Planning Board Hear Plan For Auto Auction Expansion

A review and non-binding discussion of a proposed building addition, garage bays, and two parking lot expansion areas for the property located at 1 Action Boulevard was in discussion at the May 3

Planning Board meeting.

It was explained by Matthew Routhier from TF Moran, who was representing the applicant, that it was recommending they go in front of the Planning Board for a conceptual review.

"We feel it's beneficial as well," Routhier said.

He said the majority

of the proposal is a "last effort" of maximizing what is needed for the business currently.

Routhier said one of the things they are looking at is building expansions, saying they are looking to expand the main building that is there now by about 7,560

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Kindergarten Committee Work on School Board Presentation

Over the past year, the Kindergarten Committee has been developing a plan for moving forward with Full-Day Kindergarten, and how that would look for the school district if passed by the voters.

Last week, on Thursday, May 4, the group met and discussed a number of their findings and how to best present those findings to the School Board for their approval.

Londonderry Superintendent, Dan Black, and Principal of Moose Hill School, Sandra Mack, led the meeting, starting with a brief overview of what some of their findings have been, noting that what they've heard from the public is that people are in favor of moving the discussion of Full-Day Kindergarten forward.

Black noted that the district is behind the state and the country when it comes to Full-Day Kindergarten and

providing this to the district would open up about 100 more school days for children and create a much stronger foundation for five-year-olds.

Ultimately, the recommendations the committee proposes would be left up to the School Board as to whether it makes it to the March ballot.

Black also went through the space needs of Moose Hill School, saying that it will be a

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Fire Department to Upgrade Thermal Imaging Cameras

The Fire Department went in front of the Town Council on April 24 to discuss a proposal to purchase thermal imaging cameras with American Rescue Plan Act funds.

Deputy Fire Chief, Bo Butler, said they were looking to purchase 35 cameras. Butler added that the goal is to equip every firefighter with a thermal imaging camera on the fire ground.

"We will be seeking ARPA funds to make this a reality," Butler said.

Some of the reasons why the department was looking to purchase the cameras includes helping firefighters being able to see through zero visibility conditions, improving search times, locating

possible fire victims and fire, monitor fire spread/behavior, and locate hidden fires. It will also help improve firefighter survival.

One example given of where the thermal imaging camera saved lives was on July 27, 2022 during a fire on Tseneto Road.

Following the fire, a near miss report was done and one of the recommendations was to have one of the cameras for every riding position.

"Under the leadership of our fire chief we are here to make sure it never happens again," said Lieutenant, Christopher Lamy.

Lieutenant, Bruce Hollowell, explained how he became disoriented on the third floor with a probationary firefighter.

He said he was the only one who had a thermal imaging camera, which became problematic because of the extra air needed by giving directions because the probationary firefighter couldn't see through the 0 visibility conditions.

"I was the only one with the eyes," Hollowell said, saying that if everyone can see, they can move easier.

"In the grand scheme of things it's cheap money," Hollowell said.

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Fire Department Secure Grant For Mental Health Aid

During the April 24 Town Council meeting, one of the agenda items was in regards to the acceptance of unanticipated revenues

for the fire department. It was explained by Deputy Fire Chief, Bob Butler, that when he became deputy chief one of the priorities given to him by Fire Chief, Darren O'Brien, was working on

the wellbeing and mental health of the members of the department.

"Without the members, we have no mission. So the mental health, the well-being of our members, is the first priority," Butler said.

Butler said they started doing a "full court press" along with the union to bring in mental health providers from the outside to speak about some of the issues they face every day.

He said that in May they will be having a spousal class where a mental health provider will come in and do a three hour session to talk to them and their significant other so people on the "homefront" know what they face.

Butler stated that originally they didn't know where they would get the funds from, but he ended up finding an

organization called the NH Charitable Foundation and they had funds in the form of grants and they applied and were granted the funds.

"Londonderry fire was granted and secured a grant for \$10,000 specifically for additional mental health training," Butler said.

Butler said he thinks the training will be a major benefit for the members and their families.

One question raised was about the application process and how

long it took to get the application approved. Butler told the Town Council that it took about three months.

"It was extremely streamlined," Butler said.

He explained that the organization was very receptive to their application and they formed a good relationship with them.

"It was a no-brainer for them," Butler said.

