Noelle Lambert Surviving in Popular Reality Show

Londonderry native, Noelle Lambert, is currently still surviving as a contestant on the CBS show, “Survivor”. The long-running reality show is in its 43rd season and Lambert is the only granite state competitor.

Lambert was a three sport athlete at LHS and played Lacrosse at the University of Massachusetts Lowell. She currently lives in Manchester.

“My life has definitely prepared me for the game of Survivor,” stated a confident Lambert. “I was a standout player, I started every single

game, I was a leading point scorer.”

However, Lambert’s lacrosse career was cut short after a Moped accident in 2016, during a visit to Martha’s Vineyard. The accident led to the loss of her left leg above the knee.

Capital Improvement Plan Hearing Taking Place Nov. 9

During the Oct. 12 Planning Board meeting, one of the agenda items was in regards to a workshop on the Capital Improvement Plan.

Planning Board member, Jeff Penta, questioned the rating for the elementary schools as a “2”, which means the project is deemed as necessary. He said that aside from the first two phases of Moose Hill, the rest of the schools are likely six years out and thought that it should be reflected in the CIP as that.

The project descrip-

tion states, “Renovations and construction of new areas to address current educational needs for all three elementary schools.”

“All three elementary schools are simply “old”,” the draft CIP states. “Since they were built, the methods of teaching, the curriculum have all changed significantly. Structurally, the buildings may be OK, but the HAVC system, roofing, current security needs, etc. all should be evaluated, and most likely replaced.”

In total the project estimate is \$127 million.

Penta said he wanted it to break out the differ-

ent projects and asked if the rating could be changed.

Comprehensive Planner, Amy Kizak, said the project will be looked at again next year.

“This gets revisited every year,” said Kizak.

Penta stated ultimately he wanted the ratings to be as accurate as possible based on what is happening right now.

“This is a huge ask for the town and I want the information to be as accurate as possible,” said Penta.

Planning Board Ex-Officio, Deb Paul, said it makes sense to put it as

School District Looking to Bring Transparency Back

The School District is bringing information about their committees online in order to inform the public more. Interim Superintendent, Dan Black, explained they are hoping to have more transparency when it comes to the work that different committees are doing.

“Since last spring, our leadership team has been working to get school back to normal. Looking at the current state of our schools, that effort has largely paid off,” said Black. “We know getting back to

normal also means making sure all of the normal functions of a school system are running properly.”

Black said the COVID 19 pandemic disrupted a lot of their systems and they are still working to get operations back to normal.

“One of those systems is making sure the community can follow along with any committee work that happens for the School Board and School District,” said Black. “We admit that many of the paperwork and posting requirements for our committees were not as consis-

tent over the last couple of years as they should have been. We have begun rectifying this so the community can follow along with the ongoing and timely work of our various committees.”

Black added that they hope to be able to connect with the community on as many

Lambert returned to sports after a year, initially going back to lacrosse before trying track and field. Eventually, she worked up to the American team for the 2020 Paralympic games.

“I did not want to let the accident define my life and the rest of my life. I had tough moments, but I never wanted to show it, and that is my stubborn self. I was able to compete at the Tokyo Paralympic Games, and set a new record for the 100-meter for my classification group.” Lambert explained while outlining the recent highlights of her career.

Since the accident, Lambert has engaged in motivational speaking and later founded the Born to Run Foundation, a non-profit organization aimed at “providing specialized prosthetics to young adults and chil-



dren,” according to their website. The site also claims that twenty-one prosthetic donations have been made so far.

Lambert has been described as “Granite Stater all the way” according to Townsquare Media’s Sean McKenna. He added that the first winner of Survivor Richard Hatch also “has NE roots”.

“I don’t want people to look at me and see that I’m broken, I want people to look at me and be inspired and motivat-

ed,” said Lambert. “I’m absolutely going to win; I’m going to be the first amputee to win the game of Survivor.” She is the third amputee to appear on the show overall.

Many viewers have already reacted well to Lambert, her story, and her performance in the initial episodes.

The current season of Survivor began Sept. 21, and Lambert has survived the first four eliminations.



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Energy Task Force Discusses Plans for the Future

The Londonderry Energy Commission met on Sept. 29 to discuss ways their group can move forward.

One issue Commission members wanted to address has been difficulties measuring the exact energy usage of Londonderry schools. This means getting a clear measurement of electricity, propane, oil, and natural gas. The Energy Committee was determined to have a preliminary presentation ready on their findings by Oct. 17 at the latest.

"I'm hoping as a first approximation, I can go into the school budget and figure out their energy, but I don't know if it's that simple," said Commission member, Michael Speltz.

Right now, the Energy Commission has been able to find raw usage numbers for Town Hall, but not the schools.

"You can get an amount of money, but that doesn't tell you your usage at all," said Londonderry resident, Christine Herez, in response to questions about usage. "I went to Eversource to get my

communities information and I went to Liberty for the gas."

However, members noted that even asking Everstone and Liberty only gives a limited view of the energy used by Londonderry. The Committee proposed a complete energy audit of the school consumption for a more accurate picture of the situation.

