Class of 2023 & Principal Bid Farewell to LHS

Londonderry High School held its Forty-Fourth Annual Graduation Exercises on Friday night, June 9, and presented 315 members of the Class of 2023 with their diplomas at the Southern New Hampshire University Arena.

The commencement began with a procession march from

behind the stage, led by Marshals Cara Bound and Shelly Gagnon onto the floor of the arena surrounded by family members and friends filling the stands. The LHS Band performed "Pomp and Circumstance," under the direction of Serge Beaulieu as they filed in.

The ceremony opened with graduate, Logan Bower, taking the stage and performing a guitar solo

Town Council Gets Briefed On Proposed National Grid Project

The Town Council received a presentation from representatives of National Grid and Twin State Clean Energy regarding a proposed project to bring 1200 megawatts of clean hydro power from Quebec to the region.

"We're here because we really want to get input," Theran Hill, a representative from Twin State Clean Energy, said.

He explained that

energy bills are high and it's partially because New England is heavily relying on natural gas. During the winter months, they are usually getting that supply from other countries.

"Because of that the price of electricity does fluctuate," Hill said.

He said if the project was to be completed they would be able to bring new energy supplies to the region and at times when they have excess energy they would be able to sell it

back.

As part of the project, they would be using a transmission line from Canada that would go through Vermont and New Hampshire using existing right of ways, and they would use existing lines and substations after making improvements to them, which would lead to tax revenue for host communities. As part of the proposal, it would pick up on the National Grid transmission lines in

Contamination Concern Raises Discussion of Municipal Water


The latest meeting of the Utilities Committee included a presentation from the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) on water contamination, especially around private wells in Londonderry.

Jeffrey Marts, Administrator of the Hazardous Waste Remediation, was at the meeting with Amy Rousseau to give a presentation on behalf of DES with his team. The presentation aimed to update the town on remediation levels for PFAS, or "forever" chemicals.

"PFAS in Londonderry came under scrutiny in 2019," Marts said. "Of the 2,300 wells that were sampled in Londonderry, approximately 990 exceeded the groundwater quality standards."

Saint-Gobain Performance Plastics was a major source of well water contamination and the company already pledged to provide safer drinking water to Londonderry residents with contaminated wells after

Well Placement Creates Need for Lot Line Adjustment

A public hearing for a formal review of lot line adjustments for 39 and 41 South Road, were on the agenda during the June 7 Planning Board meeting.

It was explained by Eric Mitchell, who was representing Raymond and Brenda Dickey, that they have a well that is currently on the property belonging to their neighbors at 39 South Road, which is owned by

Eugene and Judith Harrington.

Mitchell said as part of the lot line adjustment they would be making it so the well would be on the Dickey property.

He stated that they would be swapping two triangular pieces of property and in total they would be about 750 square feet of property.

Mitchell told the board that the properties would end up being the same size after the lot line adjustments and

they are only making the change in order to put the well on the right property.

"That's the only reason why we're here," Mitchell said.

Assistant Town Manager, Kellie Caron, noted that it would be an even land swap and that staff didn't have any objections to the proposed lot line adjustment.

"Staff is supportive of the conditional approval," Caron said.

The Planning Board approved the conditional approval.

Also during the meeting, the board had a public hearing on an application for a formal review of a subdivision plan to divide one lot into two lots at 190 Litchfield Road, which is owned by Diane and Martin Boucher.

Mitchell, who was also representing the owners on the project, said they were looking to subdivide one lot into

two. He added that right now there is a single family house there.

He explained that the total lot is 2.93 acres and they would be making one 1.64 acres with the other lot being the remainder of the lot.

It was noted by Mitchell that in 2015 there was a subdivision approved, which ultimately created the large lot and they are looking to make a second lot on it now.

"Basically what we're

doing is taking the 2.93 acre lot and cutting a lot off of that," Mitchell said.

There were no objections from staff and no members of the public spoke in support or against the proposed project.

The Planning Board approved the subdivision plan.

The next Planning Board meeting is slated to take place on July 5 at 7 p.m.

Planning Board Give OK For Eversource Pole Replacement

One of the agenda items during the June 7 Planning Board meeting was in regards to an application for a conditional use permit for Eversource.

It was explained by Conor Madison of GZA, who was representing Eversource, that they were looking for a conditional use permit for 3,856 square feet of temporary wetland impact for equipment access

and word pad placement within the Conservation Overlay District.

