Malaguti Expected To Hire New Fire Chief From Within

For the second time in his short tenure, Londonderry Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, will need to select a new chief.

Earlier this month, during the Town Council meeting on Aug. 14, longtime Fire Chief, Darren O'Brien, announced

he would be retiring.

So who will be the next fire chief?

Malaguti in an email to the Londonderry Times on Aug. 27 said the fire chief position was posted for internal positions on Aug. 15, which closed on Aug. 30.

He said he expects to pick someone who currently works for the

department, but isn't sure who may be interested in taking over the chief role.

"While I do not know who will ultimately apply for this important position, I have every expectation that Londonderry's new fire chief will come from within the department's

Proposed Tesla Dealership Will Be First in the State

A new electric car dealership may be coming to Londonderry after the Conservation Commission discussed a new conditional use and wetland permit at 36 Industrial Dr. at their latest meeting. In conjunction with Tesla, Scannell Properties hopes to build an Auto Dealership. Civil engineer, Jim Petropoulos, and wetlands scientist, Brendan Quigley, were at the meeting to make a presentation.

"It is an 8.3-acre property located in the GB Gateway Business

district. The site contains a combination of scrubby wood growth and open areas," explained Petropoulos. "We have filed for the approval of a 50,180 sq. ft. auto dealership with accompanying site improvements and a proposal intended to be the new service and sales facility for Tesla."

The site will also include a large parking lot of 305 spaces and eight supercharging stations.

Scannell recently acquired the option to buy the Industrial Dr. site and is looking for approval before moving

forward. If approved, it would be the first Tesla facility in NH. A similar proposal in nearby Bedford fell through last year.

Petropoulos acknowledged several environmental concerns, having already promised to use local plants for landscaping around the dealership.

"I flagged the wetlands on this site late last fall," added Quigley. "The impact on the surrounding area has been minimized by adding a retaining wall to the project. I think the concerns are pretty manageable."

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Town Uses ARPA Funds for DPW Feasibility Study

The Town Council heard a proposal from Director of Public Works and Municipal Facilities, Dave Wholley, during the Aug. 14 meeting about a proposal to allocate American Rescue Plan Funds to conduct a public works facility master plan feasibility study.

Wholley explained that earlier this year he did a presentation to the Town Council about the lack of facilities in town for DPW and the challenges that comes with it as they try to serve the community as best

as possible.

He said as part of the study they would also be looking to see if there is another location in town for a new facility one day, which could also help address other needs that departments have when it comes to space.

Wholley explained to the Town Council that the plan was to bring in Weston & Sampson to conduct the study.

Michael Richard from Weston & Sampson said their group specializes in public works facilities.

"We've done over 150 of them predominantly

in the New England area," Richard said.

He stated that they have 35 staff members dedicated to it.

"It's just what we do," Richard said.

It was explained by Richard that the first step in the process would be programing/needs assessments.

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Town Council Approve Funding For Dispatch Center Remodel

During the Aug. 14 Town Council meeting, Patrick Cheetham, a captain with the Londonderry Police Department, presented a proposal to use some American Rescue Plan Act funds for the dispatch center remodel project.

He explained that in April 2022 members of Rep. Chris Pappas' office reached out to the about applying for federal community grant project grant funding. Their dis-

cussion was about what the best option would be for funding a project and the dispatch center was decided on.

"It literally is the life center of our police department," Cheetham said.

Cheetham said they were approved for \$75,000 and the total cost of the project is projected to be \$153,000. He added that they were looking to use \$53,000 from ARPA funds and the rest would be paid for from department budgets over time.

Cheetham said they only needed the Town Council's approval in order to receive the funding and they wouldn't be required to have any matching funds and there would be "no strings attached."

"This grant allows us to spend the money how we choose," Cheetham said.

Cheetham told the Town Council that the remodeled space would be designed for 24/7 work, and would be climate controlled.

He explained that

prior to becoming a police officer, he worked as a part time dispatcher and there was a lot less equipment than there is now, which will be purchased as part of the remodel.

"I can tell you there was one computer monitor, one computer terminal, and there was one radio," Cheetham said.

Cheetham explained that they now operate off of four computer monitors and have no less than 25 to 30 programs running.

He said they are try-

ing to make the best workspace possible for those who work in dispatch, including adding a break room for the first time.

One question raised by Town Councilor, Chad Franz, was whether or not the remodel would be able to accommodate any possible expansions that may be needed in dispatch as the community continues to grow.

Cheetham said they usually have two dispatchers and a supervisor working at a time,

but the remodeled space would allow for more.

