uring the July 19 School Board meeting it was announced by School Board Chair, Amy Finamore, the board would be having a public hearing on Aug. 2 regarding a matter that was discussed during a nonpublic session on July 5.

She explained that last spring the School Board spent time in each of the schools checking in with staff and listened to their concerns and goals for the future.

"This is a practice

Editorial **Summer Heat Can Be Dangerous**

Boy, it's getting hot out there now. We're in our first extreme heat stretch of the summer. With temperatures being well into the 90s, add the humidity, it feels like it is 100 degrees. Sending the air conditioners into over drive and those without them looking for shade.

Time to remind everyone to take proper precautions to protect themselves, family, the elderly, and pets from this hot weather. These extreme heat conditions could lead to heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Here are some tips from the American Red Cross that may help:

• Never leave children or pets in your vehicle.

• Stay hydrated, drink plenty of fluids, and avoid drinks with caffeine or alcohol.

• Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothing.

 Slow down, stay indoors, avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day.

• Take frequent breaks if working outdoors.

• Check on family, friends and neighbors who do not have air conditioning, who spend much of their time alone or who are more likely to be affected by the heat.

Excessive heat can lead to: Heat Cramps; signs are cramps in legs or abdomen

Heat Exhaustion; signs are cool, moist, pale or flushed skin, heavy sweating, headache, nausea, dizziness, weakness exhaustion.

Heat Stroke; signs are hot red skin

that may be dry or moist; changes in consciousness, vomiting and high body temperature.

If signs get worst, call 9-1-1.

Some signs of heat stroke in your pet according to www.akcchf.org : • Heavy panting and unable to

calm down, even when lying down.

- Brick red gum color
- Fast pulse rate
- Unable to get up.

If you suspect your pet has heat stroke, take their temperature. If the temperature is above 105 degrees, cool the animal down with water. Stop cooling the animal when the temperature reaches 103 degrees. Bring your pet to a veterinarian.

One last warning for those who want to cool off in the water, you should use places designated for that purpose. We realize it's challenging to find water recreation this year with fewer pools in operation and crowd limits on the places that are open. Avoid places off the beaten path; they can be dangerous for swimmers. If something goes wrong, there might not be anyone nearby to help. Be cautious.

Remember, in a few months we'll be talking about how much we miss these days.

Summer is normally a time of fun in the great outdoors and there should be plenty of opportunities for that once these dangerous temperatures subside.

Until then, we believe you should take the proper precautions to avoid the summer danger of extreme heat conditions.

SAU #12 CHILDFIND NOTICE (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act)

Child Find is a process of identifying all persons who may be educationally disabled from age 2.5 to age 22 years. The school district must assess every student when there is a suspected educational disability. The SAU #12, which serves the town of Londonderry, offers screenings of children before they enter public school to look for possible delays in language, learning and/or development.

Students who have been identified as having an educational disability but are not presently receiving services because they have refused services or have dropped out of school may still be eligible to receive special education services. Programs in special education continue to be an available option to a student until one of the following is met: they receive a high school diploma that represents completion of the local school district's graduation requirements, reach their 22nd birthday, or are found to no longer be educationally disabled.

SAU #12 provides special education and related services to students with educational disabilities in compliance with all relevant Federal and State laws and regulations. For more information, please contact:
