Solar Farm Project Planned at West Road RC Club Site

Public input at the Tuesday, Oct. 24, Hudson Board of Selectmen meeting was centered around one agenda item, the proposal to add a solar farm to the old landfill property on West Road.

It was explained by Town Engineer, Elvis Dhima, that they could use portions of the West Road Landfill site, to install solar panels, make money, and save money on the town's electric bill.

"Due to many variables of the site and the permitting process, we followed qualifications-based selection process, and we received qualified submittals," Dhima wrote in a they would essentially be

ectmen. He said the committee, which was established by the Board of Selectmen, recommended Kearsarge Energy from Boston Mass., as "the best vendor for this project." Dhima told the Board of Selectmen that the committee selected Kearsarge Energy, "based on the most revenue and savings for the town, experience and expertise on similar landfill projects." He added that the town could save and make about \$4.47 million for the 25 years of the contract, with a 15-year additional lease option available bringing that number up to \$8.45 million. One of the concerns raised during the meeting was what it would mean for the Southern New Hampshire Radio Control Club, which currently uses the space and has used this space for the past 23 years. School Board Discuss Proposed Warrant Articles

The Hudson School Board had a preliminary discussion regarding proposed warrant articles during its Oct. 25 board meeting.

Two of the proposed warrant articles are currently placeholders, as the district is still negotiating contracts with two different collective bargaining units, one with the union representing the cafeteria personnel, part-time para educators, and part time licensed practical nurses. The other union represents school district building administration, department heads, psychologists, and school

"That has not been report to the District." finalized," Superintendent,

Daniel Moulis said. One proposed warrant article, which was quickly voted on by School Board members to not move forward with, was a warrant article that stated, "Shall the Hudson School District adopt the revisions to RSA 198:4-b, II enacted in 2020, which allows the District to retain up to 5% of the District's net assessment in any vear, allows the expenditure of any amount retained after the School Board first holds a public hearing, and further requires the School Board to include in the annual reporting of the retained fund balance in its annual

"We'll keep having it until they change the law again," Business Administrator, Jennifer Burk, said about the decision by the School Board to remove the warrant article from consideration.

School Board member, Ethan Beals, said when the time comes they should look at potentially spending down some of the fund balance they currently have in the account.

Burk said they have two options, one to reduce the tax rate and the other is for emergencies, which would need to go through the education

Selectmen Discuss Warrant Articles Including Feasibility Study for the Hudson Boulevard/Circumferential Highway

In addition to forwarding a General Fund Operating Budget to the FY 2025 Warrant in the amount of \$35,527,448, which is around a 19 cents increase on the tax rate, the Board of Selectmen voted on several different proposed warrant articles. All approved warrant articles with their wording can be found in the minutes of the Oct. 24th meeting at HudsonNH.gov.

A warrant article has been forwarded and recommended 3-1 by the Board of Selectmen to ask for funds to cover a portion of the Circumferential Highway/ Hudson Boulevard Feasibility (from Lowell Road to 111) Study. The warrant article will ask voters to vote on raising and appropriating the sum of "\$200,075 for feasibility study and preliminary engineering design of the Hudson Blvd. This project will be funded \$800,300 (80%) from NHDOT federal grant and \$200,075 from this appropriation. This is a Special Warrant Article, per RSA 32:3 VI, reflecting an appropriation that will not lapse until the monies are expended, or June 30, 2029, whichever is the earliest,"

Selectmen. This was recommended by a 3-1 vote. The tax rate impact would be 4 cents.

A variety of warrants concerning the fire department were considered. One of the proposed warrant articles was regarding the Fire Apparatus Refurbishment/Repair Capital Reserve Fund, which was established as a way to "fund the refurbishment and repair of the fire department's fire apparatus." It was explained by Town Administrator, Steve Malizia, that the proposal was to originally put \$150,000 into the fund, however, he said, "That's probably a bit aggressive," and to save on the tax rate impact they could consider putting \$100,000 into the fund instead. Malizia said the main point of doing the refurbishments is to give the trucks more of a life. The Board of Selectmen agreed and forwarded the warrant article with the \$100,000 request.

The largest monetary request was to raise and appropriate \$438,258 for the purpose of hiring four Fulll-Time Firefighter/ AEMT's. Fire Chief, Scott Tice, said they currently

The Board of Selectmen ultimately decided against forwarding the warrant article.

However, the Board of Selectmen made a different decision about the training officer position, which was proposed by the Fire Department, as well. The warrant article as written reads: "Shall the Town of Hudson vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$164,891 which represents the cost of wages and benefits, to hire and one (1) filltime Fire Captain Training Officer." The tax rate impact would be 3 cents, and Tice said it was his priority over hiring more firefighters this year, which the Board of Selectmen agreed to move forward with.

Another warrant article the Board of Selectmen agreed to move forward with will ask voters if they should discontinue the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund, which was previously established in 2011, with the remaining funds being transferred to the Emergency Medical Services Revolving Fund.

