warrant. Speak out, pro or con. The Timberlane school budget should generate plenty of talk. And Hampstead's multi-million-dollar plan for renovations and additions to Central School will face voters. Express yourself.

This past year Derry cut its tax rate, and the Town Council has directed that it be cut again. Sandown and Hampstead school voters chose default budgets in 2014. Have officials heard the voters?

Good luck with your resolutions, and from all of us at Nutfield Publishing to all of you, our best wishes for a happy and healthy New Year.

Support for Auditorium

To the editor:

At the end of my last letter, in support of the auditorium, you noted that my previous letter had not been received. We know from your email to me that it may have been lost due to email complications at the newspaper. Below is the letter – as relevant today as it was when it was originally written.

Let me add a few thoughts, in response to those who see the auditorium as merely a “want” that will unnecessarily cost taxpayers money. Of course a venue like this will cost us taxpayers to build and to maintain; that is a given. I don't minimize that impact on any taxpayer.

The simple fact is that this has been a “need” for over 20 years. It's just that people are finally starting to identify the true need and that the timing, with current school bonds retiring and the current “cheap cost of money” – that is, low bond rates, now is the time to act to fill this void in our community.

No, it will not accommodate commencement ceremonies with its 800 seats; that event is once a year. Countless other events will fill many and sometimes all of those seats over and over again, year after year for generations to come.

Here is the previous unpublished letter:

I have to throw a penalty flag on you for unsportsmanlike conduct in your editorial on the Mack Plaque, “Let the Games Begin.” You do a nice job of characterizing the rivalry and the spirit behind it, but then take an unwarranted jab at the end, by stating that this healthy rivalry makes “far more sense than a rivalry that results in spending

millions to build an auditorium in Londonderry so that students won't have to use rival Pinkerton's Stockbridge Theatre or Derry's Opera House.” While many in town may justifiably envy Pinkerton's beautiful theater, that is a very small reason for us to vote in March to begin the process of building our own.

We don't have a problem with using the Stockbridge Theatre or the Opera House because they are within our rival's borders. We don't use the Stockbridge Theatre because it's for Derry's schools – one school system's performing arts productions (think of all the chorus, band and orchestra concerts) are not typically held on another school's campus. Imagine playing our Lancer home games on another campus.

The Opera House is too small and woefully inadequate to stage quality theater productions and is inadequate, unavailable or inaccessible for all of the other functions which will utilize our new space – LHS, LMS and elementary drama productions, music department concerts for all age levels, school assemblies, webinars, community productions and presentations – the list goes on and on.

We are looking to spend millions to better our community – not to best our rival's.

The current cost for the middle school bond is 500K per year (for the whole town). The anticipated cost for the auditorium is 500K per year (for the whole town). Thus, it is more likely that residents of Londonderry

wouldn't notice an increase in their taxes at all.

The reader who only reads your headline walks away with two impressions:

1) The auditorium will increase their taxes

2) The people who support the auditorium don't care about their financial concerns.

That is not objective reporting.

Recycling Just Got Easier

To the editor:

A change is coming to Londonderry: recycling is heading in a new direction for most communities in the region, and it's called "single stream." Waste processors are building material recovery plants that take all manner of household recyclables and separate them mechanically into their respective types: metal, glass, plastic, paper, etc. In the past, paper items were accepted and processed separately from all other items.

How does this affect

us? Londonderry - which was the first town in New Hampshire to establish a curbside recycling program - has had a "dual stream" system for close to 30 years. Residents have been recycling paper products into one bin or bag, and containers (glass, metal, plastic) into a second bin or bag. Until now, these items were kept separate in the recycling truck.

However, because our hauler now takes our recyclables to a single stream recycling plant, he is currently mixing all of our curbside recyclables together in his truck. Hence, there is no requirement for residents to continue to distinguish paper from containers.

Now, it's important to remember two things: 1) there is no change to what can or cannot be recycled. Only the method of sorting in the truck is changing; and 2) you may continue to separate your recyclables as you have in the past if you wish, and place them at the curb in a cart, red bin or blue bag.

Alternatively, you may also now choose to put all your recyclables into one receptacle or blue bag,

and leave that at the curb. Many will find that to be the easiest method for sorting their recyclables in the home. Either way, the hauler will pick them up for the rest of the current hauling contract.

In preparation for July 2016, when the town's current contract expires, the Department of Public Works will be requesting proposals for automated collection of recycled items similar to how our trash is currently collected: via standard carts with wheels and trucks with automated pick up arms. Not only will this be an easy way to recycle, but it will help keep our costs down while reducing the instances of papers being blown out of uncovered bins.

We hope this change makes it even easier to recycle in Londonderry, enabling us to decrease the amount of trash we generate and thereby decrease what we pay for disposal costs. If you have any questions, please call the Public Works Department at 432-1100, ext. 137 or 193.