Town Councilor, Chad Franz, said he thinks that the ability to get the grant quickly showed how well the grant was

put together.

"Let it be a testament of how hard your work and your staff's work were in preparation for this," Franz said.

The Town Council unanimously approved accepting the grant funds.

Butler said he plans on continuing to pursue different grant opportunities and other unanticipated funding opportunities in the future.

"I'm going to keep at it. There's money out there, I'm all over it," Butler said.

Hallowell said that in terms of maintenance of the cameras, they run on a battery life of three to five years and they feel it'd be worth the investment.

"These cameras will continue to save lives," Hallowell said.

The Town Council approved using the ARPA fund for the purchase.

Also during the meeting, Butler gave the Town Council an update regarding equipment the department is in the process of ordering and receiving.

On March 6, the Town Council approved allocating \$173,293.88 from the fire department's fire equipment capital reserve fund in order to purchase a number of pieces of equipment including things like hoses and

SCBA masks.

It was explained by Butler that all of the equipment they plan on ordering has been ordered, except for the high-rise hose/nozzle package. He said the battalion chiefs are trying out the different packages before they make a decision on what to order.

Butler said that to date they have spent about \$131,996.07 out of the \$173,293.88 allocated.

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Town Council Approve Rezoning For YMCA Property

The Town Council heard a rezoning request, on April 24, which was recommended by the Planning Board and would allow the YMCA to rezone their property at 206 Rockingham Road to C-II.

The YMCA, which is where the property is located, was looking to go from C-I (Commercial I), C-II (Commercial II), and AR-I (Agricultural-Residential I) to only the C-II (Commercial II) district.

It was explained on Feb. 8, at the Planning Board meeting earlier in the month by Steve Keach, who was representing the YMCA, said that the YMCA previously obtained the different parcels and in 2017, the former Town Planner recommended that they voluntarily merge the lots into one 15.1-acre parcel.

"As the result of the parcel being comprised of multiple smaller parcels the current zoning overlaying the property is fragmented," Keach wrote. "The property includes Agricultural-Residential (AR-I), Commercial I (C-I), Commercial II (C-II), and Route 28 Performance Overlay Zoning Districts."

During the Planning Board meeting, Keach described the proposal as a "housekeeping matter" and said they don't have any immediate plans for development and it wouldn't modify the existing use.

At the Town Council meeting, Jason Lopez, who was representing the YMCA during the Town Council meeting, said they first started looking at changing the zoning about six years ago.

Town Councilor, Ron Dunn, said he was con-

cerned for neighbors with having the zoning changed to commercial and didn't see the need for it.

Town Council Chair, John Farrell, said they try to have common zoning for properties located near each other instead of having all different zoning.

Dunn asked why they couldn't make it at a different zone rather than C-II.

Lopez said they were just moving forward with the original recommendation from 2017 when they first looked at rezoning it. He noted that there are many properties surrounding it that are zoned C-II.

"We just moved forward with the recommendation of C-II to keep that consistency with the abutting lots," Lopez said.

He noted that if something was to happen and

they were able to develop the property for something else it would still have to go in front of the Planning Board where people would be able to express concerns they have.

"Abutters would have

the right at that time to come forward and express their concerns at the site plan process," Lopez said.

Dunn said he didn't see the need for it.

Councilor, Jim Butler, noted that while he

understood the neighbor's concerns, any changes for the property would have to go in front of the public anyways.

The Town Council approved the rezoning request with Dunn voting against it.

Concerns for Athletics

To the editor,

Currently I serve on the Londonderry Recreation Commission (though not writing in that capacity). For 25 years I served as a board member for the Londonderry Wildcats (football & cheer) and for 23 years I coached and served on the board of Londonderry youth lacrosse. Londonderry families and kids have always been of my interest and passion.

Arrogant, egotistical and being a bit of a bully might be something you look for in a coach at Notre Dame or Alabama, probably not for Londonderry families.

Nearly 20 years ago the Wildcats made the family supported decision to move their middle-school football and cheerleading program to AYF the nation's largest youth football/cheer program with rules and procedures to protect the integrity of the sport, protect players and support families. After that change the Wildcats became one of the largest and most successful football and cheerleading programs in all of NH having won multiple state football championships and national cheerleading championships. The Wildcats are well-respected; family run and very-financially sound. The success of the Wildcats has led to the recent success at LHS football.

