Planning Board Discusses Moratorium On Development

At the end of the Dec. 3 Londonderry Planning Board meeting, board member Tony DeFrancesco once again brought up the topic of potentially having a temporary moratorium on development.

“We need to discuss it, we need to talk about it, we need to bring it up,” Planning Board Chair Jake Butler said during a previous meeting.

At that meeting, Butler explained that they

are in a “unique time” right now, explaining that in the past year, they have had over 1,000 units either approved or actively being worked on. Butler added that they have infrastructure issues that they need to

PUD Development Raises Residents Traffic Concerns

The first December meeting Planning Board saw extensive public input for the latest stage of the Village at Technology Hill Planned Use Development. Many worried the design did not go far enough in reducing traffic concerns.

“My understand was that nobody was going to address the intersection at Page and Old Mammoth for traffic,” said Robin Steward of 522 Mammoth Road. “The Old Mammoth, and we’ve been fighting for this for several years, finally got striping down the middle and we did

get stop signs.”

In particular, she noted speeding and noise from large trucks already using Mammoth and the surrounding roads would only grow worse considering the scale of the industrial PUD. The Page/Mammoth intersection has seen several accidents over the past few years.

“What are you doing to protect us?” asked Steward. “We already pay our taxes, and we already live here.”

Engineer Nick Golan noted there had been an overview of their traffic study at an earlier meeting.

“We evaluated off-site intersections to see if any improvements would be

required,” he said. “In this instance, two off-site improvements were required: those are left-hand turn lanes at Technology and Akria, and at Kitty Hawk.”

Developers were coordinating their traffic improvements with Town Engineer John Trottier.

“What dictates those off-site improvements?” asked Planning Chair Jake Butler. “What is the mechanism that says you have to do this as a result of their traffic study?”

Golan stated that concerns over traffic delays and congestion drove the study, along with what off-site im-

Community Aggregation Plan Tentatively Launching March

The Londonderry Utilities Committee met on Dec. 3 to hear about progress on the Community Aggregation Plan from Bart Fromuth of Freedom Energy Logistics, who assured the Committee they were clear of all regulatory hurdles with the state’s Public Utilities Commission.

“We got our approval from NH PUC in August, and since that time, we’ve effectively been ‘street legal’ in the state of NH for our Community Choice Aggregation Program,” he explained.

“The one thing I’ve been waiting to find out is where the Eversource rates are going to go. We hope to learn that information on Dec. 12.”

Fromuth was confident prices were looking “competitive,” allowing him to give an estimated start date of March 2025. That date was not set in stone, initial rate estimates have been inaccurate in the past.

“We think, right now, there’s a market opportunity that will have us some good savings,” he said. “We still have to do mailings to the residents. When the Town Manager or their design-

nee signs off on our first power contract, we have an obligation per the state statute to give our residents a 30-day notice via mailing. After that mailing has been issued, we also have an obligation to have a public hearing a public gathering where we answer question from residents.”

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Proposed Athletic Budget Reviewed by School Board

The Londonderry School Board reviewed the proposed \$480,840 athletic budget, which would be an increase of \$36,538 over the current budget. For game officials Athletic Director Jimmy Lauzon said they were proposing \$66,500 for Londonderry High School and \$18,000 for Londonderry Middle School.

"Another part of the game official budget line is termed security, which

is the money allocated for hiring police officers to cover games," Lauzon said. "This amount, \$7,500 dollars, is the same as last year, and it is the amount requested for security to cover all home football games, most basketball games, and various other tournament games and athletic events held on school district property and at the hockey arena."

Another line item part of the budget is for the high school's repair/maintenance, which

Lauzon said is being proposed at \$13,000 which is the same amount they spent last year.

"The amount reflected in this line is needed because as our football helmets and shoulder pads age, and the cost to recondition them increases due to an increase in the number of parts that need to be replaced, which is necessary to certify them to meet the NOCSAE safety standard. There has been an increase in the high school football pro-

gram, which has required more helmets and shoulder pads," Lauzon said.

He explained that the "remaining balance is set aside for unanticipated repairs that may occur during the season."

"Lastly, this line includes money to repair and maintain the three-school district owned minibusses to keep them in top condition and the decrease in spending in this line is primarily because the minibuses were purchased in the last two years and the repair/maintenance costs have dropped significantly," Lauzon said.