Balcom Family Keeps Gingerbread Tradition Alive with Mack's Replica

A local family honored Mack's Apples by selecting the farm stand as the subject for its annual gingerbread-making tradition.

Emily Balcom, 18, said she thought it would be nice to make a replica of Mack's this year because it's a place in town her family enjoys visiting at the holidays.

"We made the white sign with the apple in front of the farm stand because we always see it when drive by, and we included people skating because we like to play ice hockey there in the winter. We also like to go sledding and we love the ice cream, so we put a hot cocoa stand for winter," Balcom said.

In previous years, Balcom, her mother, Sue, her

aunt, Sharon Rydel, and her sisters Paige, a junior in high school, and Kate, who is studying mechanical engineering at the University of New Hampshire, have built a gingerbread log cabin, a farm, a church, and even a lighthouse.

They begin building their creations the day after Thanksgiving, working into Saturday.

The Mack's Apples replica, which they designed working from a photo of the farm stand, required a quadruple batch of gingerbread and took 15 hours to complete.

"It's a very long day and it's tiring," Emily Balcom said, adding that although it's a labor intensive project, they listen to Christmas music and enjoy working together.

Sue Balcom said when her daughters were young,

they would build individual gingerbread houses. As they got older, they decided to join forces to focus on one creative effort.

Sue said the girls' project takes over the island in her kitchen from Thanksgiving until Christmas, after which the girls smash their replica and eat the candy.

When asked if they have any tricks or tips learned from countless hours of experience in gingerbread construction, Emily and her mother said the trick is over-baking the gingerbread dough so that there's little moisture in the cookies, and mixing a frosting that has a glue-like consistency.

"We have one recipe we always use, and we make our own frosting," Sue said.

windows, they melt hard candies on wax paper, then set the hardened glass into the windows of the building and light it from inside the structure with a battery operated

candle.

Emily said this year they got more creative with the candy - they used pieces to build a stone wall around the skating rink, flames for a camp-

fire, and a string of festive lights.

The family gave a photo of their creation to Mack's, and it is now hanging on a wall at the farm stand.

Bursitis is a painful condition that affects the small fluid-filled pads (bursae) that act as cushions among your bones and the tendons and muscles near your joints. Bursitis occurs when a bursa becomes inflamed. The most common locations for bursitis are in the shoulders, elbows or hips. But you can also have bursitis by your knee, heel and the base of your big toe. Bursitis often occurs in joints that perform frequent repetitive motion. If you have bursitis, the affected joint may feel achy or stiff; hurt more when you move it or press on it or look swollen and red.

The most common causes of bursitis are repetitive motions or positions that irritate the bursae around a joint. Examples include throwing a baseball or lifting something over your head repeatedly; leaning on your elbows for long periods of time; extensive kneeling, for tasks such as laying carpet or scrubbing floors or prolonged sitting, particularly on hard surfaces.

The occurrence of bursitis becomes more common during middle age. If you work in a profession or have a hobby that requires repetitive motion or pressure on particular bursae, you're at an increased risk of developing bursitis. Professions or hobbies that can cause bursitis include carpet laying; tile setting; gardening; bicycling; baseball or ice skating to name a few. Certain diseases and conditions increase your risk of developing bursitis, such as rheumatoid arthritis; osteoarthritis; gout; thyroid disease or diabetes.

If it appears that something else may be causing the discomfort, your physician may request an X-ray of the affected area. Your doctor may want to perform additional screening to rule out other causes of joint inflammation and pain. This may include blood tests or an analysis of fluid from the inflamed bursa.

Bursitis treatment is usually simple and includes resting and immobilizing the affected area; applying ice to reduce swelling; or taking nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), such as ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin, others) or naproxen (Aleve, others), to relieve pain and reduce inflammation. Sometimes, your doctor may recommend physical therapy or

exercises to strengthen the muscles in the area.

While not all types of bursitis can be prevented, you can reduce your risk and reduce the severity of flare-ups by changing the way you perform certain tasks. Examples include use kneeling pads; cushion your knees; bend your knees when you lift; avoid elbow pressure; wheel heavy loads; take frequent breaks or walk around.

Londonderry High Comes in 10th in Niche Ranking

Londonderry High School finished in the top 10 of the Niche Organization's top public high schools in New Hampshire for 2014.

The school ranked 10th overall of 84 public high schools in the state and 2,060 of 14,431 in the country.

Coming in ahead of Londonderry, starting with first place, were Hanover High, Bedford High, Oyster River High, Souhegan Cooperative High, Bow High, Hopkinton High, Hollis-Brookline High, Exeter High and Portsmouth High. Pinkerton Academy in Derry came in 27th.

