Town Council Get Update On the Industrial Tax Incentive Program

During the Monday, Nov. 14, Town Council meeting, members got an update on the Commercial/Industrial Tax Incentive Program.

Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, explained the program essentially allows for businesses that have new property value worth \$15 million or more to get tax breaks. For existing businesses, they can also get tax breaks if they have an additional \$15 million in value. It was explained by Malaguti that since they implemented the program back in June, they haven't had anyone

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Town-Wide Speed Limits Being Discussed Again

The issue of speed limits was a topic of discussion during the Nov. 14 Town Council meeting.

It was explained by Londonderry Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, that a vote was taken during the Oct. 3 Traffic Safety Committee meeting to request the Town Council look at changing the speed limits for Calla, Sunflower, Sandy Brook and Acorn roads.

Malaguti said since there are no posted speed limits on those roads it is automatically the default

35 miles per hour.

Town Council Chairman, John Farrell, said the last few years there have been ballot questions about lowering speed limits in town that weren't successful.

He said people in town have not been in favor of such changes.

"They were both defeated by the voters," said Farrell.

Malaguti also noted they had a directed patrolman to enforce speeding recently on Calla.

"There were no violations that were noted at that time," said Malaguti.

Town Councilor, Chad Franz, said the proposal would be to reduce speed limits for cul-de-sacs or dead end roads, town wide.

He also noted that on Sept. 3, a girl on his street, Sunflower Lane, was hit by a car while crossing the road and while she is okay, he wants to be able to mitigate the risk of people getting hurt in the future.

Traffic Safety Committee Chairman, Bob Ramsay, said if they are going to do it for some roads with dead ends or cul-de-sacs in town then

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Heritage Commission Review Large Plans Near Vista Ridge

The Londonderry Heritage Commission had a list of new issues on their agenda for their Thursday, Nov. 17, meeting.

The first was for a site plan for 130 townhouses at 171, 175, and 191 Rockingham Road. The request also included another site at 71 Perkins Road.

Jason Lopez of Keach-Nordstrom Associates attended the meeting with land owner, Jean Gagnon, to make a presentation about the two properties. The two men also had a presentation for a

separate design review to subdivide the same properties.

"These properties are located in an area intended for properties with both residential and commercial use. Jean is a residential builder, not a commercial builder," said Lopez. "We talked to the Planning Board about separating commercial use."

The original plan had businesses on the first floor, although two are now looking to remove the commercial section of the site to focus mainly on the residential part of the project.

"It's all regular construction, all wood con-

struction," said Gagnon. "I haven't gotten into colors yet; we'll try to paint it a light color." The Commission and Mr. Lopez suggested earth tones for the color.

The Commission requested more specifics, including the design and colors before the project move onto the Planning Board.

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Local Survivor Gives Inspiring Speech at Middle School

Hometown hero, Noelle Lambert, visited her former halls of Londonderry Middle School to deliver an inspiring speech to students that centered on persevering through life's adversities.

Lambert, who was a multi-sport athlete when she went to school in Londonderry, is currently on the NBC show *Survivor*, where she hopes to be the first amputee to win the game. As of the end of last week, she is one of eight contestants out of 12 that are still competing to win \$1 million in season 43 of the show.

Noelle has also competed as a Paralympian as a runner.

She was welcomed back to the school in the gymnasium she used to play basketball by a full assembly of students and staff. Her former high school lacrosse coach, Bob Slater, also attended the speech.

She started by telling the students that she grew up in Londonderry

as the only girl with three brothers and she was always drawn to being competitive. Growing up, her dream was to be a Division I lacrosse player in college and after four years playing three sports at Londonderry High School, she was signed to play lacrosse at UMASS Lowell, where she was able to realize her dream.

As a freshman in college, she started in every game and was the leading point scorer on her team.

She explained to the students how she lost her leg following the success of that season.

Lambert lost her leg, below the knee, while riding a moped with her college teammates on Martha's Vineyard. This was the first time she had driven a moped, and ended up in a horrible accident with a dump truck. Following the crash, her immediate thought was how will I ever play sports again. She wasn't sure how she would even walk again let alone run.

She attributes a man driving behind her at the accident as saving her life by applying a tourniquet before being flown to a hospital off the island.

After surgery, she started the recovery process after losing her leg and having it amputated above the knee.

Lambert refused to let the injury end her college career, she had lots of support from people around her and said "I was determined

not to let this accident define the rest of her life."

During her sophomore year, she commuted to school every day while she healed and waited for her walking prosthetic leg to be made. At that time, she became a student coach.

The following summer, she worked on learning to use a running blade, which is an artificial leg used by athletes.