Another proposed warrant article would ask voters to raise and appropriate \$25,000 to be added to the Energy Efficiency Capital Reserve Fund, which would have a tax impact of 1 cent. Malizia said with about \$56,000 in the fund, and without any major projects lined up, it was recom-

Three warrant articles which were moved forward addressed paving, drainage, and paving. The Board of Selectmen also agreed to move forward with a warrant article for an additional \$100,000 to be added to the Town Wide Paving fund, rather than putting this additional amount into the town budget warrant total. The tax rate impact would be 2 cents. The Board also

\$100,000 to be allocated for the Rehabilitation of the Melendy Road, which would be a 2 cent tax rate impact. The final warrant was to establish a Drainage Capital Reserve fund of \$100,000 and this would again have a 2 cent impact on the tax rate.

It was important for the Board of Selectmen to give the voters some clear choices while prioritizing safety throughout the town.

The board agreed to make the change.

Another proposal was to raise \$200,000 to upgrade two science classrooms/ labs at Hudson Memorial School.

"This is the second phase of two science classroom labs," Moulis said.

He explained that the funds wouldn't have any tax rate impact because the funds would come from the June 30 Fund Balance, which would become available on July 1.

Another proposed warrant article reads: "Shall the Hudson School District vote to establish an Alvirne Farm Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the farm, furthermore to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000 from the June 30 year end undesignated fund balance available for transfer on July 1 to be placed in this fund, and to name the Hudson School Board as agents to expend from the fund."

The warrant would have no tax impact, but members of the School Board asked to be provided with more information about what projects are lined up.

The School Board also voted to change the warrant article asking voters to approve a warrant article asking voters to approve spending \$250,000 from the end of the year fund balance to renovate the former Checkers kitchen at Alvirne for the school's food service program, instead of raising the funds.

"Although we have seen a decrease in overtime opportunities, our staffing lev-Scott Tice, said in June the els have not been fully Board of Selectmen allowed restored." He stated that them to cover mandatory they still have two open positions, with one out on long term injury and one retirement, which requires time shifts.

"In an attempt to alleviate some of the firefighter mandates, I am requesting authorization for FFDP Bourdeau and the Lieutenants to continue to work overtime for a firefighter vacancy that would have otherwise been mandated for the remainder of 2023," Tice wrote in a memo.

Tice told the Board of Selectmen during the meeting that in October, 17 shifts were mandatory overtime shifts that had to be covered by firefighters, and in November there are currently 31 scheduled

mandatory overtime shifts. He explained that since probationary firefighters can't work overtime at first,

it means they have about 20 firefighters to cover the different mandatory overtime "This is something that

would be greatly appreciated by the firefighters," Tice said.

The Board of Selectmen ultimately approved the request, allowing Bourdeau

and the lieutenants to work mandated overtime shifts, through the end of the year.

In other business at the Board of Selectmen meeting, the board heard a request from Police Chief, Tad Dionne, to accept a donation from Walmart.

He explained that Walmart was looking to donate 10 flat screen "smart" televisions, with a total value worth \$2,130.

New Contract Approved For Litchfield Dispatch, Ambulance Services

During the Tuesday, Oct. 24, Hudson Board of Selectmen meeting, Fire Chief, Scott Tice, presented a proposal for new agreements with the town of Litchfield for ambulance and dispatch services.

He explained that earlier this year they realized the ed to is the amount of contracts "hadn't been updated in some time," so they wanted to make changes.

He said previously the notice requirement was 30 days, however, under the new contract, either party would need to give six months notice.

to \$17 a call starting in 2025, and up to \$19 a call starting in 2026.

On the ambulance side, Tice said they are able to bill patients directly.

The contract language reads: "Patients who request an ambulance response from Hudson Fire Department shall be billed the current established ambulance rates as approved by the Hudson Board of Selectmen. A copy of current established ambulance

changes to ambulance service rates shall be provided to the Town of Litchfield. Second, billings for those patients who have not paid within forty-five (45) days will be sent to the patient. If a patient has not paid Hudson Fire Department within forty-five (45) days after the second billing, the third billing will be sent to the Town of Litchfield who shall pay the Town of Hudson or its designated agent. The rate charged to

Tice stated that the town also receives a stipend for having the equipment and personnel ready for the ambulance. He added that last year they received \$138 per call, but this year they would be receiving \$175 a call in 2024, \$195 a call in 2025, and \$215 a call in 2026.

It was explained by Tice that the town has been providing these services to Litchfield for several years, and they aren't doing anything new.

"Our contracts had just expired many years ago and we hadn't upped what we were getting from them," he said.

The Board of Selectmen ultimately approved the new contract.

Lowell Road Variance Request Denied by Zoning Board of their own.

The Hudson Zoning Board of Adjustment met on Oct. 26 to discuss a variance request from Benjamin Mercuri of Nashua, who was hoping to gain approval for an 8-unit, multifamily complex at 100 Lowell Road.