Last year at a Londonderry School Board meeting where the board was wondering how they could pay ancillary staff higher salaries they instead approved nearly \$100K not to pay staff or

improve girls sports programs at LHS but to form a middle school football program – the ONLY district in NH to do so. Not an NHIAA program but an independent league with a checkered history of abusive behavior towards children and bullying of parents. A move that was not supported by 80% of Wildcat families. This 12th hour last minute budget approval came at the request of the LHS athletic department. Effectively this back-door non-budgeted funding killed the Wildcat middle school football program. For what reason, control and the fact the Wildcat board would not be bullied into making a decision to appease an LHS coach. This attack on an independent Londonderry program continued this year when the demand to move the Wildcats remaining football teams to the league with an offending history was made or the school district would take over those teams with additional funding as well.

Why is this a concern beyond football? The athletic department at Londonderry school district has its sites now turned to other youth sports programs with similar demands. Do it my way or we will take you over too. As I said, being egotistical, arrogant and a bit of a bully might be the way to go at big power colleges but not dealing with Londonderry families. Parents and families in other youth programs now have to worry about their children and control of their sports programs. Who is next ? The school board

needs to tread carefully in supporting the egotistical arrogant zeal of a power hungry athletics department and its secretly anointed director as it attempts to continue to interfere with sanctioned community sports programs.

A Bad Decision

I am very upset by the recent decision made by the Town of Londonderry to lease the apple orchard on the north side of Pillsbury Road to Sunnycrest Farms. I have worked at Mack's Apples for several years. This news came as a shock!

I realize that a part of this land was sold by Andy Mack to the Town (front portion behind the grange over to the piece across from Matthew Thornton Elementary School) and the back orchard piece to the Conservation Commission. This land had always been farmed by the Mack's, since the 1700's. Once Andy sold the farm the Town had leased the parcel to the new owner Kyle Chrestensen, who continued the upkeep of the property and the orchard. The lease ended in November of 2022. My understanding is that Kyle kept asking the Town, since his lease ended in November 2022, about the status of the lease going forward. The Town kept putting off their decision and never really spoke to him regarding their plans for a new lease.

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Mr. Christensen did present the Town with a proposal for a new lease. However, he did not receive a response from the Town.

At the April 24, Town Council meeting, the matter of a new lease for this parcel of property to Sunnycrest Farm was on the Agenda. This was when I learned of this issue. A lease for this property to Sunnycrest was approved by the Town Council. I am unclear whether the approval was only for the five year lease for the front parcel by the Town or if it also included the back orchard leased by the Conservation Commission. As far as I know at this time this orchard on the north side of Pillsbury Road will now be leased to Sunnycrest for 20 years at the cost of one dollar. If this is true it is a very sad, poorly thought out and just a bad decision by the Town.

Both sides of Pillsbury Road have always been part of UPick 3 of

Mack's Apple's Orchards. Now under the new arrangement you have two different orchards on each side of the street directly across from each other. Years past, when Mack's controlled the property, customers picking apples at Mack's were free to pick a wide variety of apples on either side of Pillsbury Road. That will no longer be possible. How are these two different orchards supposed to police their customers.

In my opinion this was an ill thought out decision. It is very unclear why the Town chose to move in this new direction. This process was not an open process. I think this was a vindictive decision and I am unhappy that is

was apparently made behind closed doors. This Town can be better than this.

Obviously we all should take a close look and be thinking about our own votes for our Town leaders at the next Town election.

Continued from page 1 square feet. He added that they are also looking to expand the storage capacity including for vehicles.

In the center of the site, Routhier said they are looking to pave an area that is currently grass to create more fen-

ced in secure storage and they would also be looking to expand the storage lot to the south of the property.

Routhier stated that they have done calculations for parking to make sure they meet and comply with the regulations, which they would. He said with all the uses

including the bank, office/strip mall, and the auto auction building they would exceed the requirements.

It was explained by Routhier that the auto auction business typically employs people on Thursday to help with the auctions. He said they currently park par-

tially on the site and the rest at the park and ride.

"That has been occurring for quite some time with no issues from the park and ride folks," Routhier said.

Director of Engineering and Environmental Services, John Trottier, said they provided some technical requirements for parking space sizes and other issues, which they hope to be addressed now rather than in the future. He also noted that the applicant was looking to have underground drainage.