It took her quite a while to be able to play lax with the new leg, but by her junior year, she was able to return to the field. It was a difficult transition in her return to sports, but she able to join her teammates in a game, where she was able to actually score her first goal since her accident.

She said that in her senior year, she wanted to share her experience with others with disabilities and she started the non-profit called "The Born to Run Foundation," which helps children and young adults get prosthetics at no cost.

After graduating in 2019, Lambert was

approached to run in the Paralympics, where she was able to qualify for the 2020 Paralympic Games in Tokyo by beating the reigning champion.

She attributes this to having competed with women without disabilities while she was training.

At Tokyo, she placed sixth in the world at the 100-Meter.

Following her success in the Paralympics, she then took up snowboarding where she has competed in the world championships and finished fourth.

She is currently showing the world what a survivor she is as the only "above-the-knee amputee" contestant ever on the longstanding show "Survivor."

Lambert expressed her accident didn't end things for her, it was the beginning of a new challenge in her life and made her a better person.

Lambert finished by saying, "Every person in this room is going to fail at some point, but that does not mean you should quit. It should make you work harder."

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Londonderry Police Department Make Case For Budget

The Police Department Command Staff presented their proposed department budget during a joint budget workshop with the Budget Committee and Town Council on Nov. 5. One of the parts of the department budget is for services provided at the Manchester Airport. Capt. Timothy O'Donoghue explained the city of Manchester owns the

airport and operates it through the department of aviation, which is an enterprise fund. It means any services the town provides they get reimbursed for. O'Donoghue said the main obligation is for personnel. "We are contractually obligated to provide one captain, five sergeants and 12 patrol officers," said O'Donoghue. The proposed FY 24 budget is \$2,909,026.93

with about \$1.43 million coming from salaries. With the new collective bargaining unit it's likely to change. Other budgeted expenses include \$497,500 that is estimated for medical/dental/life insurance, \$18,000 for workers compensation, and \$195,000 for overtime. One question asked was if Manchester typically funds the full amount of their budget request.

O'Donoghue said they do because it is required under the contract. O'Donoghue told the Town Council they have about three and a half years left in the agreement. Presenting the overall budget was Police Chief, Kim Bernard. Bernard said he was looking for what is needed. "If you see me it's a need," said Bernard. One of the areas

Bernard said they were looking for an increase in was for building maintenance. He said that since FY 18/19 the building maintenance line has been \$18,178. However, Bernard stated they have maintenance needs that need to be addressed. Through their maintenance employee, Bernard said they are able to do some things themselves in order to save money and time rather than hiring an outside contractor.

for oil changes. Another major expense he pointed to is tires, which is \$600 per set of tires. The entire fleet costs \$16,800. Bernard said they were proposing to put \$61,145 into the budget line for next year. "There are needs the police department does have," said Bernard.

"I want to see exactly what we're going to get," said Town Council Liaison, Jim Butler. "Our recommendation is that those colors, all designs, and everything Mr. Gagnon presents must be part of the plans and signed by the Planning Department.

will be for sale, although some owners may later choose to rent them out. The Commission asked the pair to come back with color ideas, a signage plane, and lighting. The Commission had another presentation from Michael Cavanaugh of Rhino Capital Advisors with property owner, Charles Evans. Their project hopes to build 100,000 square-foot warehouse building at 26 Jack's Bridge Road. "We're using natural earth tones, textured

concrete, and stucco to give it an industrial park feel," said Cavanaugh. The design had a clear plan to encourage drainage and minimize the impact on the surrounding wetland. "There aren't as many intricate details as a housing design." The design is also "solar ready" so a future client can easily add solar panels to the roof. Members of the Com-

mission were impressed with the proposal. "I think this is a great addition to our tax base," said Butler. Commission Chair, Krystopher Kenney, asked Cavanaugh to submit a separate signage plan at a later meeting to get a better idea of the result. The warehouse was approved as submitted without any objections.

Another line item that Bernard was concerned about is vehicle maintenance. Bernard said that since FY 16/17 the line item has been \$4,000. Bernard explained they have a number of expenses for their vehicles. For example, each oil change costs about \$60 and they need to do a minimum of three per year. It means they need to have \$5,040 per year

apply for it.

“To date we haven’t had an application under the existent criteria,” said Malaguti.

“Obviously, since June the economic picture has deteriorated considerably,” said Malaguti.

Malaguti stated he has heard from people on the Town Council and in the community that it is a program that has a lot of potential and promise; however, he said the thresholds may be too high.

“But we might be pricing just about everyone out of it,” said Malaguti.