Another highlight of the proposed budget is for rentals which is being proposed at \$90,000.

"This money is used to rent ice time and a locker room for our JV and Varsity ice hockey teams, pool time for our swim teams," Lauzon said.

He said \$19,000 is for "indoor rental for spring sports prior to being able to use our outdoor facilities or facility rentals for when our fields are unusable."

"The increased cost is due to the new additional costs for golf course rental for our golf team, which was free previously," Lauzon said. "In addition to the golf course change, there is also a new cost for the rental gymnasium for our meets during gymnastic season. Lastly, any other increase to this line is because of the increase in pool and ice rental costs along with

the cost to rent ice." For general supplies the proposed budget would be for \$32,000 at Londonderry High School and \$4,500 for Londonderry Middle School.

"These amounts represent money to purchase balls, scorebooks, medical supplies, and other miscellaneous equipment needed," Lauzon said.

Lauzon said that the proposed budget "reflects our commitment to maintaining a high-quality athletic program while adapting to increasing costs and evolving needs. We continue to prioritize student safety, program excellence, and responsible fiscal management while providing comprehensive athletic opportunities for our students."

ough to judge," argued Steward. "How are you going to stop the traffic? How are you going to let us live our lives when you have people shooting down this road all the time?"

Town Council liaison Shawn Faber added that traffic concerns has been a "hot button" issue across Londonderry.

"There's a lot of other roads, there's a lot of other intersections that

need to be taken care of," said Faber. "We need to start looking at this from an overarching level."

Co-Developer Dick Anagnost claimed the PUD would represent the "second largest taxpayer" in Londonderry, behind Granite Ridge, and that their revenue would be an important contributor to costs associated with policing and infrastructure improvements.

Bob Merrill, of 569 Mammoth Road, also expressed his concerns about how the PUD would impact people already living in the area.

"Going back to August when we were doing the infrastructure one of the things that were brought up is that they wanted to run most of the truck traffic up to the industrial area. I think it should be spread out where some of it is going up Kitty

Hawk and maybe even spread out some of it to go toward Technology," he suggested. "Not all the traffic will be going towards one spot."

Merrill worried about safety and noise issues if all traffic attributed to the PUD was funneled onto Mammoth without controls in place.

Despite the concerns, the board voted to conditionally approve the site plan.

The Utilities Committee hoped to get the contract for the plan signed sooner rather than later, something that would require coordination with the new acting Town Manager.

"The Town Manager has signature authority, when do we need to present that to him to sign it?" asked Committee Chair Lynn Wiles.

Presuming the rates were favorable, Fromuth wanted the contract signed on the same day they got the final rates. This would likely be sometime after Dec. 12, as several rounds of "indicative pricing" were needed to make a final determination of Aggregation rates. He agreed to send the Committee a sample contract, giving its members time to look over likely terms in the Aggregation agreement, even without the final rate numbers.

If the Dec. 12 rates prove to be higher than expected, the March launch would be pushed

back to summer 2025. Freedom Energy Logistics and Colonial Power have repeatedly emphasized the need for a launch date with rates below Eversource.

"The next launch window would not be until about July, because that's when we get the rate information for the

August cycle," said Fromuth, who reiterated the importance of showing immediate results from Community Aggregation. "If it's choppy, or if there's not savings to be had, it kills the program in the cradle, and towns usually fold after that in terms of moving forward with this."

"A few of us have a briefing with the Town Manager to tell him where we're at for this program and to get him ready to sign on the dotted line," said Wiles.

The next meeting is set for Tuesday, Jan. 7, 2025, on the first floor of the Moose Hill Council Chambers.

address along with staffing issues as well.

"We have a lot of things that need to be addressed," Butler said.

It was explained by DeFrancesco during the Dec. 3 meeting, that he thinks they should decide on whether or not they wanted to ask the Town Council at this point to look at implementing a temporary moratorium on development.

DeFrancesco said he thinks if they were to go with a temporary moratorium the "legal calamity that it could cause is very real."

He also said that based on his research he thinks the case law is "sketchy" and said if something was enacted now "it could cost the taxpayers quite a bit of money" also noting it could disrupt some things.

"We need to have consensus one way or another," DeFrancesco said.

Planning Board Vice Chair Art Rugg said he thinks the best thing to do is to have a joint meeting at some point between the Planning Board and the Town Council.

