Planning Board Discusses Subdivision, School Population

One of the agenda items discussed at the Sept. 7 Londonderry Planning Board meeting was in regards to a subdivision

plan for 106 Wiley Hill Road.

Representing the owner was Jeff Kevan. “The proposal is to create two new lots,” said Kevan.

He explained that the

current house would be on a lot that is over three acres, one would be for a little under three acres, and the other would be about five acres.

Town Council Moves Forward with Lithia Springs Purchase

After a number of months deliberating on the merits, the Town Council finally voted to move forward with the Conservation Commission’s proposal to purchase land that was once owned by the Lithia Springs Water Company off Nashua Road.

The council had been holding off making a decision until they could understand what may or may not be developed on the 54 acres of land. They also requested to see an appraisal of the land.

The land is currently owned by the Elwood family, of Elwood Orchards, and was purchased by them in 1949.

According to the Purchase and Sale Agreement, dated in May of this year, the purchase price will be \$1.5 million.

The proposal call for the land to be held in perpetuity for conservation, agriculture and recreation purposes.

The appraisal came in at \$2 million and Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, told the council the document suggested that, “this is a highly developable parcel that you can put a lot of develop-

ment onto.”

Malaguti added that the town had received a number of letters in support of the purchase of the property.

The first councilor to speak was Deb Paul, who was all for moving forward with the purchase saying, “We’re buying this property to protect the wetlands around the buildable areas of the property.” She added that the property has significant wildlife connection lines. “I’m against putting a development on this piece of property.”

School Board Discuss Infrastructure Concerns

During the Sept. 6 Londonderry School Board meeting, Interim Superintendent, Dan Black, explained it is important the district begins to map out what they want to do in terms of renovations and repairs.

He said he feels they need to come up with a short term plan along with a longer term plan.

Black stated that right now they are in a good spot since they have nothing that is in interment failure right now.

During the meeting,

Black made four recommendations of what he feels are some of the most pressing concerns. Black said their most pressing issue are mechanical, including things like boilers that are past their life.

He said they are hoping to get a read of what needs to be replaced in one to three years for boilers.

“No one in this room wants a boiler to break in January,” said Black.

Another major area that Black pointed to is the space at Moose Hill. He explained he feels bad the library for the school is in a staff room.

“We are out of permanent space in that building,” said Black, who noted they need a long term plan for the school.

He stated one of the important things to look at is the future programming there; like all day kindergarten.

Another priority that Black recommended **continued on page 3**

One question that was asked was whether or not they are planning on widening the roadway at all.

"They are not," said Kevan.

It was also asked if there would be a lot of disruption to the stone walls on the property.

"They will all probably have to be relocated," said Kevan.

The Planning Board ultimately gave condi-

tional approval for the subdivision plan.

Also during the meeting, Planning Board Chairman, Arthur Rugg, pointed out that the school district numbers show they are likely to have a decrease in students this year. Rugg stated it's not only a trend in Londonderry, but also across the state.

"For over 20 years we've had a declining school population," said Rugg.

He said it was some-

thing they need to pay attention to.

It raised the question of how often they update their growth management plan.

Rugg explained they have to update it every year.

One concern that was brought up by ex-officio, Deb Paul, was the fact they need to get their water infrastructure under control, including whether or not they have big enough pipes for the growth of the town that

they are seeing.

Paul stated going forward she thinks they need to make sure they take into account their water and sewer infrastructure when it comes to the growth management plan.

"We really need to be careful in looking at this growth management to include water and sewer from now on," said Paul.

Paul also noted she thinks traffic control should also be included, including how much

traffic they can handle with the side roads they have now.

"We should really have a plan for growth like that," said Paul.

Rugg said he agreed with her.

"You are not wrong Deb," said Rugg.

It was also noted by Paul, who is the liaison for the ZBA, that they have on their agenda constantly things regarding sign regulations and asked if it was something they could look at in the future.

Rugg said it needs a comprehensive look by a consultant because of the complexity that comes with things like first amendment rights being protected.

Town Planner, Kellie Walsh, said it is something she has on her radar.

"That of course comes with some costs," said Walsh.

The next Londonderry Planning Board meeting is slated for Oct. 5 at 7 p.m.

Franz, wanted to confirm that the money for the purchase would be coming from two sources. One would be through Conservation Commission funds and the other would be

through a grant.

Malaguti responded that there were actually two grants being applied for and if for some reason, the town failed to get those grants, the town could opt out of the agreement. He added that the Conservation Commis-

sion's Land Acquisition Funds, which comes from land use change taxes.

Marge Badois, the Chair of the Conservation Commission, spoke in favor of the purchase, "This property is exceptional on many levels. It's environmental, his-

torical and ecological. It would be one of our top acquisitions."

She reiterated that there is no taxpayer money being used for the purchase and mentioned there are also many endangered species living there including some osprey.

Resident, Daniel Bouchard, asked the council what would happen if the grant funding aspect does not go through. He felt that if the remaining balance went to the voters it would more than likely pass as a Warrant Article.

Council Chair, John Farrell, thought that there wouldn't be

enough time at that point to get the acquisition done.

It was also pointed out that at the time of the meeting, the Conservation Commission has \$780,000 in their account and he was thinking there would be another \$200,000 added to the account this fall, leaving a grant amount of roughly \$600,000 needed for the purchase.