Last year, the District's dropout rate was about .34 percent, and 90 percent of last year's graduating class was accepted to two- and four-year colleges, according to Superintendent Nate Greenberg.

"I think it's the result of the pre-K through grade 12 education here in Londonderry. We have been working for years on high standards, personalizing instruction, and instituting college and career ready standards," he said. "I also think it's because the parents really have been incredibly supportive and because of the collaboration between the parents and schools."

The Niche Organization's rankings were based primarily on academic performance, with grades in health and safety, student culture and diversity, teachers, resources and facilities, extracurricular activities and activities and sports also taken into consideration. The organization additionally considered survey responses from parents and students.

The school's academic score accounted for 50 percent of its overall score, while its safety and teachers' grades accounted for 10 percent.

With an overall grade of A-, the high school ranked 22 for academics - 48.2 percent of students are enrolled in Advanced Placement (AP) courses and the school's SAT composite score is 1820. The high school's graduation rate is 95 percent and the student-teacher ratio is 13:1.

On the list of Safest Public High School in New Hampshire, Londonderry ranked 5th with a school-related arrest rate of zero percent, an expulsion rate of zero percent, and an out-of-school suspension rate of 2.7 percent. The school ranked 7th on the Best High School Teachers List for the State.

Londonderry ranked 9th for Best New Hampshire School Districts; 4th for Best High School

Administration; 5th for Best Sports Programs; 7th for Best High School Outcomes; 8th for Best Facilities; and 9th for Best Extra Curricular Programs.

Nationally, the high school ranked 4,260 of 10,907 for academics; 313 of 7,304 for safety; 460 of 9,593 for extracurricular activities; 288 of 5,984 for

facilities; 505 of 9,534 for sports; 593 of 6,360 for administration; 803 of 5,886 for teachers; 1,047 of 6,947 for food; 2,412 of 6,034 for best outcomes; and 6,676 of 9,538 for diversity.

The high school's high ranking for overall experience indicates students are happy with their experiences in all aspects of

the school; the school is an exceptional academic institution in terms of teachers, students, resources for learning and student outcomes; the school is made up of a diverse population and fosters an accepting positive school culture; and students are actively involved in a variety of extracurricular activities

and sports the school offers, according to the Niche Organization.

"We are proud of these results," LHS Principal Jason Parent said in an email.

New Procedure Jan. 1 for Outside Burning

The Londonderry Fire Department announced a new procedure that will allow residents to call the department to check the status of outside burning for the day.

Residents who call 432-1100, Ext. 311 or 421-1380 will hear one of two prerecorded messages: "Those with a valid seasonal category 1 or 2 burning permit may safely have a camp or cooking fire," or the department "is not allowing burning today due to

the fire danger classification issued by the State of New Hampshire," according to a press release from the Fire Department.

Residents who hold a valid seasonal burn permit must follow all outside burning permit guidelines.

Permits must be renewed on an annual basis at the Londonderry Central Fire Station, where a valid 2015 burning permit may be obtained.

When there is 100 percent snow cover surrounding a fire site by 100 feet, a burn permit is not

required.

The information hotline will go into service on Jan. 1.

For more information, call the Fire Prevention Bureau at 432-1124 during normal business hours.

The new system was created partly because it provides an easier method by which residents can find out if it is safe for them to burn, but also to alleviate call volume for dispatchers, according to Londonderry Division of Fire Prevention Chief Brian Johnson.

"Now that we're also dispatching for Hampstead, we have seen a rising increase in call volume. We have already had 100 more calls in Londonderry this year than the total number of calls last year, and the year isn't over yet," he said, noting the new system is based on the model used successfully in Salem. "And on a nice Saturday night, we can get up to 100 phone calls from people asking if they can burn a campfire. It's overwhelming for one dispatcher."