"They're the ones that are going to make the decision on it, it's not us," Rugg said.

Planning Board ex-officio Giovanni Verani previously said he thinks staffing needs to be addressed independent of a proposed growth moratorium.

"I think that starts with the Town Council to hire a Town Manager," he said.

He also noted that there is a housing crisis going on in the State, and that Londonderry is in a favorable location to build.

"There is a huge housing crisis out

there," Verani said, noting that they should look at smart development.

It was ultimately decided by the Planning Board to not take any action at this time.

Butler said that it's important that they at least discussed the potential for seeking a temporary moratorium.

"I think what's important is we had the conversation about it because it seems a lot of the time we don't have conversation," he said.

He also said he hopes the Town will support looking at the infrastructure needs in Town.

"I hope that through this conversation our leadership at the council realizes that the infrastructure throughout this town is a real issue and it should be front and center and it needs to be discussed. It needs to be figured out how some of these improvements can be funded," Butler said.

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Hudson Teenager Threatens Teens, Mom Near Airport with a Machete

An 18-year-old Hudson man was arrested last week on four counts of criminal threatening with a deadly weapon after police say he used a machete during an argument near the Manchester Regional Airport.

According to a report by Lt. Garrett Malloy of the Londonderry Police Department, on Friday, Dec. 13, at approximate-

ly 11:15 p.m., the Londonderry Police Department responded to a report of Criminal Threatening with a weapon.

Officers determined that three juvenile females had been stopped in a vehicle on Planeview Drive when a second vehicle approached. The occupants of the second vehicle allegedly shouted at the juveniles before leaving the area. The juveniles recognized

the individuals due to an ongoing dispute be-

tween the parties.

One of the juveniles called her mother, who arrived at the scene. Shortly thereafter, the suspect vehicle returned, and the male driver exited the car, holding what appeared to be a machete. The suspect reportedly threatened the juveniles and the adult with the weapon.

The victims provided officers with a description of the suspect and the vehicle, including its

registration number. A "Be On the Lookout" (BOLO) alert was issued to surrounding law enforcement agencies for 18-year-old Timothy Maghakian of Hudson.

According to the report, Maghakian was apprehended just over an hour later in Merrimack.

The report states, "At approximately 12:30 a.m., the Merrimack Police Department located the vehicle and took Maghakian into custody. He

was arrested on four counts of Criminal Threatening with a Deadly Weapon. His vehicle was impounded, pending a search warrant. No injuries were reported in the incident.

Maghakian refused bail and was transported to the Rockingham County House of Corrections."

Maghakian was scheduled to appear in Derry District Court on Monday, Dec. 16.

Conservation Commission Tries to Determine Status of Land Donation

The Conservation Commission met on Nov. 26 to discuss what the impact would be regarding the recent resignation of Town Manager Mike Malaguti would be regarding environmental planning in town. Recreation Director Art Psaledas will serve as the Acting Town Manager.

"Art can contact Mike and ask him any questions you guys have. Mike has agreed to help us out with the transition," said Town Council Liaison Ron Dunn. "Anything you guys have in

the works; Mike is willing to help us."

Chair Marge Badois was particularly concerned about legal issues around land acquisitions the Conservation Commission hoped to finalize over the next few months, including a land donation around the intersection of Highway 102 and Parmenter Road. Alternate Mike Speltz was unsure when that donation would come before the Town Council for approval.

"I did inspect the property. I saw no environmental concerns," said Speltz. "My offer was to draft a deed, but I

don't have an answer if the town wants that."

He wanted more information on the matter from the Town Manager and the Town Council on the donation. Members wanted to eliminate any question over land ownership.

The Conservation Commission announced progress on the boat launch.

"We have gotten an approval from our permit-by-notification," said Speltz. "One of the requirements is that we record an agreement with the DES at the registry. That requires the signature of not only Marge, which is pretty straightforward, but of the contractor as well. The contractor is obligated to follow the con-

ditions of approval and right now, the contractor doesn't even know we're revising the design."

Getting approval from the NH Department of Environmental Services had taken longer than expected.

The Commission also talked about what they wanted to do in response to the developing Master Plan, which had undertaken a survey.

"We are going to be publishing the results of the survey," said Badois.

"There is interest in people keeping informed on this."

Green development had been a topic of discussion with both the Conservation Commission and the Master Plan Committee, mainly as part of the debate over what to do with existing land-use regulations in town.