Assistant Town Manager, Kellie Caron, said they would need to go through the site plan amendment process.

"This will require a site plan amendment," Caron said.

Caron stated that they had good conversations with the applicant initially.

"Overall we've had good preliminary discussions with the applicant," Caron said.

One question asked during the meeting was if there would be impacts on the wetlands. Trottier said any of the work that they are proposing is beyond the 50 foot buffer.

Planning Board mem-

ber, Lynn Wiles, said that if planning board staff is comfortable with the stormwater underground storage then he is.

Planning Board Secretary, Jake Butler, said he thought the project made sense.

Planning Board Chair, Art Rugg, said he thought it was a straightforward proposal so far.

"It looks quite straightforward to me," said Rugg.

Rugg suggested they continue to work with planning department staff on the details and said he thinks it's a good sign they are expanding.

"Work with staff, any abutters, make sure they know what's going on," Rugg said.

\$500,000 Awarded to Restore and Conserve Lithia Springs Wetlands

The NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) announced recently that the Governor and Executive Council recently approved an Aquatic Resource Mitigation (ARM) Fund project in Londonderry for \$500,000.

The Lithia Springs

project in Londonderry will protect high-value aquatic resources and their upland buffers. The town will use these grant funds to acquire and permanently protect 54 acres of habitat on Nesenkeag Brook in southwest Londonderry. The aquatic resources

to be protected within the conservation easement includes 2,209 feet of stream frontage on the brook, as well as vernal pools and 18 acres of wetlands. Lithia Springs lies within the Pen-nichuck waterworks, which serves approximately 88,000 people.

big issue if the town chooses to move ahead with Full-Day Kindergarten. Adding that staff is already using closets and hallways for teaching, therapy, and counseling.

LEEP is also an issue Black said, the program continues to grow and takes up a lot of space.

Construction to Moose Hill would need to happen to accommodate these space issues but there were no num-

bers given on any of the design concepts.

Black and Mack also had a rough timeline given to them through the architects they've been working with. Black said, due to lack of laborers, Phase I construction would take about 16-months, while Phase II would add about 27-months.

Besides the overall space needs discussed, there was also an issue raised on making the front entrance safer and

to create a better way for parents to drop off and pick up their children from Moose Hill.

There was a conceptual design presented at the meeting that showed about 25,000 square-feet of additional space created in Phase 1A and Phase 1B of the project.

Black was hoping that the Trident Group would be able to come up with some solid numbers to present to the School Board on May 23.

In Phase I of the plan, there would only be a need to add one custodi-

an, but Phase II would require additional teachers and staff.

Black said there will be some hard numbers presented at the May 23 School Board meeting on staffing, which he said wouldn't hit the operating budget for another four-years if approved by voters.

It was also stated that the ultimate goal of the committee at this point is to get the School Board's approval to

move forward with going to a construction manager in order to get detailed costs on the project and the board would then decide whether the plan would make it to a ballot.

Members of the committee, along with Black and Mack, are: Jeff Penta, Donna Traynham, Jeff Garside, Tony De-Francesco, Amanda Longo, Nancy Hendricks, and Barbara Curro (who is also representing the

kindergarten staff.)

Black stated after the meeting that the presentation should be ready for the public to view by May 19, prior to the School Board presentation on May 23.

Black added that this is part the tentative long range plan the School Board put in place through number conversations last Summer and Fall to prioritize the issues around the district.