"Set up allows up to three working dispatchers and a dispatch supervisor," Cheetham said.

He also noted if they ran into an emergency they could also convert office space into more workstations.

"This meets our current needs, but also allows for future growth as well," Cheetham said.

The Town Council approved allocating ARPA funds towards the remodel project.

Zoning Board Approve Variances For Gas Station Sign

One of the agenda items during the Aug. 16 Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting was in regards to a number of variance requests for 174/178 Rockingham Road, which is owned by Nouria Energy Corporation.

Ari Pollack, an attorney representing the applicant, said the property was originally three separate lots of record and they all had their

own frontage on Rockingham Road. They have since been merged together and they received a conditional use permit to allow a gas station and the site plan received approval to allow a convenience store as well.

The main argument for granting the different variances Pollack pointed to is that they would be allowed more signage if they had the original lots still.

"It would essentially have punished the land

owner for having merged three properties into one," Pollack said.

He said the variances were addressing the proposed signage particularly for the free standing sign. Pollack said the proposal is similar to what others have requested in Londonderry.

Pollack explained they have frontage and visibility from Route 28 and they have a corner lot.

"The freestanding sign is proposed along

Route 28," Pollack said.

He said they would have the appropriate setbacks for the district and they wouldn't need any variances for it and they were only seeking variance for the sign itself.

One of the variance requests was to allow a 20 foot sign where 10 feet is allowed.

Pollack argued that the taller sign like the other variance requests wouldn't change the characteristic of the neighborhood or would reduce property values. The ZBA agreed and granted the variance request unanimously.

Also during the meeting, the ZBA heard a variance request to allow a sign that is 70

square feet in area while 30 square feet is the maximum area allowed.

Pollack said the larger sign area is to allow for the sub tenant to have a placard.

"The larger signs allows the site operator to advertise the cafe and sub tenants with placards within the sign," Pollack said.

He explained that Nouria Energy has their own cafe and doesn't think they would be on the freestanding sign, however, they would have it for a subtenant.

The ZBA unanimously approved the variance request.

Another variance that the ZBA approved was to allow a sign that is neither a monument

sign nor a directory sign.

Pollack stated they would have a pylon sign that is common for gas stations.

The company also requested a variance to allow a changeable electronic sign where changeable electronic signs are not permitted.

One question raised was how often the prices would be changed.

They were told that the changes in the prices would be infrequent.

No one spoke for or against the applicant for any of the variance requests.

Members of the Zoning Board ultimately approved the variance request.

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Pickleball Task Force Give Update to Town Council

The Town Council heard an update regarding the Pickleball Task Force during the Aug. 14 meeting.

"We're here tonight to give you a quick update about where we are," Brian Samolyk, Chair of the task force, said.

He said the group was formed a few weeks ago and it's "running at a fast clip."

Since forming, he told the Town Council they have made commit-

tee assignments including for people to look at potential locations, to find out what vendors to talk to and to see what kind of equipment would be needed if they were to move forward with having pickleball in town.

"It really has been kind of an intense effort for the first couple of weeks," Samolyk said.

He said they have also been working with Kirsten Hildonen, Administrative Support Coordinator, who has explained to the task

force how to run meetings properly.

"That's something that's new to me," Samolyk said.

They are meeting with a lot of different people and are looking at different current pickleball sites

Steve Spaziani, a task force member, said they are looking at fundraising and grant opportunities and are also looking at the ways other towns have gotten money to get it built.

The main task currently for the task force

is to get as much feedback from the community as possible. They said one of the ways they are planning on doing so is by having a booth at the Londonderry Senior Expo coming up at the end of September.

Also during the meeting, the Town Council heard from two candidates regarding an open Budget Committee seat.

After hearing from the two candidates, Paula Moore and Kate Burbidge, the Town Council felt both candi-

dates could be selected to fill the opening.

"We have two good candidates," Town Councilor, Ron Dunn, said.

There were also questions about whether or not they could appoint two different people. One of the openings was Dunn's seat, who's seat became vacant after he became a member of the Town Council, and Tim Siekmann's seat, who resigned last month following being charged with numerous felonies.

Since the open position was still being advertised for, the Town Council decided to wait for a future meeting to see if there are any more candidates before making a decision.

However, both candidates were encouraged to attend one of the upcoming Budget Committee meetings as the Town Council's invited guests.

The next Town Council meeting is slated to take place on Sept. 11 at 7 p.m.

Second Derry Medical Center Building Headed for Woodmont

During the most recent Planning Board meeting, one of the agenda items was in regards to a conceptual discussion about a proposed site plan to build a 30,000 square foot office building with associated site improvements on Michels Way, which is part of Woodmont Commons.

