In a staff memo, it was explained that Page Rock owns the properties at 3 Page Road, 556 Mammoth Road, and 295 Rockingham. Ultimately, they were looking for rezoning of the 556 Mammoth Rd. property in order for all the lots to be zoned the same in order to develop there.

Brad Westgate, an attorney representing Page Rock LLC, said the plan is to have a multifamily residential complex for 40 units, which they would be able to get as a conditional use

Black said the official enrollment numbers, which get reported to the state and federal government, will be pulled on Oct.1.

We are saying all this because every so often, when something controversial happens or a contested election arrives, we are accused - and that's the accurate word - of running "only one side" of an issue, while failing to run letters from the opposing side. We're accused of bias and not doing our

That's one of the most insulting things to say to a journalist or newspaper owner. Only in the editorial itself does the newspaper take a stand on an issue.

Letters, on the other hand, are the opinion of the letter writer, and they have nothing to do with the opinion of anyone at the newspaper. We print letters critical of the newspaper when they come to us.

We print letters we privately agree disagree with constantly. We have no control over the matter, nor do we want control over others' opinions.


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Elementary and Middle School Curriculum Coordinators Present Spring Data

The Londonderry Elementary and Middle School curriculum coordinators presented Spring data to the School Board during its Sept. 5 meeting.

the need for pump stations around South Road. He cited a water main break in Pilsbury two years ago that temporarily cut water service to much of the town when the Mountain Homes pump station shut down due to low pressure. A backup source through a new water tower would allow the system to maintain pressure, preventing a similar shutdown in the

"The plan is to start in 2024, we'll start as early as we can, everything should be in use and service by the end of the year," said Boisvert. Plans for the water tower were approved last year.

Pennichuck doesn't anticipate any supply problems from the source at the Merrimack River, despite a growing population. There were no supply issues during the last drought, and

although the company was watching for any changes to environmental standards, Boisvert specifically raised the possibility of new federal regulations around manganese levels in the water.

A more extensive buildout to connect 350 homes in the Saint-Gobain Consent Decree area and High Range is still in the planning stages, although Pennichuck has conducted an initial engineering study. The extension would serve neighborhoods across the west side of Londonderry.

There were questions as to what type of new piping would go into any future project, including the Gordon Drive water tower.

"Why would we not want to replace the existing line with a larger, 16-inch pipe to feed the Mountain Homes station?" asked Utilities Committee alternate

"From a common-sense standpoint, it seems like something we'd want to do, right?"

Boisvert told the Committee that larger pipes would mean a larger pumping station most of Londonderry wouldn't need.

However, there are several unknown factors including where a new pipeline will be located. Despite an initial study, Pennichuck was reluctant to move forward without hearing back from Saint-Gobain, and there are no detailed plans in place so far.

While members of the Utilities Committee expressed concern over funding new pipes, the NH Department of Environmental Services has confirmed that closure of the plastic facility move "does not affect or amend" the plastic company's responsibilities to Londonderry residents.

Saying, there is significant problems with the foundation due to water running beneath the structure and in order to do anything with the building, a proper foundation would be necessary, this would most likely mean lifting the building and cost a great deal of money. He mentioned a figure of about \$3 million.

Farrell felt that the voters would not pass a warrant article for \$3M and thought a much lower figure would need

to be proposed.

Former Town Councilor and Londonderry Times publisher, Deb Paul, expressed her feelings on the subject, saying that determining a dollar figure should come after the residents of Londonderry settle on a use for the building.

She said, "At the end of the day, the council has the decision, but the building belongs to, we the people, of Londonderry."

Richard Lewis Fitts

Richard Lewis Fitts, 63, of Los Gatos, CA died peacefully at home on Aug. 17, 2021. He was born Sept. 22, 1957 at the Alexander Eastman Hospital in Derry, NH. Our mother told us while giving birth, Dr. LaRochelle exclaimed OH MY! There's another one! He had no idea, nor our mother that there were twins, & there was Dickie. Our little brother.

As a child he was a mischievous rascal. He often defied the rules of school & home, landing him in trouble. There was more than one parent teacher conference in grade school. Every year he wrote the same book report, John F. Kennedy's PT109. Later, all his school reports were on the internal combustion engine. One time when he was very young, he & a friend painted a neighbor's house with kerosene. He got in big trouble for that one. Another time he took an axe to all of the paint cans stored in the garage.

He was the son of Lewis Richard Fitts & Mildred (Field) Fitts & grew up in Londonderry, NH. He graduated from Pinkerton Academy in 1975. His favorite thing to do was to skip school & drive around in cousin Donnie Prescott's 1966 souped up red Ford Mustang.

As a child he was adventurous & creative. He & his best childhood friend built forts, rafts to float on ponds, invented spy games, played pond ice hockey, explored the woods, adopted stray animals, built & launched model rockets during the era of the Space Race.

Later he channeled that energy into creating a successful business, remodeling custom homes in the Los Gatos, CA area. His general contractor business thrived for 28 years up to his passing. He was a proud & meticulous craftsman, & his work was sought after. His mountain home community loved him. He was never idle. Always building. Just like his grandfather & father before him he built his own home in CA for his family. It is a beautiful house filled with unique features. He treated his sisters and his family to his works of craftsmanship. There was a birdhouse that was an exact replica of our grandparent's house. There was also a jewelry box handcrafted from rare & exotic woods from Africa & other places all over the world.



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