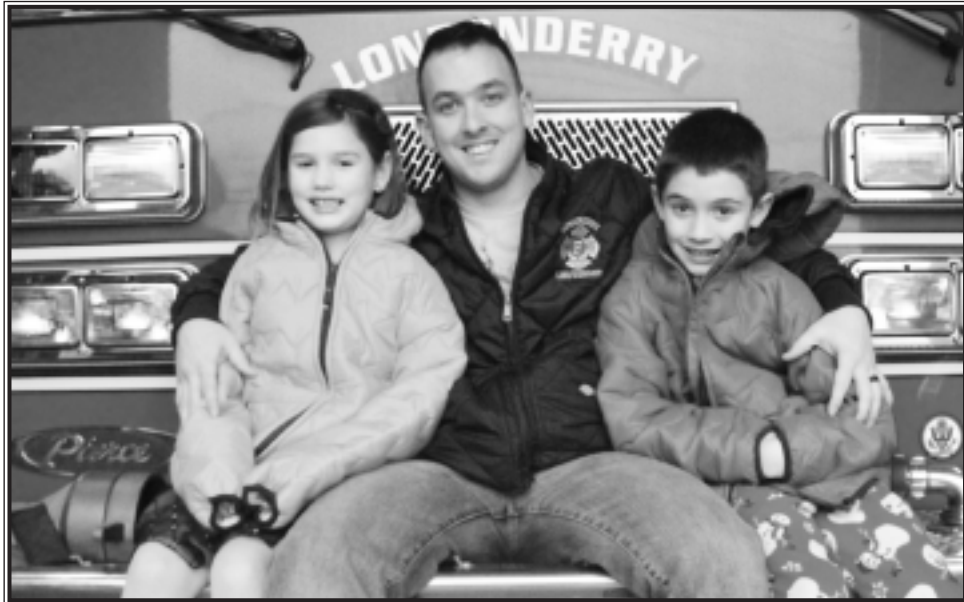

Some even posed with the firefighters in their new winter coats on the front of the trucks.

"The look on the kids' faces when we gave them the coats was worth its weight in gold," Butler said. "We strive to do everything for the right

reasons, and this is one of those right reasons."

Operation Warm was such a success this year, the union plans to organize another warm coat drive next year and hopes to get the word out to inspire even greater participation, according to Butler.

Following the Market Basket takeover, Pillsbury Realty Development, LLC filed a lawsuit in Merrimack Superior Court on March 28 accusing DeMoulas Super Markets of alleged breach of contract and purposeful, deliber-

ate, and continued delay in fulfilling its obligations under the Access Agreement signed in May 2011, thereby blocking the company's ability to move forward with its development plans.

Pillsbury Realty alleged DeMoulas Super Markets' actions put the entire Woodmont Com-

mons project in jeopardy.

A court date was set for Sept. 18, but court action was stayed until early 2015 when it appeared Arthur T. DeMoulas would have the opportunity to buy out the remaining shares in the company and resume direction of Market Basket stores.

Pillsbury Realty and the Town of Londonderry proceeded with engineering on the access road while litigation was pending to allow construction to begin in early 2015, if the issues were resolved.

After prolonged negotiation, Arthur T. DeMoulas bought the remaining shares of his company and resumed his position as CEO, which Pillsbury attorney Daniel Luker told

the Londonderry Times in September would be a "win/win" outcome for both parties.

"Now that things have been resolved, I suspect we will start to see Woodmont move forward," Smith said.

Pillsbury Realty LLC Principal Michael Kettenbach said he can't comment on any new developments with the project until they come before

the Planning Board and the public.

The next step for the project would be for conceptual plans and designs for the access road, which is important to the Town in terms of traffic mitigation, to be brought before the Planning Board, which would "really start the process," according to Smith.

"I haven't seen anything yet," he said.

Lawsuit Settled Against Murray's Auto Recycling

Murray's Auto Recycling of Londonderry and the Conservation Law Foundation (CLF) reached a negotiated resolution in the case CLF filed against the auto salvage company on April 30, 2014.

The civil suit, filed in U.S. District Court under the citizen suit enforcement provisions of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, sought a declaratory judgment, injunctive relief and other relief the court deemed appropriate to correct Murray's alleged violations of the federal Clean Water Act.

CLF alleged Dudek Auto, also known as Murray's Auto, located at 55 Hall Road and owned by Ed Dudek, discharges stormwater to wetlands adjoining Little Cohas Brook and has not applied for a stormwater permit for the facility at least since 1998.

The negotiated resolution, filed on Dec. 18, requires Dudek Auto to develop a Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) by Jan. 31 and update the plan as necessary moving forward.

Development of the plan is to include formation of a pollution prevention team of qualified personnel who will be responsible for preparing the plan and assisting the plant manager in implementing practices to com-

ply with the permit; assessment of potential stormwater pollution sources; selection of appropriate control measures that minimize the discharge of pollutants during storm events for each of these sources; and development of procedures for conducting required inspection and monitoring activities, as well as regular maintenance of control measures.

Dudek Auto is to hire a qualified engineering consultant to develop the SWPPP and include the consultant's recommendation in the plan, as well as provide a copy of its SWPPP to CLF for review and comment by Jan. 31.

The auto salvage must also install and implement control measures, including good housekeeping practices, erosion and sediment control, and runoff management taking a low-impact development approach.

Finally, Dudek Auto agreed to a monitoring program, five installment payments totaling \$23,000 to the New Hampshire Rivers Council for environment restoration of or other benefit to the Merrimack Watershed, and payment of CLF's legal fees and costs, which total \$33,000.

According to court documents, CLF alleged its complaint in a letter to Dudek Auto dated Jan. 27, 2014, after which Dudek

Auto allegedly violated Section 301(a) of the Federal Clean Water Act, which prohibits the discharge of any pollutant into waters of the United States from a "point source," unless the discharge complies with various sections of the Clean Water Act.

