Concerns Over Gilcreast Road Property Discussed by Council

During the public comment portion of the Monday night, July 11, meeting of the Town Council, a resident raised concerns in regards to negotiations between the town and

Gilcreast LLC on the property at 35 Gilcreast Road.

The topic was brought up by resident Christine Perez, and abutter, who lives at The Nevins development.

She explained that she had concerns with

the potential development of the property which is 23-acres of land and backs up to the Nevins community open space.

"I am saying it publicly because I want it on record," said Perez.

Town Council Approves Update to Dog Regulations

A proposed ordinance to make changes to the leash ordinance in town was one of the topics of discussion during the July 11 Londonderry Town Council meeting.

Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, called the proposed changes a "general rewrite and improvements."

Malaguti said that it works to try to solve problems they have had in the past and may have in the future.

"It doesn't institute a

full leash law," said Malaguti.

Town Clerk, Sherry Farrell, said that it is also important for people to be responsible for their pets.

"We have to be responsible for them," said Farrell.

Farrell stated that since they approached the Town Council about making changes to the ordinance and spoke about owners being responsible for their pets they have seen a decrease in the number of calls they receive.

"I have to thank our residents; they listen-

ed," said Farrell.

Farrell pointed out during their previous meeting that she worked with the deputy police chief to find out how many calls they have had over the past couple of years regarding concerns about dogs. She said that there were just under 1,500 incidents or concerns with dogs.

Farrell said that the calls were for a number of different reasons.

One suggestion offered by Town Councilor, Deb Paul, was to have the definitions on what determines a "Menace"

Hearing on Purchase of Lithia Springs Property Continued

During the Monday night, July 11, meeting of the Town Council, a public hearing was held on the potential purchase of the Lithia Springs property along Route 102.

It was explained by Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, that the town is looking into acquiring 54 acres of land along Nashua Rd., towards the Hudson line.

He said that it used to be the home of the Lithia Springs Water Company.

Adding that, "It is since long gone."

Malaguti said that

before they could go forward with the \$1.5 million deal it needed to get approval by the Conservation Commission, which it did.

They also need to receive approval by the Town Council and the appraisal amount needed to be no less than the cost of the purchase agreement.

"That's why we're here tonight," said Malaguti.

Malaguti said that they have a safeguard because if they can't find the funds then they can back out of the agreement.

Malaguti said that the Conservation Commission currently has

around \$750,000 in their land acquisition fund and that they are hopeful that they will be able to increase that amount.

He stated that they are hopeful that they will be able to be awarded different grants that they applied for or will be applying for in order to purchase the property. Malaguti said there

Freedom Energy Logistics Gives Update on CAA Program

Barth Fromuth of Freedom Energy Logistics came before the board to discuss the Community Choice Aggregation agreement between the town of Londonderry and the company at the most recent Energy Efficiency task-force meeting on June 16.

The Londonderry CCA program website said that the goal of the agreement, which was signed in 2021, is to “provide savings for customers” but has a disclaimer that savings cannot be guaranteed compared to the utility’s basic service rate.

“The CAA program

seeks to provide price stability and average savings over the full term of the program, but because future utility rates are not known, there is no guarantee of savings,” the website said.

Fromuth said that him and the company have been giving regular updates to the Town Council about the agreement since the contract had been signed and that he had personally presented to the council twice.

Chair Deb Paul said that she did not remember Fromuth coming before the board to present the information and that she had not received any updates on

the agreement.

Fromuth said that Paul was giving inaccurate information.

“I’m not telling you [inaccuracies],” Paul said. “I’m saying I as a councilor have not got anything and as a council it has never been brought up at a meeting for the last two and a half years since I’ve been on it.”

Fromuth said that he could provide evidence that he had presented to the council.

“I don’t know why this is so tense, we’ve had a good relationship with the town of Londonderry,” Fromuth said.

Paul said that the conversation was not

tense but that she just did not have any data or recollection of the presentation and contract.

In early 2020, the company approached a number of towns with this proposal which Londonderry had expressed interest in as tax bills were going up.

Fromuth said that although the actual contract had not been written up and signed until 2021, that the process with informal meetings began in 2020.

The company had battled back and forth with the utility companies to come up with a compromise over certain disputes, and the

company then came up with a draft of the community choice plan which was seen and approved by the community choice task force.

The plan then came before the Town Council but could not yet be approved at that point due to changes that were incoming from the Public Utility Commission rule process.