He explained that they were looking to replace a pole on the 391 transmission line.

"This is a similar type of work as we've seen before," Madison said.

He explained that every year they inspect every pole on the lines and when they inspected the 391 line they saw some cracks to it and decaying and decided to replace it.

"This is a wood pole we are proposing to replace," Madison said.

He said they wouldn't be adding any lines or replacing any other poles. Madison told the Planning Board they would be doing a wood to steel replacement of the pole.

"This is just a wood to steel structure replacement," Madison said.

Madison stated that the transmission line goes to Rochester and

they will begin on the overall project in mid July, however, he wasn't sure when the pole in Londonderry would be replaced.

It was pointed out by Assistant Town Manager, Kellie Caron, that the Conservation Commission previously recommended that they approve the plan when they reviewed the project.

Phil Sciandra, an abutter to where the work will be done, asked

if there would be any clearing of trees as part of the project saying his trees have been impacted in the past.

"I came here tonight to see how many more trees you're cutting down," Sciandra said.

Madison explained that Londonderry is one of the biggest hubs for Eversource so he wasn't sure about past projects, but they wouldn't be cutting any in the area in the future.

"I just wanted to

know if you're going to cut any more of my trees down," Sciandra said, noting that he didn't have any other objections to it.

No members of the Planning Board had any questions about the project.

The Planning Board ultimately approved the conditional use permit.

The next Planning Board meeting is slated to take place on July 5 at 7 p.m.

Londonderry.

Town Council Chair, John Farrell, asked if there would be any impacts on abutters where larger trees would have to be removed.

He was told they

would mainly be doing sideline trimming and they wouldn't have to expand the right of way.

Farrell also asked if the abutters to the project would have views of the power line, which he said reduces the values of homes.

"What I want to know

is those abutters to those corridors going to be looking at power lines," Farrell said.

Shawn Downey, representative from National Grid, said he's been doing outreach efforts for a number of years and they would be for this project as well.

"My team and I will knock on every door on the right of way and make sure individual folks know what's coming and when," Downey said.

Farrell also suggested that they work with Town Engineer, John Trottier, and explain what their plan is for the proposed project so he can then brief the council.

"I want to know from John what it is," Farrell

said.

Hill said they would have open houses beginning this summer in different communities to discuss the proposal.

He also told the Town Council that it takes about two years to get permits and if they were to move forward, construction wouldn't be until 2026.

Farrell told them to expect the public to have a lot of interest in

the project after what has happened in the past with different projects.

"You're going to be met with a skeptical community," Farrell said.

Utilities Committee Chair, Lynn Wiles, said during a previous Town Council meeting he was looking forward to working with them on the project.

"I think it's going to be a wonderful project for Londonderry," Wiles said.

Town Council Send Historic Easement Issue to Lawyers

The Town Council discussed whether or not they should have their attorney review a historic preservation easement deed for the 2 Litchfield Road property during the June 5 meeting.

Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, said that the current owner of the property, Richard Flier, wasn't a party to creating the easement originally, and that Flier has concerns with being

able to sell it.

Flier went in front of the Heritage Commission last month who recommended that staff work with their attorney and Town Council to explore what would need to be done to make the property commercially viable.

During the meeting, Flier explained that he has had trouble finding a buyer because anyone that looks at it and finds out about the restrictions ends up walking away from it, and that

there is a lot of work that needs to be done that currently can't be.

Malaguti told the Town Council that his obligation is to keep it at the same level of historic preservation as when he bought it.

"It appears he's done just that," Malaguti said.

He told the Town Council that they could potentially loosen the restrictions, but would need to have their legal counsel review it to see if anything could be done.

Malaguti said that it is ultimately the Town Council's decision about whether or not anything should be done.

"The Town Council is in the driver's seat," Malaguti said.

Town Council Chair, John Farrell, said in 2006 he was on the Planning Board and a young family was looking to rezone and sell the home. At that meeting it was voted 7-0 for the Town Council not to approve the rezoning to make it part of the historical dis-

trict.

However, he said the Town Council ultimately voted 2-1 to have it rezoned, saying that it was highly controversial and that regulations weren't followed.

"That's how we got here," Farrell said.

Town Councilor, Ron Dunn, said the property is listed around \$150,000 more than what it's assessed at and said the market is telling him that the house is priced too high.