Malaguti said they should examine to see if the guidelines and requirements they have right now are appropriate at this time considering the economic conditions.

As an example Malaguti explained there are three buildings in town that are worth \$20 million or more, however they wouldn’t qualify unless they added more value to it.

Malaguti told the Council that based on their review there are more businesses that would be eligible to participate if they reduce the criteria.

It was noted by Malaguti that it wouldn’t be for current tax paying properties, unless they increase their value of the property by \$15 million.

He said only the additional value would be eligible for the tax break.

Town Council Chairman, John Farrell, said they should discuss it at the next meeting when the full Town Council is at the meeting.

He stated he would be willing to discuss it further, but it doesn’t mean they are going to agree to make any changes.

“I’m happy to discuss anything, it doesn’t mean we’re going to do anything,” said Farrell.

Farrell asked Malaguti to provide the Town

Council with some options for them to consider.

Also during the meeting, the Town Council discussed ending the Exit 4A TIF District.

Malaguti explained while there is authorization for the TIF district, there was never anything implemented there.

“It was never fully implemented,” said Malaguti.

He said it’s not a good practice to have TIF districts that aren’t actually being used and said he recommended they dissolve it and it could be revisited if there are projects presented for it.

they should do it for all the roads.

Ramsay also noted that by changing the speed limits it wouldn’t necessarily stop people from speeding.

Director of Engineering and Environmental Services, John Trottier, noted, “If we’re going to do this, there needs to be some engineering study put to it.”

Another argument that was made by Franz

is that there were 13 people during the Traffic Safety Committee meeting that were in favor of lowering the speed limit, however, Farrell said that the ballot question failed previously.

“And the ballot measure was defeated twice by the town,” said Farrell.

Londonderry Police Chief, Kim Bernard, also said he would want it to be changed for all the same type of streets if they were going to make any changes. He stated there are many roads in

town and with various speed limits already, it becomes difficult to know what roads have what speed limits.

Town Council Vice Chairman, Joe Green, said if they look at it further he wants to know what the cost will be to change the speed limits.

It was decided they would revisit the proposal during a future meeting when more information is available.

The next Town Council meeting is Dec. 5 at 7 p.m.

Thomas E. Bisson, 65, of Londonderry, NH, passed away Sunday Nov. 13, 2022, in the Southern NH Medical Center, Nashua, NH. Tom has overcome many medical problems over the last 10 years, beating cancer, a rare lung disorder, but this last illness was too much, and he was taken from us much too soon. He was born on April 16, 1957, in Hartford, CT, a son of the late Wilfred and Marguerite (Thibault) Bisson, and had been a resident of Londonderry for the past 20 years.

He is survived by his beloved wife of 32 years, Pamala (Carr) Bisson of Londonderry; two sons, Robert P. Bisson of Pelham, NH and Zachary T. Bisson and his partner Ethan Conley of Manchester, NH; two brothers, Joseph M. Bisson of Pasadena, MD and Gregory J. Bisson of North Carolina; one sister, Patricia Guimond of Berwick, ME; his mother-in-law, Barbara Carr of Londonderry, as well as many nieces, nephews, cousins and his Uncle George Thibault. 
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Londonderry's Madelyn Murray Lands Lead in NEDE's The Nutcracker

Madelyn Murray of Londonderry, will portray the lead role of Clara in the Sunday performance of New England Dance Ensemble's (NEDE) professional production of The Nutcracker. Nov. 26 & 27 at the Seifert Performing Arts Center, Salem, NH.

Madelyn "Maddy" Murray is no stranger to the stage. And now, her upcoming appearance as Clara in NEDE production of 'The Nutcracker' casts her squarely in the spotlight. Madelyn has been dancing for over half of her life. She began her dance career at Melissa Hoffman Dance Center, and now focuses her study of ballet with Barbara Mullen at Londonderry Dance Academy (LDA).

Madelyn is a straight A high-honor student

who currently balances a rigorous dance schedule with her studies and the responsibility of working as a student assistant for musician-ship. Though her main instruments include oboe, violin, and clarinet, she also teaches and plays trombone, trumpet, clarinet, and percussion. 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

Lancers Football Head for Second Consecutive Title

The Londonderry High School Football team will be looking to defend their Division I championship title after beating the Pinkerton Academy Astros 21-7 at Lancer Park in the Semifinals on Saturday, Nov. 19.

The Astros were held scoreless until the third quarter and the Lancers defense kept PA out of the endzone to maintain the win.

Londonderry was able to hold the tough Pinkerton senior running backs, Cole Yennaco and Jacob Albert, to

just 63-yards to help assure the victory.