"Everything is changing rapidly," added alternate member, Ray Breslin, as he referred to the impact of inflation on energy costs. "Looking to the future, wow, who knows what we've got."

Membership issues were also on the meeting agenda as Sue Foley, and Rick Darveau recently stepped down from the Committee due to schedule conflicts. Londonderry

residents, Janice Harvey and Ann Fenn, have applied to fill the vacant positions. Members proposed making the new applicants alternate members of the Energy Committee. They also proposed making Breslin a full member of the Committee.

Planning for next year included a conversation on the responsibilities of the Energy Commission might evolve into a more comprehensive environmental board. Responsibilities could include water, recycling, energy, and elements of conservation with a larger committee to coordinate policy. Such a new setup would allow for greater collaboration toward shared goals.

"We would focus in

on energy, but we would also be connecting to those other groups in making it under the umbrella of the Londonderry environmental resource committee," said Energy Commission Chair, Deb Paul. "We're all talking about the electric cars, we're all talking about the solar panels, we're all talking about how we can do a better job, we're all talking on the same issues."

Solid Waste, Conservation, Beautify Londonderry, the Energy Committee, and a future Water Committee would fall under the theoretical umbrella of environmental resources. Somebody from the Planning Board would also be involved.

Members hope to put a workable plan in place for a more comprehen-

sive presentation to the Town Council and School Board.

The Londonderry Energy Commission tentatively scheduled a quick meeting for Thursday, Oct. 13, to discuss

their presentation. The next full meeting is scheduled for Monday, Nov. 7. Meetings occur in the Rangeway Meeting Room at 7 p.m., unless otherwise noted..

For a few months now, we have known that we may be losing Derry's Police Chief, Ed Garone, it began with a massive retirement party held on June 1, celebrating his 50-years of service. Hundreds gathered at the event and paid tribute to his long-standing service to the community.

On June 29, the town of Derry honored Garone by naming the Police Station as the Edward B. Garone Building.

On Sept. 30, a final tribute was conducted by the department and the town, as he officially relinquished his post to George Feoli during a parade that rolled by Garone and his family at the Greater Derry Boys and Girls Club in East Derry.

Sadly, Ed lost his battle with cancer last week and now there will be a large void in the lives of anyone that had the pleasure of knowing him.

Besides his duty as a police officer, Garone sat on countless boards as well as giving up much of his personal time to help with community committees and clubs.

He was always available for fund raising efforts by the Derry Rotary, where he was a 48-year member and past president.

He would lend a hand to the Derry Garden Club, a club his wife Blanche has had tremendous involvement in.

Over the years, we had countless interactions with Ed and we can personally name a number of occasions where Garone showed why there will

never be anyone that will match his devotion to the community.

He would always greet you with a smile, a handshake, and a joke. We loved that about him. It never seemed like you were talking with the Chief of Police, he was just a guy who loved volunteering.

One moment that always stands out to me took place during the annual Derry Rotary Auction. I was looking at a roll-top desk that was sitting out in the viewing area, but noticed a draw side was missing. I asked Ed if he had seen it and he suggested we check the dumpster.

Sure enough, someone had thrown it out. It was in pieces. "You want it?" he said. I figured I could glue it back together, so I told him I'd climb in and retrieve it.

Ed stopped me, "I'll get it." He jumped over the five-foot high dumpster and retrieved every broken piece.

I'll always remember that moment and I can't imagine many others would have done the same.

Another memorable moment was when a friend told me of the time he and his father-in-law, who was a veteran, were in line at a store when Ed engaged with them, and offered them a trip to Washington through the Rotary.

He didn't know Ed, but was instantly taken by his kindness.

We will surly miss Ed Garone, he was a great man to have known and we're sure has left an impression on

"Director of Public Works, Dave Wholley, stated that Public Works needs a budget increase of 50% on vehicle maintenance and a 40% increase in the salt budget to keep roads clear next winter." It is always a good thing for department heads to give as much advance warning of impending budget increases to their projected budgets as possible but increases of that magnitude certainly got my attention. After just closing the books on a fiscal year which included record breaking residential property tax bill increases, massive budget increases for whatever reason are simply untenable.  a four or five rating so people know what it is rated as of now and if there are new members of the Board in the future they don't think that the current Board thought it was a top priority right now.

Planning Board member, Ann Chiampa, said she wanted them to prioritize the needs versus the wants for the high

school project in order for it to get approved. The high school, which had an estimated cost of \$98.75 million for the different proposed projects was rated as a 3, which means desirable.

"That might be more amenable to the public," said Chiampa.

Kizak said they are needs and not wants based on the 10 year master facility plan.

"That will be discussed further by the

school board,"

Chiampa said for example she wanted to see the gym and auditorium to be separate.

Planning Board member, Jason Knights, said he felt it made sense to have one budget number.

"I think it does make sense to have it part of the larger number," said Knights.

Town Council Chairman, John Farrell, said it is the first time in 15

years that he wasn't on the CIP committee, the CIP is used for transparency and so people know what might be coming.

He added that by changing the rating they would take that visibility away.

"You're taking away the visibility," said Farrell. He stated they should continue to have discussions about it.