Town Councilor, Ted Combes, argued that what a house is assessed at doesn't mean what someone can sell a property for.

Flier told the Town

Council that aside from not being able to find someone interested in buying the property because of the restrictions, he's also having trouble finding a quality tenant for it.

He also argued that right now it wouldn't qualify as being historical.

Farrell suggested they have their land use attorney look at the document and make a determination if anything could be done, which the Town Council agreed to.

"See what she thinks," Farrell said.

He said if they were to do anything, they would have to have a public process.

Slater Proposes Agenda Policy Change

School Board Chair, Bob Slater, said there have been times in the past when he has been denied putting items on the School Board agenda.

It's why Slater proposed amending the policy during the June 6 School Board meeting.

"I don't ever want a sitting board member that's been elected by the community to be refused an agenda item," Slater told the School Board. "You're elected by the community, it should go on the agenda."

As part of the proposed policy change, language was added which states; "No board member shall be refused an Agenda Item(s), unless the item has been deliberated and voted

on in the past 6 months and there is no new information pertaining to the topic."

Slater explained that if the majority of the School Board doesn't want to move forward with a particular agenda item then they can vote it down and there wouldn't be a need to discuss it further. He added that is a more appropriate way to filter agenda items.

Superintendent, Dan Black, said he was in support of the policy amendment in a memo to the School Board ahead of the meeting.

"The updated language is a great update to this policy to not leave any ambiguity or a grey area in how topics get onto the agenda," Black said.

Other parts of the policy outline how agen-

das are developed for the board meetings.

Under the policy, the Superintendent is responsible for preparing all of the agenda items in consultation with the Board Chairperson and any appropriate school district administrators.

"Items of business may be suggested by any board member, staff member, student, or citizen of the district," the policy reads. "The inclusion of items suggested by staff member, students, or citizens shall be at the discretion of the Superintendent, who shall inform the board of any unresolved excluded items and the reason for the exclusion. The agenda, however, shall always allow suitable time for the remarks of the public who wish to speak

briefly before the board."

The agenda along with any supporting materials are required to be given to the School Board members "sufficiently prior to the board meeting, if at all possible, to permit them to give items of business careful consideration. The agenda shall also be made available to the press, and others upon request."

The School Board approved sending the policy amendment to a second reading.

School Board Briefed On False Alarm

During the June 6 School Board meeting, the board received an update regarding a false ALICE alarm at Matthew Thornton Elementary School that recently occurred.

Superintendent, Dan Black, explained that the alarm was pressed by accident when someone didn't realize what the alarm was for.

Principal, Amity Small, said they received a lot of questions from staff of what to do when the alarms go off and they saw first hand what to do.

She said everyone responded appropriately and everything went well.

Black said the updated ALICE alarms will be much different and makes it clear not to press them unless it's an emergency.

He explained that they are going to also have training on why they would be in a situation of when it should be pressed.

Also during the meeting, the School Board received an enrollment update.

Black said they have

4,120 students, the same amount of students they had in October.

"Based on this overall stability in enrollment we are seeing, the same general picture that we have seen over the past couple of years that we described in detail during the budget season. Our current projection for next year again is 4114 total students (which does include Out of District Placements," Black told the School Board.

Black said over the summer, the main thing they look at is Kindergarten and First Grade enrollments.

"Over the summer we pay close attention to any spikes in enrollment in both Kindergarten and First Grade that we may not be prepared for," Black said.

Black told the School Board that they had an enrollment study done in 2017 and what they projected for where they would be at this point is about where they actually are.

However, he said the analysis was based on births and people moving in and out, and that they also need to consid-

er other things like the number of housing units being built.

He said if there are things being planned in town like developments then they need to know about it.

"If things are going to change, I think we need to know that," Black said.

School Board member, Bob Slater, noted that there are 800 to 1,000 housing units likely to be built in the next couple of years.

The School Board also accepted a number of resignations during the meeting.

It included Kathleen Boucher, a support staff member at LMS,

D'Alma Colon, a dining services employee at Matthew Thornton, Nicole Curran, a teacher at South School, Karyn Farnsworth, a support staff member at Matthew Thornton, Jennifer Forsys, a support staff member at LMS, Laura Hajjar, a support staff member at South School, Lisa Jones a teacher at Matthew Thornton, and Joseph Mann a custodian with the school district.