Overall, Londonderry was able to gain 179-yards of total offense in the game, while the Astros were held to just 120-yards.

Albert had an off day, and the first play from the offensive line gave a good indication of how the game would go for the PA side. Albert lost his footing in that play and started with an opening fumble.

Fortunately, he recovered the ball, but the team went three-and-out to start the game.

Londonderry had a very strong opening

drive, starting at their 22-yard line after PA's first punt and was able to pound the ball down the field to get into the end-zone during a 10-minute drive.

During that drive, on fourth-and-eight at the PA 38-yard line, Londonderry quarterback, Drew Heenan, threw down the field to Anthony Amaro for a big 34-yard completion inside the ten-yard-line.

The drive ended with senior running back, Trevor Weinmann, getting the first touchdown of the game with a two-yard run. The point after by senior Jack Drabik put LHS up 7-0.

The Astros second drive of the game ended much like their first, with the Lancer defense holding them to minimal yards on the ground and forcing a three-and-out punt.

Londonderry started their second drive of the game from their side of mid-field, where Heenan made another nice pass to end the first quarter. Weinmann made a very nice juggling, sideline catch at the PA 35-yard line.

The Lancers drive ended with another fourth down attempt that was foiled by PA at the 28-yard line.

The Astros took over on downs and continued to try and run the football against the tough LHS defense.

On second down, LHS senior, Nathan Pedrick, busted through the PA line and got the first sack of the game for a 6-yard loss and helping to force another punt.

During the punt, the Special Teams squad came up big with junior Cam Brutus being able to break through and block the kick and allow fellow junior Seth Doyon to grab the ball and get into the end zone for the second score of the game. Drabik then gave LHS 14-0 lead with the extra point into the wind with four-minute left in the half.

Pinkerton's third drive of the game had Yennaco under center, hoping for a different result in running the ball, but despite one passing play in that drive and a new quarterback the drive ended with another three-and-out and a punt.

The following LHS drive resulted in the Lancers first punt of the game, giving PA the ball at the 35-yard line where Londonderry forced another PA punt after three running plays.

Despite two nice passing plays during Londonderry's final

drive of the half, it ended with another failed fourth down attempt.

The final PA drive of the half had the Astros getting their first, first down and also saw senior kicker, Jack Drabik, taken off the field after an injury during a tackle on a Yennaco first down run with just 10 seconds left in the half.

Pinkerton saw it's first glimmer of hope, after Lancer senior, Andrew Kullman, fumbled on his first carry of the game and the Astros Patrick Waldron recovered, putting PA just outside the LHS 30-yard line.

The PA offense had their first big passing play in the following drive, junior quarterback, Tim Hersom, had a completion to Matt Morrison on a third-and-15 play to give the Astros a first down.

The drive ended with a failed fourth-down attempt at the LHS 14-yard line, giving LHS the ball back, where they punted after three plays.

The PA momentum continued in their second drive of the third quarter, resulting in the Astros first score of the game.

PA worked their way down to the one-yard line where Yennaco put the Astros on the board with a touchdown. The point after kick by Craig Coventry put the score

at 14-7 with four minutes left in the quarter.

The Astros defense held Londonderry to minimal yards in the following drive, but the Londonderry punt put PA at their three-yard line to start the fourth quarter.

The Lancers defense nearly had a sack in the end zone for the safety to start the final quarter, but settled for a punt.

During the punt, an Astros facemask penalty put LHS at the PA 13-yard line, setting up Londonderry's third touchdown of the game. Heenan ran the ball in from the 10-yard line on third down to get the game back to a two-score lead. Senior Dylan Wrisley came in for the injured Drabik for the point-after.

That score was all Londonderry needed to give them the victory over the rival Astros and give them their third trip in four seasons to the Division I finals.

Heenan was eight for 16 in pass completions

for a total of 78 yards in the air. Heenan also led his team in rushing, getting 66-yards on 16 attempts on the ground.


Junior Jake Schena had 20-yards on seven carries followed by Weinmann and Andrew Soucy who both had seven-yards.

Amaro was the leading receiver with his catch of 34-yards, Weinmann had three catches for 23-yards and junior Matt Carrol had three for 20-yards.

On defense, Pedrick led in tackles with 7.5, seven of them solo and Weinmann finished with 4.5.

Londonderry will face the Bedford Bulldogs in the championship game on Saturday, Nov. 26, at Exeter High School at 1 p.m. Bedford finished the regular season at 6-3 and their last division title was a 28-14 win over Pinkerton in 2018.

Londonderry will be going for its third title in four years, getting wins in 2019 against Exeter and a 24-14 win over Winnacunnet last year.
