

### **Hearing on Purchase of Lithia Springs Property Continued**

uring the monday night, July 11, meeting of the Town Council, a public hearing was held on the potential purchase of the Lithia Springs property along Route 102.

It was explained by Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, that the town is looking into acquiring 54 acres of land along Nashua Rd., towards the Hudson line.

Speltz said he doesn't know if they ever adopted the policy or not.

"To me it's a good document," said Speltz.

Speltz said it talks about guidance for mitigating avoidable impacts to streams and if they have an impact on their buffer and how they deal with it.

It was noted by Speltz that as a Conser-

vation Commission they said that they could dishave the authority to make recommendations to the Planning Board on how to mitigate buffers when they get different applications for developments.

"We only recommend to the Planning Board," said Speltz.

Badois asked if they think it would be beneficial to get the policy into the planning regulations. It was pointed out by

Speltz that it would be used to give to developers ahead of time. He

cuss the policy further during a future meeting.

Also discussed during the meeting, Badois said that she got an email from someone in town who said that turtles have been getting hit near some wetlands and she was asked that they look at putting signs up in the area.

She said that they have one already and would get another one to put up as well.

The next Conservation Commission meeting is slated for July 26.

Perez said that she wanted to see a fence of some sort there to determine where the Gilcrest property ends. She said that in some places it is 100-feet away from the property line and in other areas it is more.

In March, voters narrowly passed an article that authorzed the town to negotiate the release of the land from conservation for no less than two million dollars.

Town Council Chairman John Farrell said that he thought that they weren't negotiating any more with the company.

"We're no longer negotiating," said Farrell.

Londonderry Town Manager Mike Malaguti said that part of the issue is that the parcel has a conservation easement and since it was thought that it couldn't

be developed it wasn't part of the sewer plan and they have a lack of capacity.

He said until last week they thought the project was on hold.

"They are now trying to determine if there is a way to do the project with septic," said Malaguti.

Malaguti said they are still not sure if anything is developed there.

"It's a big open question at this time," said Malaguti.

Farrell said that if it goes forward they will have to be sensitive to the concerns of the residents in the Nevins.

Malaguti said that Perez talked to her about it and they received a letter from the homeowners association.

'There's been some internal deliberations within the Nevens community," said Malaguti.

Town Councilor Jim Butler asked what kind of fencing they would be looking to have there.

Perez said that one concern is people putting things in their area and they don't want people coming through to their open space or starting fires. She said that the land is owned by the Nevins.

"It's not town land," said Perez.

One concern that was brought up is that work has taken place on the property even though there is a conser-

vation easement on the property.

It was explained by Malaguti that the parcel isn't owned by the Town and instead it is owned privately but they have a **Conservation Easement** on the property. He said that since there is an easement on the property and the property isn't owned by the town that he didn't think they had to get permission from the town.

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### Freedom Energy Logistics Gives Update on CAA

art Fromuth of Freedom Energy Logistics came before the board to discuss the Community Choice Aggregation agreement between the town of Londonderry and the company at the most recent Energy Efficiency taskforce meeting on June 16.

The Londonderry CCA program website said that the goal of the agreement, which was signed in 2021, is to "provide savings for customers" but has a disclaimer that savings cannot be guaranteed compared to the utility's basic service rate.

seeks to provide price stability and average savings over the full term of the program, but because future utility rates are not known, there is no guarantee of savings," the website said.

Fromuth said that him and the company have been giving regular updates to the Town Council about the agreement since the contract had been signed and that he had personally presented to the council twice.

Chair Deb Paul said that she did not remember Fromuth coming before the board to present the information and that she had not re-

the agreement.

Fromuth said that Paul was giving inaccurate information.

"I'm not telling you Paul [inaccuracies]," said. "I'm saying I as a councilor have not got anything and as a council it has never been brought up at a meeting for the last two and a half years since I've been on it."

Fromuth said that he could provide evidence that he had presented to the council.

"I don't know why this is so tense, we've had a good relationship with the town of Londonderry," Fromuth said.

Paul said that the "The CAA program ceived any updates on conversation was not

tense but that she just did not have any data or recollection of the presentation and contract.

In early 2020, the company approached a number of towns with this proposal which Londonderry had expressed interest in as tax bills were going up.