Moose Hill Building Committee Applications Now Open

The School Board approved the mission and the make-up of the newly formed Moose Hill Building Committee during their June 6 meeting.

School Board Chair, Bob Slater, said his concern is to make sure the committee gets pricing for the back wing of the building as well as for additional space for office, multipurpose,

and other space needs for the kindergarten.

He said he wanted it to be broken up into three sections so they can see how it's broken up and to get input from the committee about it. He added that would be deciding what would go on the warrant article if anything.

"I'd like to show the community that," Slater said about the breakdown of the project, noting it will show the com-

munity what the different cost differences would be.

In terms of the make-up of the committee, Slater suggested that they should have five full time members and two alternatives, depending on the number of applicants that they receive, which the rest of the School Board agreed with.

The mission of the committee that the School Board agreed on

is "the Moose Hill Building Committee will be to comply with all the stipulations within policy BCFA, up to and including advising both the School Board and Kindergarten Committee on both cost-effective plans for Phase 1a, Phase 1b, and Phase 2 of the Moose Hill School that also meet the educational needs of Phase 1a, Phase 1b, and Phase 2."

According to the advertisement for appli-

cants, the School Board is "looking for leaders from the community, especially professionals in the areas of engineering, general contracting, and the construction fields to explore options, costs, and future planning of the current conceptual design and be able to offer recommendations."

Anyone from the community who is interested in applying to be on the building commit-

tee can do so by going to londonderry.org or filling out a paper application at the District office, which is located at 6A Kitty Hawk Landing.

It is expected that the School Board will begin to review the applications at the June 20 School Board meeting "if at all possible."

The next School Board meeting is slated to take place on June 20 at 7 p.m.

a recent agreement. Other problematic sites like the Auburn Road Landfill are still undergoing remediation.

"The state has an enforceable standard of 12 parts-per-trillion for PFAS contamination," Marts added. "The EPA has a health advisory down to 4 parts-per-trillion" for some chemi-

cals, although this isn't an official standard. Residents should avoid using any contaminated water source.

Although designs are in the early stage, there have been studies to

extend the town's municipal water supply over the next 10 years.

"Earlier last year, we sent to the drinking and groundwater trust fund to set up a rebate program," said DES Response Administrator, Amy Rousseau. "We started that program in August 2022, and it's been very successful."

The fund was established partially in response to PFAS contamination in Londonderry and offers a one-time, \$5,000 grant for PFAS treatment with up to \$10,000 for a service connection to the public

water system. 275 rebates have been issued and covers homes outside of the previously established St. Gobain Consent Decree Area.

"We have \$20 million in the program, until that funding runs out, we will issue rebates," said Rousseau. \$2.5 million has been spent so far. Charcoal filters are also available for residents and reduce PFAS chemicals below detectable levels when replaced regularly.

Brandon Kernen, administrator of DES Groundwater and Drinking Water, recommended

an expanded public water system sometime soon to provide an alternative supply to residents using well water.

"Is there a goal or a move within DES to at least make a move, to try to get people on municipal water and get people off the wells?" asked Utilities Vice-Chair, Martha Smith.

Kernen confirmed that there is a push to get people off private wells. "There's a window of funding for about 3, 4 more years, a lot of it's targeted toward PFAS contaminants. That window for federal funding is tight, the time is right to focus on public water systems," Kernen explained. "You have to make decisions pretty quickly on how you want your water system to look going forward. Our first choice to mitigate contamination is to get people onto a water system where it's viable."

One possibility raised was building a municipal water system independent of Pennichuck, despite the cost of such an endeavor is unclear.

Potential Cell Phone Policy Discussed by School Board

The School Board discussed potentially creating an official policy for cell phone use during the June 6 School Board meeting.

School Board Vice Chair, Sara Loughlin, said as a school administrator in another school district, she spends a lot of time during her day dealing with cell phone use and there isn't much in their student handbook.

"Phones take up a big chunk of my day every day," Loughlin said.

Loughlin said with all

students going to have their own 1 to 1 devices beginning next year, there is no reason why they would need to use devices in classes and they should have formal procedures.

"I don't see any reasons for students to be using cell phones," Loughlin said.

School Board member, Tim Porter, said they need to have an official policy.

"I think it needs to be an official policy rather than just guidelines," Porter said.

Porter said that some other districts allow for teacher discretion when

it comes to using cell phones, but it should be taken off their plate to have to decide.