That Section also prohibits discharges not authorized by, or in violation of, the terms of a valid National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit issued pursuant to the Clean Water Act.

CLF's investigations determined that Dudek's auto recycling business is located on and in the federally-mapped wetland that adjoins and flows into Little Cohas Brook.

"Any automobile salvage yard discharging storm water that has come in contact with industrial materials or areas of industrial activity into public waters requires a discharge permit under the Clean Water Act," Zak Griefen, lead attorney for CLF's Environmental Enforcement Project, told the Londonderry Times in August. "After determining that Dudek Auto requires a Clean Water Act discharge permit, CLF checked (the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's) database to see if Dudek Auto had obtained that permit and learned that Dudek Auto had never applied for it."

The CLF never alleged any pollutants from Dudek's property were going into the stormwater, noted Joshua Wyatt, Dudek's attorney.

"Mr. Dudek is glad the case is resolved and happy to invest in his property to make further im-

provements to help the environment," Wyatt said.

Wyatt noted Dudek is cooperating with the CLF and continues to be in cooperation with the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services to remedy environmental issues on his property.

The settlement will not be finalized until it has been reviewed and approved by the U.S. Department of Justice.

"Everyone is satisfied with the resolution and we are optimistic the federal government and court will approve it," Wyatt said.

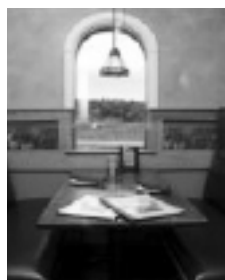

North School Business Fair a Highlight of the Year

Budding entrepreneurs at North Elementary School sold a variety of unique products at the school's 30th annual Business Fair.

Products ranged from homemade hand warmers to pencils made from tree branches.

"Kids have been seeing the business fair since they were in first grade," teacher Toni Carballeira said. "The first thing they ask when they get to fifth grade is, 'when is the business fair?'"

In addition to dreaming-up a product to sell at the fair, students are responsible for writing a business plan they present to their teacher that explains what their overhead costs will be, why they believe their product will be desired and successful, and what they plan to charge for their product so that they are able to pay their parents back for production costs.

"Everyone helps out with this - parents, grandparents, even aunts and uncles," Carballeira said, noting the event wouldn't be possible without the

help of the students' families.

Grace McDonough worked for about five hours total sewing hand warmers with her grandmother, and Rease St. Gleais worked for about 10 hours making scarves with her grandfather, choosing fabrics at the store herself and cutting the fabrics into accessories to sell at the fair.

"I learned they're really hard to make," St.

Gleais said of the scarves her grandfather knitted and donated for her business.

Other students crafted treasures from raw, natural materials.

Fred Keaton and Ryan Duddy teamed up to cut yo-yos from wood with the help of Keaton's dad.

Keaton said the project took about three weekends to complete, and their efforts were rewarded - they had nearly sold out a basket that had been brimming with yo-yos in their first hour.

The duo decided to sell their Yo-yos for \$2 and their Mega Yo-yo, a

larger version, for \$3.

With the help of his dad, Nathan Seibert sawed tree branches into ornaments and whittled smaller limbs into pencils, drilling a hole down the center of the branches and hammering compressed graphite into the hole.

"I started planning for this in first grade when my dad made wands like the ones in Harry Potter from tree branches," said Seibert, who factored into his business plan \$15 for labor costs.

Seibert had already made over \$21 within the first hour of the business fair, which started at 9 a.m.

In addition to paying everyone back for expenses related to producing their product, the students are required to donate at least 10 percent of their profit to a charity of the class' choosing.

Students chose to fundraise for the Juvenile Diabetes Association, as her class has a student with the disease.

"Most of them break even, and many who make a profit choose to donate more than the required 10 percent to their charity," she said.

"They put a lot of time into making their products and creating their business plans. This builds nicely on our goal

LHS Icemen Win Twice, Fall Once At Salem Holiday Tourney

The Londonderry High ice hockey team continued its efforts to find consistency early in the 2014-15 season by playing in the 15th annual Blue Devil Holiday Classic at the Salem Icenter recently.

Coach Peter Bedford's LHS bunch had its ups

and downs in its three contests in the tourney, winning a pair and dropping one.

The Lancers defeated teams from Massachusetts and Maine in their first two matches before dropping a tight decision to the Merrimack High Tomahawks' squad that is now coached by Bedford's former Londonder-

ry High assistant Matt Davis.

The Lancers and their fans had reason to think they'd been fortunate to walk away from Salem's Icenter with a 5-4 nipping of a tough Belmont (Mass.) Marauders' squad in the first holiday tourney game for both squads last Friday, Dec. 26.