"You want to have it part of all conversations," said Farrell.

The Planning Board ultimately approved chan-

ging the rating for the elementary school project to a five, which stands for being "premature."

The Planning Board will be holding a public hearing for the CIP plan during its Nov. 9 meeting starting at 7 p.m.

 issues as possible.

"We are here to engage with the community on the many issues that surface through this committee work; we know progress comes from dialogue with the community and transparency," said Black. "Please reach out to us with any further questions and needs."

One of the committees includes the "C3 Committee", that meets about six times a year. The focus includes curriculum, technology, and special education topics that are discussed first

in C3 before they are brought to the board.

Another committee is the "communications committee" with a focus on maintaining all current communication initiatives and to look at building best practices to communicate with the community.

A newly formed committee is the kindergarten committee that will be meeting every three to four weeks during the school year. The goal is to get feedback on full day kindergarten.

One committee that the district currently has is a superintendent search committee which

has a goal of hiring the permanent superintendent for the school district.

The school district also has the facilities study committee, which currently doesn't have a charge from the school board and the wellness committee, which meets three times a year. The wellness committee is a federally mandated committee that they need to have as part of the school lunch program.

Chief Edward B. Garone



Chief Edward B. Garone, 79, of Derry, passed away on Tuesday, Oct. 11, 2022 at his home in Derry. He was born in Haverhill, NH & lived in Bradford, VT until the family relocated to Queens, NY returning to Bradford, VT as teenager.

He is survived by his loving wife of over 57 years, Blanche (Wormwood) Garone; son, Michael Garone, of Derry, and his wife, Rebecca; daughter, Vicky Moran, of Lebanon & her husband, Frank; his grandchildren, Aiden Garone, Alexander Garone, Maureen Marquis & her husband Ryan; & his two foster grandchildren, Carleigh Sullivan & Ethan Sullivan Dupuis. He is also survived by his brother-in-law, James Wormwood of Elyria, OH; & extended family members & friends.

He is predeceased by his parents, Francis A. Garone, Sr. & Winifred (Barry) Garone; his brother Francis "Gary" Garone, Jr., & his wife Mona; & sister, Nancy McHugh.

Chief Garone's life was dedicated to public service, serving a 3-year tour of duty in the US Marine Corps from 1961-1964, stationed for 16 months in Iwakuni, Japan & was assigned to the 2nd Marine Division completing his service on Aug. 31, 1964.

After returning home from the Marine Corps, he began his career in law enforcement as a Police Officer in Lebanon, NH being sworn in on Oct. 15, 1964. Where he quickly rose to the rank of Captain. On June 1, 1972, at 29 years old, he became the Chief of Police for the Town of Derry. He served as the Chief of Police for the Town of Derry until his retirement on Sept. 30, 2022, after serving 58 years in law enforcement & serving the community of Derry for 50 years & 4 months.

He had a long dedication to the Derry community, exemplified by his unparalleled community and civic minded devotion to many organizations. In 1984, the Derry Chamber of Commerce recognized him as its Citizen of the Year.

He was a member of the Greater Derry Boys & Girls Club Board of Directors for over 45 years. The Club recognized him as Volunteer of the Year, he was a past President of the Club, & Chairman of the Capital Campaign to build a new Club.

Chief Garone was also a member of the Derry Rotary Club for over 48 years, serving as President & was a Member of the Board of Directors. He received the Paul Harris Fellow recognition & was awarded Rotarian of the Year for 1987-1988 & was the longest serving Rotarian.

He was also the Director of the Derry Veteran's Assistance Fund & was one of the initial Board of Directors & served as past President.

Chief Garone also served on the Board of Directors & as President for the Vivian Leon Memorial Foundation, a charitable foundation that provides funds each year to local charities.

Over the years he also served on the Board of Directors for the Alexander Eastman Foundation & for the Seacoast Child Advocacy Center.

He served as a Board Member on the New England State Police Information Network (NESPIN).

Over his 50-year tenure as Chief of Police for Derry, he was instrumental in the formation of the first regional special operations unit in NH, the Southern NH Special Operations Unit. He served as President of the Board of Directors since its inception in 2000.

He was an active member of the NH Association of Chiefs of Police (NHACOP) since being appointed Chief in Derry. He ascended through the Chairs & served as President in 1981 & subsequently, he became Secretary for the Association in 1990 & maintained that roll until his retirement. The Association awarded him the Lifetime Achievement Award in 2008.

In 2015, he received the NH Congressional Law Enforcement Award for Career Service for his 50 years of outstanding dedication and commitment to NH Law Enforcement.

He also had a family home where he was born & raised in Bradford, VT. In 2006, he became a Commissioner for the Bradford Police Commission responsible for the oversight of the Department. In 2010 the Commission was renamed the Public Safety Commission, with additional oversight of the Fire Department & Rescue Squad, he served on until the time of his death.

There are no calling hours. Graveside services concluding with military honors will be held on Thursday, Oct. 20, at 9 a.m., at the NH State Veteran's Cemetery, Rt. 3, Boscawen, NH. The Peabody Funeral Homes & Crematorium are assisting the family with arrangements.