Paul said that as Fromuth was explaining the history of the contract, it started to sound familiar, though she still was never given any data or any documents on it.

“I’d love to get my hands on some of the documents or even from

the task force...” Paul said. “They were never circulated to people on the board or within the town itself, and that’s not your problem and that’s not your fault. I’m not blaming you; I’m just saying it would have been nice if we were able to find that information.”

Fromuth later apologized as he was unaware of the Energy Task Force and said they did not yet exist when his company first started the planning process for the agreement.

Paul said that she did not believe there was much to do with the agreement until it is up in a few years but thanked Fromuth for his time.

School Board Makes Eighth Grade PSATs Optional

During the July 5 School Board meeting one of the items discussed during the Superintendent Report was in regards to standardized testing.

Interim Superintendent Dan Black said that overall the School District is doing well when it comes to standardized testing each year.

“I think we’re doing okay when it comes to the pressures of standardized testing,” said Black.

Black explained that it was brought to his attention that they do a lot of standardized testing for the eighth graders each year compared to the other grades in the District.

In Londonderry they made a decision a few years ago to have students in eighth grade. With other required standardized tests it means that students in eighth grade are taking tests up to five times a year.

“What we have seen between state/federal

requirements as well as our own choices is that we are testing our 8th graders too much over their final year of middle school,” Black wrote in a memo to the School Board. “We have also concluded that the PSAT 8/9 test is much more suitable for 9th graders (especially in math) and penalizes our 8th graders when we use it for class placement decisions at LHS when they take it in the fall of their 8th grade year.”

Black said that it was brought to his attention

by Londonderry Middle School Principal William Van Bennekum, and other staff at the school.

After discussing it further they decided to make the decision not to require the PSAT going forward in eighth grade.

Black said that students will still be able to take the PSAT in eighth grade as a way to practice if their parents decide they want that.

“We want to shift our academic program at the 8th grade level to make

the PSAT 8/9 test optional for students that want to take it as a practice exam for high school, but not a requirement as it now stands,” said Black. “LMS will work with any family that chooses to have their student take the PSAT 8/9 test in the fall of their 8th grade year and register them for that test.”

Black told the School Board that while they weren’t required to go to the Board for their approval he wanted to

make sure that they were aware of the change.

Aside from the changes to the PSAT for eighth graders Black said that they would be keeping all of the other requirements currently in place for testing.

“We would still intend to keep all the PSAT testing that still occurs at the high school as well as the i-Ready testing in the lower grades, along with all the testing mandated by the state and federal government,” said Black.

Old Home Day Committee Readies for August Events

The final celebration for Londonderry's 300th birthday is now only a month away. The Old Home Day Committee was particularly excited about the Saturday event. Expectations are that Aug. 20 will be the busiest day of the 5-day celebration.

The Saturday celebration will begin at 10 am with the Old Home Day Parade. As one of Saturday's most anticipated events, the parade is expected to be crowded and will follow the annual route from Londonderry Middle School, down Mammoth Road, and ending at Mack's Apples. The parade route will cover 1.2 miles, and at least 6,000 spectators are expected at the parade.

Kirby Brown of the Old Home Day Committee emphasized that, unlike the firework celebration, the parade will go forward "rain or shine." Brown also stated that any person or organization looking to enter the parade can still

fill out a registration form on the town website. Anybody with questions or concerns about the registration process should contact the Committee as soon as possible.

Brown reminded parade participants that all floats have to be ready to go, in the Londonderry Middle School assembly area, no later than 8:30 a.m. Everyone else in the parade must be ready at 9:30 a.m. The Old Home Day Committee must approve the design of a float, and anybody in the parade must be able to keep pace. Applications for parade participation cannot be accepted any later than 5 p.m., on Friday, July 29.

Brown also said that booth registration remains open. Most of the 70 spots for a Saturday booth have been rented, but there are a few spots still open for residents looking to sell food and drinks. Civic organizations and non-profit organizations will receive priority.

All booths must provide their own electrical

cords, chairs, and tables. The Committee strongly recommends a canopy for all vendors in case of bad weather. Like with the parade the "rain or shine" rule will apply. As with the parade, booth registration forms need to be in by 5 p.m., on July 29.

Applications should be either mailed or dropped off to Kirby Brown on the 2nd floor of Town

Hall. Parade Day booths "always sell out" and Brown strongly encouraged anybody interested in renting a space for food or games to fill out a registration form sooner, not later.

