uring the Dec. 19 Town Council meeting, Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, announced they were working on the language for some of the warrant articles this year including the possibility of a warrant article in regards to Lions Hall.

Malaguti explained they would likely be looking for guidance from the Department of Revenue Administration and their legal counsel as to whether or not they can put a multiple choice question on the ballot.

School Board Members Review District's Truancy Policy

t the Dec. 20 School Board meet-Ling, one of the agenda items was in regards to a first reading of proposed policies regarding attendance for students.

The district's Director of Pupil Services, Kim Carpinone, said she is representing a Committee of people from each of the schools that have been working on making revisions to the policy since the summer.

For the policy, JED, which is known as the "truancy policy" for the district, they are looking

'One of the goals of JED is just to be consistent with the regulations around compulsory education and truancy," said Carpinone.

One of the subsections of the policy is related to the school district attendance policy.

Carpinone said they are looking to make amendments to it.

"This amendment creates a cohesive districtwide procedural approach to school attendance," Carpinone said in a memo. "The procedures define an excused and unexcused absence

> Carpinone explained that in the amendment it will attempt to articulate what an excused absence would be and what the district policy for what happens when a number of unexcused student absences occur.

> For example, in the proposed policy it states that if a student has been absent unexcused five or more days in the school year or has ten or more half days unexcused absen-

If it continues and they have more than 10 days. then a meeting would be scheduled with their parents or guardians.

"The purpose of the meeting shall be to develop a plan to address the truancy," the proposed policy reads. "At the meeting, the building principal or his/her designee(s) and the truant officer shall inform the parents/ guardians that additional unexcused absences may result in a report to the Division of Children Youth and Families (DCYF)

der RSA 169-D: 2, III (a) in the local district court."

The proposed policy states that if the student doesn't comply with the plan and either has 20 full absences unexcused or 40 half days then "the building principal or his/her designee(s) and the truant officer shall consult with the Superintendent to determine whether DCYF should be notified and/or court action filed."

School Board Unanimously Approves Black as Superintender

School Board approved current Interim Superintendent Daniel Black as the District's next permanent Superintendent during the Tuesday, Dec. 20, meeting.

According to a press release, this decision comes after many months of work by the Superintendent Search Committee that was initially charged early last year under the guidance of the Bryan Group, who helped the committee determine Superintendent competencies and characteristics; collected and vetted applications; and ran an indepth interview process.

After successfully going through short and long interviews, Black

He was moved on to a community Meet and Greet on Dec. 12, when community members could ask questions and make public comment. From there, the Board made their final vote on Dec. 20.

> Black has been serving as the Interim Superintendent since July 1; prior to that appointment, he was hired as the District's Assistant Superintendent in 2016. Before coming to Londonderry, Black worked in Keene as the Assistant Superintendent. His collection of educational experience includes: founding Principal in New York City Schools,

teacher, and Teach for America in Texas. He earned his degrees from Vanderbilt, Harvard, and Plymouth Universities.

In Londonderry, Black is known for his databased collaborative decision making. He has been instrumental in the formation of the District's Portrait of a Graduate. He is focused on designing clearer competency-based curriculum. He is deeply committed to helping the District future plan effectively for issues such as student achievement, facilities planning, and the status of public Kindergarten. Black also makes visiting classrooms and supporting teachers and students a priority. He is well regarded by the Administrative Team, many of whom he assembled upon becoming Interim in July.

Before making the motion to appoint Black to the position, Board member Bob Slater explained the grueling search process over the past year, and that he was looking for the best person to move the District in a positive direction. He noted of Black "I have watched this man

since last spring when he was appointed Interim; he put a team together like no other to move the District forward – it was amazing. Since July, the District has gotten stronger and stronger, and this place is running like it never ran before. I feel as though this gentleman has those qualities to move us forward. The District is fortunate to have him."

Black stated, "I am humbled and thankful for the support and praise from the School Board and Search Committee. I would also comment that Londonderry did a great job putting me through a hiring process, while at the same time recruiting me for the long term. At every step of the way, I was reminded of the great staff and community we have here in Londonder-

Detective Alfaro passed the competitive detectives process earlier this year to make a list of five eligible candidates and was promoted to sergeant.


The newest Sergeants were then introduced. Sergeant, Andrew Phillips, and Sergeant, Ryan MacLean, stepped forward with their family members.

Superintendent, Dan Black, explained during their previous meetings that although he understood wanting to get information out to the public quickly through electronic means, including email, he was worried about generic requests from outside entities.

A change to the science department was also made which updated the description for Placement Advanced Physics II.

"A new course piloted as a continuation of Advanced Placement Physics I," the memo read. "This course is a continuation of the study of elementary physics that began in College Physics I. Topics to be investigated include the fundamentals and the applications of oscillating sys-

heat energy and thermodynamics, electrical charges, and electric and magnetic fields."

Another course that will be added is for the science department which will be Honors Earth Space Science.

"This class would offer an accelerated and intensified curriculum designed to meet highschool level "Next Generation Science Standards" Earth Space Science Standards at the depth, pace, and rigor of an honors level class," the memo read. "Next Generation Science Standards provide a unique opportunity to increase geoscience literacy with a focus on further development of science and engineering skills. Students will meet these standards by exploring curriculum developed around student-relevant phenomena, instruction, lab activities, and research. Many of the labs and activities in the Honors level course would utilize the same materials and

already owned or budgeted for in the current program."

The district is also adding a life skills class where "students get introduced to all areas of Family and Consumer Sciences in one semester."

The memo outlined that a few weeks would be for kitchen skills, clothing design/basic sewing skills, budgeting, career exploration, early childhood education and relationships.

Another new course that was being proposed is under the counseling department called college seminar.

"This course is designed to meet the needs of any student investigating post-secondary educational opportunities,' the memo to the school board reads. "The course increases awareness of all the college options available after high school and gives students a clear path to what's next in their lives.'

The School Board ultimately unanimously approved the changes.
