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Editorial

Happy Old Home Day!

At the end of the 19th century, NH had lost thousands of its inhabitants to the Civil War, the new frontier in the west, and the fast-paced lifestyle of the big cities. Once abandoned, the previously bustling and inviting communities and farms turned into ghost towns. The cozy homes they left behind fell into disrepair, green fields and pastures soon filled with weeds and brush, and the deep forests thick with trees were being cut down to help keep big business going. Times were difficult and depressing for the remaining residents who remembered how beautiful and industrious their state once was.

N.H. Governor Frank Rollins. knew the success of his state was in jeopardy and that life in NH could not continue this way. He took it upon himself to make a change and devised a plan to reinvigorate the state and its failing economy. He decided to host a massive reunion in all cities and towns throughout the state.

It was to be a grand festival, celebrating all the wonderful things about NH and its citizens, both past and present. The governor wanted this celebration to encourage former residents to keep ties with their old communities. He also hoped that those who left NH and found success elsewhere would want to stay connected to their roots by purchasing summer homes and other properties.

Gov. Rollins wasted no time in drafting local towns to find current addresses of former Granite Staters across the country to send them invitations to attend the very first Old Home Day celebration. The response was overwhelming.

Old Home Week's inaugural night was Saturday, Aug. 26, 1899. There were outdoor gatherings, complete with bonfires, from the mountains to the beaches. On Sunday, attendees sang hymns and former residents gave special services. Communities expanded their own celebrations after the first year, to include patriotic parades, outdoor concerts, baseball games, contests and so on.

Old Home Week did so well at revitalizing the state and its residents, that the rest of New England quickly followed suit.

Now, over 100 years later, NH is still preserving Old Home Day. While many cities and towns have continued the tradition, hard times or lack of participation have prevented it from taking place annually in many communities across the state.

Citizens of Londonderry should take pride in knowing that more than a century later, their hard work and dedication to this historic New Hampshire tradition has been, and will continue to be preserved for generations to come.

"This policy arose because the Committee thinks we needed to more formally define the purpose and how the Social Media presence of School District should function," Superintendent, Dan Black, said. "The Communications team did a great job said during a public com-

malizing how the presence will work was necessary after running into a few issues with posts and comments that were made with our lawyers."

He explained that through the formal policy they will be able to have a clearer vision of what the regulations are, along with a "much better set of rules for public comment than we have now."

Black said when it comes to public comments, their lawyer said if something is able to be

> He stated for example if a staff member was named during a public comment then that wouldn't be allowed so it wouldn't be allowed on Facebook comments.

"The Communications Committee really wants to turn the comment function back on because that increases the engagement and reach we get with Social Media," Black said.

As part of the proposed policy, it lays out what the guidelines are

for public comment.

It includes reasons why the district would be able to remove postings including ones that are:

A. are abusive, defamatory, or obscene;

B. endorse any product, cause, political party or political candidate in conflict with Londonderry School District Policy KJ;

C.target, disparage, or discriminate on the basis of ethnicity, race, religion, sexual preference, age, sex, or disability;

D. constitute a specific or imminent threat:

include links to other sites

F. contain confidential information;

G. are in violation of any intellectual property right of another;

H. are in violation of any law or regulation;

I. are in violation of any District policy;

J. are off-topic or do not relate to the posted topic; or

K. are in violation of the guidelines of the social media site.

The policy explains E. contain spam, ad- that the district social

vertising, solicitations or media platforms would be regulated.

"Official District social media platforms will be regularly monitored," the proposed policy reads. "Staff members responsible for monitoring content may remove posts based on viewpoint-neutral considerations in accordance with this policy, administrative regulations, guidelines, and protocols after consulting with the Superintendent or designee."





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