In addition to the parade, games, and activities that are scheduled throughout Saturday. The Londonderry Common will feature several dozen

booths with a variety of food and contests available. The "Craft Fest" will also return as part of the Saturday celebration, featuring local artists.

Child-friendly activities will be found in the

Kid Zone with a train ride, prizes, and more for local families.

Adult activities will include ax-throwing and a beer tent featuring a selection from 603 Brewery & Beer Hall.

or "Vicious Attack" explained in the ordinance, so people don't have to go to refer to the RSA to find out what the meaning is.

Malaguti said that he thought it was a good idea.

Town Council Vice Chair, Joe Green, said that he is hopeful that the language in the ordinance is written so they

can enforce it.

"We want to push it forward so it is a solution," said Green.

Malaguti said that he spoke with the police department who said they are on the same page when it comes to enforcement measures.

Town Councilor, Jim Butler, said he was concerned after hearing people say that they don't want to call the animal control officer. He said that he thinks

the police department should make a presentation to explain why some cases can't or aren't prosecuted.

"Maybe it's not as simple as people think," said Butler.

It was explained by Londonderry Deputy Police Chief, Kim Bernard, that the animal control officer is only a part time employee and oftentimes patrol officers respond to calls.

Bernard said that when patrol officers are responding to calls regarding dogs or other animals they have to prioritize certain calls ahead of it.

"They're not going to clear a domestic to go check on a dog at a dumpster at that particular moment," said Ber-

nard.

Bernard said that they would enforce whatever the fine scale is.

Bernard said that he thinks they have a good animal control officer in Londonderry.

"Our animal control officer is phenomenal," said Bernard.

Butler also suggested that when people are in violation of the ordinance that they have pamphlets made so

there is an educational component to it.

The Council decided to amend the ordinance to have the statutory requirements of nuisance, menace, and vicious in the ordinance.

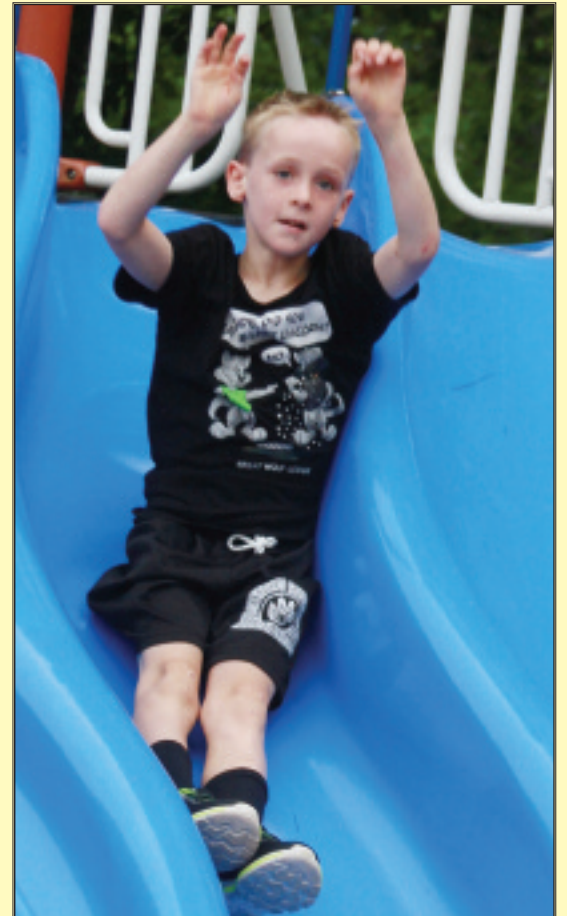

Tennis Campers Get Swinging into the Summer Program

The Londonderry Tennis Camp had its two-week program take place at the LAFA Complex last week into this week with a few dozen participating in the program.

This was the second year of the United States Tennis Association (USTA) Net Generation platform aimed at introducing, teaching and developing youngsters the game of tennis.

The program, run by the Roberta Davis, the coach of the Londonderry High School Boys' Varsity Tennis team, is a comprehensive program, covering beginners through the advanced player, and competency-based, spelling out the skills and knowledge each player needs before moving on to the next ball (orange, green, yellow)

and court size. Each player starts in a modified court with a red ball where they develop building blocks for serve, rally and score and advance through developing tactics, techniques, and movement. If a player is 10 or older or has advanced through the skills in red ball, they move to a larger court size and smaller orange ball. The curriculum, developed by tennis professionals, is a proven technique that makes learning fun and allows players at every level to feel success.