It was also stated that the sellers really want the purchase to happen, so if the total money for the purchase isn't raised by the end of the year, the contract would need to be amended.

Both Wayland Elwood and his attorney were present at the meeting and told the town they have every reason to work with the town, as long as the land is to be conserved.

Malaguti added "He should be commended for letting the property go for less than its worth."

Ann Chiampa spoke on behalf of the Londonderry Historical Society and said the society took a vote recently and were in 100 percent agreement on purchasing the property.

With that, the council voted unanimously to move forward with the purchase.

School Board Gets Update From Communications Committee

The Sept. 6 Londonderry School Board meeting had an update regarding the newly formed Communications Committee.

Amity Small, the principal of Matthew Thornton Elementary School,

said they have been meeting and the meetings have been productive.

"It's a very dynamic group," said Small.

Small said everyone who is on the committee comes with a "different lens" on things.

One of the things

they have been able to do is get the new parent hub up and running. She explained that it will be able to get information to families in one place.

As an example of something they can put on the parent hub, Small said are fliers from outside organizations.

Another thing that has been accomplished is having a new Youtube channel that will house all their videos and have it divided up by schools so the content is easier to navigate.

Small stated they also have some staff members who now have

Instagram accounts up. It is a way to promote what is happening in the schools. She said that acting Superintendent, Dan Black, for example had 23 posts up at the time of the meeting.

Small also noted they would be posting more on Facebook as well. The most popular post they have so far is the "faces of principals."

"That is our most popular post," said Small.

It was explained by Small they are going to rely on feedback from families, staff, and students to see what their needs are.

Small said they are always going to be trying to improve their

communications especially as things evolve.

"We're never going to reach a point where we're done," said Small.

Also during the meeting, Black gave the School Board an update regarding the school district's enrollment.

Black stated that currently they have 4,149 students enrolled within the district, which is down four students compared to last year's school year. There is potential that more students may be added.

It was pointed out by Black that the official enrollment is Oct. 1, which is what they give to the state for funding and for budgetary purposes.

Continued from page 1 was the District office and whether or not they want to continue with their plan from last year, or go with a different one.

Black said they also need to address the older parts of the high school.

"We have some issues there," said Black.

Black explained that because of the supply chain issues they need to pay attention to how long things take. For example it would take about a year and a half to get a boiler right now.

"These things are going to take a long time," said Black.

Black thinks eventually the School Board should have a public comment period to discuss the tentative plan.

School Board mem-

ber, Bob Slater, said he wants to get a consensus from the Board for the four items presented by Black to make sure that is all their priorities.

If that is the case he said they should come back in two weeks to the next School Board meeting and then go with public forums.

To him, on the top of the list is addressing the mechanical issues.

"Mechanical is number one," said Slater.

Slater explained he is concerned about costs going up along with the bond rates potentially going up. Because of that he wants to see what the price for the district office is projected to be and if it's too expensive they could look at something else.

He said if they agree to move forward with trying to build a new district office then they should move it to the top of the list because of the uncertainty with

prices.

School Board Vice Chair, Sara Loughlin, stated she thinks Moose Hill should go ahead of the District office.

"I think we need to look at our students and what their needs are," said Loughlin.

School Board member, Amanda Butcher, said she also agreed that Moose Hill is important to look at, especially since the state may begin requiring all day kindergarten.

Think for Yourself

Would you rather be exposed to as many ideas as possible and make up your own mind as to what their worth is, or have someone else, sanctioned by the government, decide what you should or should not know.

That's the essence of what the American Library Association's Banned Books Week is about, and it takes place September 18 - 24. Its whole purpose is to celebrate the freedom to read and the importance of the First Amendment.

Banned Books Week reminds us of books that people have attempted to keep from the public for a myriad of reasons. The challenge is the attempt to keep a book from you and me, it involves people saying they have the right to tell others what they can or cannot read. We can't accept that.

Parents have the right and the duty to guide their children's moral values and oversee their reading. They do not have the right to dictate what anyone else's children read, that's what a request to ban a book means.

In simpler terms, what you like to read may not be what I like to read, but neither of us has the right to prevent the other from reading what we want.

Do you read the Bible? Did you enjoy *The Catcher in the Rye*, *The Grapes of Wrath*, *To Kill a Mocking-*

bird, *The Lord of the Flies*, *Brave New World*, *The Call of the Wild*, or *Native Son*? How about novels by Toni Morrison or Ernest Hemingway?

They all faced banning.

Society faces grave danger when restraints are placed on availability of information. That's why we cherish press freedom, and why our country's founders enshrined it in the Constitution. It's why we think you should be able to go the library and select any book you want without someone having censored the collection first.

Don't take your freedom to read for granted. There are people eager to tell you and libraries what they've decided should be kept away from us. That's called censorship, and there is no place for it in American society.

Of course some books contain viewpoints offensive to some readers. The solution? Don't read the book.

Banned Books Week celebrates open access to the expression of ideas, even those out of the mainstream.

We invite you to celebrate your right to think for yourself this week by visiting your local library and checking out a book. Your choice, choose any book you want.


I also have taken notice, whenever I had complained about "Modern Capitalism" regarding Health Insur-






