Town Council Moves Forward with Lithia Springs Purchase

fter a number of months deliberating on the merits, the Town Council finally voted to move forward with the Conservation Commission's proposal to purchase land that was once owned by the Lithia Springs Water Company off Nashua Road.

The council had been holding off making a decision until they could understand what may or may not be developed on the 54 acres of land. They also requested to land.

The land is currently owned by the Elwood family, of Elwood Orchards, and was purchased by them in 1949.

According to the Purchase and Sale Agreement, dated in May of this year, the purchase price will be \$1.5 million.

The proposal call for the land to be held in perpetuity for conservation, agriculture and recreation purposes.

The appraisal came in at \$2 million and Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, told the council the document suggested that, "this is a highly develsee an appraisal of the opable parcel that you can put a lot of develop-

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Malaguti added that the town had received a number of letters in support of the purchase of the property.

The first councilor to speak was Deb Paul, who was all for moving forward with the purchase saying, "We're buying this property to protect the wetlands around the buildable areas of the property." She added that the property has significant wildlife connection lines. "I'm against putting a development on this piece of property."

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School Board Gets Update From Comm

The Sept.6 Londonderry School Board meeting had an update regarding the newly formed Communications Committee.

Amity Small, the principal of Matthew Thornton Elementary School,

said they have been they have been able to meeting and the meetings have been productive.

"It's a very dynamic group," said Small.

Small said everyone who is on the committee comes with a "different lens" on things.

One of the things

do is get the new parent hub up and running. She explained that it will be able to get information to families in one place.

As an example of something they can put on the parent hub, Small said are fliers from outside organizations.

Another thing that has been accomplished is having a new Youtube channel that will house all their videos and have it divided up by schools so the content is easier to navigate.

Small stated they also have some staff members who now have Instagram accounts up. It is a way to promote what is happening in the schools. She said thatacting Superintendent, Dan Black, for example had 23 posts up at the time of the meeting.

Small also noted they would be posting more on Facebook as well. The most popular post they have so far is the "faces of principals."

"That is our most popular post," Small.

It was explained by Small they are going to rely on feedback from families, staff, and students to see what their needs are.

Small said they are always going to be trying to improve their communications especially as things evolve.

"We're never going to reach a point where we're done," said Small.

Also during the meeting, Black gave the School Board an update regarding the school district's enrollment.

Black stated that currently they have 4,149 students enrolled within the district, which is down four students compared to last year's school year. There is potential that more students may be added.

It was pointed out by Black that the official enrollment is Oct.1, which is what they give to the state for funding and for budgetary pur-

Continued from page1 was the District office and whether or not they want to continue with their plan from last year, or go with a different one.

Black said they also need to address the older parts of the high school.

"We have some issues there," said Black.

Black explained that because of the supply chain issues they need to pay attention to how long things take. For example it would take about a year and a half to get a boiler right now.

"These things are going to take a long time," said Black.

Black thinks eventually the School Board should have a public comment period to discuss the tentative plan.

School Board mem-

ber, Bob Slater, said he wants to get a consensus from the Board for the four items presented by Black to make sure that is all their priorities.

If that is the case he said they should come back in two weeks to the next School Board meeting and then go with public forums.

"Mechanical is number one," said Slater.

Slater explained he is concerned about costs going up along with the bond rates potentially going up. Because of that he wants to see what the price for the district office is projected to be and if it's too expensive they could look at something else.

He said if they agree to move forward with To him, on the top of trying to build a new district office then they should move it to the top of the list because of the uncertainty with

prices.

School Board Vice Chair, Sara Loughlin, stated she thinks Moose Hill should go ahead of the District office.

"I think we need to look at our students and what their needs are," said Loughlin.

School Board member, Amanda Butcher, said she also agreed that Moose Hill is important to look at, especially since the state may begin requiring all day kindergarten.

Think for Yourself

Would you rather be exposed to as many ideas as possible and make up your own mind as to what their worth is, or have someone else, sanctioned by the government, decide what you should or should not know.

That's the essence of what the American Library Association's Banned Books Week is about, and it takes place September 18 - 24. Its whole purpose is to celebrate the freedom to read and the importance of the First Amendment.

Banned Books Week reminds us of books that people have attempted to keep from the public for a myriad of reasons. The challenge is the attempt to keep a book from you and me, it involves people saying they have the right to tell others what they can or cannot read. We can't accept that.

Parents have the right and the duty to guide their children's moral values and oversee their reading. They do not have the right to dictate what anyone else's children read, that's what a request to ban a book means.

In simpler terms, what you like to read may not be what I like to read, but neither of us has the right to prevent the other from reading what we want.

Do you read the Bible? Did you enjoy The Catcher in the Rye, The Grapes of Wrath, To Kill a Mockingbird, The Lord of the Flies, Brave New World, The Call of the Wild, or Native Son? How about novels by Toni Morrison or Ernest Hemingway?

They all faced banning.

Society faces grave danger when restraints are placed on availability of information. That's why we cherish press freedom, and why our country's founders enshrined it in the Constitution. It's why we think you should be able to go the library and select any book you want without someone having censored the collec-

Don't take your freedom to read for granted. There are people eager to tell you and libraries what they've decided should be kept away from us. That's called censorship, and there is no place for it in American society.

Of course some books contain viewpoints offensive to some readers. The solution? Don't read the

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Ceremony Held To Honor Those Lost During 9-11 Attack




Young people develop into responsible citizens through their experiences as CAP cadets and become tomorrow's aerospace leaders.

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
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Masked to be Presented by Ovation Theatre Company



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

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