Davis revived the summer program last year with the help of Betty Mak, the LHS girls' head coach, and her husband who have branched off this year to offer a more advanced tennis camp and some private lessons.

Over the last few years, Davis has been

trying to get the younger generation more interested in the sport of tennis, with the ultimate result being more students signing up for tennis when they got to the high school level.

Hoping to create a

natural feeder system into the high school program through the camp, Davis has also approached the principal at Londonderry Middle School. "I've been working with the Middle School Principal, William

Van Bennekum, to restart the Tennis Club that has been defunct for many years. Having an option to play tennis at the middle school gives every kid the chance to try out the sport and consider participating

on the team at the Division I high school level and introduces them to a healthy activity and lifestyle choice that they can play at any age," Davis said.

More than \$7.2 Million Awarded for Drinking Water, Wastewater

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) recently announced that Governor Chris Sununu and the Executive Council have approved multiple projects, in a combination of grant and loan funds, for needed drinking water and wastewater system improvements, totaling more than \$7.2 million. NHDES provided the funding through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), and the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF). NHDES has offered over \$100 million in funding for more than 200 projects, which are in the

process of finalizing their proposals to NHDES for submission to the Governor and Executive Council for approval. More information about the projects that have been approved is below:

Dover: Water Facility Improvements - \$5,188,000 ARPA grant
 • ARPA Grant: \$5,188,000
 • Total project cost: \$17,290,213

The City of Dover will use the grant funding as administered through the Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances Remediation Grant and Loan Fund (PFAS RLF) to assist with the construction of a new treatment

facility to remediate PFAS, as well as other contaminants, within groundwater at the Pudding Hill well field. The project includes design, bidding, construction and engineering oversight of the construction.

Londonderry: Water System Financial Planning - \$50,000 ARPA Grant

The Town of Londonderry will use this ARPA grant to develop a water system financial plan to assess the feasibility of development of the public water system for the Town with the purpose of expanding public water service to address widespread PFAS con-

tamination of private residential wells. This planning project is strategically important to New Hampshire due to the large number of private residential well users in Londonderry with concentrations of PFAS above the applicable current maximum contaminant level (MCL).

Process Energy Services, LLC: Contract for Wastewater and Drinking Water Energy Audits - \$500,000 ARPA grant

Process Energy Services, LLC will use the grant funding to conduct comprehensive process level energy audits at publicly owned wastewater and drinking

water systems to identify cost-effective energy efficiency and renewable energy measures within the systems. When possible, the measures identified through the energy audits will be paired with asset management-identified improvements to prioritize projects more holistically.

Wolfeboro: Drinking Water Infrastructure - \$735,000 ARPA grant; \$735,000 DWSRF loan

• ARPA Grant: \$735,000
 • DWSRF Loan: \$735,000
 • Total project cost: \$1,480,000

The Town of Wolfeboro will use grant funding to design and con-

struct the rehabilitation and replacement of Water Treatment Plant (WTP) components that are at the end of their useful life. Grant funds will be used in conjunction with DWSRF loan funds to complete the engineering, design, bidding and construction for the project.

appears to be a lot of interest in the purchasing of the property.

It was explained by Conservation Commission member, Mike Speltz, that by obtaining the property it would help to protect their drinking water and help

to protect wildlife.

Speltz said that the property has a long history in Londonderry.

"Lithus Spring is a part of Londonderry's history. This was an important part of Londonderry for 40, or 50 years," said Speltz.

One resident who spoke during the meeting was John Wilson,

who said that he doesn't think it is a great investment to buy properties that have wetlands and can't be developed because they are already protected.

"The State will protect it," said Wilson.

Town Council Chairman, John Farrell, asked that they have a GIS calculation done to deter-

mine what is buildable and what isn't.

"That would help me to make a decision," said Farrell

Malaguti said that they have until Dec. 31 to close on it, but said that he was able to negotiate favorable terms which allows for reasonable extensions of time if needed. The deadline for the

Town Council to make a decision is Aug. 31.

"That gives us some flexibility here," said Malaguti.

Malaguti said that one of the advantages of waiting a little bit longer is that they will be able to find out what the appraisal is, which will give a better indication of what can be built there.

Town Councilor, Jim Butler, said it made sense to get more information before making a decision.

"I just think we need to do due diligence," said Butler.

The Town Council voted to continue the public hearing to its next meeting on Monday, Aug. 15.
