"I believe we have a problem with the system regarding review of applications such as design review, wetland permits, and conditional use permits," said Conservation Chair, Marge Badois. "A couple of meetings ago we had the warehouse project where they were looking for a conditional use permit, and we were confused why they were asking for this if they were getting a wetland permit."

## Editorial Doing Our Share

Whether or not there are border guards or high fences they won't make any difference in stopping entry into the U.S., they have no impact and these invaders are amongst us every day.

Now is the time to stop them at the roots because they are working on new growth so their roots are weak, in the fall it is the opposite.

Conservation officials remind us that invasive plants are a problem in our towns, and they're a problem in our waterways as well. According to the state's invasive species coordinator, invasive plants impact endangered or threatened species, reduce diversity and wildlife habitat, impact water quality, damage property, and can lead to the starvation of birds and other wildlife.

Just to name a few; Japanese knotweed, bittersweet, purple loosestrife, multiflora rose, Russian olive, and burning bushes thrive locally and have a stranglehold on portions of our woodlands and roadsides. We don't have to leave our yards to encounter invasive plants we never put in the ground ourselves. The invasives are many and varied, and some, such as burning bush and loosestrife, are pretty. That attractiveness doesn't make up for the damage they cause.

Oh, let us not forget the invasive bugs like jumping worms and hammer worms that can destroy your yard in a heartbeat.

What invasives do is simple, they take over which then leads to crowding out native plants. Educating yourself is key.

It's a battle we might be losing. This problem can't be left to someone else to deal with, it will take a village because if these plants or worms are near your yard or by the road, they'll be in your yard soon enough.

Meanwhile, if you think the water is safe from unwelcome visitors, think again. With boating season underway, state officials regularly issue warnings to boaters to pay attention to what they might be putting in the water. When boating at any lake check your boat before they enter the water to make sure you aren't bringing any unwelcome weeds to a lake currently free from these damaging invasives.

NH now demands a new way to look at littering boats, trailers, motors, fishing equipment, bait buckets, and diving gear since they can carry aquatic weeds, leaving an infested lake. With no natural predators, the plants quickly dominate native plants, fish, and aquatic life. That translates into impaired water quality and reduced shorefront property values.

Homeowners can help control these invaders by learning to identify them, joining in volunteer efforts to control them, and carefully disposing of pulledup roots for plants, any soil for worms, and for water think about shoes, or tires during launching and of boats. Removing them is important, but you can always check with the state's Cooperative Extension Service for advice.

Once an invasive gets a foothold, it's too late. Prevention is key and is the duty of every boater. Back on land, you can contact your local conservation commission, garden group, or the state for advice on getting rid of invasive plants. This battle won't be won unless each of us does our share.