Following a sluggish start to the first period, the Lancers ended that stanza all knotted up with Belmont at 1-1.

Londonderry grasped a 3-2 advantage at the end of two periods, but the contest was tied up twice in the third period before senior forward Lucas Poulin provided the locals with what proved to be the winning goal with a little less than nine minutes remaining on the game clock.

Londonderry didn't wind up with any shortage of shots on net in the tight victory after hammering 38 blasts on the opposing net. And LHS goalie Colby Joncas faced the comparatively small number of 22 Belmont blasts in three periods of play. Joncas came up with several noteworthy saves down the stretch - finish-

ing with a total of 18 - as he and his teammates worked intently to preserve the 5-4 lead that ended up being the final score.

The Bay State team snared an early lead - scoring a mere 3:07 after the opening faceoff - to claim the 1-0 advantage.

Londonderry got the tying goal with 8:49 left in that opening period thanks to a strong forechecking effort by Cooper Roy, who stole the puck from a Belmont defender and shot five-hole successfully on the Marauders' keeper.

The Lancers then flashed their offensive prowess during the first five minutes of the second period, receiving consecutive goals from Mike

MacKenzie (from Chris Marrello just 2:41 in) and Alex LaPlante (from Cooper Roy only 1:27 later) to claim a 3-1 lead.

The Marauders got one of those goals back with 34.8 seconds to go in the period, and it was a one-goal game going into the final 15 minutes.

Londonderry had a 15-7 advantage in shots on net in the second period and had a 27-12 lead in shots over those first two periods, but their lead on the scoreboard was more than a little tenuous as the third period commenced.

And once the puck got dropped in the third stanza, it didn't remain a 3-2 game for long. Belmont knotted the score at 3-3 less than two minutes in,

but LHS reclaimed the upper hand less than a minute after that when Poulin set up LaPlante to make it a 4-3 contest.

But the Bay State boys tied the score at 4-4 a mere 2:03 after that, and it was anybody's game once again.

However, Poulin did the honors on the eventual winning goal with 8:49 remaining when he made a solo rush up the ice and was stopped by the Belmont keeper at the right post of his net. But as the Lancer veteran swooped around to the left post of the opposing cage the puck wobbled his way and he didn't miss on his second shot at the netting.

Then on Saturday evening, Dec. 27, the Lancers

LHS Wrestlers Gain Attention at Lowell Holiday Event

First-year coach Jason Cucolo's Londonderry High wrestling squad put forth a strong showing at the annual George Bossi Lowell Holiday Wrestling Tournament at the Tsongas Arena in Lowell, Mass., last weekend.

The Lancers, who ended day one of competition Saturday, Dec. 27, ranked second among the more than 60 competing squads and spent some of the morning in first place, wound up finishing out of the top three contingents. But Cucolo's crew had five wrestlers nab top-eight finishes, with senior

star Jean-Luc Lemieux leading the way by winning his 138-pound weight class by going undefeated in five bouts.

Cucolo's charges trailed only the three-time defending champion Mount Anthony squad from Vermont for the team title after one day of competition, and that Green Mountain crew wound up winning the tourney crown again, with a team total of 256 points. Springfield Central (Mass.) was a distant second scoring 182 and Timberlane of Plaistow took third with a 166 total.

Lemieux tallied three, first-period pins and one second-period pin on the way to his weight class championship, taking the title over Garrett Ludwig of Winchester, Mass.

Kyle Byrd ended up with the next highest Londonderry finish by taking fourth in his 160-pound class. Byrd went 6-2 in eight total matches.

Fellow Lancer Richard Bilodeau made it all the way to the championship semi-finals, where he lost to Dylan Barreiro of Pinkerton Academy, 7-3. He tallied three pins and a

major decision to claim fifth place - posting a 5-2 overall record - in his 195-pound class, Ryan Cabezas made it to the Championship Quarter finals but wound up finishing seventh overall in his 126-pound class with a 5-1 record, and Andrew Chase, who had the most matches for the team, took eighth in his 132-pound division with a 6-3 record.

Other Londonderry competitors in the high-profile tourney were

Mahdi Achab, 170-pound, (3-2 record), Jake Barr, 152-pound, (2-2), Colin Reardon, 145-pound, (1-2), Kevin Robischeau, 106-pound, (4-2), Sebastian Rozczenko, 182-pound, (2-2), and Craig Santos, 113-pound, (3-2).

"Overall, I was pleased with a fourth-place finish, although there is still room for improvement," said Cucolo. "A fourth-place finish at this type of tournament early in the year is a good start; however, the wrestlers and I

aren't content with this finish. We will continue to improve and grow each day with the end goal of winning a New England championship."

Regarding the individual efforts of his charges, Cucolo said, "I was pleased with the individual placers in the tournament as well. All guys that had to wrestle back after tough losses showed heart and determination and did not give up after not reaching their goals (earlier) in the tournament."

