Summers explained that currently the tax exemption is \$300,000.

Town Councilor John Farrell noted that the town of Windham currently has the program in place.

"The town of Windham does it, yes," Summers said.

Summers noted during the meeting that Windham is the only town in the state that has the 100% exemption.

Summers explained that they currently have 84 residents who receive the exemption, and have another six that will be receiving it next year, for a total of 90 for the upcoming tax year.

Assessor Steve Hamilton said he believed only a handful of people receive the full benefit in Windham.

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# School Board Reviews Proposed Personnel Budget

t the most recent School Board meeting, the Board reviewed the proposed personnel budget.

It was explained by Superintendent Dan main things they look at is enrollment.

He explained that the district is projected to have 3,893 students at this point which is 61 students less than they currently have.

It included reducing the number of teachers by two full-time equivalent teaching positions.

Black said however, they aren't expecting anyone to lose their jobs because of the move.

"From analyzing the Master Schedule, we believe we can absorb these two positions with natural turnover of staff for next year while still offering the same range and types of classes for our students," Black

move would be a savings of \$178.060.

Black also noted that they are proposing to swap a counselor posigrade social worker position to be shared between the two schools.

The change wouldn't have any impact on the budget.

"Many of our high need's students need more support in school, and someone with the skillset and time to manage their wrap around services within school and outside of school while providing the counseling services of a social worker," Black said.

Black also noted that He noted that the they were proposing to decrease special education staff by two full-time equivalent teaching positions.

"With the combination for a new 6th-12th tion of decreasing enrollment and changes within our service model to support students more with the general education setting we believe we can absorb the reduction of 2.0 FTEs for the upcoming school year," Black said.

> He said it would be an expected savings of \$178,000 and they wouldn't expect a reduction of force.

Black also explained that benefits and salaries make up about 80% of the budget.

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# **Technology Hill Development Begins Initial Construction Work**

The Londonderry Planning Board met on Dec. 4 to continue their review of the residential phase of the Village on Technology Hill Planned Unit Development. Construction Manager Bruce Blazon, Co-Developer Dick Anagnost, Engineer Nick Golan, and several others were at the meeting to explain how the next phase of their PUD would impact Londonderry as preliminary the Village began.

"I'm pleased to announce that with assis-Engineer John Trottier that we have broken large-scale ground on the infrastructure package," an-Anagnost. nounced "We've started clearing, we've begun site work, and now we'll be able to complete critical path infrastructure items and site work through the winter, like blasting and utilities and that sort of thing. So, we're really excited to be here tonight."

The approval process has been through several stages of approval from town officials due, in part, to the site's multiple uses, ranging from industrial its 439 apartments designed for Technology Hill workers.

Rugg wanted more details on the phased development of residential buildings in the Village.

The total buildout of the residential units is a two-and-a-half to threeand-half year buildout, based on the numbers of buildings and the durations of those buildings," said Blazon. "Many of the buildings will get their foundations in from the 2025 spring to the 2025 fall, and we'll make the determination over how many buildconstruction work for ings we can kick back to the next season."

Construction speed was limited by the numtance from the Town ber of qualified crews capable of working on developments. Blazon said the goal was to keep construction work local when possible.

> "What we're doing now is really building on the prior infrastructure package. We're installing additional sidewalks, we're installing additional buildings, we're installing our landscaping, and we're installing our lighting. Those are really the four primary components," explained Golan. "We're adding amenities, and we're adding our buildings."

> "The idea is that we've provided trees to break up and soften the scale of those buildings. Multiple types of trees that bear different types of seeds, fruits, and nuts that help support different local types of wildlife," said Golan. "We have evergreen trees to provide winter interest, and also a couple of specimen type trees. We're looking at American beech, white oak, red oak, and these can get as tall as 80

While the development had enough parking to support residents, it avoided large parking lots in keeping with a desire to avoid a "mass of pavement" in favor of more public spaces. The plan would include conduits for EV stations without full charging infrastructure. Londonderry has no specific regulations dealing with EV stations.

Owing to the size of the PUD, environmental impact has been a significant, ongoing issue for developers.

"The solar panels on top of all the buildings, are you planning on using the power generated on site? Or are you putting that into the grid?" asked Board Secretary Lynn Wiles.

Anagnost indicated

they would use all energy generated by their panels, mainly for the more energy-intensive industrial buildings. Developers were also in talks with the nearby airport and the FAA over the possible impact such panels could have on nearby planes.

"The expectation is that it will be lighted," said Golan, who did not see the need for an FAA permit as a significant barrier to the PUD.