"It would be appropriate to have something in the plan saying we should have something in the plan saying we should revise site

plan and subdivision regulations to be more supportive of green development," said Speltz. "No minimum required parking spaces, EV charging, sidewalks, all of these things."

He singled out adding more EV stations as an area he believed the Commission should focus on, especially with the expected growth of both Londonderry and electric vehicle ownership in the coming decades.

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Library Trustees Face Questions Over Support of Library Director

The Leach Library Board of Trustees had a decent turnout from the public at its Dec. 4 meeting, first hearing from Head of Circulation Services Megan Donovan of 45 Chase Road.

"There have been many instances of people coming up to me: patrons, friends, talking about how the Trustees don't support the library staff," said Donovan, who specifically wanted to address rumors that at least some Trustees wanted to remove Library Director Erin Matlin. "Is that something you support here in the library staff, or do you want to see a change?"

Donovan said the source of the rumors could not be confirmed.

"That's obviously a rumor," said Trustee Christine Fitzgerald. "I support the library and I support its staff, otherwise I wouldn't be here as a Trustee, but I also support the citizens and taxpayers."

Fitzgerald added the Library Trustees were volunteering their time.

When pressed for a yes or no answer as to whether they supported the Library Director, the Trustees declined to elaborate beyond emphasizing their support for the library. Other members of the public expressed frustration at this, including Donna Reinhold of 77 Pendleton Ln.

"I want to put it on the record, I think Erin Matlin is doing a great job. I'm a little concerned there are rumors, be-

cause rumors come from somewhere," said Reinhold. "I'm concerned there is a member of the Board who will not outright answer. I know that libraries are being politicized, let's no politicize Londonderry's library. This is the gem of the town."

Responding to the questions over the Board's support of Matlin, Treasurer Jan McLaughlin argued that their connection to the Library Director was like "an employer-employee relationships."

"Those relationships aren't something that any manager or employer should be answering about any employee that they manage. It's not appropriate, they should be addressing it directly with the employee in question,"

said McLaughlin. "I think for my colleagues to say 'I support the library' is an appropriate thing for a Library Trustee to say."

Trustee Liz Thomas agreed, saying the Board should use more discretion when discussing sensitive topics.

"Because rumors are appearing in this envi-

ronment, we need to be conscious about what were saying in public," said Thomas.

Resident Erica Laue praised library programs put in place over the last few years.

"I really appreciate what you, and Erin, and all the staff at the library have done for our kids and I agree we should

keep moving in this direction. I appreciate that," she said. "I think the reason that people come and speak at things like this and people volunteer to become Trustees is because we all care so much about this public resource."

Laue asked that everyone to "work together."

The Londonderry High School Boys' Basketball team had an excellent start to the 2024-25 winter sports season, beating the Warriors of Winnacunnet High School by 13-points in the team's home-opener.

The Lancers have come into the new season hoping to improve on their 9-9 record from last year, a not so distant memory where they entered the Division I tournament as the number 11 seed and were taken out in the first round by the Windham

Jaguars.

In their first game of the season, on Friday night, Dec. 13, at home, Londonderry was able to lead throughout the contest, outscoring WHS in three of four quarters.

The Lancers started the first period with a slim 15-14, but pulled away 35-26 by the half.

The LHS squad was then outscored 13-10 in the third, but rebounded in the final quarter 23-16 for the eventual 68-55 victory.

Senior forward, Mason Paquette, led the team in scoring with 16 points.

Paquette had five

successful shots inside the arc and went 6-6 at the foul line.

Senior forward Blake Thompson went four-for-four outside the arc and finished with 12-points in outside shooting.

Senior forward Matt Luongo scored 11-points, getting one three-pointer, one for two and was also 6-6 in free-throws.

Senior Nathan Marshall had nine-points in the game, scoring in every quarter. He had three from the floor and three free-throws.

Senior guard, James Totten, had eight points

with one three-pointer, two baskets and one free-throw.

Other scorers were: Senior Jameson Seaman with six; Senior Cam Madden had three; freshman Garrett Nahlik got two and junior Jaylan Ncala scored one.

The team is scheduled to have two more regular-season games before the holiday break.

The Lancers played in Exeter on Tuesday, Dec. 17, and will finish the week at home against Manchester Memorial on Friday night, Dec. 19, starting at 7 p.m.
