"This Technical Advisory is to provide guidance on meal availability pursuant to RSA 189:11a," the advisory stated. The Department is issuing this Technical Advisory to ensure that districts are aware of their obligation to provide one meal for each student, including kindergarten and pre-kindergarten students pursuant to RSA 189:11-a."



In the meantime, Vice Chair, Art Rugg, suggested that they continue to work with abuttors to address any of their concerns.

"They're the ones who can make or break the whole thing," he said.



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ersource to Continue with Steel Poles Replacement

The Conservation Commission met on April 9 to hear from Licensing and Permitting Manager of Eversource, Kurt Nelson, and consultant, John Relleno, who were there to give a presentation on the company's I-158 Line Structure Replacement.

"It's a similar project to what you have seen many times before," said Nelson. "Many of our laminated wood pole structures that were found to be defective are going to be replaced in their entirety. Slowly but changed out to steel."

Relleno noted that Eversource needed to access its infrastructure "quite often" for maintenance and line inspections, especially around their Scobie Pond substation.

As such, they already had plans in place to avoid disturbing the surrounding environment too much and the addition of rock fords to bypass wetlands without interrupting the flow of water would allow easier access without needing to ask for a permit every time.

"Overall temporary wetland impact for the project is 132,000 square feet, permanent impact is 10,472, temporary buffer impact is 18,327,

impact, that would be from the permanent gravel roads we would like to leave for continuous access, is 114,222," Relleno outlined in response to several questions from Conservation.

Eversource also promised to gate off their new trails to prevent unwanted access from members of the public. Offroad ATVs have been a problem for fenced-off land in Londonderry before.

"Would you be amenable to providing us a plan, a mark-up map that shows the number and type of gates you're going to be providing?" asked Conservation member, Michael Speltz. "We've played this tune before, it's very important for us limits ATVs and the gates are the best thing we've come up with."

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



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