"I rather that not be an option," Porter said.

Superintendent, Dan Black, said when they don't have a policy in place and create one they want to engage their staff like they did with the dress code policy.

Londonderry Middle School Principal, William Van Bennekum, said they have put in different policies. For example, in March they created a no cellphone policy for the gym and locker rooms, saying they had issues with

them being used.

He said that last year they instituted a no cell-phone policy for social events or dances, which was receptive by parents.

"Dances and social events at the middle school are made to be social," Van Bennekum said.

Van Bennekum said they allow students to arrive early to take photos before the dance and then turn them over when the dance begins.

High School Principal, Jason Parent, said at the high school level they try to treat students as young adults and have designated

areas where they can be allowed.

Currently, cellphones are allowed in the classroom for educational purposes at the discretion of the teachers. He added that students are allowed to use cellphones during personal time.

For example, he said students may check it between classes or in the lunchroom, texting isn't allowed in the classrooms.

He stated that students can be written up for using cellphones when not authorized to.

Incoming principal, Rick Barnes, was in

attendance for the meeting and said it's important to have consistency with enforcing policies.

"You can have whatever policy you want or procedure you want. It's going to come down to how it's enforced," Barnes said.

Black told the School Board they can come back with proposals after discussing it over the summer.

Loughlin said they should discuss proposals during the Summer in order to have new policies in place for the beginning of next school year.

Proposed Policy Changes Reviewed by School Board

The School Board had a number of second readings of policies during their June 6 meeting.

One of the policies was in regards to board committees, which would make it so the entire School Board makes decisions on who is appointed to committees rather than just the Chairperson as it stands now.

Superintendent, Dan Black, pointed out that they will need to consider what to do with the Communication Committee, which was recently formed.

"Right now, there is no specific charge be-

cause the work that got started last Spring is now completed. However, our School District would be weaker if this committee did not meet regularly moving forward," Black said in a memo. "They have done such excellent work over the last year to completely revamp and update our communication practices that we do not want to lose this momentum if we allowed it to disband."

Black said they were recommending that since the School Board "shall not have standing committees," under the policy that they should have it function as an administrative committee until there is a new

charge for the committee.

"We would run it like the C3 Committee in terms of posting the agendas publicly, having the minutes on the website, and inviting the public to the meetings as well even though it would be an administrative committee," Black said.

Another policy change the board is looking at is in regards to how committees work including how people can apply and making requirements for minutes to be kept of the meeting.

Under the amendment, how and where people apply for committees would be explained.

"Applications to be-

come a member will be available on the District's website and at the DO," the proposed amendment reads. "The board shall set a deadline for acceptance of applications. All applications must be mailed or emailed to the School Board. The board may choose to hold some interviews after reviewing the applications."

The policy change would also require a committee to elect a chair, vice chair, and secretary, who would be responsible for taking minutes. The expectations for what is required at a minimum for the min-

utes is also spelt out in the policy amendment.

Black said they would be having the Communication Committee review the policy at their next meeting.

He said the administration was also recommending to add language to state "When

needed, the School Board will ask the Superintendent and other members of the Administration to review applications and provide input to the School Board."

All of the proposed policy changes were sent to a third reading.




Two Comeback Wins Propel Lancers to Another State Title

The Londonderry High School Baseball squad capped off their near perfect

2023 season with two dramatic wins in their final two games of the playoffs to clinch their third Division I title.

The 4-3, walk-off,

extra innings win against Pinkerton Academy on Saturday night, June 10, at Delta Dental Stadium gave the Lancers their seventh state title.

The victory also served as a bit of revenge between the two rivals, after Londonderry lost to the Astros 2-0 in the championship game one year earlier.

In the team's final game on Saturday night, the Lancers got off to an early 1-0 lead in the bottom of the first when Jayden Hamilton hit a leadoff single to right and was later batted in with a ground ball to second by Johan Pena.

The lead stood at 1-0 until Pinkerton tied things up in the fourth on a double and a single to score one for a 1-1 score.

Senior starter, Connor Fennell, kept the PA squad from scoring for






In the championship match against Hollis-Brookline: Brassard had nine kills; Munro got three kills and one

ace; Evans got five digs; Elguezabal had five digs and an ace; and Joncas finished with two digs.

This was just the second time that the Lancers were able to make it to the Championship match. Back in 2011 Londonderry fell 3-1 to Salem High School.