Fromuth said that although the actual contract had not been written up and signed until 2021, that the process with informal meetings began in 2020.

The company had battled back and forth with the utility companies to come up with a compromise over certain disputes, and the

company then came up with a draft of the community choice plan which was seen and approved by the community choice task force.

> The plan then came before the Town Council but could not vet be approved at that point due to changes that were incoming from the Public Utility Commission rule process.

Paul said that as Fromuth was explaining the history of the contract, it started to sound familiar, though she still was never given any data or any documents on it.

"I'd love to get my hands on some of the documents or even from

the task force..." Paul said. "They were never circulated to people on the board or within the town itself, and that's not your problem and that's not your fault. I'm not blaming you; I'm just saying it would have been nice if we were able to find that information."

Fromuth later apologized as he was unaware of the Energy Task Force and said they did not yet exist when his company first started the planning process for the agreement.

Paul said that she did not believe there was much to do with the agreement until it is up in a few years but thanked Fromuth for his time.

uring the July 5 School Board meeting one of the items discussed during the Superintendent Report was in regards to standardized testing.

"I think we're doing okay when it comes to the pressures of standardized testing," said Black.

Black explained that was brought to his it attention that they do a lot of standardized testing for the eighth graders each year compared to the other grades in the District.

In Londonderry they made a decision a few dent Dan Black said that years ago to have students in eighth grade. With other required standardized tests it means that students in eighth grade are taking tests up to five times a year.

> "What we have seen between

requirements as well as our own choices is that we are testing our 8th graders too much over their final year of middle school," Black wrote in a memo to the School Board. "We have also concluded that the PSAT 8/9 test is much more suitable for 9th graders (especially in math) and penalizes our 8th graders when we use it for class placement decisions at LHS when they take it in the fall of their 8th grade year."

Black said that it was state/federal brought to his attention

by Londonderry Middle School Principal William Van Bennekum, and other staff at the school.

After discussing it further they decided to make the decision not to require the PSAT going forward in eighth grade.

Black said that students will still be able to take the PSAT in eighth grade as a way to practice if their parents decide they want that.

"We want to shift our academic program at the the PSAT 8/9 test option- make sure that they were al for students that want to take it as a practice exam for high school, but not a requirement as it now stands," said Black. " LMS will work with any family that chooses to have their student take the PSAT 8/9 test in the fall of their 8th grade year and register them for that test."

Black told the School Board that while they weren't required to go to the Board for their approval he wanted to aware of the change.

Aside from the changes to the PSAT for eighth graders Black said that they would be keeping all of the other requirements currently in place for testing.

"We would still intend to keep all the PSAT testing that still occurs at the high school as well as the i-Ready testing in the lower grades, along with all the testing mandated by the state and federal

## Old Home Day Committee Readies for August Events

The final celebration for Londonderry's 300th birthday is now only a month away. The Old Home Day Committee was particularly excited about the Saturday event. Expectations are that Aug. 20 will be the busiest day of the 5day celebration.

The Saturday celebration will begin at 10 am with the Old Home Day Parade. As one of Saturday's most anticipated events, the parade is expected to be crowded and will follow the annual route from Londonderry Middle School, down Mammoth Road, and ending at Mack's Apples. The parade route will cover 1.2 miles, and at least 6,000 spectators are expected at the parade.

Kirby Brown of the Old Home Day Committee emphasized that, unlike the firework celebration, the parade will go forward "rain or shine." Brown also stated that any person or organization looking to enter the parade can still vide their own electrical

on the town website. Anybody with questions or concerns about the registration process should contact the Committee as soon as possible.

Brown reminded parade participants that all floats have to be ready to go, in the Londonderry Middle School assembly area, no later than 8:30 a.m. Everyone else in the parade must be ready at 9:30 a.m. The Old Home Day Committee must approve the design of a float, and anybody in the parade must be able to keep pace. Applications for parade participation cannot be accepted any later than 5 p.m., on Friday, July 29.

Brown also said that booth registration remains open. Most of the 70 spots for a Saturday booth have been rented, but there are a few spots still open for residents looking to sell food and drinks. Civic organizations and nonprofit organizations will receive priority.