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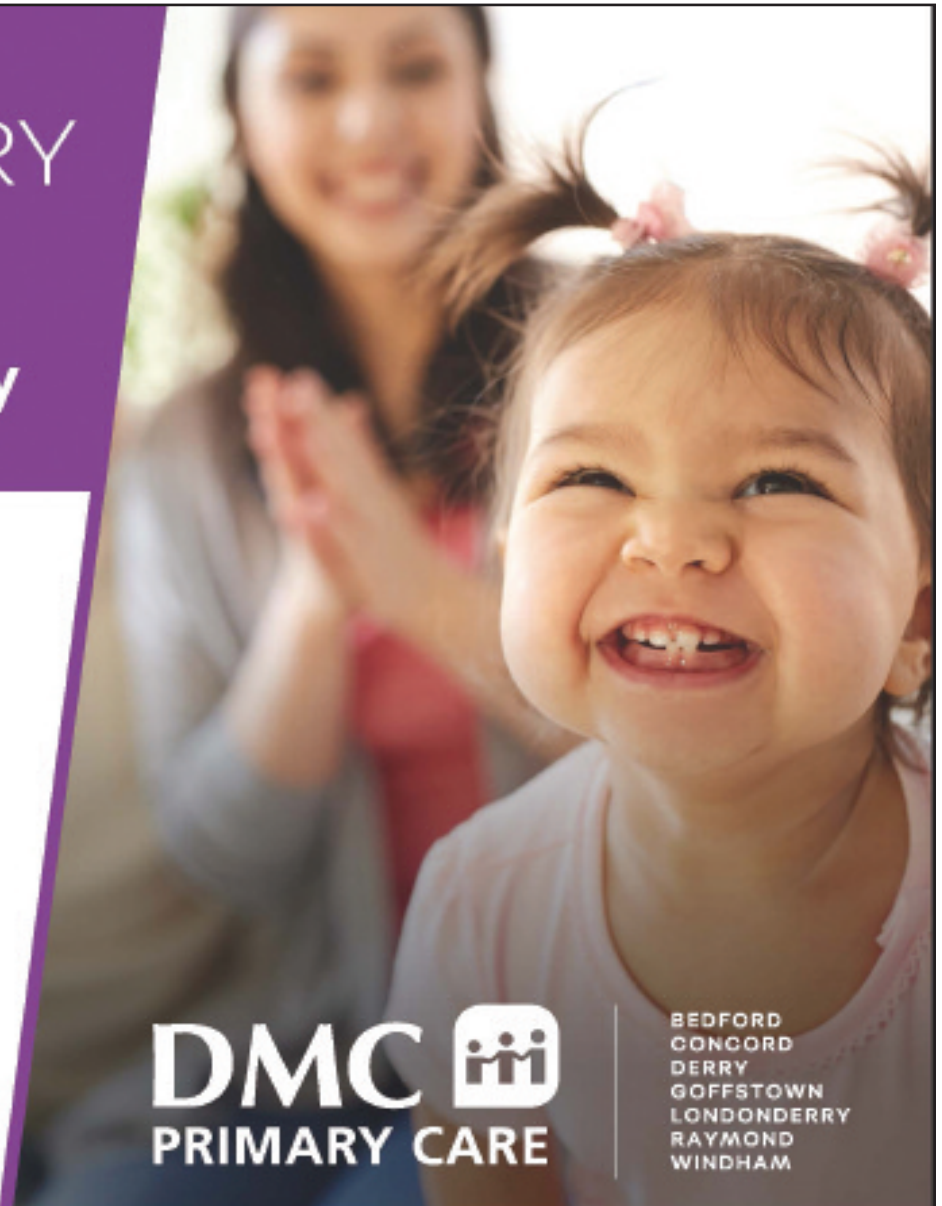

Lancer Baseball Keep Winning Streak Going and Beat Astros

The Londonderry High School Varsity Baseball team had another successful week to start the month with three, three-run wins, one at the expense of rival Pinkerton Academy.

The three victories give the Lancers a six-game winning streak and put their season record at 10-1 and they now sit on top of the Division I standings at 10-1.

The team's week started at Nashua North High School, on Wednesday May 3, where they came away with a three-run shutout over the Titans.

Senior pitcher, Mike Crowley, served up a gem, allowing just one hit over seven innings and struck out 14 batters for the win.

The first LHS run came in the third inning,

with one out and two men on. Junior Owen Carey hit a sac fly to left, to bring in Brady Anderson from third.

The remaining runs came in the sixth inning, with junior Johan Pena and sophomore Jet Jones getting one-out singles with men on.

The Lancers had five singles in the game, with center-fielder, Brett McKinnon, getting two and right-fielder, Liam Stott, providing another.

Crowley sat down all, but two Nashua batters and walked just one in the Lancers eighth win of the season.

Two days later, at Lancer Park, the home team held onto a one-run lead taken in the sixth inning, for a 3-2 victory over Bishop Guertin.

Both teams scored one-run in the first, for a

The Cardinals tied the game at two, in the top of the fourth, where it remained until the sixth.

The final run of the game came on a bases loaded walk to senior Connor Fennell.

Senior Lancer right-hander, Kevin Rourke, pitched the entire game, allowing five hits, three walks and two runs with five Ks for his third win of the season.