"The public gain would outweigh the public loss, housing units are needed throughout Hudson and Southern New Hampshire," said Mercuri. "I feel that our proposed development will be reviving and bringing back life to a city lot that's been vacant for a couple of years now."

The Lowell location is Paquin, in a letter to the to a housing project they in a business zone of Hudson and there have been issues with the intersection, leading to at least one Town Hall recommendation to put in a residential building instead of a new business for the perceived lower impact on traffic.

However, even with the lower impact, abutting residents questioned the Lowell proposal, feeling it would make an already unsafe situation even worse.

"We have serious concern about the development of this property and the location of the driveway," wrote nearby resident, Julia ZBA. "At least once a week, we almost get hit by someone out of County Road or someone driving up the center lane to pass someone who is trying to turn onto Atwood."

The risk of accidents in the area has always been a problem, and many nearby residents tell people not to turn left on Lowell Road for safety reasons. Paquin called the intersection "the third most dangerous intersection" in town.

Abutters, Ronald and Jerilyn Maynard, also wrote to the ZBA to express their "extreme opposition"

feared "was too close to the road" and could cause a "danger to oncoming traffic." They also noted the proposal seemed too large for the property's size and unfit for children or a school bus stop, claiming the land was originally established for a single home, not a multifamily complex.

Mercuri was open to relocating the driveway, promising to redesign the building to make it safer if requested by the ZBA or engineers.

"I'll tell you now, I'm not willing to sign a piece of paper that puts the public's life at risk," said Board member, Normand Martin. "I've been in this town 22 years, there's been numerous accidents there. None were fatal, but people had to be cut out of cars. For a variance, I couldn't approve it." Other questions arose

regarding the size of the variance, as the current Lowell property is less than half the required size for a multi-person dwelling.

"There is also the issue of altering the essential character of the neighbor-

hood itself, most of the houses around there are single-family houses," said Alternate Board member, Tristan Dion. "They're looking to put eight units on a small lot. The town doesn't really have anything like what we're trying to put in this neighborhood."

Ultimately, the ZBA agreed there were too many problems with the request, voting not to approve the requested variance.

The Hudson Zoning Board is scheduled to meet again on Thursday, November 16, at 7 p.m. in the Buxton Community Development Conference Room.



Mills, Broncos Stampede Goffstown, Clinch Playoffs

The hometown Broncos took to the road to play the Grizzlies of Goffstown on Friday, Oct. 27, and they had a situation in front of them that they have not had since 2019 when they were in Division II of the NHIAA: win and clinch a playoff spot.

The Alvirne squad did just that, winning 37-8 over GHS and clinching a number 10 seed heading into the playoffs.

While the Broncos have certainly had their ups and downs throughout this season, they seem to have clicked at the exact right time, having won three of their last four, beating Concord, 19-12, in the state capitol, crushing the Winnacunnet Warriors of Hampton by a final of 28-0 in a game that the Broncos dominated the whole way on, then a tough loss to a championship contender in the Londonderry Lancers, 40-0, and then this convincing victory over the Grizzlies. Just prior to this hot stretch, the Broncos had lost a close game, 21-10, to the Salem Blue Devils, and prior to that, Alvirne won, 36-13, against a weak Malden Golden Tornadoes squad down in Malden, Mass. All told, Alvirne finishes off the 2022 regular season at 5-4 (4-4 NHIAA D1), good for not only the most wins in a single season since 2019, but their first playoff birth, as well as their best allaround season since returning to Division I.

been without their starting quarterback, Charlie Crawford, since week three when he left the game against Windham with a shoulder injury, looked strong early on against the Grizzlies. Shawn Boudreau has been solid for the Broncos since taking over, and it seems that the offense is becoming a complete unit at the perfect time.

The Broncos have the luxury of having an all-butguaranteed All-Stater in the game as heavy favorites Aiden Mills in the backfield, with a stud tight end in Ryan Rocheleau, who has done everything the Broncos could have ever asked for from him thus far. Imagine what would have happened had Crawford not gone down.

As for the playoffs, it all comes down to tiebreakers. Alvirne sits in a three-waytie for the 10/11/12 seeds with Keene and Spaulding. Now, none of these teams have played head-to-head this season, so here's how it works out:

The Broncos, who have 12th seed due to their lack of a victory over a playoff team, while Alvirne and Spaulding have one apiece.

Spaulding finishes in the 11th seed due to only having two divisional wins on the road, to Alvirne's three, including week 9 play, meaning Alvirne finishes as the 10th seed and will head to Nashua next week to play the Titans, likely on Saturday afternoon or evening, time TBD.

The Broncos came into against the 1-7 Grizzlies, and they did not disappoint; scoring five touchdowns on the night, including three more touchdown runs for Aiden Mills and two TD receptions for Jonovan Santana, one on a jet sweep and another on a 3rd & 35 pass on a seam route from Shawn Boudreau from the mid-field stripe that would make it 28-0 Broncos just before halftime, allowing for the opportunity to "double score" out of the half, which they did thanks to Mills' third and final TD Keene finishes as the run of the night to make it