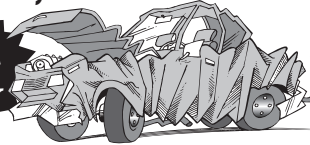

Ex-LHS Hoop Star Stefanie Murphy Reigning In Romania

Former Londonderry High basketball star Stefanie Murphy has traveled quite a few hoop roads since her record-setting, two-time Gatorade Player of the Year days in a Lady Lancers' uniform.

First was her superb career at Boston College, followed by a successful professional run in European hoop that has carried her to a handful of countries. Presently, the 2007 LHS graduate appears to be right in her basketball prime, playing for the Sepsis team in Saint Gheorghe, Romania.

Home in Londonderry for the holidays, the 2011 BC grad is presently ranked in the top 10 in both scoring and rebounding in Romania Liga National for her Sepsis squad. And her consistently strong play has her team riding high as it heads toward the second half of its season after the holiday break.

"Things are going really well," said Murphy. "My team's currently in first place and we're in the final four of the Romanian Cup. We've been playing really well. The team works hard, and our coach pushes us to become better every

day."

Coach Zoran Mikes' Sepsis squad went 13-2 in its 15 first half games, ending the first segment of the regular season with six consecutive victories.

Murphy ranked first on the Romanian team in points per game (16.9), rebounds per game (8.8), and minutes played per game (27.9) while also averaging nearly two assists and one block per contest.

The standout center sat second in field goal percentage at 63.5 percent, enjoying perhaps the finest season of her pro career after campaigns in Slovakia, France,

and Hungary as well.

"Overall, it's one of the better experiences I've had over the last few seasons," she said. "I'm very excited for the second half of the season to start. Our last regular season game is Feb. 28, then we start the playoffs."

Murphy is one of four Americans on the Sepsis team, including Colorado native Chucky Jeffery, former University of Pittsburgh stalwart Taneisha Harrison, and ex-West Virginia University player Christal Caldwell.

Murphy has gotten great pleasure from being able to meet members of

the community in the city in which she plays, which is different from some of her other European hoop experiences.

"What's really great about this team as well is that we've had some interaction with the community, and we were able to deliver gifts donated by our fans to those less fortunate in a nearby kindergarten and to a special needs school. It's really nice to be able to give back," she said.

During the six-game winning run at the end of the first half of the regular season, Murphy had several big games and played

a key role in all six.

She netted 29 points and hauled down nine rebounds in a 102-60 win over Cluj Napoca, collected 18 points and eight boards with two blocks in an 88-42 pounding of Satu Mare, and was good for 18 points, eight rebounds, three assists, and three steals in a 114-54 pounding of Torgu Mures.

So folks who enjoyed watching Stef Murphy play basketball at Londonderry High and Boston College in years past can rest assured that she's still doing big things in pro basketball in Romania.

The victory was called a win for the middle class and restored faith in a business model that values company relationships between employers and employees, as well as those between co-workers and with customers.

School District Considers Building Auditorium

The School Board approved sending to the March 2015 ballot a warrant article asking voters for \$500,000 to fund architecture and engineering services for the proposed construction of a Community Auditorium at the high school.

It's anticipated the 28,800-square-foot facility would cost the Town around \$8.9 million, with the project to be broken into two phases: the architecture and engineering services and construction of the auditorium. If the warrant article to fund architecture and engineering for the project passes, a Building Committee would be created.

Despite efforts of the Auditorium Committee to rally support for the project at school functions, the proposed auditorium has received mixed reviews.

Members of the music community expressed strong support at a School Board meeting, urging the Board to send the architecture and engineering costs to the voters, but taxpayers called into question the School Board's decision to start the process.

Auditorium Committee Chairman Tony DeFrancesco said an increase in taxes shouldn't dissuade residents from supporting construction of the auditorium, noting it's "not cheap to live in a full-service community."

Finance Director Sue Hickey Resigns, Hired by Derry

The Town of Londonderry paid former Finance Director Susan Hickey \$64,000 as part of a settlement agreement reached in December after she submitted a letter of resignation Dec. 1.

Town Manager Kevin Smith confirmed Dec. 8 that he placed Hickey on administrative leave and advised her he was terminating her employment. After exercising her right to a public hearing before the Town Council, Hickey withdrew her request, having reached an agreement with the Town regarding her separation from employment.

On Dec. 2, the Derry Town Council confirmed Hickey as the Town's new Chief Financial Officer.

Smith said currently the Finance Director's responsibilities are being handled by controller Doug Smith.

Market Basket Saga

When Market Basket Chief Executive Officer Arthur T. DeMoulas was ousted by his cousin Arthur S. DeMoulas and replaced with co-CEOs James Gooch and Felicia Thornton, employees of stores throughout the region rallied for the replacement of their leader.