Chris Nickerson from Nickerson Designs, LLC explained to the board they would be building a second medical building in Woodmont Commons.

Nickerson said they were looking to get comments from the

board so they know what comments and concerns they may have about the project before they submit their formal site plan in an attempt for it to go smoothly.

"We like to get this one moving as quickly as possible," Nickerson said.

He stated that the first Derry Medical Center building is approximately 42,000 square feet and opened in May.

"All of the feedback we have gotten has been extremely positive," Nickerson said.

One of the features that Nickerson said many people like

about the building is the walkability of it, saying employees are able to take walks during their lunch break and soon there will be other things in the complex. He added that the amenities will likely help attract employees easier.

Nickerson told the Planning Board that they received some comments from the Heritage Commission and one of the items brought up by some commission members was having more bricks, something they would be incorporating.

He said they incorporated some arch win-

dows into the north facade of the building as well as the west side of the building.

Another comment brought up by the Heritage Commission was to add more green space by taking out some parking spaces.

It was noted by Bob Duval from TF Moran that they eliminated three spaces. He added that they have more spots in the plans than needed because of the user requirements.

Nickerson also high-

lighted the economics of the project and for example, the first medical building has an annual tax bill of about \$180,000.

"That's real tax dollars being generated," Nickerson said.

Assistant Town Manager, Kellie Caron, said they have had several productive conversations with the applicant and they have done a good job with incorporating the comments. She added that they are also wrapping up the

technical review comments for the applicant.

Planning Board Chair, Art Rugg, who also serves as Vice Chair of the Heritage Commission, thought it was a good design.

"It has class, it has style," Rugg said.

No time frame was given about when the formal site plan application would be submitted.

The next Planning Board meeting is slated to take place on Sept. 6 at 7 p.m.

Save Planet Earth With Nuclear Power

To the editor,
We have to reduce Carbon emissions to address global warming. Renewable energy sources like wind power and solar power can only provide about 20% of our power requirements. To meet energy needs in the eastern U.S. we would need 100,000 square miles of solar panels (the size of New England) or 800,000 square miles of windmills (the size of Alaska and California).

As a past scientist and engineer I believe the solution could be the construction of small-scale nuclear power generating units linked together. A drawback to nuclear power has been previous accidents. The Chernobyl plant accident was due to shoddy construction and mismanagement, and the Three Mile Island partial meltdown was due to inadequate operator training. Another draw-

back has been the high cost of building large nuclear power plants.

Kairos Power is testing a small scale and affordable nuclear power unit in New Mexico. It is only 16 feet tall and could be housed in a small building. It uses molten fluoride salt to cool the reactor. If there is a cut to the power for the cooling system and a failure of safety systems, the reactor will not melt down.

Nuclear power plants produce a minimal amount of spent fuel which is safely stored in sealed and monitored casks at the plant sites. The use of deep drilling to create horizontal bore holes could provide permanent storage facilities.

The future of our planet could rely on the replacement of fossil fuel power plants with nuclear power systems.

able. We expect to have a good result."

Scannell has already applied for a statewide dredge and fill permit, getting comments from the NH Department of Environmental Services.

There was some worry from members of the Conservation Commission over the size of the size.

"I don't understand why you need so many parking spaces," wondered Conservation member Susan Malouin.

The proposed parking lot is larger than what is required by the town. The size is based on estimates by Tesla

over how many spaces they feel are needed to serve expected customers in the area and over 40 expected employees.

There was also concern about plans to put the parking lot and what the plan has is a buffer zone designed to protect the surrounding environment. Town law generally prohibits having a parking lot in the zone, even with approval by the Conservation Commission.

"Our conditional use permit, that part of our zoning ordinance, allows us to recommend granting a conditional use permit for certain things," said alternative Conservation member, Mike

Speltz. "But parking is not one of those permitted uses of the buffer, I think this is problematic."

Scannell developer, Leo Leighton, acknowledged concerns about the buffer zone, expressing a willingness to make some changes if needed and promising to "restore" the area "through replanting" in the near future. He also pledged to work in accordance with NH Fish and Wildlife recommendations moving forward.

Despite their concerns over the environmental impact of construction, the Conservation Commission expressed their enthusiasm for seeing Tesla come into Londonderry.

"This is the first step in the process," Richard said.

He noted that it's arguably the most important step in the process and its the foundation of what they are going to build off of.

As part of the process, Richard said they would interview staff to try to understand the operations of the department.