Standing outside the Garden Lane store in Londonderry, employees held signs that read, "Our Boss the Only Boss ATD" and encouraged patrons to boycott the grocery until Artie T. was allowed to return to his position as CEO. By the end of July, Market Basket customers had joined the fight for Artie T.'s return.

At the end of August, Arthur T., who previously owned a 49.5 percent share in Market Basket, signed a contract to purchase the 50.5 percent of

the company's remaining shares from his cousin and delivered a speech to his loyal employees and customers expressing his gratitude for their loyalty.

The receipts of customers who paid higher prices at other grocery retailers to support the employees' efforts to return Artie T. to his position at the helm of the company were displayed in the windows of Market Basket stores.

When it was time to return to work, Lemieux said his employees were happy to be back and said Aug. 28 was "a very emotional day." The sale agreement was finalized in December.

Customer Katie Wilhelm called the victory a win for middle class America. "It's standing up for everything this country stands for and has fought for," she said.

EEE Discovered

New Hampshire's first finding of Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) in the summer of 2014 was in Londonderry. The New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services announced the discovery of a mosquito infected with EEE in Londonderry on Aug. 15, right in the middle of the Town's Old Home Day Celebration.

But the finding didn't stop the weeklong activities from going off without a hitch, according to Town Manager Kevin Smith. "We had one of our best parades yet, and no one stayed away," he said.

State's Fourth Worst Storm-Related Power Outage Puts Town in Dark

The State's fourth most significant storm-related power outage left thousands of Londonderry res-

idents in the dark on Thanksgiving.

Fire Chief Darren O'Brien said 3,100 Londonderry residents were without power at the height of the storm on Nov. 27. Efforts to restore power to the Town's 10,570 customers were substantially complete by Sunday morning, according to Public Service of New Hampshire.

The Londonderry and Derry Fire Departments worked in conjunction with A Londonderry Emergency Response Team (ALERT) to open a shelter at the Londonderry High School gymnasium early Thanksgiving evening, offering those without power a warm place to stay, showers and a hot meal. Six people stayed at the shelter, with two people staying overnight on Nov. 28, when temperatures dropped. An additional 18 people used the showers and about 11 stopped in for a meal and to recharge their mobile phones. The shelter closed Nov. 29.

Residents Resist Workforce Housing Developments

After hearing the concerns of several residents who spoke against a proposed workforce housing development on Stonehenge Road, the Zoning Board of Adjustment voted unanimously to deny all three variance requests related to the project.

The decision was a significant step towards managing the number of workforce housing projects coming into Londonderry.

At the Dec. 18 public hearing for the 288-unit apartment complex, residents called for the town to take inventory of workforce housing units currently available and under construction before granting variances for another

project.

According to State Rep. Al Baldasaro, R-Londonderry, who served on the Affordable Workforce Housing Board and voted against the legislation in 2008, the Workforce Housing law was designed for regional use. Derry, Manchester, Litchfield and other areas surrounding Londonderry already offer a high percentage of workforce housing rental units, he said. Londonderry also offers homes for purchase that are under the median.

Pettengill Road To Be Completed 'With No Burden to Taxpayer'

"This is a project that has been a decade in the making," Town Manager Kevin Smith said of Pettengill Road. "Now seeing it come together, and being almost entirely paid for by private dollars, I think is quite an accomplishment."

Smith announced at the Aug. 11 Town Council meeting that Pettengill Road is being completed without town funds. The road will be completed by landowners, with a commitment from Prologis to build 1,800 feet of the two-lane road, starting at the airport access road, to open up the UPS/Pratt & Whitney site.

Property tax revenues on UPS alone are anticipated to be approximately \$800,000 in the first year.

A Tax Increment Finance District (TIF) was set up for the area, which is to fund a \$250,000 traffic light installed by the

landowners. A sewer system will be built by the town and paid for with user fees.

Hazmat Course Prepares Firefighters for Ebola

The Londonderry Fire Department completed a refresher course on handling Hazardous Materials with a component addressing the Ebola outbreak in October. The Ebola outbreak has killed thousands of people in West Africa and became a concern as international travelers and healthcare workers to the region returned to the U.S. with the virus.

With an airport in town, Battalion Chief Jim Roger said it was important the department was prepared to care for infected patients and contain contagion.

Criminal Charges Dismissed, Battalion Chief Resigns

Charges against Fire Battalion Chief Douglas Cardwell related to alleged harassment were dropped in November after he accepted a negotiated resolution and resigned his position with the Fire Department.

Cardwell, 48, had been on paid administrative leave since he was arrested in September on four misdemeanor counts of making harassing telephone calls to his girlfriend's ex-husband.

Cardwell was a member of the Fire Department for 28 years.