Richard explained that they would also do an assessment of what each space would need.

Another aspect they would be looking at is a site analysis, where they determine if there may be any issues with things like zoning or

how traffic would be impacted.

From there, they would come up with different concepts and would have meetings with the town to determine what makes the most sense.

"What we will walk away with is what is the preferred concept for the town," Richard said.

Richard stated that when they eventually come up with costs, it would be not just for the building, but costs in the future as well.

He said they want to make sure what they propose to build makes sense for the present, as well as long term.

"We want to make sure that we get it right," Richard said.

Richard added they

expect for the project to take about four months, but it could be expedited or it could take longer depending on the pace the town moves in.

"It really moves at the town pace," Richard said.

The Town Council ultimately approved allocating \$64,500 in ARPA funds for the study to be done.

Earlier this summer, Wholley suggested that the town might want to look at relocating the Drop Off Center to where the existing DPW facility is located and move the DPW operation closer to the center of town. The recently purchased land next to the Police Deptment was suggested.



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Slater Looks To Add More Information To District Website

One of the agenda items during the most recent School Board meeting was in regards to a discussion about adding more information to the school district's website specifically for the business page.

School Board Chair, Bob Slater, said he recently met with Business Administrator, Lisa McKenney, about getting more information up. He

added that he thinks it would be good to get as much information out to the public by posting more to the site.

"I would like to continue working with her a little bit and make some changes to the face page of the business section, which is the RFPs and RFQs the bidding process," Slater said,

One of the things he stated that they could potentially have on the site is their manifest once they are approved

by the school board. He added that it happens in other school districts. Other things he said could possibly be added is more information about open and awarded bids and who bidders were for different projects.

"Just simple stuff like that," Slater said.

Slater said he also thought it would be good to have more information accessible to the community because people would be able to

look there or they can be pointed in the right direction when seeking information about different things.

"I think it's good for people to see where their tax dollars are going and if they have a question, we don't have to take time out of our day," Slater said.

He explained that he was looking to be able to have more transparency when it comes to the district.

"This district is (an)

open book, but I'd like to continue the conversation with Lisa over the next month or so," Slater said.

McKenney said they can discuss further about exactly what the School Board is looking to have on the website, saying she looked at some other school district websites to see what they have and she thinks sometimes if you flood it with too much information it could have an opposite

impact.

For example, she said by having too much information on the district's website it could be hard for people to navigate it and find the information they are looking for.

"I want to put meaningful information up that people can go to take a look at and really extract some good data and not just put up so much stuff out," McKenney said.

ZBA Grant Frontage Variance For Meadow Drive Garage

During the most recent, Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting, one of the cases was in regards to a proposed variance request to allow a garage to be located 16.3 feet from the front property line while a 40 foot setback is required.

George Chadwick, who was representing the owner of the proper-

ty at 3 Meadow Drive, explained that they were proposing to build a 28x32' garage on the site.

Chadwick explained that there is a shed currently in the front of the property, which they would be moving as part of the project.

"We would be removing the shed," he said.

It was explained by Chadwick that one of the unique things about the

property is that the road isn't centered in the right of way and the pavement for the road is 34 feet away from the existing property line.

"Meadow Drive is located 34 feet from the edge of the property line," Chadwick said.

He stated that the proposed garage they are looking for a variance for is 50 feet away from the edge of pavement, but still wouldn't

be 40 feet from the property line.

Another issue pointed out by Chadwick is that there is a leach field located in the back of the house with a garden as well. He added that the left side of the property wouldn't be a feasible option for the garage because of the way it slopes down.

Timothy Savoy, owner of the property, explained that when he originally bought the house he was told the property line was seven feet from the street, however, when he hired Chadwick to draw plans

for the garage, they learned that it wasn't the case. He noted that because of it they have been landscaping all the way to the street.

Chadwick told the ZBA they didn't think it would affect the essential character of the neighborhood, saying there are many in the area that have garages that are about 50-feet away from the street, which would be in their case. He said ultimately people don't see property lines and instead look at where things are located.

He also stated that they felt they would only be adding value to other properties and they wouldn't be negatively impacting anyone by having the garage.

The ZBA agreed that there were features unique to the property and granted the zoning variance during the meeting with the one condition being that the garage can't be any larger than 28x32.

The next Zoning Board meeting is slated to take place on Sept. 20 at 7 p.m.

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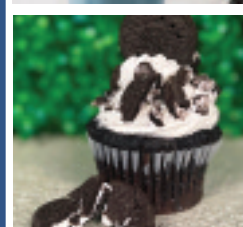
